## Gardner Is High School Principal

Clifton Gardner, school principal at Wilson for the past two years, was elected by the School board Tuesday night as high school principal in Tahoka, succeeding John Shepherd who moved to Abilene to accept a teacher's position in the science department.

Gardner served as junior high school principal at Wilson for two years and last year was the elementary school principal there. Before going to Wilson, he was basketball coach at Blackwell.

The father of four children, Gardner received his Master's Degree from Texas Tech. Last summer he and Tom Bartley, of the local high school, taught drivers' education classes for Tahoka high school students.

He is a brother of Milton Gardner, who was North Elementary School principal in Tahoka for several years, leaving here three years ago to enter the ministry.

## J. D. Atwell Named New Head Football Coach At Local Schools

J. D. Atwell, 28, successful Farwell coach the past two years, was named head football coach of the Tahoka High School Bulldogs at a meeting of the school board Friday night. He succeeds Bill Haralson, who recently resigned to accept a similar position at Childress after eight years in the Tahoka schools.

Atwell expects to move here with his family about July 1, and is looking for a two-bedroom home.

Atwell is a young man of the highest type, comes very highly recommended, and has a fine record during his seven years of coaching. He is married to a Brownwood girl, and the couple has two children, a boy five years of age and a girl two.

He was reared at Graham, where he was an all-around athlete in high school, following which he attended Howard Payne College, Brownwood, where he graduated in 1952. He was an outstanding athlete in college.

Atwell started his coaching career at Wolfforth (Frenship), where he was assistant two years. Moving to Wheeler, a Class B school in the Panhandle, he was head coach there three years. His first year at Wheeler, his team won only one football game and lost eight, but the next two years he won a large majority of the games. His last year at Wheeler, his team won the Class B regional championship.

His record at Class A Farwell the past two years has been outstanding, especially in football. In 1957, his team won seven and lost three. Last year, his team won ten and lost two, winning district 3-A title and bi-district over Idalou before losing out in the regional game to White Deer. The team he lost to went on to win the Texas Class A state championship. As a head coach, he has 34 victories, 19 defeats and one tie, eight of the losses being his first year at Wheeler.

Atwell will also coach track, assist with basketball and other phases of the physical education program.

Mrs. Atwell is a graduate of Danil Baker in Brownwood. She is a teacher, but does not plan to teach next year.

Supt. Spears said Atwell was finally chosen by the board after the field of applicants had been cut to six outstanding men. An assistant football coach is yet to be selected.

Coach Jake Jacobs, basketball coach here for 12 years, was recently named athletic director of the local school system to coordinate the physical training program.

## Wilson Wildcat To Be Drilled

Announcement has been made that another wildcat will be drilled in the Wilson area this time only one-quarter mile east of the City of Wilson.

To be known as No. 1 Mrs. Callie Lumsden, the Wheeler Oil Company of Fort Worth will drill 5,000-feet for oil. The well will be located 5,989 feet from north and 5,196 feet from west lines of league four, Archer County School Land.

W. B. Yarborough, L. E. Windham and Ormand Brothers Drilling Company, Midland, No. 1-A R. L. Hagler, section 1426, block 18, E-L&RR survey, a re-entered 4,600 foot wildcat one location south of their recent 4,400-foot Glorietta discovery in the YWO pool of Lynn county, was recompleted from the San Andres, to pump 116 barrels of 38 gravity oil and no water daily.

Production was through perforations at 4,043 to 4,049 feet after 750 gallons of acid.

The operation originally was drilled by J. Paul Karcher, et al, Midland, and abandoned Nov. 18, 1956.

Funeral services for Hubert Houston (Nhorby) Roberts, 53, of Grassland will be held this morning, Friday, at 10:00 a. m. in the Central Baptist Church in Grassland conducted by Rev. D. W. Copeland of Wells and Rev. Miller of Lubbock. Burial will be in Grassland Cemetery under the direction of Hudman Funeral Home in Post.

Roberts, who had been a resident of Lynn county for 44 years, died at his home Wednesday morning following an illness of about three years. He was a well known farmer in Lynn county.

Born Jan. 6, 1906 in Commerce, Roberts came to Lynn county in 1915 from Amarillo. He married the former Lillian Edwards of Grassland on Feb. 16, 1934 at Lovington, N. M. They had been married 25 years at the time of his death. In addition to farming, Roberts operated a service station at Grassland for 12 years.

Survivors include his wife of Grassland; two daughters, Mrs. Alice Brasher of Seminole and Mrs. Barbara Ruth Jones of Big Spring; one step-daughter, Mrs. Juanita Taylor of Lubbock; one step-son, W. T. Mitchell of New Iberia, La.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Roberts of Grassland; three sisters, Mrs. Jewel White, Mrs. Mildred King and Mrs. Viola Greer, all of Grassland; two brothers, Floyd of Grassland and C. W. of Tahoka, the latter being county-clerk; and seven grandchildren.

## Hansard Is Named D. A. By Governor

George Hansard, county attorney of Dawson county for the past several years, is being appointed district attorney of the 106th Judicial District, according to District Judge Truett Smith.

He will take office on Sept. 1, when the present district attorney, Morgan Copeland of Brownfield, becomes the d. a. for the newly set up 121st Judicial District.

The appointment was made known in a telegram early this week to Copeland from Governor Price Daniel.

Hansard will serve the 106th District, now composed of Lynn, Dawson, Garza and Gaines counties. This district previously also consisted of Yoakum and Terry counties, which will now be a part of the new district.

Hansard is a young man of about 30 years of age and has served as county attorney of Dawson county for the past two or three terms.

He will make the third district attorney the 106th has had since the last election, when Mitchell Williams was re-elected to office. Williams recently resigned his post to enter private practice and Copeland was appointed to replace him.

## Bill McNeely Cuts First Load Wheat

Lynn county's first load of 1959 wheat was brought in Monday to Goodpasture Grain Co. in Tahoka, cut from a 35-acre field on the farm of Bill McNeely, about nine miles north of town.

The crop, although it had been hauled on three times, averaged 30 bushels to the acre, according to Arlie McNeely, who harvested the grain. It tested 13. One hail storm hit the crop when it was green, knocking out several kernels from each head of grain. The most vicious came last week. Following such beatings, it was not expected that the crop would produce over 20 bushels, but surprisingly averaged 30.

McNeely's wheat was delivered to the elevator about the same time as these first loads reported elsewhere over the South Plains. The crop had been ready to harvest earlier in the month but was delayed because of rain. Some of the wheat planted in a lake is yet to be cut.

Lynn county's 4-H Club entomology team won first place in the state contests, according to a telegram received here Wednesday afternoon from College Station. Lester Ford of Tahoka, a member of the team, was the second high individual in the state in the event. Other members of the team are Lynetta Cain of Tahoka, Marchetta Wood and Ronnie Wood of O'Donnell.

Floyd county entomology team came in second.

Lynn county 4-H Club members this week were attending the State 4-H Club Roundup at College Station where the entomology team and livestock team and the tractor operator winner from the county were entering state events.

The entomology team is composed of Lynetta Cain and Lester Ford of Tahoka and Marchetta Wood and Ronnie Wood of O'Donnell. Participating in the livestock teams contest were Robert and David Besire Anderson and Tommy Gardensire, Sammy Anderson and Tommy Gardensire, all of O'Donnell. Benell Lowrey was entering the tractor operator contest.

Accompanying the group to College Station were Mrs. Alton Cain, adult leader, County Agent Bill Griffin, and Buddy Logsdon, assistant county agent.

The group left Tahoka Tuesday and are due to arrive home Thursday.

Mayor Designates Clean-Up Day

The week of June 22-29 has been designated as "clean up, paint up day", according to Mayor H. B. McCord Sr.

Citizens of Tahoka are urged to participate in this event as there are many places that need cleaning up or the whisk of a paint brush.

The mayor states that tree limbs, weeds, grass or other trash that is piled in the alleys will be hauled off immediately following the clean-up campaign.

### Hog Permits Are Revoked By Council

Hog permits being held within the City limits of Tahoka will be cancelled by the City Council, according to H. B. McCord Sr., as a result of complaints being made that some of the present permits are being abused.

However, McCord said that some new permits will be issued some of the present holders whose raising of hogs has not been complained about and whose activities do not interfere with local sanitation regulations. McCord said that anyone wishing a new permit may obtain an application blank at the City Hall.

Seventy thousand acres of Lynn county cotton were lost in the hail, rain, sand and electrical storms last week, according to estimates of local observers.

Hail and washing rains early in the week did not do as much damage as did the sandstorm charged with electricity, a peculiar weather feature that happens in few places other than West Texas, which swept over the north, east and central sections of the county Friday afternoon.

Farmers started replanting cotton as soon as they could get into the fields, and most of it will have been replanted by end of this week. Rains also permit planting the remainder of the grain sorghum crop.

The sandstorm following the rains and also accompanied by rain, cut off, covered up, or burned much young cotton over a wide area. Such sandstorms are charged with electricity, it is believed, which also burns the tender plants.

Only the southwest and extreme southern part of the county received little or no damage. However, areas in the north and northeast were not damaged to such an extent but what cotton survived.

The rain which accompanied the winds Friday afternoon amounted to exactly one inch in Tahoka, bringing the precipitation for last week and the month of June to a total of 3.32 inches in town.

Although time is growing short for planting cotton, with no further setbacks and reasonable growing conditions, there is still time for a big cotton crop. The middle of June is the ideal time, most local farmers think, for the planting of grain sorghums.

Tahoka recorded a high temperature of 101 degrees Wednesday.

### Fire Dept. Warns Curiosity Seekers

The City Police department has been given orders by the City Council to issue tickets to any citizen of Tahoka or area interfering or hindering the work of the Volunteer Fire Department in Tahoka, according to Fire Chief Lawrence Harvick.

Already three tickets have been issued and about 40 warnings given. At the time of a fire alarm, many residents invade the area where a fire is located or follow the fire truck, many times delaying the work of the firemen. At times such citizens have been made to move before the truck can be parked near a hydrant.

Harvick said that these citizens do not realize how hazardous their curiosity is becoming, and that at times their presence is even dangerous. For those reasons and because the fire department must have room in which to work, the crack down is being made on violators.

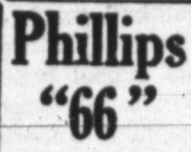

### WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDEE

As of now, there are an estimated 2,400,000 Federal civilian employees, of which in round numbers 70,000 are in the territories and possessions, and 130,000 in foreign lands.

Altogether, all government civilian employment is estimated as now running well in excess of 7,500,000. Thus of the present employed ranks, about one out of every nine people taking home pay checks are deriving them from government.

This explains why the Federal government and the many state governments are in serious financial difficulties.

The Federal government is employing alone three times as many people in civilian jobs as the nation's entire mining industry, almost twice as many as are employed on the nation's farms, slightly more than are employed by all the nation's financial houses, banks, insurance companies and real estate firms, and almost as many as the total employees of all the construction contractors.

Not only is this vast army of government employees sopping up huge chunks of tax money, but they are so numerous they constantly get in hair of those trying to make a dollar out of private enterprise.

This fact was brought out quite succinctly in a recent subcommittee hearing of the Senate Small Business committee on the logging industry which was presided over by Sen. Russell L.

Testimony established that the lumber industry, especially in the eastern United States, is made up of small enterprises producing a million or less board feet of lumber per year. Some 93 to 99% of all sawmills are in this category.

Testimony stated "Big government is one of the greatest problems of small business... the small operator who asks how in the world he can be expected to make a living with so many government people continually trying to find something wrong or information."

A partial list of the government agencies to contend with was entered into the testimony.

This partial list includes Internal Revenue Service, Social Security Administration, Housing and Home Finance Agency, Federal Housing Administration, Army, Navy and Air Force, Farmers Home Administration, General Services Administration, Corps of Engineers, Bureau of Reclamation, Public Health Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, Federal Power Commission, Forest Service, Wage and Hour and Public Contract Division of the Department of Labor, Interstate Commerce Commission, Federal Communications Commission, Civil Aeronautics Commission, Federal Trade Commission, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Federal Reserve Board, Department of Agriculture, Office of Defense Mobilization.

As already stated, this is just a partial list of the Federal agencies that swarm around the small sawmill operator.

It is probably little wonder that one of the most rapidly growing professions in these United States is that of the psychiatrist.

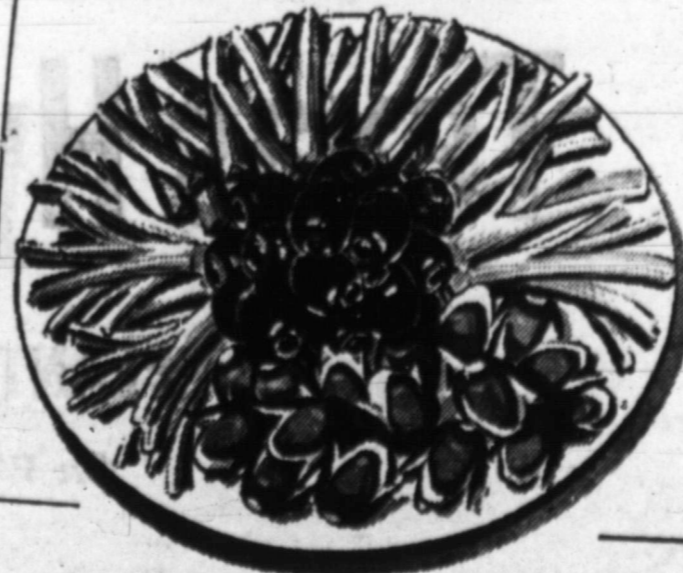

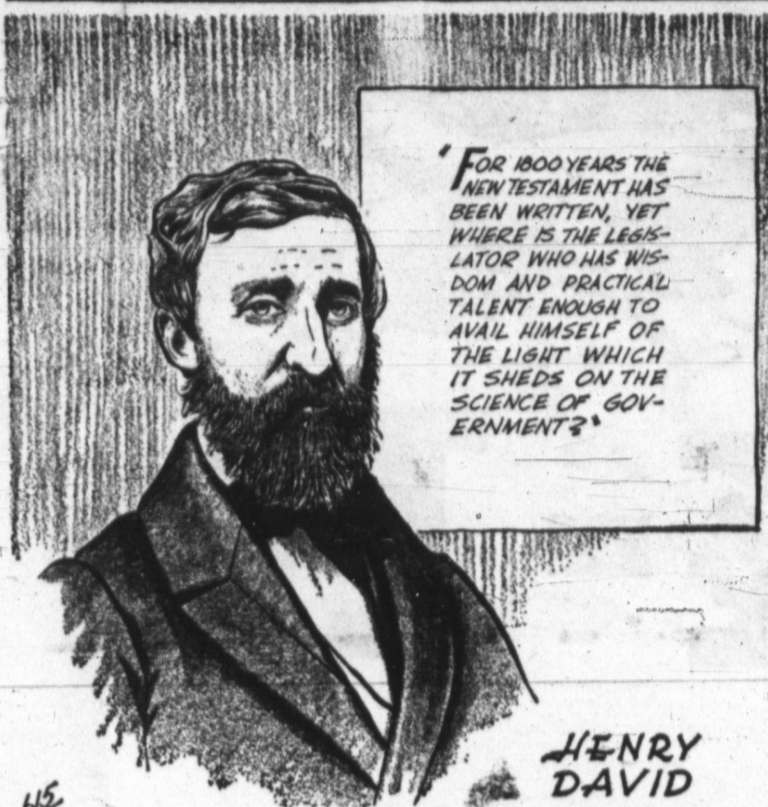

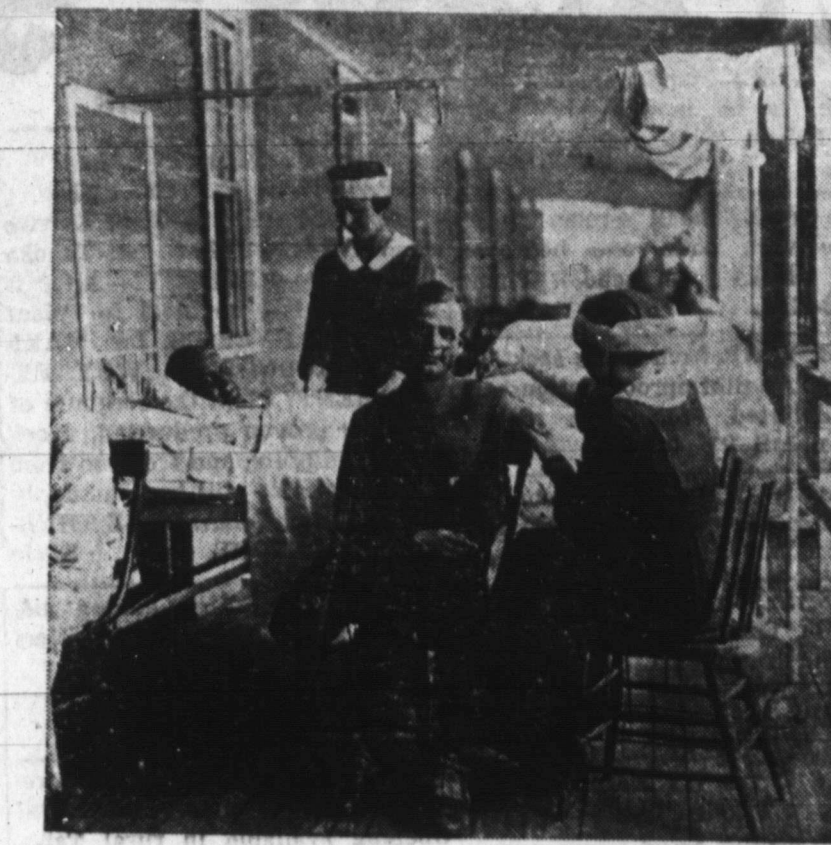

**County Ranks High In Savings Bonds**

Savings Bonds Sales in Lynn county reached 74.5 percent of the 1959 goal in the first four months of the year, making this county one of the highest ranking in the State of Texas, announces A. C. Verner, executive vice president of the First National Bank and the Lynn county bonds chairman.

Lynn county's sales to date total \$193,071.00 of its quota of \$259,000.00. However, sales in April amounted to only \$13,190.00, Verner said.

Only county in this district to exceed Lynn was Crosby with 96.2 percent of its quota, and Crosby ranked third in the State. Other counties in District 5 were: Lubbock, 25.8; Cochran, 31.2; Garza, 70.9; Hockley, 49.5; Terry, 11.9; and Yoakum, 26.7 percent.

Wallace county had exceeded its quota with 117.5 percent as had Marion with 114.3 percent.

Sales for the first four months of the year totaled \$58,105,381 of which \$12,908,783 were purchased in April. Texas has achieved 31.8 percent of its yearly goal of \$182,500,000.

Amid many disagreements at every turn, there is one thing that all three branches of the Texas government can and do agree on:—United States Supreme Court decisions.

All three branches have agreed firmly in apprehension and criticism of the dangerous trend of U. S. Supreme Court decisions. Recently, a very frank appraisal of a new Supreme Court five-to-four decision was unanimously voted to be preserved in the permanent records of the Senate. This move added one more event of criticism to the court, which has been the subject of similar action in state legislatures here during the past several years.

Into the record went the opinion of the Senate that the recent opinion by Justice Frankfurter in the Baltimore "Rat Inspector" case was a definite action to trample the guaranties of the citizens contained in the Fourth Amendment of the Bill of Rights.

of Texas Supreme Court was among the top jurists of a long list of states who signed the blanket plea a few months ago for the United States Supreme Court to use moderation in its process of what a layman may describe as "writing new law, rather than interpreting the law."

And the executive department, through governor and the attorney general, went to bat in resistance of the Supreme Court decision—actually by a minority of the court—which stripped Texas and other states of their tide-lands in defiance of the declared policy of Congress. States have been concerned in many other areas of federal court decision, such as the ruling that state courts are rendered important to assume jurisdiction in matters of state law wherein the federal government also has statutes, even though

federal agencies such as the National Labor Relation Board refuse to act under them.

The Texas Senate has probably led all other state branches in opposition to U. S. Supreme Court decisions, charging the federal courts with "making law" in many actions of recent years.

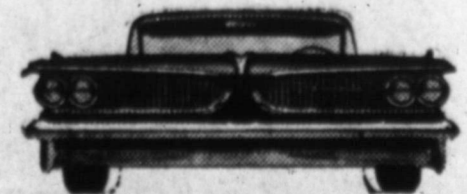
