Rain Showers County, More **Still Needed**

Rains early Saturday and again Monday evening were of benefit to large areas of Lynn County, but much of the county still needs a good soaking rain for dryland planting.

Rain in Tahoka totaled .87 Saturday and .03 Monday, but some areas to the north and northwest received up to three inches 'or more.

Most of the south half of the county remains dry and barely a sprinkle was received over the Wells, T-Bar. O'Donnell and Draw Areas. Rain wes spotted in the rest of the county.

North of West Point up into the Petty area and north of Tahoka deluges fell ranging up to three inches

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
