The Draw Community Reunion will be held July 16 at the Community Center in Tahoka. Everyone who is interested is invited to attend and bring a picnic lunch.

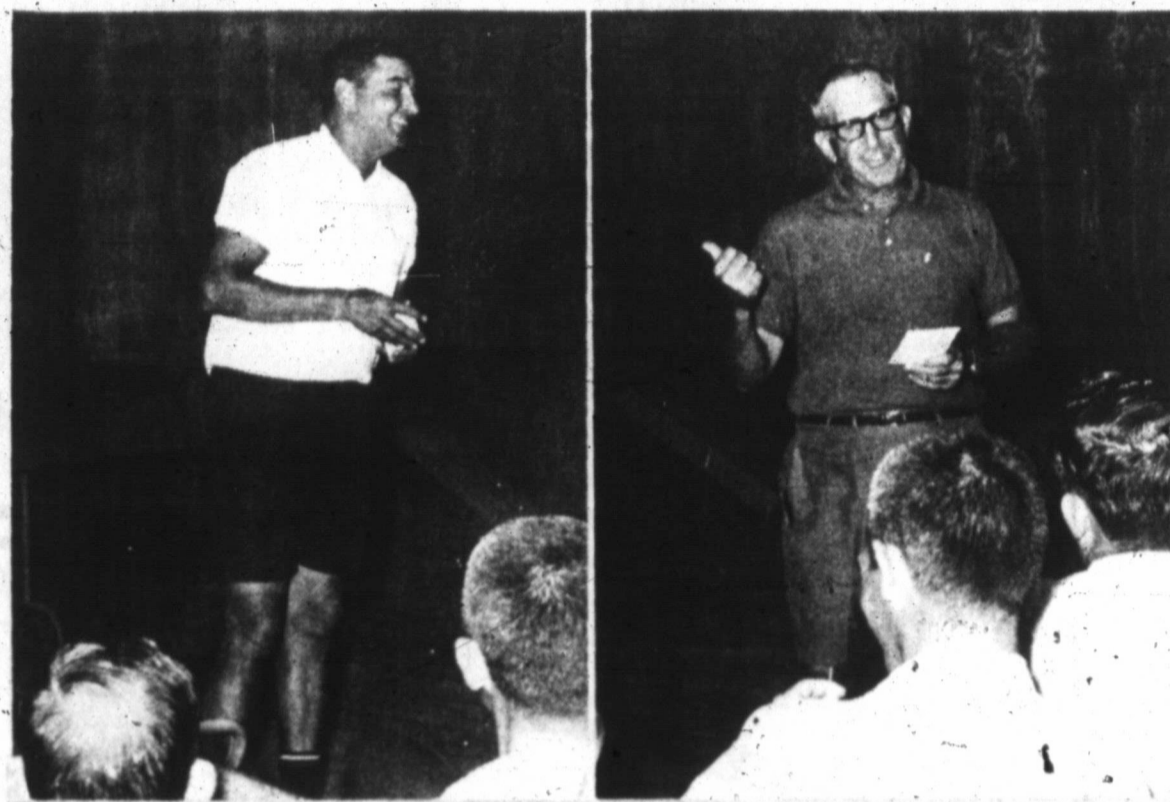

The top 4-H'ers in Extension District 2 Cotton Contest will be honored at a noon luncheon July 12 at the Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, Lubbock, which sponsors the annual event.

Lynn 4-H'ers To Enter Horse Show

Big Spring About 100 entries will compete in the annual Extension District 2 4-H Horse Show which is scheduled for July 13 in Big Spring.

The top six winners in both the dryland and irrigated division will receive cash awards, with the two first place winners also receiving a plaque.

Among the six dryland winners is Benny Barton, O'Donnell, who placed 4th in the contest with an average lint yield per acre of 366.4.

Purpose of the contest is to promote greater yields per acre of lint cotton on South Plains farms by improving fertility and soil texture and by better cultural practices.

Youth entering the contest must be regularly enrolled in 4-H Club work and be between the ages of 9 and 19.

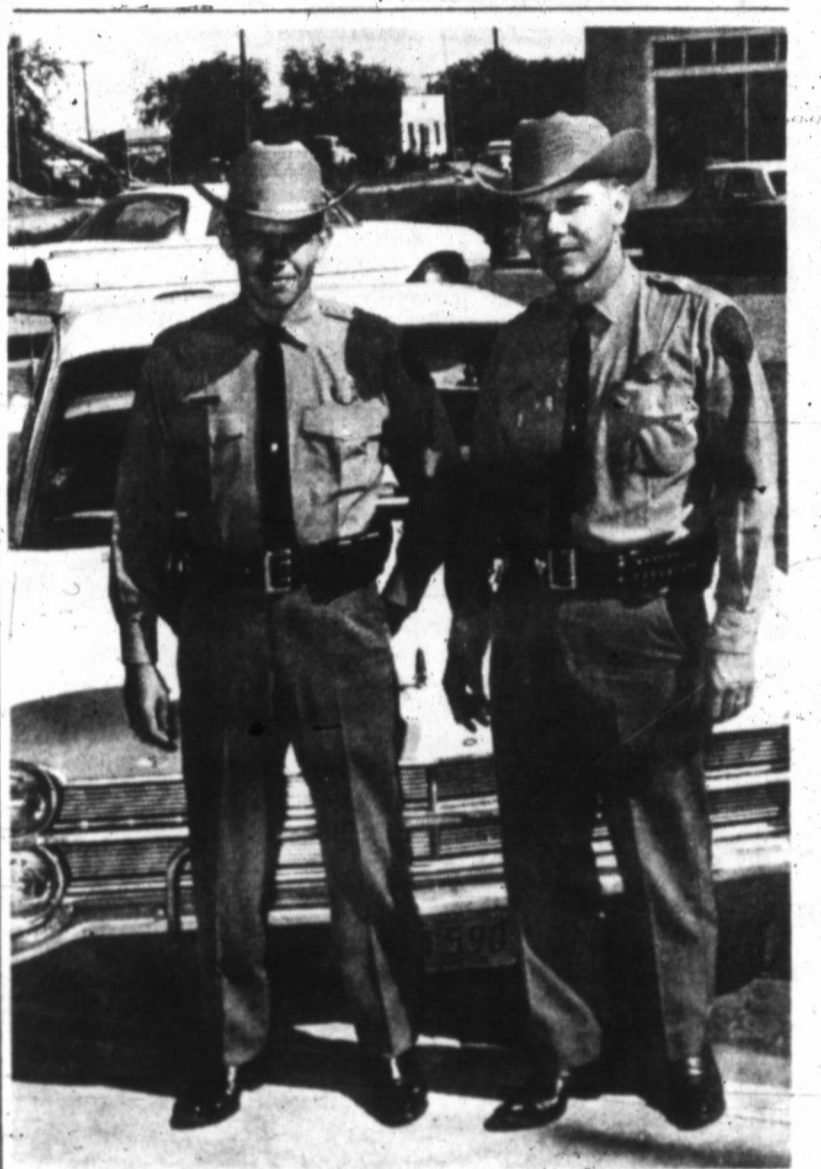
last season at Tech which were shown at the conclusion of the program.

Bill Griffin, County Agent Says.....

During 1934-36, on an annual average percentage basis, cotton accounted for about 81 percent of all fibers used in mill consumption in the United States. By 1966, this had dropped to 51.4 percent.

Production of cotton in the foreign free world over the past 10 years has been increasing at an average rate of about 4.3 percent a year. In contrast, consumption abroad (foreign free world) has been increasing at a rate of only about 2.9 percent a year. If these trends continue, production in the foreign free world would equal consumption in about 1971.

Then what will our exports amount to, since in many respects, we have been a residual exporter of cotton?

In 1924-26, the United States annually exported 9.3 million bales and foreign countries only 5.7 million bales.

When one looks at a later period, 1960-62, the United States annually exported about 5.1 million bales and foreign countries exported 11.0 million bales, more than twice that exported by the United States.

During 1965-66, the United States exported about 2.9 million bales, and foreign countries exported 13.7 million bales. This is a real problem facing the American cotton farmer.

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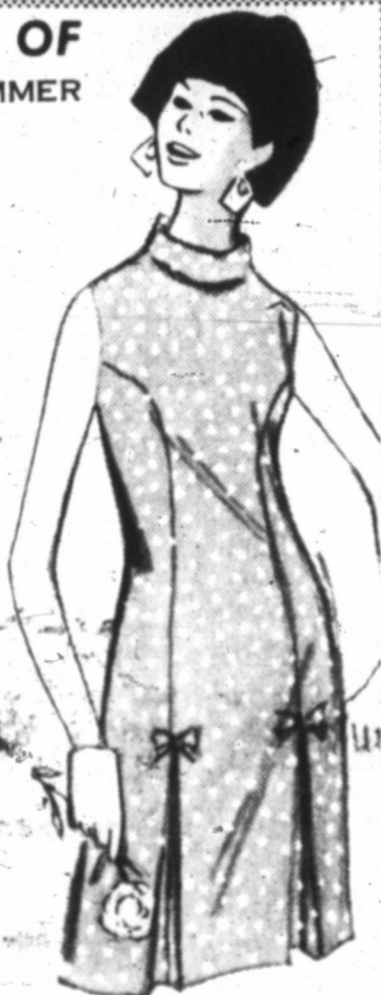

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SANDHILLS PHILOSOPHER

Communist Phone Booth



Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm is surprised to learn a new fact about Russia, his letter this week reveals.

Dear editor:
I got tired of listening to the United Nations debates on television, where every delegate is "distinguished" and every nation is "peace-loving." I figured if Premier Kossygin could walk out when something came up he didn't like I could do the same and shut the set off and wear out on my front porch and read a newspaper which an insurance salesman left here the other day when he was trying to sell me a policy which would pay off even in the event of an atomic war.
I never could get him to say who'd be around to pay off.
Over on an inside page I ran across one of those articles that always throws me off balance, which is hard to do when you're sitting with your feet propped on the banister.
According to it, the police in Russia have been bothered with culprits stealing receivers out of pay telephone booths, and what bothered

me about this was not what anybody would want with a telephone receiver or that there are petty thieves in Russia, but that there are pay telephones.

I had thought the people owned everything over there and you can see what a shock it is to learn that a Communist phone booth is no different from a Capitalist booth--it takes a dime to make one work.

When information like this slips out from behind the Iron Curtain, it makes me more and more doubtful about everything else that comes out.

**Bill Griffin,

Says.....**

For maximum yields of grain sorghum, adequate soil moisture should be available during the critical growth stages of boot, bloom and soft dough. Best yields are realized when soil moisture is kept at or above 45 per cent of field capacity during these stages, says Bill Griffin, county agricultural agent.

Grain sorghum uses less than one-tenth of an inch of water per day up to about the seven-leaf stage, but thereafter the water use rate increases rapidly.

Griffin says the peak water use of more than three-tenths of an inch per day comes between the boot and bloom stage. Two to three well-timed summer irrigations will generally give good yields or probably near maximum net return. One irrigation should be applied at pre-boot and the other at late bloom stage. If sufficient water is available for a third irrigation, it should be applied during the soft dough stage.

However, points out Griffin, one irrigation on grain sorghum gives the most efficient water use. If rainfall is short, the boot stage is the approximate time to apply this single irrigation.

Research has shown that irrigation during the pre-boot stage will often speed maturity slightly. This may be important in view of the large acreage in late-planted grain sorghum. Moisture stress between the seven-leaf and boot stage could delay maturity enough to increase losses from the sorghum midge, explains Griffin.

A good moisture should be continued through grain development to reduce charcoal rot. Adequate moisture preceding the boot stage often results in rapid stalk elongation. This, followed by a moisture stress during grain development, may contribute to a higher incidence of charcoal rot and an increase in stalk lodging.
