

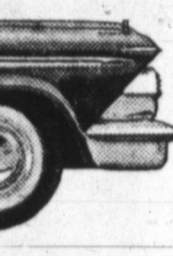

## Red Cross Drive Is Nearing End

A total of \$2362.10 has been deposited to the American Red Cross in Lynn county and additional funds are expected to be turned in by March 31 to again put the county "over the top."  
Quota for the county this year is \$2464. Tahoka has reported \$758.80 and expects an additional \$46.50. However, the town will fall short of its \$900 goal unless mail-in contributions in care of C. W. Roberts, make up the difference.  
O'Donnell has raised \$720 of its \$800 quota and John Ellis, drive chairman there, stated that the town would meet its goal. Wilson surpassed its \$300 quota with \$319.  
Rural communities have almost unanimously met their goals or surpassed them including Dixie with \$68; Newmoore, \$89.80; Petty, \$64; Lakeview, \$71; Wells, \$88.50; Grassland, \$78; New Lynn \$55.50; West Point, \$55.50.  
About \$240.00 has been reported collected at New Home with about \$130; Draw, \$61; and in Tahoka by FHA members, \$46.50.  
Certificates of awards of merit will be presented chairmen of the various communities which reached their quotas.  
A final report is expected next week on the annual drive.

William Madison Smith was born December 23, 1881, in Houston county. He was married on June 24, 1900. He moved to Lynn county in November, 1924 from Knox county, and lived a half mile east of Wells gin, on O'Donnell, Route 3.

**Warning Is Given On Farm Directory Being Worked Again**  
The News has received a warning that the "farm atlas" of "farm directory" racket is bobbing up in this area, and that business firms should investigate thoroughly any attempt to sell advertising for such a proposal.  
Texas Press Association, ever on the alert for such questionable schemes, warns that such directories are of questionable worth to advertisers even if delivered.  
At least one promoter of a "farm atlas" is reported to have contracted with a printer for publications of a county farm directory, sold and collected for the advertising, paid the printer, but skipped out without even delivering the copy to the printer.  
Tahoka Chamber of Commerce maintains a secret committee which investigates on such schemes offered the people of the county to see if they are worth-while and legitimate when the promoters of such are referred to this committee. The public is asked not to buy from strange promoters unless such have been passed on by this committee and given a letter of approval. Proposals may be referred to President Herman Renfro, or Secy. Otis Spears, who will then refer them to the committee.

Rev. Knoy was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Knoy of Tahoka, who died at Brady in 1938, a year after leaving Tahoka. A brother, Albert Knoy, died last year in California.  
He had been in the ministry more than thirty years, pastoring a number of churches over the Plains. He retired three years ago while serving as pastor at Aiken, and moved to Plainview. He was a teacher in the Sunday School of the First Methodist Church of Plainview.

## O'Donnell Lets Pool Contract

O'Donnell's civic improvement program is about to get underway, according to a statement by Mayor J. T. Forbes in last week's Index-Press.  
Contract for the new swimming pool has been let to Texas Blue Lake Swimming Pool Co. of Amarillo on a low bid of \$20,000. The City will build the bath house, pool apron, and fence at an estimated cost of \$5,000 additional.  
The pool will be 82 feet long, 30 feet wide at the deep end and 40 feet wide at the shallow end. The pool will be complete with filters, pumps, tanks, tile rim, underwater lights for night safety, and racing lanes on the pool floor.  
Bids are now being received for two other buildings, the new community house to be erected in the new city park along with the swimming pool, and the new city offices-fire hall building which will be located on lots just west of the present city fire hall. Each building is expected to cost approximately \$10,000.  
Plans are also being made for a paint-up, clean-up week during the month of April.

The church invites everyone in this locality to attend the services.

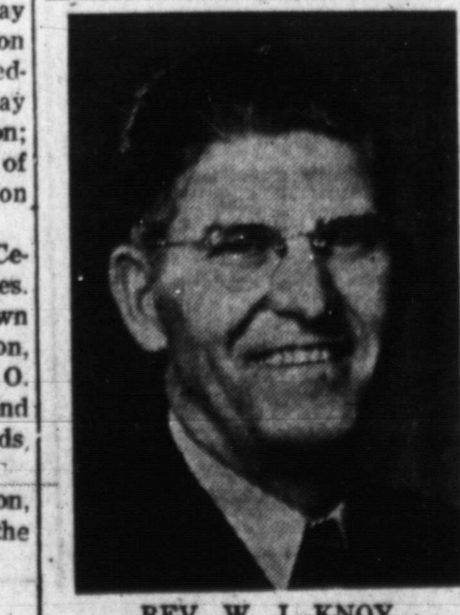
Lynn county bank deposits showed the surprising total of \$15,017,337.50 in reports made last week by the three banks at close of business on March 12.  
This is possibly an all-time record for this date, and is little more than a million dollars less than the December 31 total, which was \$16,128,675.38.  
Loans were also surprisingly low, a total of only \$3,554,260.83 being reported by the three banks.  
However, total deposits are considerably below the peak in January. Unofficially, deposits in the First National Bank of Tahoka are reported to have heached about \$10,600,000 the middle of January.  
On March 12, the First National Bank of Tahoka had on deposit a total of \$9,041,476.83 as compared to \$9,249,762.34 on last December 31. This bank opened the year of 1958 with deposits of slightly less than seven million dollars. Loans outstanding at the First National on March 12 totaled \$1,964,966.13.  
The report of Wilson State Bank shows \$3,389,941.20 on deposit, with loans totaling \$1,167,996.69.  
First National Bank of O'Donnell, which has been going through the process of reorganization, had on deposit \$2,585,919.47 and loans outstanding of \$521,298.01.  
The deposits total is considered unusually high in view of the fact that farmers and businessmen have been paying income taxes and paying off debts.  
However, if the current drought, during which there has been no rain in more than four months, continues, deposits are due to begin dropping sharply. If the drought continues, the surplus will be needed to weather another dry year.

## Coach Wright Is Leaving Tahoka

Deane Wright, Tahoka assistant coach since 1954, will be the new assistant coach of the Slaton Tigers next year, where he will receive a substantial raise in salary over that paid him here.  
Announcement of his employment at Slaton came Thursday of last week along with announcement of the resignation of Leonard Ehler, who has resigned to join the Lubbock City recreation department.  
W. M. Kerr, Junior High coach at Slaton the past six years, is the new Slaton head coach, and Deane Wright will be his first assistant and line coach. Two other assistants named by the school for football are Paul Boswell and Tommy Laccwell, Boswell coming from Cooper and Laccwell from Frenship.

## Lonnie Wheeler Wins Second Place On Essay In Conservation Contest

Lonnie Wheeler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Wheeler and a senior in Tahoka High School, won second place in the annual essay contest on "Conservation and Citizenship" sponsored by the Lynn County Soil Conservation District and Tahoka Chamber of Commerce. The first place essay, written by Marchetta Wood of O'Donnell, was published last week. Following is Wheeler's essay:

As soils and other resources are depleted, human health, vitality and intelligence, and even the national asset of citizenship go with them.

American is built on the foundation of agriculture as a chief means of livelihood, but there is one other great enemy of this ever-expanding enterprise, wasteful depletion of soil and other important natural resources by American citizens. These citizens have no idea of the damage they are

performing through thoughtless abuse of the value of resources which could be put to use in increasing the capital of this country and the more important, in conserving our valuable, but ever-decreasing, means of future existence.

A citizen is one who at all times is entitled to protection by his native government, but there should also be another element added to this government-citizen relationship. The citizen should aid his government in another way other than paying his regular government taxes. The best way that I know to do so is by saving our precious soils, forests, lake, and minerals which make America the richest and most beautiful nation on the earth. But this second type of government-citizen relation has to have the co-operation of every individual citizen. Just one careless citizen could destroy a whole forest of God-made beauty and its

valuable wildlife. The part that one citizen plays in the boosting or the tearing down of American economy and prestige cannot be emphasized enough.

It is evident from our present-day world relations that the efforts of the Soviet Union's struggle for world domination will be won or lost in the way America reacts to Russia's expanding program of developing and conserving her own natural resources. Russia's agricultural build-up is on such a high scale that great alarm should be raised in the eyes of American citizens. And from this alarm, American progress in developing natural resources should be instituted with an alert eye set up to detect reckless wasting. America has met many serious crises in her history, but this is the most serious yet. The battle will be fought between citizens, not military personnel, who realize the value of conservation.

This economic race between the Soviet Union and the United States has become so keen that any American citizen who, without regard for the well-being of his country, is practicing unwise conservation and is failing to do his best toward promoting such conservation is guilty of committing treason against the United States and its people. He should, therefore, be subject of the punishment offered by the act of treason for he has jeopardized his country's security. The road of good citizenship toward conservation and any patriotic American citizen may travel on this road. There are side-paths however, such as waste, which eventually lead to destruction.

The conservation of natural resources is, and has been for half century, the paramount domestic issue before the American people. Fellow American citizens, it is now up to us to come to the aid of our country. Conservation is the answer to this needed aid.

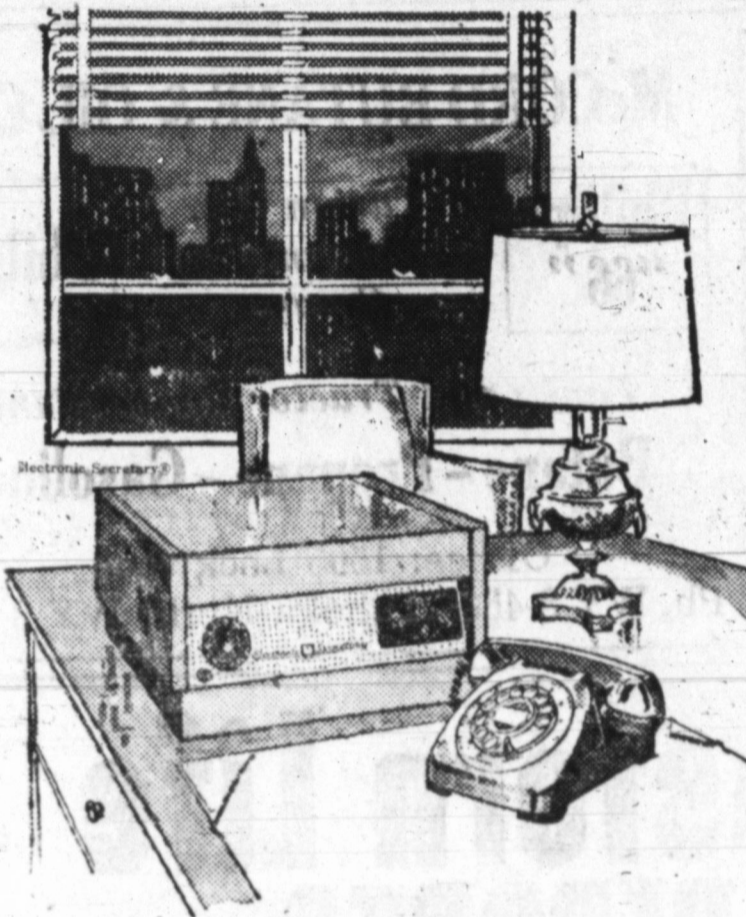

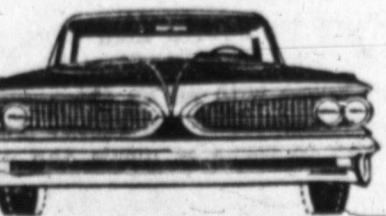

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER

There are many indications that the present Congress in session is taking a greater interest in U. S. foreign policy than perhaps past Congresses have taken for some time.

It would appear that it is slowly becoming apparent that whatever the U. S. foreign policy is on the economic front has an effect on U. S. jobs and business.

Recently in Congress Rep. Emanuel Celler of New York pointed out to Congress that in a sudden move, described a bolt out of the blue, West Germany levied a tariff on imported coal of \$4.75 per ton.

In a normal postwar year, this country ships to West Germany something like 16 million tons of coal. This suddenly imposed tariff duty will knock out this market for American miners, creating further unemployment and hardship in the coal mining areas which have already been hard hit by previously unrestricted imports of foreign low grade fuel oil.

There is an interesting angle to all this, which appears to be in direct opposition to those proponents of free trade, reciprocal tariff treaties and other measures designed to break down the U. S. protective tariff system.

It has always been said that regardless of wage differentials, the U. S. could produce at a lower rate. From the testimony of Rep. Celler, there does appear to be some substantiation for this viewpoint.

### Tahoka School Plant Improvement Program Now Well Underway

Supt. Otis-Spears carried a representative of The News on a tour of the local school plant to view the improvement program and work to be done.

First stop was the primary department, just recently completed as a five-room addition to the east end of South Elementary School, where four of the five, first grade classes are now housed and the fifth is in a convenient adjoining room.

The school is very proud of this \$50,000 addition, which has just about every modern feature recommended for the teaching of first grade students.

Each room has movable desks and chairs for the small tots, and each room is an individual school unit, complete with two private rest rooms, wash basin, drinking fountain, paper towels, individual lockers for students, work table, and ample shelving and storage space for teaching materials. Each room has a display tack board on which children post examples of their work, and there are the usual blackboards. The lighting is excellent, and the acoustical fiber-glass ceiling cuts noise to a minimum.

Separating two rooms on the

north and two on the south is a large 20 by 60 foot combination hallway—darkroom—playroom, where the small children can play during inclement weather and where movies may be shown to a large group. The department also has its individual entrance and exit.

Minor repairs will be made to North Elementary School, erected in 1935, where new desks and other furnishings are badly needed. Another deficiency in this building is the lighting. The electric lighting consists of only two drops in a room, and on dark days children can hardly read from the weak lights.

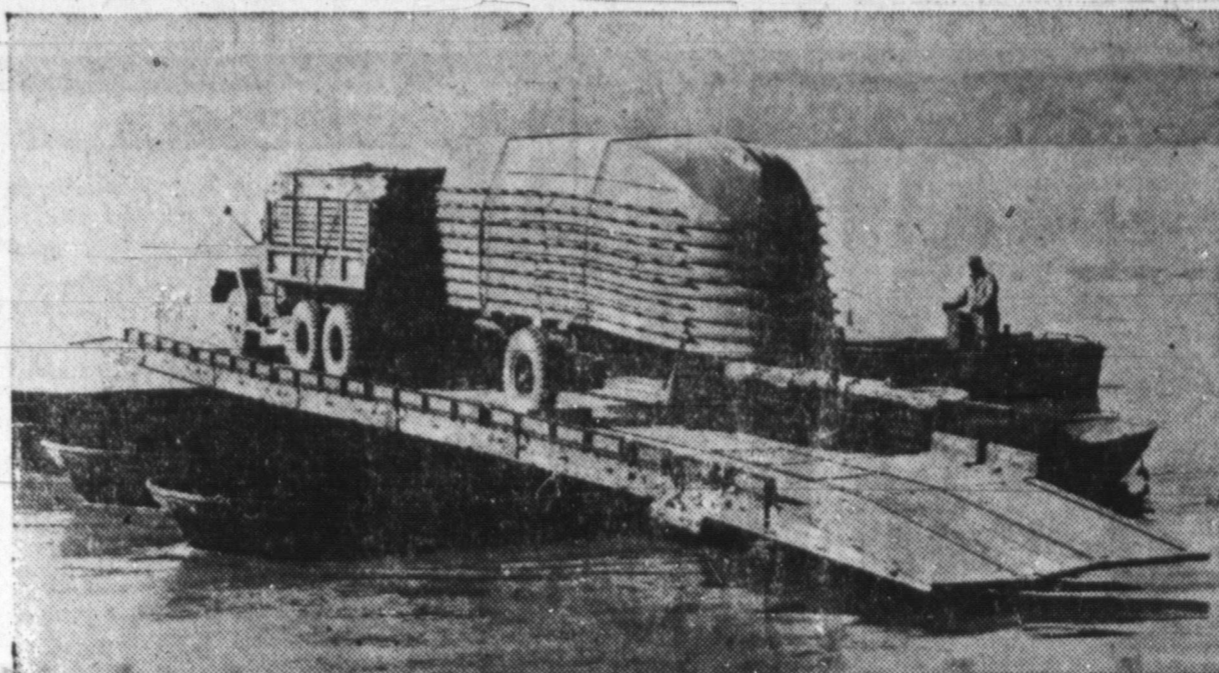
Another anticipated improvement is that to the science department in the High School, which will be completely rebuilt and modernized to meet today's requirements.

In preparation for erecting the new gymnasium, the two concrete tennis courts had to be torn up. New courts have already been poured to the north rear of the High School auditorium. However, the backstops are yet to be built.

The contractor on the new gymnasium is pouring the foundation for this new building while the process of assembling materials for the structure goes forward. Footings have been run and preparations made for running the base.

Off-street parking will be provided in a paved area north of this new building and also east of the north half of the building.

When the current work is complete, only antiquated portion of the Tahoka school plant will be the band hall. Although this building is not adequate and is a temporary barracks building, Army

After spending some time dispensing some humor that kept the crowd in an uproar, the principal speaker, Delbert Downing got down into the "meat" of his talk on "What Is Life All About?"

In answer, he said he didn't know, but that he was getting closer to an answer.

"Man's life is made up of three facets," he declared, "his possessions (the material things he makes and owns), his relationship to his fellowman, and his relationship to God." He declared that man cannot separate his relationship with his fellowman from his possessions, and he cannot separate his relationship to God from either of these.

"They are inescapable. Man must live with these three facets," he said.

Some other quotations give an insight to his thought-provoking talk.

"We live in a dual world—a world of fabulous new discoveries. We have to learn to use what we discover. We have to learn whether to use them to glorify God or to use them to destroy ourselves."

As an example, he cited that Henry Ford had built a car that was low in price that everyone could buy. But, in giving us this invention, he had given us something else. Man uses the car to travel—go visiting, fishing, or other places on Sunday—instead of worshipping the Lord on Sunday.

"Every great civilization begins by tilling the soil," he quoted as a statement from Will Durant. "We have had 22 such great civilizations. Now, we are the 23rd." He issued a strong hint our civilization is headed for the same end as that of Greece and Rome and all the other 22.

"Man begins to transfer his faith in God to things he can build."

"In 1953, we spent \$200 million for tranquilizer pills as a substitute for finding peace with God."

"Man must have peace within before he can have peace with the world."

The speaker was introduced by Wynne Collier, a long-time friend. Rev. J. B. Thompson gave the invocation and benediction.

## O'Donnell Gin Doubles Size

Work has been started on the improvements and enlargement of the O'Donnell Farmers Cooperative gin, according to Carl Sanders, president of the board.

The plant is being enlarged to 8-120 stand gin, which amounts to two plants in one building, and every step is being taken to make this one of the most modern plants in the area, Sanders says.

To house the equipment a 42-foot addition is being built on the north, a new press will be added, new double dryers and Moss lint cleaners, automatic sampler, and other new equipment installed.

Completion is expected in August, and cost is expected to run around \$160,000. The additional plant will enable the gin to turn out 400 to 500 bales of cotton every 24 hours.

Sanders says the gin handled 14,700 bales of cotton this last year, and in recent years has paid back to farmer members about \$250,000 in cash.

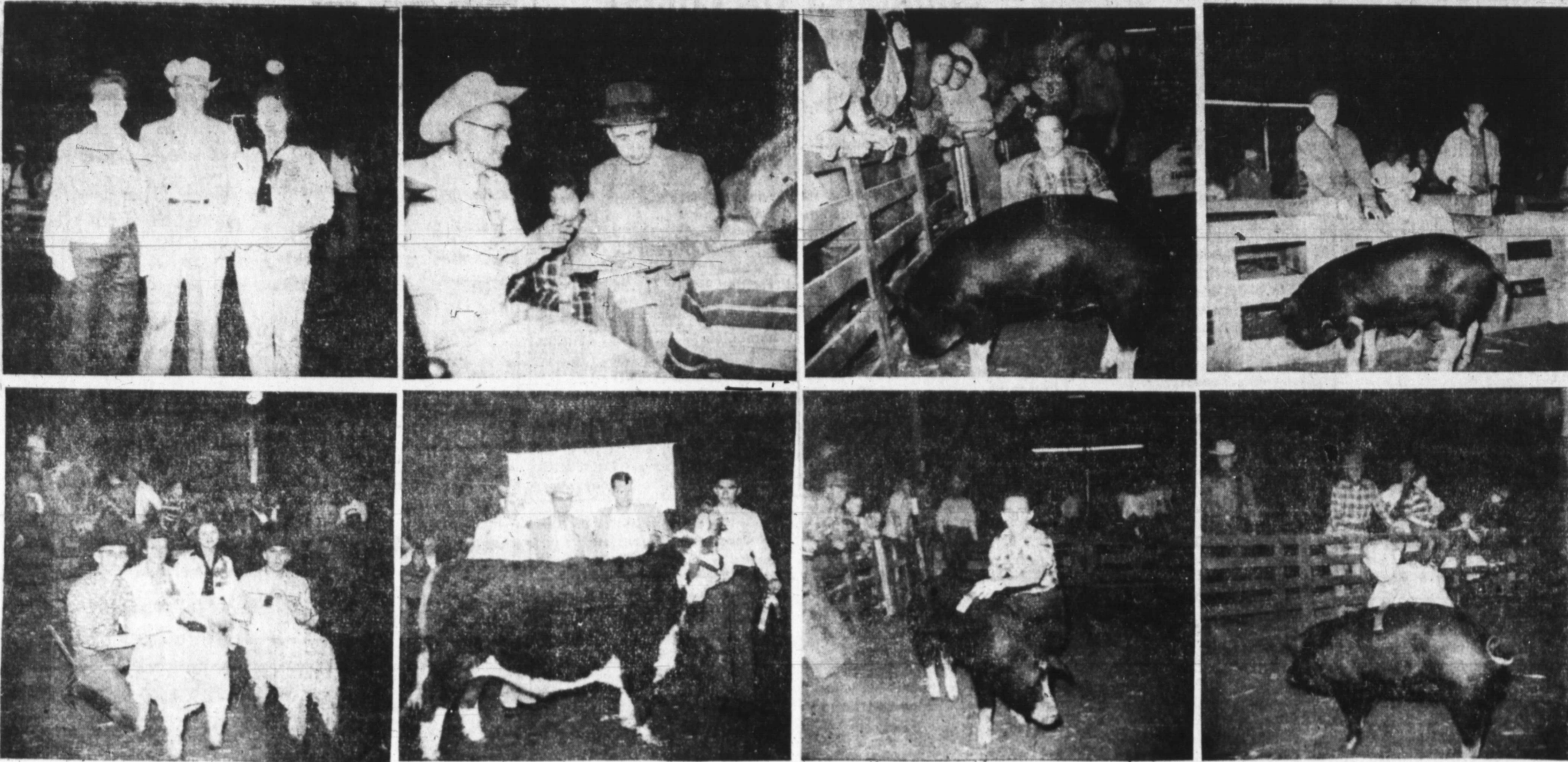
