





### Ward N. Eakin Timothy Jones, 9 63, Rites Monday Drowns Recently

Ward M. Eakin, 63, suffered a heart attack at his home east of Tahoka on Saturday, July 8, and was pronounced dead on arrival at the West Texas Hospital in Lubbock about 8 a.m.

Eakin was a native of Greer County, Oklahoma, and moved to Tahoka from Plainview in 1928. He married the former Miss Doris McGonagill on December 3, 1932, in Tahoka and they had made their home here since that time.

Mr. Eakin was a member of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka. He was always interested and active in various farm organizations and served as a board member of the Producers Gin Cooperative, as President, the Soil Conservation, and the Farm Bureau. He also worked with the stock shows in Lynn County and surrounding areas.

Survivors include his wife of Rt. 1, Tahoka; two sisters: Mrs. Vernon Cantrell of Plainview and Mrs. Lester Hoover of McGregor; two brothers: John P. of Abilene and P. O. of Phillips; 10 nieces and nephews.

Funeral services were conducted at the First Baptist Church, Monday at 10 a.m. with Rev. Jim Turner officiating. Burial was at the Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

**Royal Ham Aspic**  
2 packages lime gelatin 2 TBS. prepared horseradish  
2 cups boiling water Dash Worcestershire  
2 cups cold water 1/2 cup sour-cream pickles  
1 TBS. dry white wine 2 cups diced ham  
1 TBS. salt

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add cold water and seasonings. Cool. When aspic is about ready to set, pour 1/4 into 9" ring mold and arrange ham cubes and pickles decoratively. Chill layer quickly, then add remaining aspic into which ham and pickle relish have been mixed. Chill till firm.

Make your favorite vegetable salad in a 9" ring mold. The two rings, when entwined, will serve 10-12.

Offer two types of punch - one tart, one sweet - in twin pitchers. For the sweet one, use your favorite recipe for fruit punch. Here's a tasty tart punch.

**Sparkling Bride's Punch**  
2 cans (6 oz. each) frozen lemonade concentrate 1 cup orange juice, strained  
1 bottle (1 qt.) your favorite whiskey 1 jar (8 oz.) red maraschino cherries  
1 orange, sliced thin w/peel 2 large bottles (28 oz. each) ginger ale

Stir lemonade concentrate, orange juice and whiskey in a 1-gallon punch bowl. Add cherries and their juice. At serving time, add ice cubes, stir, add ginger ale. Garnish with orange slices. Makes about 28 punch cup servings-repeat as necessary.

## All About King Cotton

If you depend on king cotton for your livelihood, you're not alone; for according to government statistics, nearly 11-million American workers and their families also rely on this 3,000-year-old "wonder" fabric to make ends meet.

And "wonder" fabric is exactly what it is. The fiber, for example, can be woven into cloth one-fourth inch thick or so sheer and delicate as to have been referred to as "webs of woven wind."

A pound of cotton can be spun so coarse that it would extend not more than a few hundred yards, or so fine that it would reach from Washington to New York. Cotton cloth can be woven so tightly as to be waterproof. Chemical processes can make it resistant to flame, oil, rust, mildew, heat and scorch. Modern cotton fabrics can be truly wash and wear. With all of these attributes, the demand for cotton goods is greater than

this is not a club for just the wives of the farmers. This club is for all people interested in the cotton products and the promotion of cotton. The dues are only \$1 per year and we meet only 4 times a year for the purpose of not being "clubbed" to death.

This Cotton promotion Club is simple. It is based on the national statistic that 85% of all fabric (not just piece goods, but anything consisting of fiber), is bought by a woman. This buying gives the woman a responsibility to cotton that the men do not have. Also, until the club was organized, we women did not have a chance to learn why cotton and cotton consumption is so important, not only to the farmers, but to the business man and to the economy of West Texas.

Our programs will give us a better understanding of the cotton situation, and as we see what synthetics are doing to us, the decision to buy more cotton is left up to the individual. All of the programs summed up will show that if cotton doesn't sell much more at the retail level than it has in the past few years, then more price and acreage cuts are very likely and cotton could become a minor crop. What would you do in this country to replace this multi-million dollar business? Wouldn't it be easier and less expensive to try to save it? How important is cotton to Texas? In 1964 (before the price and acreage cuts were imposed upon us) of the 9 leading crops in Texas, the income from cotton was more than the income of the next 8 crops combined. ISN'T THIS WORTH FIGHTING FOR?

Farmers - particularly in the Southern Plains and Mississippi Delta regions - are meeting this demand by growing 2, 3, 4 and even 5 bales of cotton per acre - and, thanks to good management and improved fertilizers, are using less labor in doing it.

Studies at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock, Tex., revealed recently that yield differences between fertilized and unfertilized continuous cotton increased each season. What's more, after two years of applying high analysis nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizers, the number of pounds of lint cotton per acre soared close to 900 as compared to 385 pounds per acre without help from fertilizer treatment.

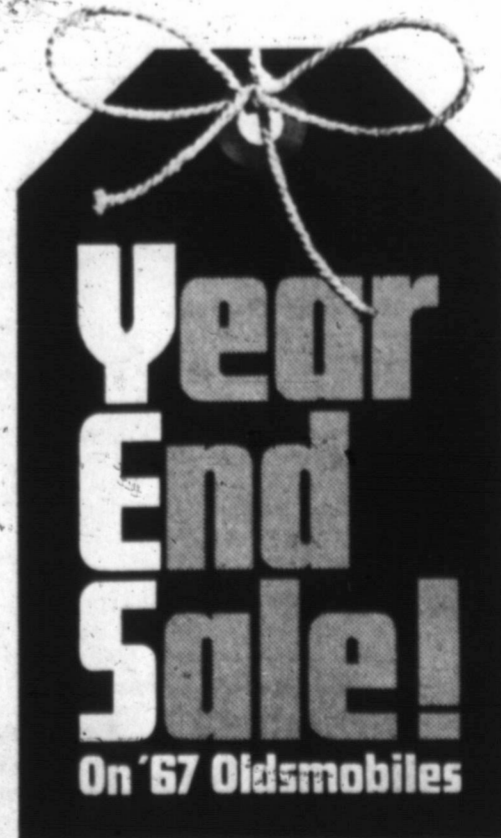

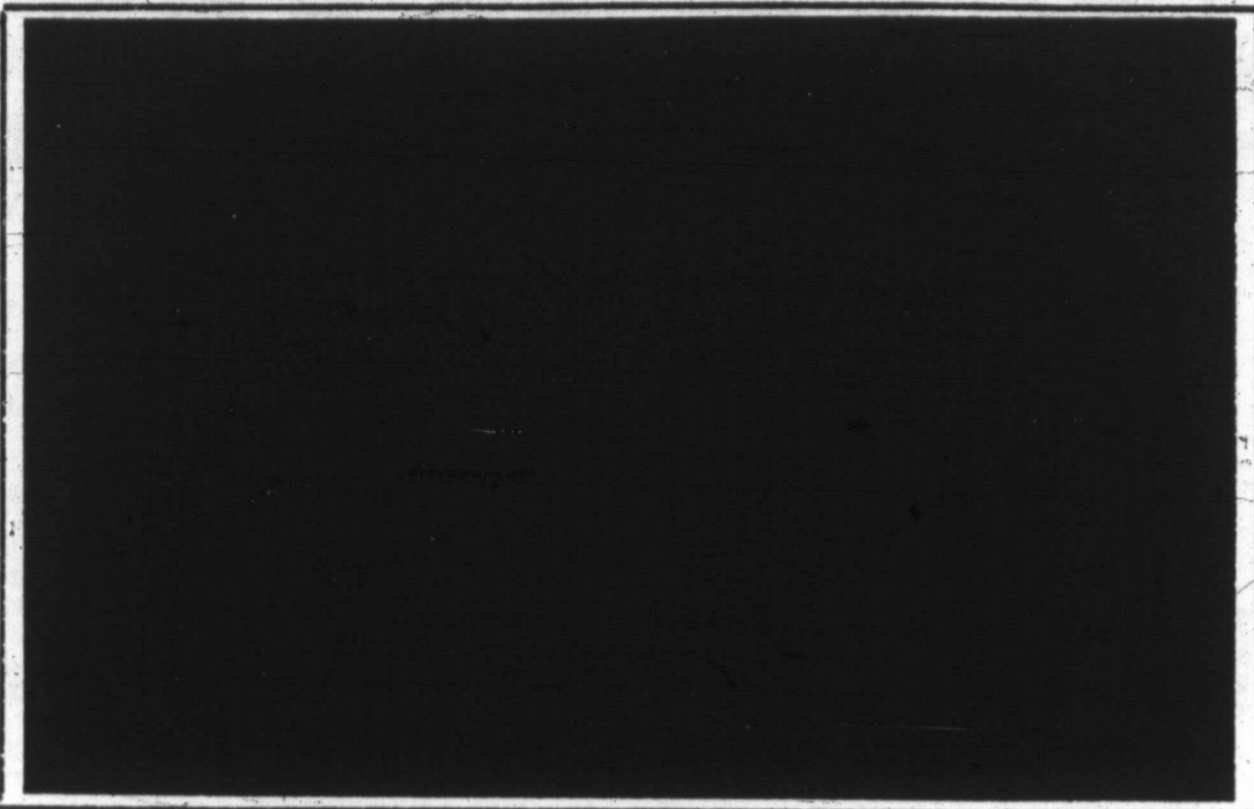

### ENTOMOLOGY IS 4-H PROJECT

One of the most fascinating projects undertaken by 4-H Club members is entomology, the science dealing with insects and insect control.

Plants, animal and humans in North America are att-

acked by 3,000 different kinds of insects. Crop and livestock losses in the United States alone caused by these pests amounts to \$12 billion annually. The battle between insects and man is as old as time and so far the insects are ahead.

From coast to coast 4-H bug hunters have joined the ranks of home owners, farmers, scientists, researchers and gardeners to lessen the destruction caused by insects. The 4-H entomologists first learn to identify harmful insects common to their area. Then they learn how and when to control them.

Working with the boys and girls enrolled in the national 4-H Entomology program are local club leaders and county extension agents. Safe use and storage of pesticides is particularly stressed.

If habits of correct and safe pesticide use are cultivated by 4-H members, they are likely to carry them over into adult life," commented Bill Griffin, 4-H leader.

Some 4-Hers choose another phase of the entomology program sponsored by Hercules Incorporated since 1952, and supervised by the Cooperative Extension Ser-

vice. They make a hobby of collecting, classifying and mounting insects including butterflies, for display and study. Others collect specimens for laboratories, colleges and to exchange with young scientists.

Annual awards are provided for 4-H entomologists by Hercules. They consist of medals for four county winners; an expense-paid trip for the state winner; and \$500 scholarships for six national winners. State and national winners will be guests of the sponsor at the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago the first week in December.

Besides controlling insects with pesticides, the young bug hunters learn about other methods now possible are sterilization of insects by gamma radiation, and use of high intensity sound to study its effects on the behavior of tomato fruit worms, corn earworms and tobacco budworm moths.

Blacklight, cotton gauze impregnated with insecticide and a wooden box have been combined into an inexpensive death trap for horn flies, the irritating pests that plague dairy cattle. The device was developed at Kerrville, Texas, by Agricultural Research entomologist N. O. Morgan.

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**SANDHILLS PHILOSOPHER**

**Summit Meeting**



(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm reports on the summit meeting, more or less.)

Dear editor:

I was out here on this Johnson grass farm the other morning with nothing to do, well that's not exactly true, I had plenty to do but it was too hot, and pulled out of earshot of the house, and eased down under a tree and read an article I'd been saving from a newspaper I found on the road the day before. Country people are getting as sophisticated as city people, they drop newspapers when they get through with them, wherever they are.

THIS ARTICLE was a sort of round-up by the Associated Press of what newspapers throughout the world thought of the summit talks between President Johnson and Premier Kossygin.

Included was what was thought by the New York Times, the Washington Post, the London Evening Standard, the Paris Gaullist Nation, Rome's Giornale d'Italia, Vienna's Express, Copenhagen's Berlingske Aftenavis, Stockholm's Aftonbladet, Tokyo's Asahi Shimbun, and a lot more, but this is more than I can pronounce.

No where, however, was what the Lynn County News thought. I do not understand this.

Big city newspapers have a tendency to get stuck up and take themselves too seriously sometimes, but I've never seen a weekly paper that couldn't make just as many typographical errors as a metropolitan daily, and a lot of the former have to do it short-handed. As to what I think about the summit talks and whether any progress was made, I don't know, and couldn't unless I knew what they said. I saw the list of things they talked about, but that didn't let me know whether any progress was made.

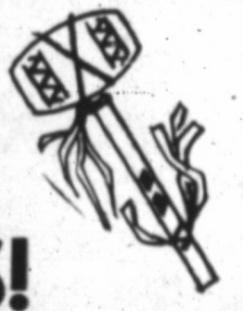

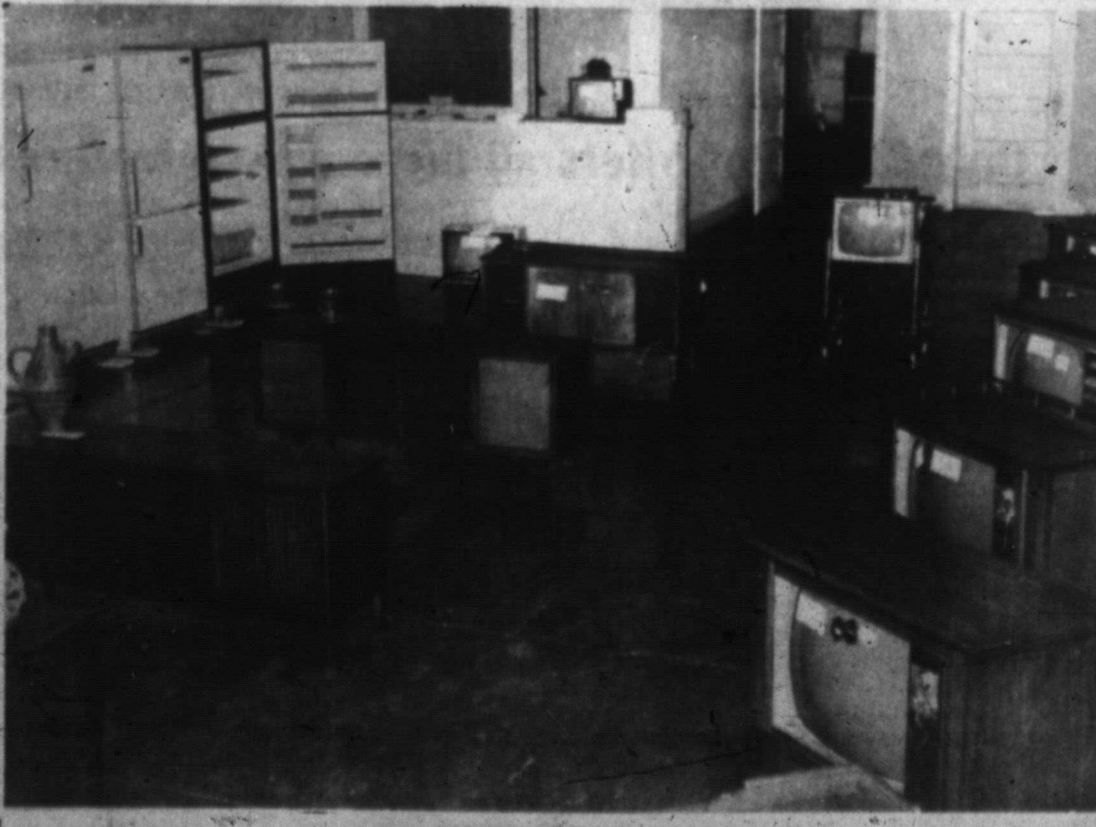

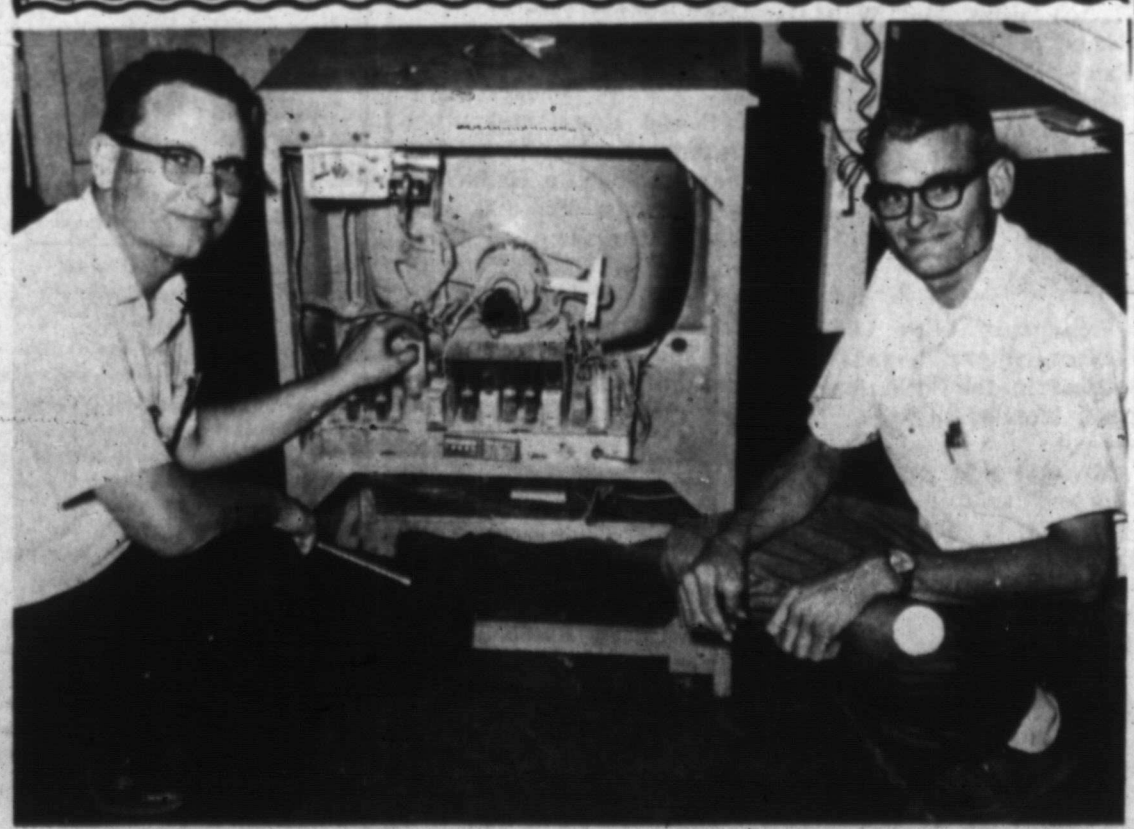

Both the highway department and the registration law were created by the 35th Texas Legislature on April 4, 1917, in order to secure federal funds appropriated to Texas under the Federal Aid Road Act of 1916.

At the time of the law's passage, population of the state was at 4,435,000 with 197,720 vehicles registered under the initial sign-up.

Now the state has over 10 million residents with a staggering 6,750,000 vehicle registrations.

And, this means a large, rectangular plate with three letters and three numbers instead of the small, circular disk which bears only the inscription, "Registered Motor Vehicle, Texas, 1917."

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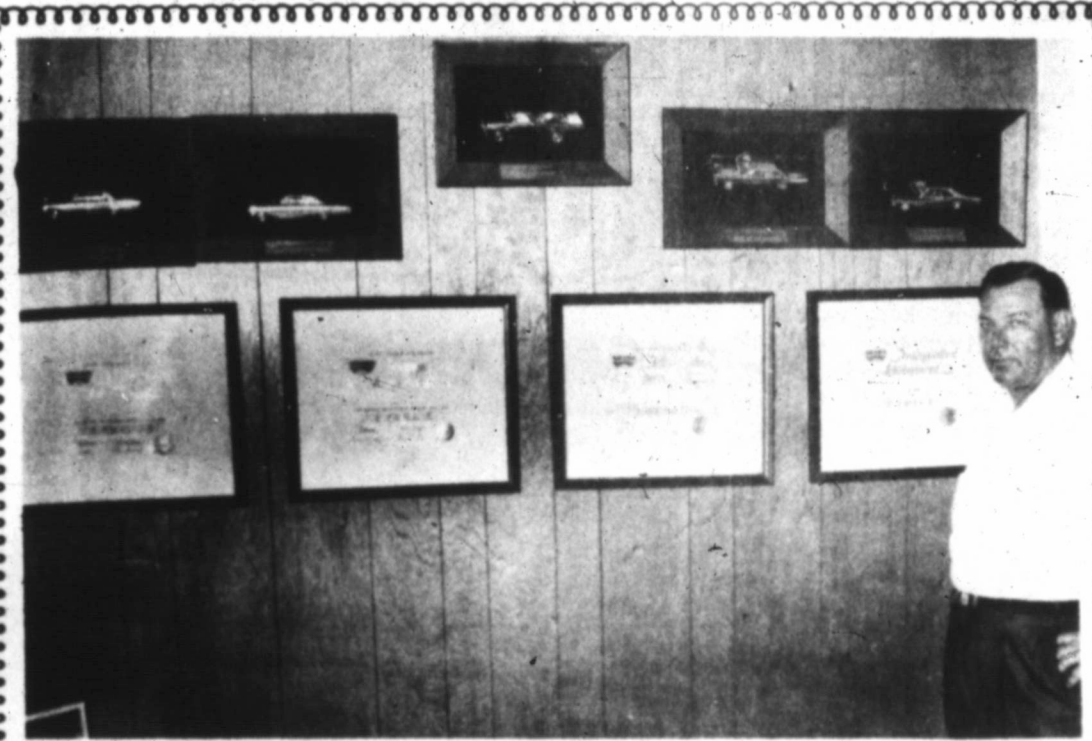

### Ann Duncan, CHDA Says:

Labor-saving devices mean that the homemaker spends less energy for her usual work, and needs less food. It used to take 240 calories to do the family wash plus 50 calories to hang the clothes on the line. Today it takes only 15 calories to put the clothes in the automatic washer and dryer.

To heat muffins, biscuits, or rolls, place them in a paper bag and twist the top lightly. Moisten the bag then heat in the oven.

Total supplies of canned fruits are expected to be about five percent above those for last year. Increases in current supplies will be appreciable in canned peaches and pears. Current stock figures are available for only a few items at this time. Stocks of canned apple slices and apple sauce are up significantly, while red tart cherries are down.

It's good training for the children to join you in shopping and to help you carry the groceries home. However, you as a homemaker should do the actual shopping in order to choose better quality and more economical foods.

Fabric softeners, one of the newer laundry products have proved to be a valuable washday aid. When added to the final rinse, fabric softeners impart a delightfully soft touch to clothing and household articles, reduce static electricity, and make ironing easier.

If you keep your hats in boxes on shelves, cut a small panel out of the front of each box and cover with cellophane. That will let you select the hat you want without opening every box. Keep studs, cufflinks, dress tie, and favorite handkerchief in a pocket of your tuxedo and you won't have to search for them when needed.

Precooked dry beans that cook in 20 to 30 minutes are now on the market in most states. Old fashion navy bean soup or popular baked beans can be ready for the table in less than an hour from start to finish.

American or cheddar cheese claims a place in every cheese assortment. There are three strengths which range in price from high to low.

Mild cheddar has been aged for 60 to 90 days, a short period in the life of a cheese but it contributes to the lower cost. Medium cheese is aged six to nine months. It develops a stronger flavor and is more costly in terms of handling and storing. Sharp cheese spends a year or more, in the aging and curing room while the full strong flavor is brought to its peak, and the processing expense rises.
