Cotton Promotion Plan Is Approved

Lynn county farmers joined those over the nation's cotton belt in giving approval to both marketing quotas and the cotton promotion program by more than the necessary two-thirds majority vote.

Ballots were counted Wednesday, and Wallace Dove of the local ASCS office announced Lynn farmers voted 1156 to 154, or 88.24 per cent, in favor of a continuation of marketing quotas; and 997 to 332, or 74.24 per cent in favor of the cotton research and promotion program which will take \$1.00 per bale to compete with the synthetic fibers on a nation-wide basis.

There were 43 challenged ballots on marketing quotas and 40 on the promotion proposal.

South Plains farmers followed the Lynn trend, and apparently both carried nation-wide. Press reports, unofficial, gave the national vote as 272,831 to 24,781 favoring marketing quotas and 181,204 to 84,342 favoring the promotion act, or 91.7 and 68.2, respectively, favoring.

Twenty-three South Plains counties voted 20,662 to 2,143 for marketing quotas and 16,852 to 5,089 for the promotion act, or 90.80 and 76.80 percent in favor, respectively.

Mrs. L. R. Mason Buried Tuesday

Mrs. L. R. Mason, 82, resident of this area about 46 years, died at 7:20 p.m. Saturday in a San Angelo rest home.

Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday in Trinity Baptist Church of Post with a former pastor, Rev. Shelby Bishop of Tahoka, and the present pastor, Rev. Jimmy McGuire, officiating. Burial followed in Terrace Cemetery at Post.

The former Miss Eula Pearl Thomas, Mrs. Mason was born in McLennan county, north of Waco, on Jan. 6, 1884. She was married to L. R. Mason on Nov. 30, 1905.

The couple came to Garza county in 1920, and lived two miles north of Storrie gin, a mile from the Lynn county line, until Mr. Mason's death on Oct. 18, 1961. In failing health a long time, she lived at Baptist Memorial Geriatric Hospital in San Angelo the past 13 months.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. W. C. Maxey of Earth, Mrs. A. M. Smith of Post, and Miss Ruby Mason of Lubbock; six sons, T. B. of Tahoka, route 1, C. R. of Huntington Beach, Calif., C. L. of Post, Robert of Lubbock, W. B. of Shallowater, and H. W. of Cincinnati, Ohio; three brothers, R. E. Thomas of Houston, Harvey Thomas of Glen Mills, Pa., and R. B. Thomas of Ft. Worth; two sisters, Mrs. Rux Williamson of Grove Hill and Mrs. Tom S. Sexton of Dallas; 29 grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.

Dunbar School Sold By Board

Tahoka school board members met in regular session Thursday night, states Supt. Harold Reynolds.

Minutes of the previous meeting and bills for November were approved. The men also approved the sale of the Dunbar school property to a local church group for \$750.00 plus attorney's fees. The board passed a policy that school facilities would not be used for meetings of evangelistic nature.

The purchase of two bus chassis was approved, one 60-passenger and one 48-passenger, and board members heard reports on the budget, financial report of all funds, cafeteria operations for November and enrollment as of December 8.

Tahoka schools had an enrollment of 1,095 as compared to 1,122 on November 10. South Elementary has 381 students, North Elementary 317, Junior High 174, and Senior High 223.

Supt. Reynolds states that appointments to the annual textbook committee were approved at Thursday's meeting.

Committee members for South Elementary are Mrs. Rhoda Roberts, Mrs. Minnie Lou Ash and Mrs. Zuma McWhirter.

North Elementary committee consists of Mmes. Louise Wyatt, Blenda Pruitt, Nan Adams, Anna Jo Carter, Jessie Clinton, Eva Jo Berkley and Jimmie Wyatt.

Members of the textbook committee for Junior-Senior High School are Mrs. J. Lynn Ryan, Tom McKee, Miss Carol Snider and Miss Beverle Smith.

The superintendent is automatically a member of the committee and serves as chairman. Principals will be ex-officio members of the committee.

He received a broken jaw and other injuries and is a patient in Methodist Hospital. A Mrs. Ables, occupant of the other car, was also hospitalized. Both cars are reported to have been wrecked.

Tax Collections Above Average

State and county tax collections are better than usual as near 70 percent of taxes due by next Jan. 31 have already been paid, states George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector.

During October and November, this year \$189,355.64, after discounts, in state and county taxes had been paid here compared to \$170,812.19 or about 65 percent, for the same period a year ago.

Taxpayers were given a three percent discount in October, a two percent discount in November, and a one percent discount applies in December.

Last year 2,074 farm trailers had been registered through November, this year 3,122.

Under the old poll tax law of last year, 391 had qualified to vote by securing poll tax receipts. Under the new law this year, only 404 have registered, slightly more than last year.

City Lets Contract For New Water Reservoir

City of Tahoka has let a contract to Ed Lampe, Contractor, of Lubbock for construction for the take-point reservoir, pump house, chlorinator plant, and tie-in water system as the last construction step for connection with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority aqueduct.

Lampe was low bidder on the work at \$49,967.00. This plant will be erected southeast of the CR-MWA take-point reservoir now being completed in Northwest Tahoka on North 8th and Ave. P.

The City's reservoir, states City Administrator J. M. Uzzle, will be of concrete and have a 150,000 gallon capacity. The adjoining pump building will house pumping and chlorinating equipment. Also, a chain-link fence is included to enclose both the City and CRMWA reservoir and plant.

Under the contract, an 8-inch water main will be laid to the east to connect with present City main on Ave. M, and another 8-inch line will extend to the south adjacent to Ave. P to the City main at North 2nd. This will permit pumping water from the Canadian River lines directly into Tahoka City mains, into the old overhead reservoir in North Tahoka, or into the newer 250,000-gallon overhead reservoir in West Tahoka.

Uzzle says work is just about complete by Plains Utility on the \$14,605.00 contract for moving water mains in North Tahoka and sewer mains at the South city limits to make way for the new US 87 four lane-highway through town.

Christmas Service At First Baptist Is Sunday Evening

A special Christmas program entitled "A Service of Carols and Candles" will be presented at the First Baptist Church Sunday evening at 6 o'clock with the pastor, Rev. Jim Turner, conducting the service. The public is invited to attend and each person is requested to bring a small (about six-inches long) white candle for use in the service.

The program will feature singing of traditional Christmas carols, reading of scriptures pertaining to the coming of the Savior, a filmstrip of the Christmas story, special music, and a period of meditation. Highlight of the service is the meditation period which begins with the light from only one candle. The pastor will light the candles of the ushers and they will pass down the aisles lighting the candles of each worshiper.

Rev. Turner first saw this service several years ago in the University Baptist Church in Abilene and he has used it several times since then in churches he has pastored. He states that it has always proved to be a very beautiful and moving worship service.

Bray Rites Are Held On Sunday

Last rites were held here Sunday afternoon and in Dallas Monday for A. M. (Maurice) Bray, 57, an apparent victim of burglars slaying by one or more burglars at Bray Chevrolet Co. late Wednesday night or in the early hours of Thursday last week.

A Tahoka resident for 18 years, Mr. Bray had been very active in church, civic, school and youth work during his life here.

Services at 4:00 p.m. in the new First Methodist Church sanctuary, which Mr. Bray had fondly helped plan, were simple and dignified, as the family thought he would want.

People from the town and country, from over the South Plains and friends and business associates from a distance filled the sanctuary and also the Fellowship Hall of the church, where the service was channeled by a speaker system.

The message was by Dr. J. Chess Lovern of Oklahoma City, formerly pastor of First Methodist in Lubbock and considered one of the outstanding ministers of the denomination, an old college classmate and friend at SMU.

Rev. Hugh B. Daniel, the pastor was in charge; a former pastor, Rev. Aubrey White of Idaho, gave the invocation; the choir and audience sang, "Faith of Our Fathers", there was a responsive reading just as in a regular service.

Officers reported early Thursday "we are nearly back where we started" on investigation into the slaying of A. M. Bray here Wednesday night of last week by one or more burglars at Bray Chevrolet Co.

Police Chief Jack Miller said lie detector tests this Wednesday night cleared two young men who have been under suspicion and questioned.

Officers are still seeking identity of two young men seen in Tahoka under suspicious circumstances at about 12:30 a.m. Thursday, two hours before the slaying was discovered.

They are also seeking information on an old 20-gauge sawed-off shotgun and an extra shell dropped at the scene of the crime.

Texas Ranger W. E. (Raz) Renfrow of Lubbock, Chief Miller, Policeman Joe Rainid, and Deputy Sheriffs Bill Wilkinson and Doyle Woody have been working on the case.

The shotgun, some of Mr. Bray's clothing, and other items were taken to Austin last week and are undergoing tests at the Texas Department of Public Safety Crime Laboratory. Test results are not expected before next week.

Justice of the Peace Horace Brupette of O'Donnell is withholding an inquest verdict pending the investigation.

Friends and associates agree Wednesday, Dec. 7, was a normal day for Mr. Bray. He was happy and cheerful, proud of his family, drank coffee both morning and evening with friends, and was making plans for Christmas.

Wednesday afternoon, accompanied by Mrs. G. H. (Frances) Chestnut, firm manager, plans were completed with Al Smith at the Cafeteria for the annual company Christmas party to be held there on the coming Saturday night.

UZZLES RETURN TO LUBBOCK
Mr. and Mrs. Danny Uzle and baby daughter have just recently completed their move from Arvada, Colo., to Lubbock where Danny is again employed by the Planning Department for the City of Lubbock. He began work in Lubbock on December 5. Danny is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Uzle and his wife, Nancy, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Travis Inman.

The Supreme Court of the United States, plus the cooperation of Texas' Legislature in passing the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure, is doing a lot to make apprehension and conviction of criminals most difficult.

Here we are confronted with an unprecedented increase in crime rate, and officers are afraid to make arrests without clincher evidence. When an officer does make an arrest, in substance, he must inform the man being arrested, "Now, Mister, you don't have to talk or answer any questions for information you give may be used against you. You have a right to have your attorney present before I can even ask you why you are not at home in bed. If you don't have an attorney, it's our duty to furnish one for you." Now, how in the world is a peace officer going to gather information from suspects?

The Texas Code requires the arrested person to be taken "immediately" before a magistrate, and the Federal rules say "without unnecessary delay"—without time for some investigation to determine possible guilt or even to eliminate the innocent. Furthermore, the Code requires a warrant be "in hand." Further still, the Code gives defense attorneys right of "discovery" (to examine the state's evidence and witness).

We're getting things in a heck of a mess, it seems to us. We need more leeway in catching criminals, not less.

If an officer can't grab a suspect—or even any innocent, decent, law-abiding citizen—and ask him what he knows, we're in trouble.

Here's a true story: A Tahoka lady bought a typewriter from a Lubbock discount center. When she got home with it she found the carriage would move only about half way across then stop. She took it back to Lubbock because she had a guarantee slip. The discount house clerk told her: "Sure it's guaranteed, all you have to do is box the typewriter up and send it to the factory, and they'll fix it, plus a small charge for the parts." Luckily, she brought it to the News, and by doing a little blacksmithing we got it to working and charged her nothing. If sent back to the factory, the freight would have been about \$4.50 and the "small charge" for the part would have been \$18.00. Some service and some guarantee from the discount houses! Most of your local merchants stand behind such transactions and make good on such a fault.

Fireplace Adds Holiday Spirit

Your fireplace can add an especially gay note to holiday activities if the fire is made up of multi-colored flames, says county agent Bill Griffin.

Instead of the usual yellow flame from wood, the flames can be green, red, blue, orange, or purple in color depending upon the chemicals used to treat the material to be burned.

Griffin explains that calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride—blue, potassium chloride—purple, strontium nitrate—red, lithium chloride—carmine, and copper sulfate—emerald green. Dry pine cones or small blocks or chips of wood can be soaked in solutions of these chemicals to produce the multi-colored flames when burned. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or local drug stores.

To treat cones or wood, a plastic pail and onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing 1 pound of the desired chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted down so

that the material is completely covered by the solution. The cones or wood should soak for at least 10 minutes.

After soaking, the treated material may be placed on newspapers to dry. After drying overnight, they will be ready for use in the fireplace.

The county agent adds that "logs" can be made of loosely rolled newspapers tied with a heavy twine and soaked in a solution of 4 pounds of copper sulfate and 3 pounds of rock salt in a gallon of water. They will take several days to dry out. Once dry, a paper log will burn all-evening and produce a rainbow of colors.

 and Mrs. Chestnut and Lionel Miller, service manager, remained for night work. Mrs. Chestnut left about 9:00 p.m., Lionel a short time later, and Mr. Bray remained to do further work.

Mrs. Bray awakened about 11:30 p.m. was slightly concerned that her husband had not come home, but went back to sleep. However, when she awoke again at about 2:00 a.m. and found Mr. Bray not home, she became alarmed. Mr. and Mrs. Chestnut accompanied her to the firm with the keys, Mr. Raindl met them there, and he found the body slumped on the floor face up adjacent to a desk at the extreme southeast corner of the parts department. Officers theorized Mr. Bray, working in his enclosed office near the front of the building, and about 60 feet and two partitions removed from the site, heard a noise, went to investigate. Possibly he was stooping over to avoid being detected as he walked down the aisle between parts shelves and was shot when he rounded the corner. Or, he may have been grabbing for the gun held by the assailant. Possibly he recognized the intruder.

Entrance had evidently been gained by a rear window. Two barrels had been moved to a spot under the window. Adjacent to the inside latch, the glass was broken. The rear door, bolted from the inside, was unlatched. Rear door to the parts department, also bolted from the inside, had been pried open. The assassin could have climbed on any one of several vehicles in the lot at the rear of the building and jumped over the enclosing fence in leaving.

Probably the intruder knew the layout of the building. Lights are left burning all the time at the front, and the intruder probably never knew Mr. Bray was there until the latter discovered the
