## Mr. and Mrs. Hill Honored By City, Chamber, Friends

"We Salute You, Frank and Mae Hill..." was the theme of an appreciation night held Monday in the Tahoka Community Center.

The honored couple, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hill, are long-time residents of Lynn County and Tahoka, both having been associated with the Lynn County News most of their years here. Hill was editor and publisher of the newspaper the past 17 years until retiring April 1.

Sponsoring the event, which drew a crowd of over 100, were the Tahoka Rotary Club, and Tahoka Chamber of Commerce. Presented in behalf of the sponsoring groups and the people of Tahoka and Lynn County was a plaque inscribed with "To Frank and Mae Hill... In recognition and sincere appreciation of their outstanding contributions to the development and progress of Tahoka and Lynn County May 29, 1967."

Both the honorees also received gifts, including a complete fishing outfit for

Hill, and a piece of luggage for Mrs. Hill.

Presiding over the function as master of ceremonies was Clint Walker, who in succession introduced Mayor Meldon Leslie; Warren Embree, president of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce; Maurice Small, executive secretary of the Chamber; and Dr. K. R. Durham, who made the principal address.

Included among the com-

ments by the various speakers were "There's never been anyone more cooperative than Frank... in anything that come up... if it's for the good of the community and Lynn County, he's for it 100%." "We are honoring some outstanding citizens who always handled their job with graciousness and good taste, cooperation of this sort is a joy." "We had confidence in Frank... and the folks of Tahoka and Lynn County owe Frank and Mae a big vote of thanks... we mourn their loss as business people in Tahoka, but wish them a long and happy retirement... We think the world of you!"

Following the program, W. T. Kidwell read several telegrams from persons who were unable to attend, but wished to offer their best wishes to the Hills, including wires from the 1967 Tahoka Senior Class, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Short, Dr. Emil Prohl and Charles Townes and wives and Guido Pablo of Italy. The Prohls and Townes are on a European Tour. The Seniors and the Shorts are in Galveston.

In a brief "thank you" after the program, Hill said, "We don't know what to say... we really appreciate the town of Tahoka and all its people and all the people of Lynn County... you get to feel a part of the people you serve... a newspaper can be no better than its people... there's no finer place than Tahoka... we expect to live here for many more years... this is the greatest honor of our lives." Following the ceremonies, cake and punch were served and those present visited and talked.

## Rain Showers County, More Still Needed

Rains early Saturday and again Monday evening were of benefit to large areas of Lynn County, but much of the county still needs a good soaking rain for dry-land planting.

Rain in Tahoka totaled .87 Saturday and .03 Monday, but some areas to the north and northwest received up to three inches or more.

Most of the south half of the county remains dry and barely a sprinkle was received over the Wells, T-Bar, O'Donnell and Draw Areas. Rain was spotted in the rest of the county.

North of West Point up into the Petty area and north of Tahoka, deluges fell ranging up to three inches

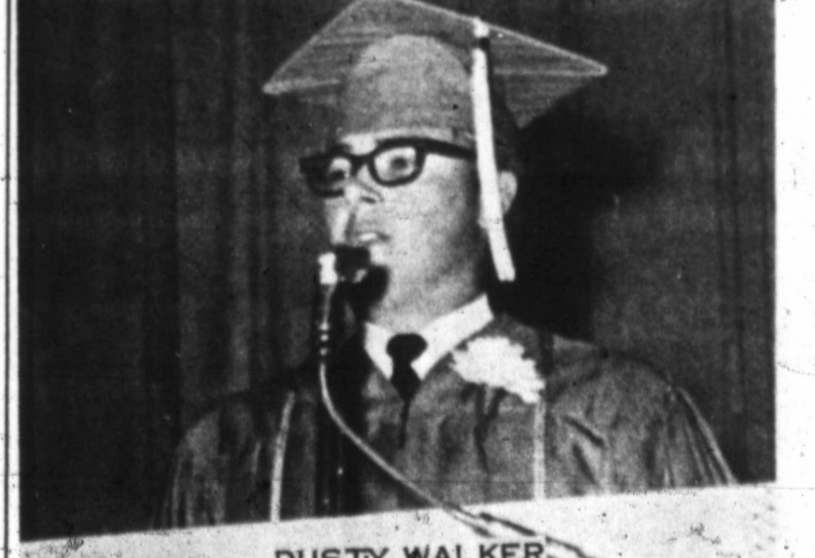

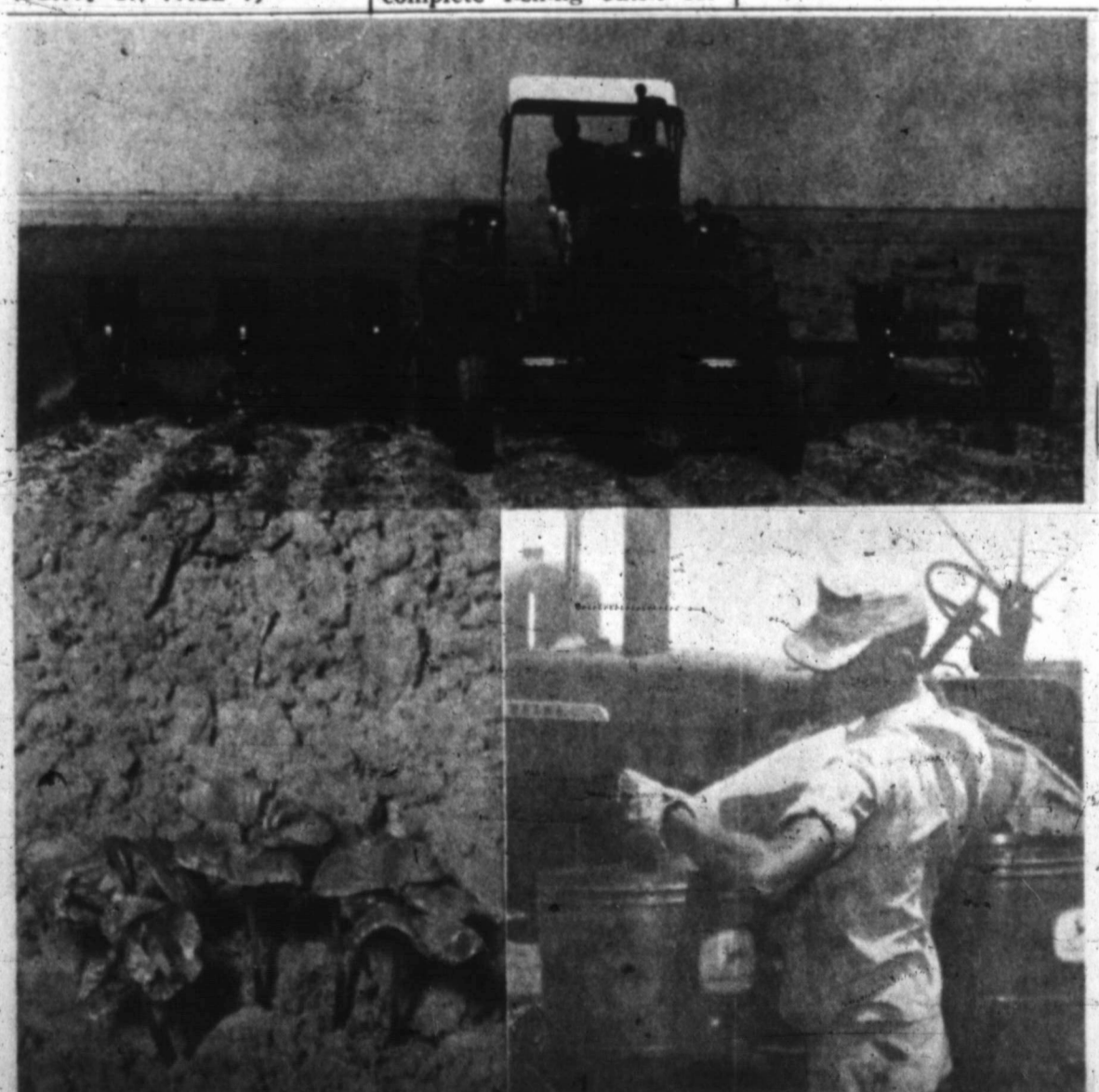

Bill Griffin, County Agent Says.....

As of May 13, 28 confirmed screwworm cases have been reported in Texas. Six cases were confirmed between April 30 and May 13, according to officials at the Screwworm Eradication Laboratory at Mission.

A total of just over a billion sterile flies were air-dropped during the same period. The officials continue to urge stockmen to be on the alert and to submit samples of any worms found in animal wounds to the Mission laboratory for identification.

Boys or girls between the ages of 9 and 19 interested in the fascinating world of insects can gain valuable information on the subject of joining a 4-H Club and participating in the 4-H entomology project.

In addition to being a lot of fun, County Agent Bill Griffin says members also gain new knowledge about both beneficial and destructive insects. Entomology is a project, he adds, which can be conducted by urban as well as rural youth.

Young members can take a basic first-year project which includes making insect collections and mounting equipment. They collect 15 insects in three orders.

For THS Bulldogs**

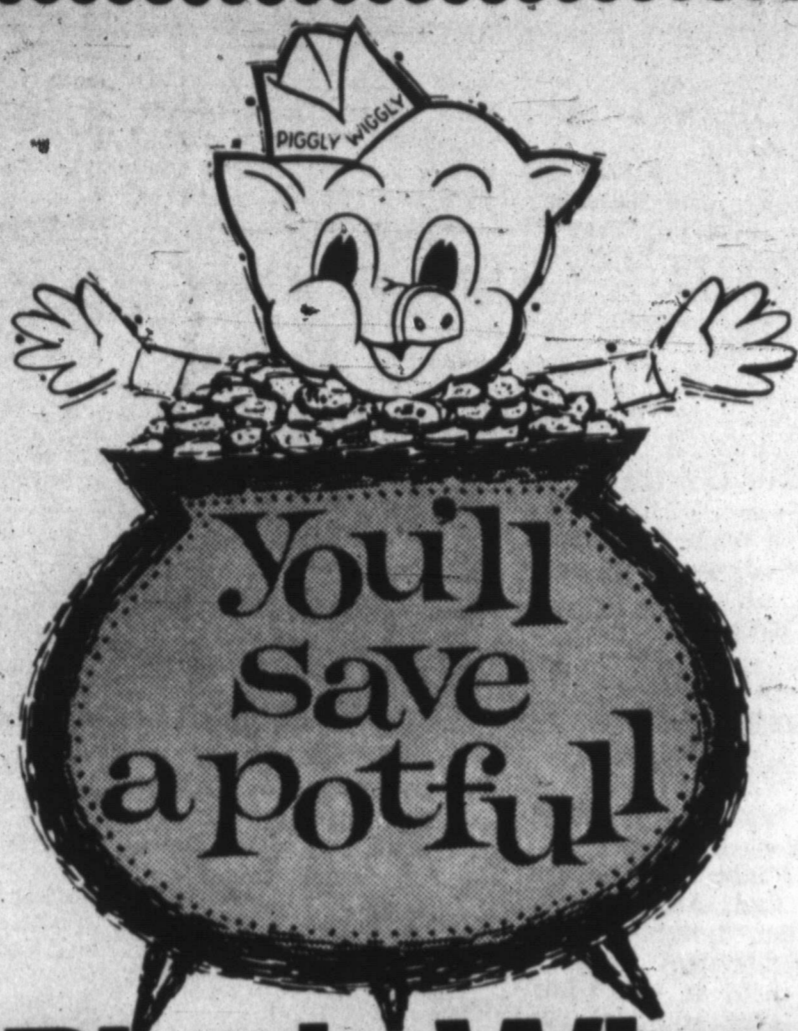
