Rains Big Help To Most Lynn Areas

Rain the past week end totaled .66 inch in Tahoka, but much of the county received more than this, some areas up to an inch and a half.

Tahoka was dampened with a shower of .11 at mid-day Friday, followed by a slow rain Sunday night and Monday after midnight that measured .52 inch, and a light .03-inch sprinkle Tuesday.

This brought the official measurement in Tahoka to 1.66 for the year and to exactly two inches since October 18, far below normal.

Much of the area west of town received an inch to an inch and a half, including West Point, Three Lakes, Wells, Newmoore and intermediate areas. Petty, Lakeview and New Home reported .8 to over an inch. Dixie had .6 to .8 inch.

Wilson, Morgan, Southland and Gordon received little rain, fall was "about like Tahoka" at New Lynn.

Central and Grassland had an inch on up, with two inches reported east of Grassland and also heavy hail.

Southeast toward Draw and Redwine farmers reported .6 up to more than an inch, and the O'Donnell area an inch to an inch and a half.

Although this is not nearly enough, farmers say it will help and is, at least, encouraging. Most have listed or broken their land, but much of it was very, very dry and some blowing badly.

Since there was little moisture in the winter, farmers had not really expected the March rain and were waiting for April and May rains to furnish sufficient planting moisture.

Mrs. Armontrout Buried Monday

Mrs. Joe W. Armontrout, 91, a resident of New Home area for 43 years, died Saturday at 5:30 a. m. in Methodist Hospital. She had entered the hospital Wednesday after having suffered a stroke.

Funeral services were held Monday at 10:00 a. m. in New Home Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Joe Allen, officiating, assisted by Rev. Paul McClung, Baptist pastor. Burial followed in Tahoka cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

Mrs. Armontrout, whose maiden name was Mary Katherine Knight, was born in Oklahoma, then Indian Territory, on December 17, 1874.

She was married to Mr. Armontrout in Hamilton county on December 17, 1898. The couple moved to Lynn county from Collingsworth county in 1923 and settled three miles west of New Home, where they bought farm land. Mr. Armontrout passed away in 1950. Mrs. Armontrout was a member of the Methodist Church.

She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Mayme Malcolm of Athens, Mrs. Billie Wilson of Oton, and Mrs. Helen Lee Peek of New Home; one son, A. L. Armontrout of Houston; 14 grandchildren and 33 great grandchildren. Grandsons were pallbearers.

Beef Program Is Next Week

Beef and beef preparation will be discussed in an educational meeting at 1:30 p. m. to 4 p. m. April 6 in the Lyntegar Electric building here.

The session is open to the public and will feature discussions on the selections, preparation and nutritional value of beef, according to Mrs. Floyd Wilson, chairman of the Lynn County home demonstration council. Butchers and grocers are also invited to attend.

Extension Service - Meats Specialist Frank Oris, of Texas A&M University, will use a side of beef furnished by A. L. Smith to show how to select various cuts of beef for different uses.

Joy Parnell of the Southwestern Public Service Co. will tell the best ways to cook the various cuts and give a demonstration on cooking with dry and moist heat. She will also show different ways ground beef can be used.

Nutritional value of beef will be discussed by Mrs. Aubrey Russell, district home demonstration agent of Lubbock.

The session is a project of the Lynn County home demonstration council and family life committee and is the second such meeting held in this district.

Cotton Ginnings Are Past 185,000

Lynn county cotton ginnings from the 1965 crop totaled 185,619 up to March 21, according to the U. S. Bureau of the Census, and total ginnings for the nation were 14,912,461.

This was an increase for the county of nearly 8,000 bales since the January 16 report.

This is not the final report, however, delayed this year by the late crop, and the final report will be averaged out to 500-pound bales and adjusted to counties where cotton was actually raised, not where it was ginned. Little change is expected, though.

Lynn maintained its position as 12th in the nation, fifth in Texas and fifth on the Plains in 1965 cotton production.

Man Electrocuted Here Wednesday

A Negro farm worker, Joe Bailey, 40, was electrocuted Wednesday at about 11:30 a. m. on a farm north of town when the section of irrigation pipe he had in his hands came in contact with an electrical high-line carrying 7,200 volts of electricity.

Bailey was working for Charles and James Brookshire on the T-Bar farm land about ten miles northwest of Tahoka, a mile west of the W. R. Warren farm. He was moving irrigation line, and James had just left, apparently only a few minutes before the accident.

A Mexican who works for Robert Warren first found the body, and then "Shorty" Hester, working on some irrigation wells nearby arrived. Mr. Hester told The News he could find no life and the body was already cold.

David Airhart, driver of the car, was uninjured. Driver of the other car involved was Effie Champion Webb of Rt. 2, Snyder.

The Webb car was going west on FM 41 and Airhart was traveling north on FM 1730. They collided in the intersection, according to Highway Patrolman H. D. Cleveler, investigating officer.

School Trustee, City Council Elections Saturday, Tuesday

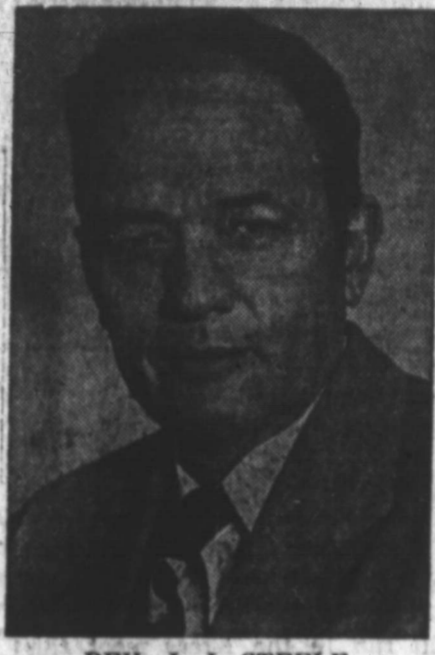
Voters in the cities of New Home, Wilson, O'Donnell, and Tahoka go to the polls next Tuesday, April 5, to elect new city council members.

Terms of three Tahoka aldermen expire, each is filed for re-election, and there is no opposition on the ballot. They are W. F. Kidwell, Alton Cain, and B. W. Rutherford. Holdover members are Jack Jaquess and H. B. McCord Jr., and Meldon Leslie is the mayor.

Wilson has a contest with five men filed for two places on the City Council, Victor Steinhauser and Harold Key, seeking re-election, and J. P. White, C. E. Campbell, and Virgil Kimbrell. A. L. Holder is the mayor, and the holdover aldermen are D. J. Hutcheson, Alfred Krause, and Clarence Nelson.

There will be 36 holes of handicap play, and each club member is requested to invite a non-club member from out of the county as a partner to play in the event. Further details for the play will be announced later.

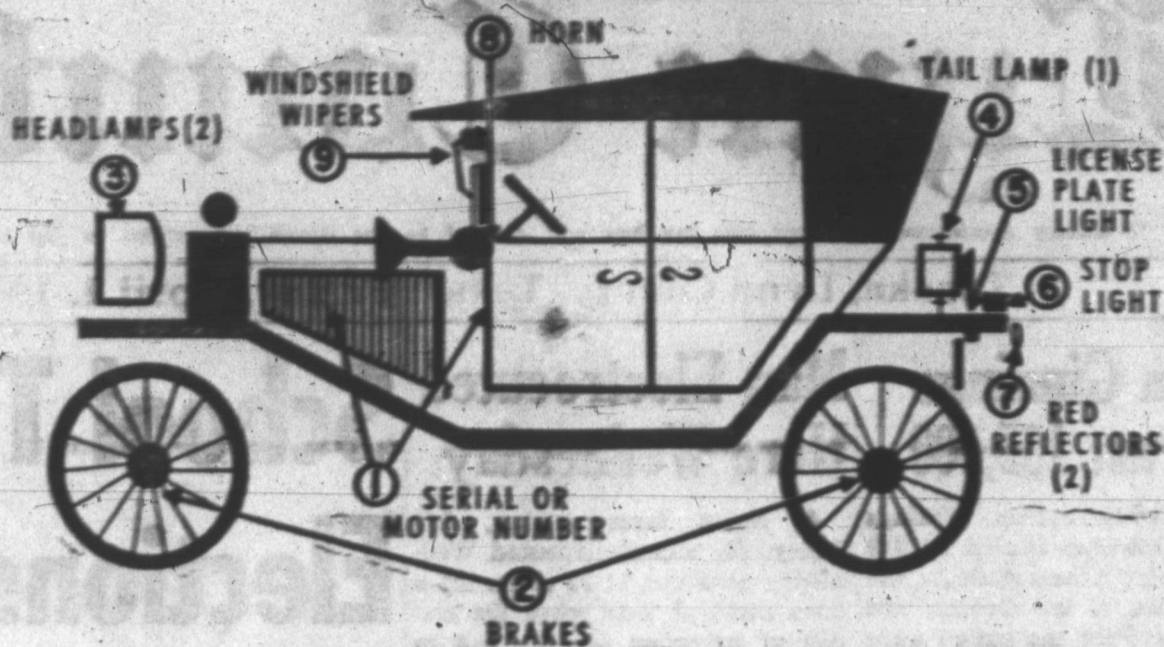

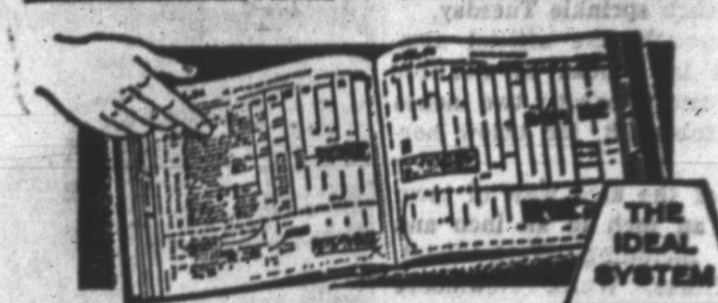

Cowpokes Had Remedy For Almost Everything

Austin (Sp.) — The nearest thing a pharmacist which the Texas cowpoke had on the historic drives north to Kansas in 1800's was the chuck wagon cook—a hearty fellow called upon to create dosage good for any ailment from bellyache to boils, from bruises to broken bones.

That is the conclusion of Dr. Esther Jane Wood Hall, University of Texas associate professor of pharmacy, who for several

years has been interested in drugs used by cowhands.

Thanks to Dr. Hall's efforts in documenting types of pharmaceuticals used on cattle drives, delegates to the annual meeting of the American Pharmaceutical Association to be held April 24-25 in Dallas will be able to view a display of drugs on the old Chisholm Trail.

Dr. Hall's research has led her to the conclusion that the drovers' cook probably was the most important fellow on the cattle drives. He ranked next to the trail boss in authority and not only did the cooking, but also drove the chuck wagon, kept it in harness and repair, and served as doctor for both men and horses.

If there had been a "Chuck Wagon Pharmacopoeia," Dr. Hall says, it probably would have contained hardly a dozen items. The lack of medicinal agents was not so much a matter of stinginess as it was ignorance of existing remedies. With the remedies that he did have, however, the cowpokes gave a vivid demonstration of making use of what you have on hand.

Snake bite, for instance, was usually treated by administering a stiff shot of whisky and cutting the wound to make it bleed freely. A Spanish dagger or knife was used to jab the flesh about the bite to counteract the venom, which often was followed by cauterizing the wound with a hot iron or by pouring on a little gunpowder which was ignited with a flaming splinter.

Horse liniment (diluted when administered for human use) was a popular remedy for any number of ills and usually was supplemented by a steam bath taken in Indian fashion—which Dr. Hall graphically describes as "human parboiling."

Running sores on the hands, caused by rope burns, and boils usually were treated with powder alum or smeared with axle grease.

April 8—9:00 a. m., have carcass information on swine. Discuss meat quality, Frank Orts. Meeting place, O'Donnell Community Center; 10:30 a. m., feeding market swine; 12:00 noon, adjourn.

KENNETH FURR DIES

The News overlooked two weeks ago report of the death of Kenneth Furr at Lovington, N. M., formerly of Lynn county, who once had gins at Southland and Lakeview and was the husband of the former Bonnie McNabb. He was the father of Mrs. Walter Morris of Lakeview.

Carbuncles called for an application of sorbello or a dung poultice.

Some chuck wagon cooks carried green willow poles which they burned into charcoal, ground in the coffee mill and poured down a cowhand sick with dysentery. And wild thyme (commonly called horse mint) found along the trail was bruised with the hands and used as an inhalent for head colds and hay fever. Balmoney weed brewed into a "tea" was a purgative "of no uncertain action," Dr. Hall notes.

One of the most popular remedies on the Chisholm Trail was coal oil, used for almost all external ailments. Also used were turpentine, camphor spirit, epsom salts, black draught, calomel, goose grease, mutton tallow, gizzard and snake oil. Poultices often were fashioned from such unlikely ingredients as bread and milk, onions, flaxseed, scraped beef steak, hot salt, mustard and poke root.

Dr. Hall confirms what television westerns have been expounding for many seasons—one of the cowboy's chronic conditions was "bad blood." But the bad blood she describes was caused by a diet of sour dough biscuits, meat and beans.

Although there was no apparent treatment for the condition while the cowhand was on the trail, a well-known "pharmaceutical" helped alleviate that tired, run-down feeling at the drive's end.

Commonly known as "forty-rod," whiskey is described by Dr. Hall as "that great pharmaceutical that produced a hundred ills for every one it cured." But most of the trail drivers apparently attempted "the cure."

"The duration for the completion of the 'forty-rod' treatment," Dr. Hall says "depended entirely on how long the patient's money lasted."

"SMALL BUSINESS"

Inasmuch as the United Nations is largely supported by the taxes of American small businessmen, even before Russia reneged in making payments, it is perhaps well to review the UN situation.

Rep. H. E. Gross, Iowa, recently commented on the fact that only by the barest of margins was Red China kept out of the UN, and Nationalist China thrown out, in 1945.

He feels that C. W. Harder, this situation may not prevail in the next vote.

UN was launched with worldwide hope to found an effective way of preventing the world wide anarchy of war. The charter provided that nations should act in concert to stop aggressive acts between nations, but should not interfere in domestic jurisdiction of any state. Since that time, however, there has been appended to UN some 14 different agencies such as the International Labor Organization, to "promote social justice" and the UN Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization which seeks control over schools all over the world. Thus, it has become quite active in meddling in nation's internal affairs.

Yet as the record since 1945 shows, the UN has been a substantial failure in achieving its main purpose, maintaining peace. This tragic failure is perhaps largely due to failure of world leaders to utilize UN for this purpose.

Perhaps the best try in this direction was the action of President Truman in getting a vote from UN to stop Northern Korean aggression, and fielding a multi-nation force.

But since that time, action has largely been on an independent basis. President Eisenhower took independent action in the crisis of Suez and again Lebanon. When President Kennedy had a confrontation with Russia over Cuba, only the American navy was deployed. President Johnson has acted independently in both Dominica and Vietnam.

When the Russians moved in to crush the Hungarian freedom movement, the UN abstained from interference on the basis already mentioned. Yet it has not hesitated to interfere in other people's domestic affairs, as witnessed by Rhodesia and South Africa.

Obviously, a new UN look is needed. All this collateral impediments should be junked and the main purpose accentuated . . . that of keeping the peace.

After all, in a stable society, one man may believe he is entitled to what some other man has. He is privileged to argue his case, but if he goes over to the other man's house to shoot up the place, all society acts to stop bloodshed.

There is no excuse today for any nation invading another. Unless the UN can agree to this principle, it will always be doomed to failure. Interference in domestic affairs can only lead to trouble and leave the world without an effective peace enforcing machine.

Tournament Successful

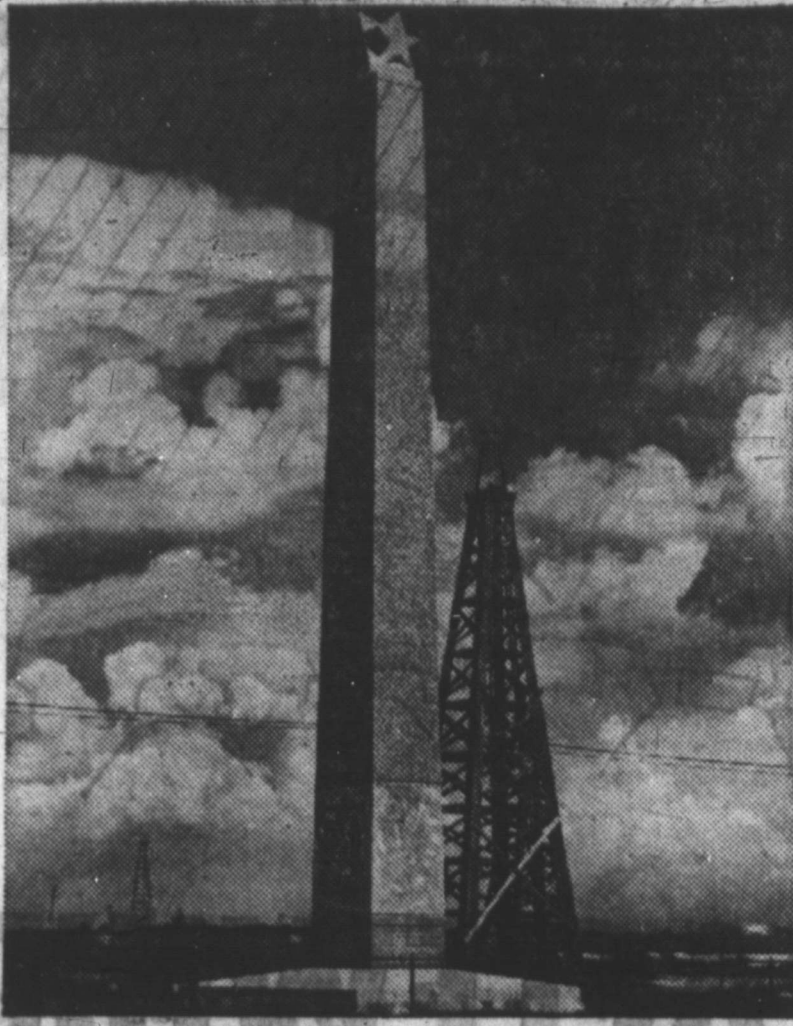

Saturday and Tuesday will be two important elections for Lynn county school districts and towns. Don't fail to vote! This will be the first opportunity for a few people to cast a free vote in Texas—the first time in more than sixty years.

There was a story in the Avalanche the other day about Mrs. E. B. Green of Lubbock, an excerpt from which follows:

Mrs. Green got her introduction to West Texas social life shortly after she arrived for her visit here in 1901. It was Feb. 14, 1902, and Mr. and Mrs. Bill Petty, who operated the T-Bar Ranch about 20 miles southeast (actually south) of here, decided to give a party for all the cowboys of the territory.

Though the numbers were few, all the young people of Lubbock attended the party, along with cowboys for miles around.

The ballroom was cleared for dancing until a midnight supper. "They had everything on that table that could be served," Mrs. Green said. "It was loaded."

"When the sun came up the next morning, we were dancing the 'Home Sweet Home Waltz,' and then we went home," she said.

Another Avalanche story Monday evening, written by Leland Boyd, recorded another bit of Lynn history, told by Joseph E. Alexander, who came to Lubbock in 1903. In 1908, in partnership with his brother, Charles, and George Curtis, the three acquired Staked Plains Telephone Co.,

which had exchanges in Lubbock, Tahoka, Brownfield, Gail, and Hale Center, with long distance lines connecting all but Hale Center. They traded the Tahoka branch to J. E. Franchies for a ranch south of Marfa in 1910.

Once, Alexander said, the company had a strange order. C. W. Post, founder of Post, started building his town, and wanted to put a telephone in his office. The partners talked it over and decided they'd have to build the line from Tahoka, this being the shortest route. But they told Post they couldn't put the line in and just charge the regular \$1.75 monthly fee. Post told them to build the line and send the bill to him, which was done.

Incidentally, The News has a copy of the telephone directory of the period immediately following.

H. B. and Estelle McCord were out at Phoenix recently trying to get some relief for his sinus trouble, but he was feeling pretty tough and went to see a Doctor Thomas Ross. He just knew he had seen that doctor somewhere before, but neither could agree on any place where they had met. Then, H. B. asked if the Doctor had ever been on television. And Dr. Ross replied, "Yes, with my father-in-law, Barry Goldwater."

Don't cuss your newspaper too much if it fails to print some news items. Maybe you failed to tell us. Even a newspaper can not hear all the news.

J. E. Walker, a farmer himself, as well as car salesman, brought us a clipping a little long to print in full, but goes like this, boiled down:

With tongue in cheek, the writer tells of America, "the land of opportunity," where it might be possible for a man to lease 22,000 acres of government land at 50 cents an acre, secure a \$11,000 loan from the Federal Land Bank, live on his unemployment check 39 weeks then go on welfare until he gets ahead, build some Government approved stock tanks, a shelter belt, contour the land, divert about 600 acres for non-use and collect about \$16 an acre on that, and end up with a "tidy little government check of \$9,600." Other crop diversions could bring the total to \$23,348.63, the writer figures, and after paying back the Land bank, with interest, he would have \$14,940.63 profit. If Uncle Sam gets wise and starts giving him a hard time, he can split the holdings into shares, and form a co-op. After all, if he doesn't take advantage of the programs, somebody else will. Good-bye depression, hard times, and scrimping!

We still haven't found that "LBJ All the Way" pin. One man said he had one but he wanted \$100 instead of \$1 for it.

Reese Program Told Rotarians

"What Reese Does and How They Do It" was told Tahoka Rotarians at the club meeting Thursday by Capt. Constantine A. Pappas, academic instructor at Reese Airforce Base.

He said Reese is one of eight undergraduate pilot training bases in the nation, four of which are in Texas, represents an investment of about \$130 million dollars and costs \$30 million a year to operate.

Each class is made up of about 50 men, every one a college graduate, a volunteer in the service, and meets other qualifications of the Armed Forces plus possible aptitude for flying and combat.

Pilots today are being started out in the T-41 prop-plane because of its low cost and the economy of operation, only about \$20.00 an hour compared to up to \$500.00 per hour cost of flying some of the larger jet planes. Although there are great disadvantages to learning by this type flying, there is a great saving in cost to the taxpayer and also some trainees are eliminated at low cost.

Advanced flying is in the T-47 and the T-38, the latter costing near three-quarters of a million dollars. There are 153 aircraft at Reese.

The Reese program is for 83 weeks, the average pilot puts in an average 12-hour day, although this frequently runs into 18 hours, and will graduate with 240 to 250 flying hours.

But for each hour in the air, the potential Airforce pilot spends four hours in ground instruction and training. He has very little time for recreation or leisure.

A lot of people are required to condition, and a lot of teamwork is required to service, overhaul, repair, control, and instruct. There is one instructor for each three pilots.

Capt. Pappas was reared at Albuquerque, is a graduate of New Mexico State University, entered the Airforce in 1961, graduated to the young, give the flavor of the pioneering days, and bring back fond memories to all the old-timers. Only thing wrong with the two she has written is that they leave the reader wanting some more.

Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

Several thousand feet of parallel terraces have been constructed in the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District this winter, says Donald Reed of the local Soil Conservation Service office. Several more thousand feet are under construction and will be completed in the near future.

Joe Brooks has finished terraces on 425 acres he operates seven miles east of Tahoka and five miles south. He plans to terrace more land next year.

C. R. Burleson has just completed half a section in the Wells area. Also in the Wells area are Harold Sanders and Harold Barrett. Sanders has completed about half a section and Barrett one-fourth of a section.

Among those members that have terraces under construction at the present time include Glenn Brewer, Cleve Littlepage and Wayne Clayton.

Parallel terraces are designed so that they can be tilled with 4, 6 or 8 row equipment. The number of point rows is reduced so this makes parallel terraces much easier to work. Any producer planning terraces in the future

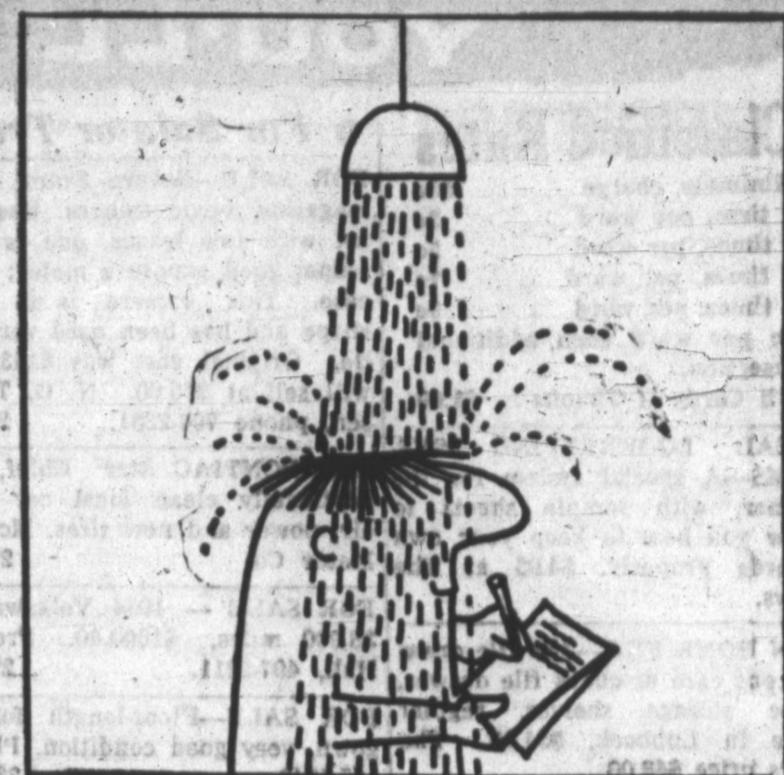

Prizes were won by Mrs. Ora Curry, Mrs. Callie Massey and Mrs. Trudy Shuknecht.

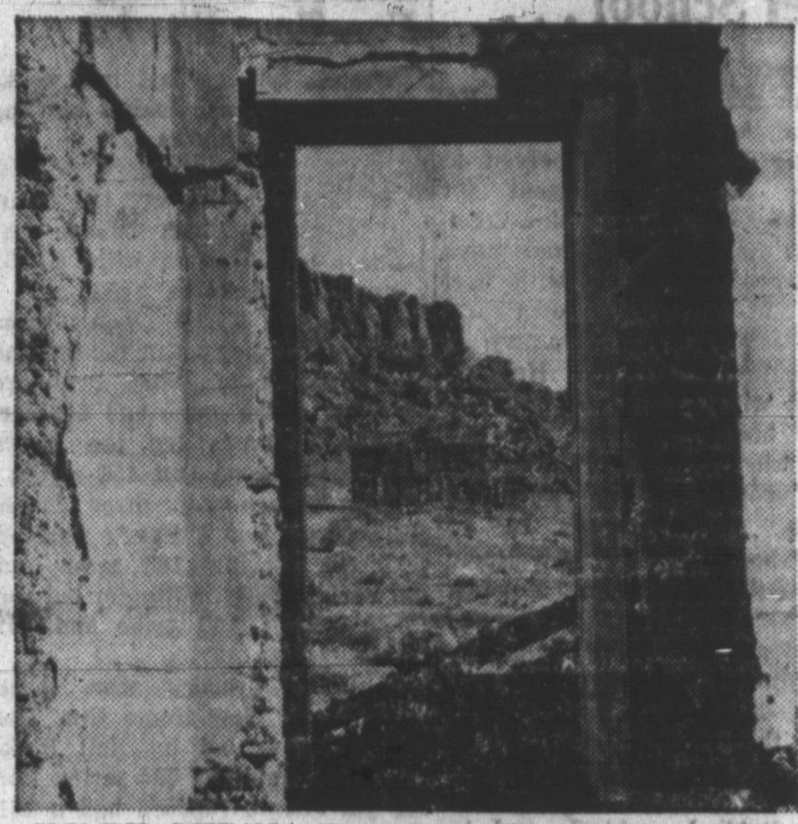
PTA Will Install New Officers At Meeting Tuesday

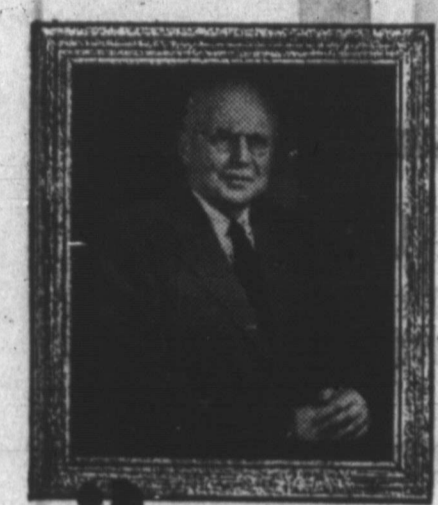

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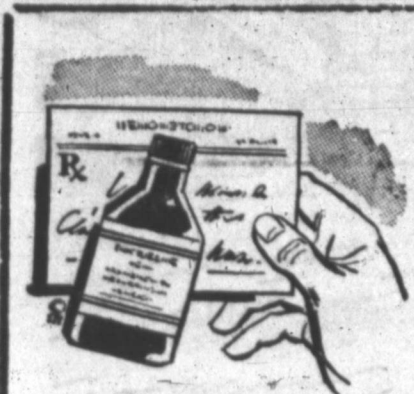

Mr. Holtzapple has had much experience in working with beef cattle and operated his own farm with beef cattle and poultry as the main enterprises. He has worked with commercial and registered breeders in that area and has carried on a very active education program in beef cattle production.

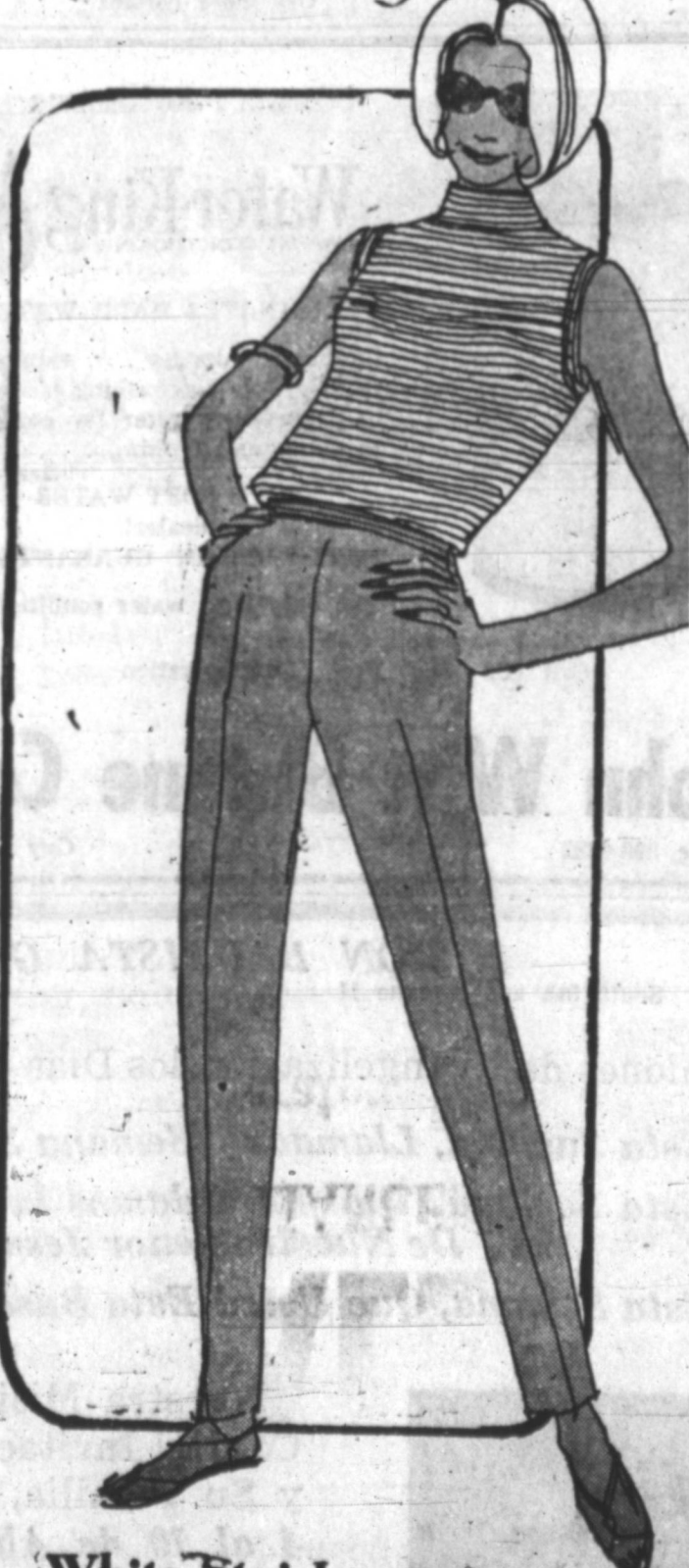
