## Everett Taking Farm Census

Appointment of Roy E. Everett of O'Donnell as crew leader for the 1959 Census of Agriculture was announced today by Field Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mr. Everett will direct a force of census takers who will canvass all farms in Lynn, Dawson and Borden Counties. Before assuming his post, he will go to Lubbock, where he will receive five days of training by a member of the Census Bureau's staff. Topics to be covered include procedures for recruiting of census takers, census taker training, canvassing methods, preparation and submission of reports, and the supervision of census takers to insure a complete and accurate county.

The crew leader is one of the key people in the field operations of the Census of Agriculture. It is his responsibility to recruit and train the census takers and supervise their work; plan and allocate work assignments; review the work of the census takers and take remedial action where necessary, and to conduct difficult interviews.

After completing his training, Mr. Everett will return to his district where he will spend several weeks recruiting census takers, and training them in preparation for the start of the field canvass on November 18.

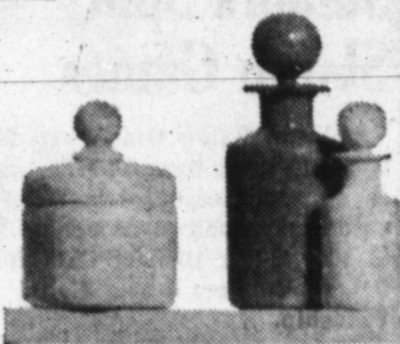

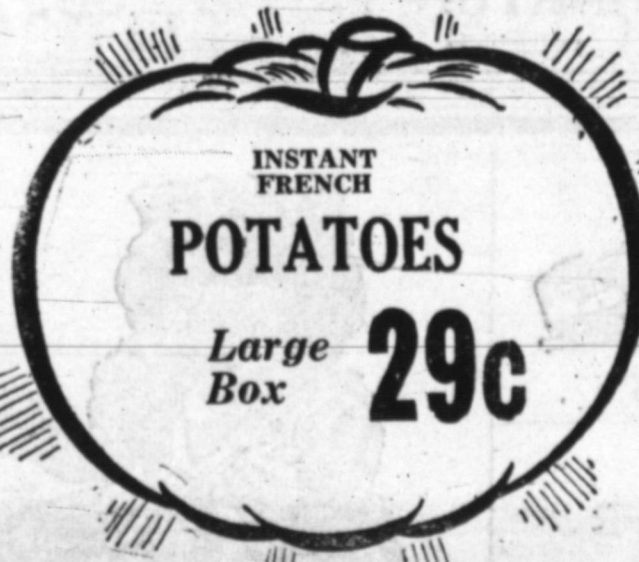

### Harmon Is State Phone Secretary

W. D. Harmon, manager of Poka-Lambro Rural Telephone Cooperative, is in Austin for the meeting Thursday and Friday of the State-wide Telephone Co-op. Association, of which body he is secretary.  
Mr. Harmon says there are now 53 rural telephone cooperative organizations in the state, and Poka-Lambro, which has headquarters in Tahoka, is one of the first and soon he expects it to be one of the largest.

Poka-Lambro was the first to receive a loan to construct its system, however the Lubbock cooperative got its system underway ahead of the one here. Work started here in 1951, and the first billings were in 1953.

There are now more than 1,900 telephone connections in Lynn, Garza, Borden, Dawson, and Terry counties, and new lines are being built in Gaines county to serve the Ashmore, Loop, and Sawyer Flat areas.

#### NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS,  
COUNTY OF LYNN:  
TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE COUNTY OF LYNN, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID COUNTY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Lynn County, Texas, on the 5th day of December, 1959, on the proposition and at the places more particularly set forth in the election order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 26th day of October, 1959, which is as follows:

"AN ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE PROPOSITION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$190,000.00 ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

WHEREAS, there has been presented for the consideration of the Court a petition signed by the requisite number of persons praying that an election be held in Lynn County, Texas, on the proposition of the issuance of Road Bonds of said County in the amount of \$190,000.00, and the levy of a tax in payment thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Court has found that said petition is signed by more than fifty (50) of the resident, qualified property-taxpaying

electors of Lynn County own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

WHEREAS, the amount of bond to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Lynn County;

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF LYNN COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said County on the 5th day of December, 1959, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine: "Whether or not the bonds of said Lynn County shall be issued in the amount of \$190,000.00, bearing interest at a rate of not to exceed four (4%) per cent per annum, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed twenty (20) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, throughout Lynn County, Texas, and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity."

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature.

3. For persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this County, and who are resident, qualified property-taxpaying electors of this County, owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

4. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

Each voter shall draw a line through one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

5. The said election shall be held at the several polling places in Lynn County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as Presiding Judges of said election. Said Presiding Judges are hereby authorized to select such assistants as may be required to assist them in holding said election at the several voting

precincts as follows:

Voting Precinct No. 1 at the Home Demonstration Agents Office, Courthouse, Tahoka, Texas, with John F. Thomas as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 2 at the High School Building, Wilson, Texas, with C. E. Campbell as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 3 at the High School Building, O'Donnell, Texas, with Ralph Beach as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 4 at the Community Center, New Home, Texas, with Tom Russell as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 5 at the Methodist Church, Draw, community, with Graham Hensley as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 6 at the County Courtroom, Courthouse, Tahoka, Texas with E. R. Edwards as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 7 at the Schoolhouse, Grassland Community, with H. W. Edwards, Jr., as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 8 at the Gin Office, Gordon Community, with J. H. Huddleston as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 9 at the High School Building, Tahoka, Texas, with Maurice Huffaker as Presiding Judge.

## Roberts Tells Of California Farm

Hollis Roberts, an old West Point boy who has made good at farming in California, his farm manager, Dick Kagler, and a number of friends were entertained with a dinner Monday night in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Tankersley. They are in the area on business and were being escorted by Jim Bob Curry of Hale Center.

Roberts farms 6,000 of the 8,000 acres he owns in the San Joaquin Valley at McFarland, north of Bakersfield, Calif., and from what he and Kagler says, the farm is quite an operation. Incidentally, Kagler is a Texas boy, reared near Hillsboro.

The farm is watered partly by deep wells, partly from ditches which bring water from 140 miles away to the valley. Their principal crop is cotton, but due to acreage restrictions they have gone in to other crops to make the \$1,000 per acre land pay off. They raise from a bale and a half up to three bales per acre, and much of the cotton is picked with 15 mechanical pickers.

They have a half section of roses, 22,000 bushes to the acre. Believe it or not, Roberts says most of the roses are shipped to Tyler, Texas, and many of them are sold back to Californians from Tyler distributors.

Other crops include peaches, oranges, quinces, grapes, and asparagus, each of which is a large operation with experts in each

## Fires Take Heavy Toll Each Year

The terrific cost in lives and property of preventable fires, was graphically portrayed in a talk at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday by Wayne DeGrasse of Amarillo, of the Texas Insurance Speakers Bureau.

"Five hundred women and children and a few old men will die in fires in Texas this year," Mr. DeGrasse said. "Seven thousand homes will burn. Most of these will be because of carelessness and stupidity."

Fire is a killer and a thief, he continued. Billions of dollars in property go up in smoke every year to say nothing of the 13,000 people who will lose their lives in fire in our nation this year.

Most fires are caused by little things that could be avoided, and the three important causes are the penny behind the electric fuse, the frayed light cord under the carpet, and the leaky gas hose.

Evidence that many destructive fires can be prevented is the fact that each year during Fire Prevention Week, during which time the attention of many of our citizens is called to minor causes of fires, the losses drop appreciably.

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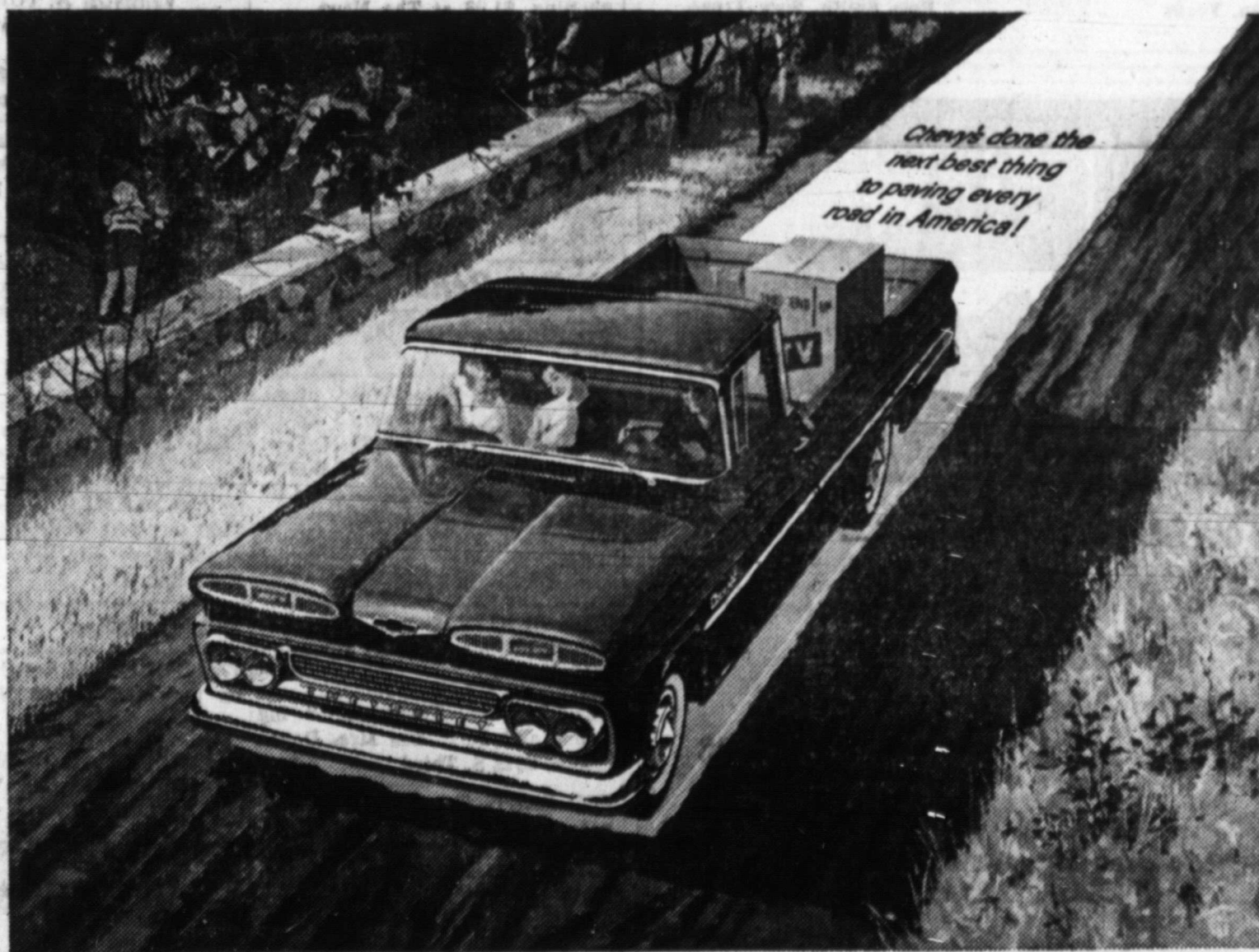
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
