ter; covers the soil more quickly and produces a denser crop growth. This breaks the impact of rain on the surface of the soil to a greater extent than does a crop that has been poorly fertilized. Adequate vegetative cover, either as a living crop or crop residues left on the soil after harvest, is the most economical way to reduce soil and water losses. By using enough fertilizer to produce high yields, there are more stalks and stubble available for return to the soil. This aids in increasing the soil's ability to take in water and store it deep for later use.

Large amounts of plant food are utilized in producing crops. To produce a bale of cotton, 80 lbs nitrogen (N); 40 lbs. phosphate (P205), and 60 lbs. potash (K20) are required. A yield of 4500 lbs. grain sorghum requires (110-60-70); 40 bu. wheat requires (80-30-50), and 6 tons Coastal Bermuda Hay requires (240-80-220).

A lot of plant food is removed from the soil in the harvested portion of the crop. One five-year-old's plaintive message to the operator was "My Mommie's asleep and won't wake up and there's a fire in our

house." After a little prodding, the operator learned the boy's name and address and called the fire department. Firemen rushed to the address, found the house on fire, and the mother knocked out by sleeping pills. Both survived, thanks to the child's action and the operator's help.

Another youngster whose moth er fell through a floor and was trapped, went directly to the telephone and dialed zero. 

With the irrigation season get- in irrigating is length of setting. ting underway, it will be well for us to review some basic principles of irrigation water management. In view of the general shortage we become doubly aware of the need to conserve it and use it as efficiently as possible.

Obviously our objective in irrigating is to apply sufficient water to meet the needs of the crop. But at the same time our system must be efficient. For example, with a surface system the field must be flat enough so that the water can be absorbed by the soil. If the slope is too great the water moves off before it can soak in the soil. About .05 of a foot fall per 100 feet affords an ideal grade for row watering. But, on the other hand the slope is directly related to the length of run and slopes of nearly 1 foot fall per 100 feet can be properly irrigated if the run is not longer than 500 feet. These figures apply to Amarillo loam and Amarillo fine sandy loam-the two major soil types in the District.




