Ruidoso Downs Opening May 20

A \$3,000 Quarter Horse Allowance and the \$3,000 Thoroughbred Inaugural Handicap are the major racing attractions set for the May 20 opening weekend at Ruidoso Downs.

The two featured races herald the beginning of Ruidoso Downs fourteenth season, May 20 through September 11, during which the famed mountain track, located on Highway 70 in the Sacramento Mountains of southern New Mexico, will distribute an estimated million dollars worth of purse money.

Several top "short" horses are being prepped for the \$3,000 "Mr. Bar None" Allowance, a 350 yard dash scheduled for Saturday, May 21. Among them are Vandy's Flash, a speed demon owned by John Askew of Fayetteville, Ark. Vandy's Flash recently set a new world's record for 350 yards, 17.5 seconds, at Los Alamitos.

Gene Hensley, Downs director, estimates there to be some 15 eager Thoroughbreds eligible for running in the May 22 Inaugural Handicap, a \$3,000 curtain raiser for the summer season of racing. The Inaugural Handicap is drawing nominations from a half dozen states with Texas and Arizona animals dominating the scene. Quick Thrust, of the Circle K stables in Albuquerque, is one of the classy Thoroughbreds expected to be seen in the popular Inaugural event.

Alice Baker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Baker of Muleshoe, Dorothy Hickman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Hickman of Muleshoe, and Veeta Mathis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Mathis of Sargent won first place trophy recently at the "Little 500" bicycle relay at Texas Tech.

The race consisted of 16 laps around the "Memorial Circle" on the campus. The coeds made the 16 laps in 21 minutes and 15 seconds, winning over 21 other teams.

Corn Variety Tests Reported

Sixteen varieties of corn were planted on April 21 in the 1960 corn variety test at the High Plains Research Foundation, Dr. E. H. Collister, chief agronomist, stated. Both white and yellow selections were included in the test.

This is the fourth year that corn variety tests have been conducted at the Halfway Research Farm. Each year the number of varieties has been reduced thru the elimination of those found to be unsuitable for the area. As many as 147 different varieties have been tested in one year.

The date of planting experiment on corn is also being continued. Early, mid-season, and late maturing varieties include two yellow and one white. In previous tests on both white and yellow corn, the late April and early May plantings resulted in higher yields than corn planted at later dates.

Mid-September harvest of the early planted corn has resulted in decreasing the loss from lodging (falling down) caused by the ravages of the Southwestern corn borer. Thru these methods, the corn yields have been higher and labor cost lower than in later planted corn. These same varieties will be planted at three later dates to continue the study.

YAKIMA FIRING CENTER, WASH.—Army Specialist Five Charles A. Green, son of Mrs. Jamie C. Green, Star Route 1, Bula, Texas, is scheduled to participate with other personnel from the 30th Artillery in Exercise Elk Horn, a Strategic Army Corps (STRAC) field maneuver, at the Yakima (Wash.) Firing Center, May 9-23.

Elk Horn, one of the year's largest Army maneuvers, will provide nearly 18,000 participating troops with training in all phases of modern warfare under simulated combat conditions. For greater realism some 2,500 troops will play the part of an aggressor which is assumed to be attacking the U. S. from the north.

The Pawnee is a new type agricultural spray plane which the Piper Corp. began manufacturing last year. This is the second of its type to be used here. The Muleshoe Flying Service received the first production model. It has been in operation here for one year and has proved to be an excellent agricultural ship.

From Lock Haven, the two went to Elmira, N. Y., where they attended Schweizer Soaring School and obtained their glider ratings. Locke is now a qualified glider instructor. Everett, a commercial student pilot, received his glider pilot license.

Locke said, "I was tremendously impressed with glider flying. It is so quiet up there that you can actually hear cars, trucks, and other noises from the ground."

Morgan Locker, of the Muleshoe Flying Service, said he plans to have a two place glider here soon which he thinks will be of great interest to the air-minded youth since glider license can be obtained at the age of 14 years. Locke and Everett returned to Muleshoe Wednesday.

**Babson Discusses
Individualism vs. Associations**

Babson Park, Mass., May 12—The days of rugged individualism have passed, Henry Ford was noted for it. He always wanted to "go alone, across lots and on foot." He had little use for committees or associations. For many years he would not join the National Automobile Manufacturers Association; he and others were in a position to go it alone, because they had some original ideas and were patient enough to work them.

I Believe In Co-operation
The story of advancing civilization, however, is a record of man's willingness to cooperate. The Trade Association Directory, prepared by the U. S. Department of Commerce, shows that there are 3,000 regional and 7,000 local associations of businessmen. With these are affiliated 12,000 trade associations, 5,000 local Chambers of Commerce, and 30,000 businessmen's luncheon clubs. It seems as if everyone is a "joiner", and many join several business groups. Yet even the above figures do not cover the many purely social, church, labor and farm fraternal groups. As for employees' organizations, there are 200 national and about 80,000 local unions.

There has been much fun poked at the "Organization Man", meaning a lower-echelon executive in big business corporations. But practically every man and many women are members of organized voluntary groups. In our free U. S., these members retain a very large degree of independence; and, except in cartels and some labor unions, individuals are not coerced or regimented or herded. On the whole, ours is a nation of free individuals — though not as free as were our pioneer fathers.

Small Businessmen
Freedom to organize is one of our basic American freedoms. Special and new interests keep arising in our world of rapid changes; one new bustling area is that of Small Business, which since 1938 has been self-organized solely and specifically to protect the legitimate interests of independent small and medium-sized business people. The largest of these Small Business Organizations is the National Federation of Independent Business, with headquarters at Burlingame, Calif. G. Wilson

Harder, President. This Federation presents its points of view to the Small Business Committees of the Senate and House. It is outstanding in its co-operation with all Senators and Representatives—and in keeping them informed of grassroots opinion on all legislation affecting small business. It has a highly respected and competent Vice-President in Washington giving full time to matters of legislative activity.

There was established by Congress in 1953 the Small Business Administration and a subsidiary, the Small Business Investment Administration. This latter has made total short-term loans of \$856,403,000 to upwards of 20,000 individual independent small business firms; in addition it has advanced long-term equity capital of \$3,785,000 during the past year. It is now administering over 19,000 business and disaster loans, including loans transferred from the former R. F. C. Sixty per cent of these loans were made in participation with banks. The cumulative losses through 1959 from SBA loans have been only 1.1%, a remarkable showing. I am convinced that the "little people" have financial responsibility and character.

Are We Over-Organized?
Is organization "cramping the style" of individuals and reducing their initiative? Are too many of us becoming "leaners" instead of "lifters"? I believe that as long as organizations are voluntary, they will wither away when they lose their usefulness. Individuals can make their influence felt within homogeneous groups of their choosing, dealing with problems about which they have direct knowledge.

My husband, who was my teacher, always said, "Don't worry about the traffic ahead; watch what you are doing here. Those problems you see ahead will usually clear up before you get there."

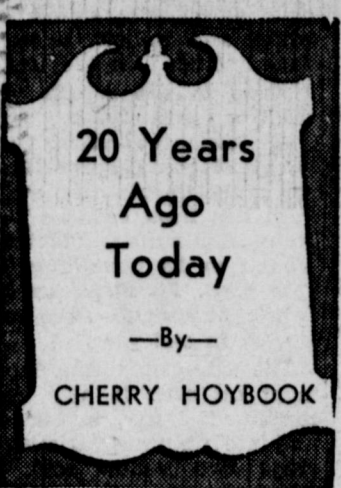
How true that fact is in the life of a Christian! Jesus always counseled against worrying about what may lay ahead. The psalmist tells us to cast our burdens on the Lord.

LONE STAR AGRICULTURE

TEXAS LAND VALUES—UP, UP, UP

The decade of the 1950's saw a boom in Texas farm land prices which prompted frequent and free predictions from many an old-timer that a bust could not be far behind. There was nothing approaching a bust, of course, even in the drought-ridden middle '50's. And as the new decade of the 1960's gets under way there are no real signs to indicate that the boom actually has even reached its peak.

Farmers may and probably will continue to complain of lower farm prices and increasing costs—which is well justified by current facts and figures. Some farm families probably will continue to forsake the land and its discouragements, although the number driven away from the farms to the cities is not nearly as high as during the drought years.

But the value of the land itself appears to be holding a remarkably steady upward trend, and this is observed in nearly all areas of Texas. Prevailing prices of farm and ranch land generally is higher than can actually be justified by its value for crop or livestock production.

The factors combining to produce this situation also have developed another overall condition which is often observed and pointed out in many sections of Texas. The condition is this: More and more land over the State is becoming tightly held and to all practical purposes taken off the market altogether, au-

tomatically cutting down the quantity of biddable land available to influence any market fluctuation.

The top strengthening factor in price determination of farm and ranch land, not only in Texas but in most other agricultural states, is the vast increase in population to be considered against the fixed amount of land available. In Texas, this more or less simple situation of supply and demand is intensified because of the more than normal growth in population.

During the past two decades, the trend of farm folk flocking to the middle-sized and big cities in Texas also has had a reverse reaction—a notable rise in week-end farming and ranching. Money from Texas industry and commerce in the cities has found its way back to the land in an ever-increasing volume—no accurate measurement has yet been taken of just how large the volume might be, but the effect on farm land values is bound to have been considerable.

The boom-and-bust predictions of the old-timers are not likely to get more verification in the 1960's than in the 1950's.

Mr. Rogers has been helping Farm Bureau in its efforts to get a wheat program to prevent a drastic cut in acreage for the 1961 crop.

Texas Farm Bureau Research & Promotion Bureau observes that although most of the up-and-cotton program determinations will be made by the present Secretary of Agriculture, if the new secretary is more liberal than the present one, it would be possible for him to establish a price support for the 1961 crop of cotton at far above the 70% of parity floor. Let's hope.

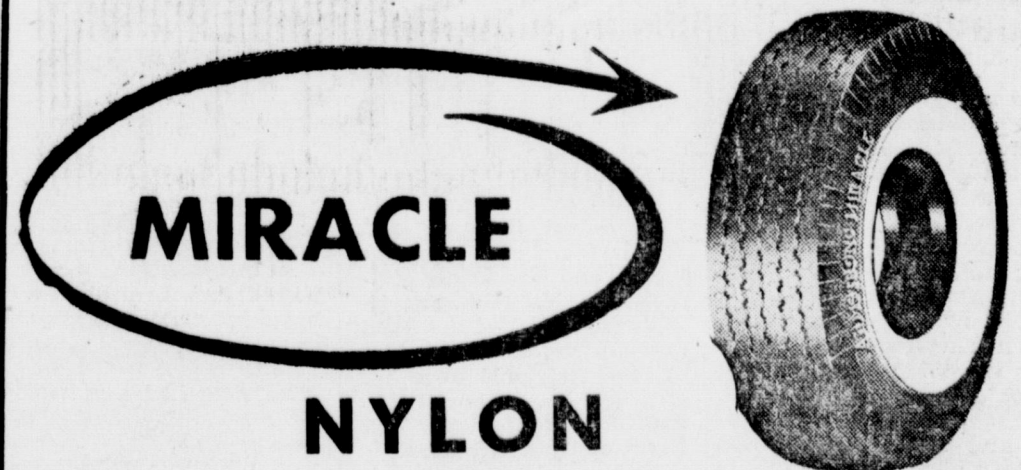
