



JACK YOUNG **Water Recharge Progress Noted**

Winner

The rapidly increasing uses of ground water for all municipal and industrial purposes and for large scale irrigation, together with the realization that the ground-water supply to three in favor of the mo- is being depleted, have emphasized the need for artificially recharging the underground reservoir in the High Plains of Texas.

Although the practice of artificial recharge has become neither widespread nor generally accepted, significant progress has been made in the technique of salvaging muddy playa-lake water which heretofore was lost through evap oration.

Greatest progress in artificial recharge has occurred since 1950 through use of the multi-purpose well, which consists of a large-capacity pro-duction well constructed near a wetweather lake to permit gravity flow of surface water through a pipeline into the

lake water tend to clog the aquifer. Although some of the mud can be dislodged and removed by periodic backwashing and pumping, it seems apparent that success of this method depends on clarification of the lake water before recharging. Recent experiments indicate that flocculation of the solids with new chemicals is economically practicable.

were planted on April 21 in the 1960 corn variety test at the High Plains Research Foundation, Dr. E. H. Collister, chief agronomist, stated. Both white and yellow selections were included in the test.

This is the fourth year that corn variety tests have been conducted at the Halfway Research Farm. Each year the number of varieties has been reduced thruthe elimination of those found to be unsuitable for the area. As many as 147 different varieties have been tested in one year.

The date of planting experiment on corn is also being continued. Early, mid-season, and late maturing varieties include two vellow and one white. In previous tests on both white and yellow corn, plantings resulted in higher flying. It is so quiet up there later dates.

The decade of the 1950's say a boom in Texas farm land prices which prompted frequent and free predictions from many an old--timer that a bust could not be far behind.

There was nothing approach ing a bust, of course, even in the drouth-ridden middle 50's And as the new decade of the 1960's gets under way there are no real signs to indicate that the boom actually has ever reached its peak.

Farmers may and probably will continue to complain of lower farm prices and increasing costs-which is well justified by current facts and figures. Some farm families probably will continue to forsake the land and its discouragements, although the number driven away from the farms to the cities is not nearly as high as during the drouth

But the value of the land itself appears to be holding a remarkably steady upward trend, and this is observed in nearly all areas of Texas. Prevailing prices of farm and ranch land generally is higher than can actually be justified by its value for crop or livestock production. The factors combining to

produce this situation also have developed another overall condition which is often observed and pointed out in many sections of Texas. The condition is this: More and more land over the State is becoming tightly held and to all practical purposes taken off the market altogether, au-


