

One irrigation should be applied at preboot and the other at late bloom stage. If sufficient water is available for a third irrigation, it should be applied during the soft dough

However, points out Griffin, one irrigation on grain sorghum gives the most efficient water use. If rainfall is short, the boot stage is the approximate time to ap-

ply this single irrigation. Research has shown that irrigation during the preboot stage will often speed um midge, explains Griffin.
