





C. C. (Barney) Dwight, 76, Tahoka photographer for the past 30 years, was found dead Sunday morning in his studio-apartment above Wynne Collier Drug.

Justice of the Peace C. A. Clem ruled death due to natural causes and that death had occurred two or three days previously. Mr. Dwight had a heart ailment.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 p. m. in Stanley Funeral Chapel with Minister Bob Barnes of the Tahoka Church of Christ officiating. Burial followed in Tahoka Cemetery.

Mr. Dwight had been in failing health several years. Friday at about 2:00 p. m. he was in the Collier drug store, complained of being ill, and Bill Ware, pharmacist at the store, helped him upstairs to his apartment. The body was found slumped on the floor near the foot of his bed Sunday at about 11:00 a. m. by Paul Pittman, a friend, who went to accompany him to church services.
