grasses. Complete desirable' deferment is sometimes nec essary the first year, thereafter if proper grazing management is used and rainfall is normal, a deferment of 3 months every third year should be adequate to maintain and increase vigor and composition of desirable grass-

A good cndition range consists of 51.75% desirable grasses. Most ranchers would think that this is the ultimate but this condition can be improved. Deferment of approximately 3 months every third growing season will enable the range to make a gradual improvement. Improvement at this level is very slow and not much change can be noted the first few years.
