Lynn County's bale count has more than doubled during the past two weeks and now stands at near 70,000 in total ginnings according to an unofficial survey of the county's gins on Monday.

According to reports from 26 gins Monday afternoon, 68,669 bales had been processed compared to 33,849 on November 25.

And, if estimates by ginners and others connected with the cotton industry are

correct, the harvest is nearing an overall completion mark of 75 percent in the county.

Projecting estimates from the ginners as to cotton remaining to be harvested in their respective areas, a 90,000 to 95,000 bale output figure for the county looks about right.

Although Lynn's projected yield had been estimated at 100,000 bales earlier in the year, the figure was revised

downward to 90,000 bales on December 1 by Plains Cotton Growers which issues monthly guesses during the harvest season.

In the New Home, Lakeview, Petty area where the harvest is reported as about 95 percent complete, 20,150 bales were reported as of Monday.

Tahoka's four gins reported a total of 11,671 with general feeling being that a little more than 50 percent of the cotton in the immediate area has been harvested.

At Wilson, 7,960 bales were reported, probably 85-90 percent of the total harvest in that area.

Thomas, Tyler On All-District Squad

Tahoka's 1967 Bulldogs landed three spots on the 5-A All-District football team dominated by State Quarterfinal Champion Seagraves which took a total of ten positions on the offensive and defensive units selected by the district's coaches.

Actually selected in a meeting on November 15 at O'Donnell, the all-district squad was not announced until this week, following Seagraves' defeat in state semi-final play.

Named to first team berths were Seniors Cliff Thomas and John Tyler, Thomas making both teams and Tyler selected for his defensive

play. Four other Bulldogs, Billy Curry, Jody Edwards, Charlie Brown, and Michael Glenn, received honorable mention from the coaches.

Thomas was one of three players named to both teams, joined by Plains' Gregg Jones and Dan Field.

The 188-pound halfback rushed for 1,518 yards and scored 156 points to gain his offensive back position on the all-district team, also named

O'Donnell Man Takes Part In Fleet Exercise

USS OAK HILL (LSD-7)--(FHTNC) Nov. 29--Engineer Third Class Sydney U. Smith, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. O.G. Smith of O'Donnell, Tex., participated in "Blue Lotus," the largest U. S. First Fleet Exercise in three years, aboard the dock landing ship USS Oakhill.

The exercise was held off the coast of Southern California from November 28 to December 9. It involved 24,000 men in 45 ships; and six air units.

The strike force phase of the exercise involved maneuvers to train participating ships in the type of Naval warfare for which they were designed. The amphibious phase of the exercise involved an actual amphibious assault at Camp Pendleton, Calif., by an embarked-Marine Expeditionary Brigade.

Exercise highlights included surface-to-air missile firings at drone targets, live rocket and bombing attacks on the San Clemente and Chocolate Mountain impact ranges, and Naval air strikes to sink target ships.

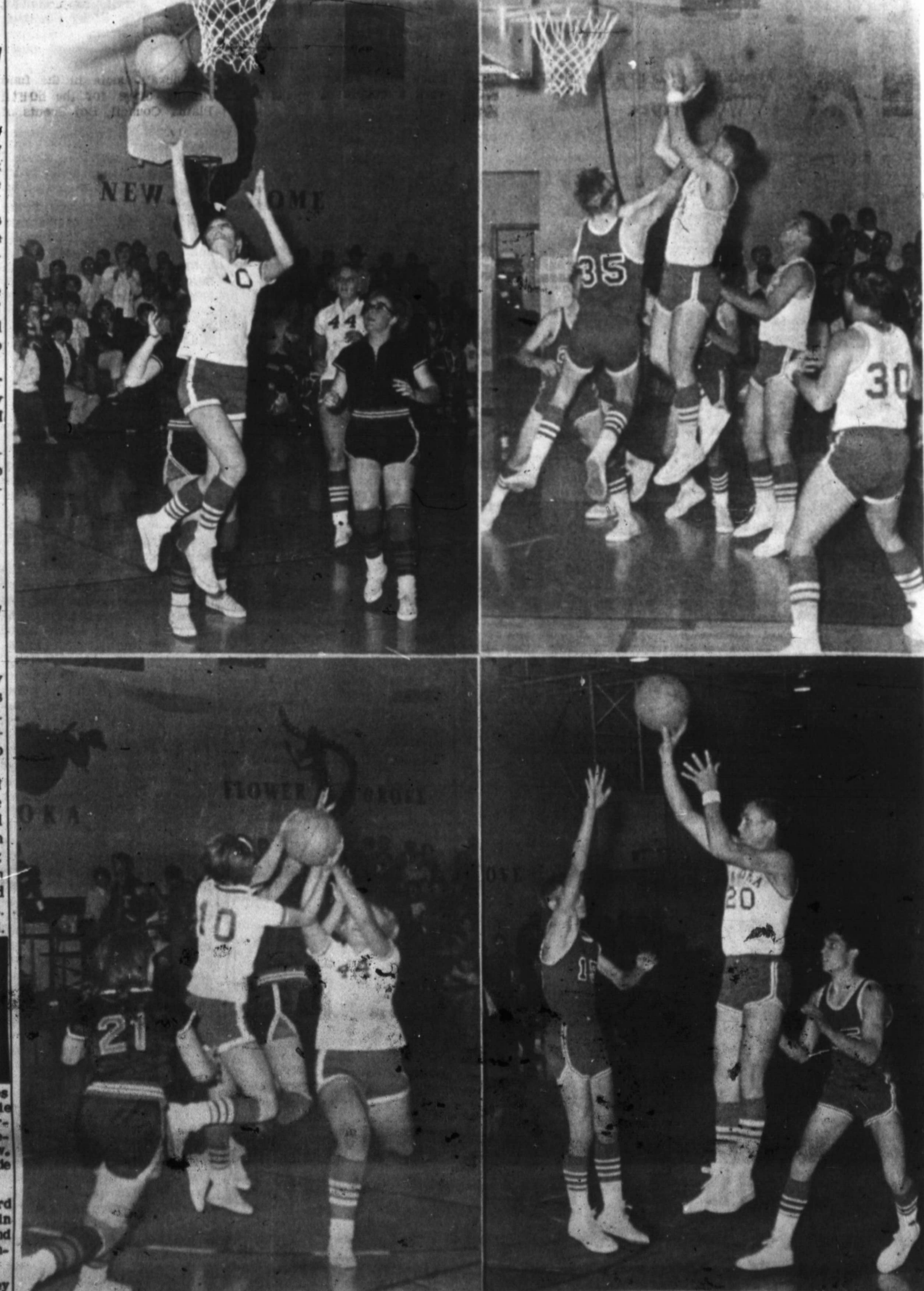

Cotton Sample Receipts Begin Decline

Cotton sample receipts began a gradual decline at the USDA Lubbock and Brownfield Cotton Classing Offices this week, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton-Classing Office of the USDA.

Estimates indicate that approximately 85 per cent of this season's crop is now out of the fields in the Lubbock and Brownfield areas and 50 per cent in the Lamesa area.

The USDA Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa classed approximately 230,000 samples during the week ending Friday, December 8th. This brought the total classed at the three offices this season to 825,000. Grades of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Office last week were lower than the previous week.

Strict Low Middling made up 16 per cent of the total classed, Middling Light Spotted 44 per cent, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 18 per cent and Middling Spotted 13 per cent. Staple length was down and averaged between 15/16 and 31/32. Twenty three per cent of the cotton classed at the Lubbock Office last week had staple lengths of 1-inch and longer compared to 33 per cent the previous week. Thirty-nine per cent stapled 15/16, 22 per cent 31/32, 13 per cent 1-inch and 10 per cent was 1-1/32 and longer.

Micronaire continued the seasonal decline. Seventeen

per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock last week was in the desirable category of 3.5 and better. The previous week 29 per cent was in this category. Ten per cent 'miked' 3.3 and 3.4, 26 per cent 3.0 and 3.2, 31 per cent 2.7 through 2.9 and 16 per cent was 2.6 and below.

Cotton prices, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, were higher for the better micronaire cotton early last week and have remained steady since that time. Prices for this cotton ranged from \$6.50 per bale over the loan for high grade, short staple cotton to \$75.00 per bale over the loan for high grade cotton having staple length of 1-3/32 and longer.

Demand continued strongest for cotton having micronaire of 3.3 and better, and this cotton was selling at a greater premium over the loan. Cotton in the lower micronaire categories was generally selling at \$5.00 and \$15.00 per bale over the loan.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 22.60, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 19.18, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 21.50, Middling Spotted 15/16 - 16.75 and Middling Spotted 31/32 - 19.60. Cottonseed prices were steady and ranged from \$57 to \$72 per ton at the gins.

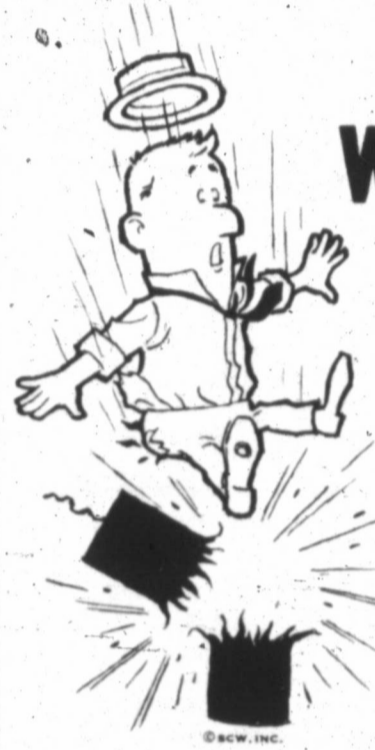

**Ann Davis,
CHDA Says:**

COLLEGE STATION, Nov.-Time seems to grow more important around the holiday season, Ann Davis, CHDA offers these suggestions to help save time and money, making "plans ahead" for food easy.

To shell or not to shell may be a question regarding pecans. Compare the cost of the nuts in the shell and those shelled. Two pounds of well-filled out pecans will yield about one pound of nut meats. If pecans in the shell cost 69 cents a pound, one pound of nut meats would cost \$1.38. Shelled pecans will cost about \$1.70 a pound if bought in that quantity. If you buy three or four ounce packages of pecans, then the cost per ounce is more, the Texas A & M University, Gwendolyn Clyde, says. Broken pieces may be less expensive than whole kernel-check prices. The pecan crop is late this year and better prices may be available later in the season.

You may be wondering whether to buy canned cranberry sauce or to make your own from fresh cranberries. A one pound can of cranberry sauce is two cups and makes 8 servings of one-fourth cup each. One pound of fresh cranberries will make three to three and a half cups of sauce and provide 12 to 14 servings of the same size. Of course, sugar must be added to the fresh cranberries when making sauce so add this to the cost of the fresh cranberries for accurate cost comparisons.

To have all your cookies at their best on Christmas day, classify the kinds you plan to make according to their storage life. The first cookies to make are those that need to be stored for a time to mellow their spicy goodness (such as fruit cake cookies).

Next bake those that are ready for eating as soon as they are baked but keep well for several weeks--these include refrigerator cookies. These are tender and store best in a loosely covered container. Rocks and he rmitis should be stored in a tightly covered container to keep moist and tender. Bake last, cookies you will use soon, such as rich butter cookies.

This is the peak season for coconuts, cranberries and tangelos. Grapefruit, tangerines, navel and juice oranges, apples, pears, grapes, avocados, bananas and persimmons are other good fruit choices.

In fresh vegetables, at moderate prices, are cooking greens, cabbage, squash, celery, sweet corn, sweet potatoes, turnips, rutabagas and head lettuce.

It is better to eat your breakfast than to drink it. While the fast breakfast drinks cut the time you spend in the kitchen in the morning, they add dollars to your food bill.

A recent Extension Service survey shows you can pay up to 75 per cent more for the fast breakfast than a full breakfast, says Doris Myers, Extension home management specialist in Texas A & M University.

A breakfast consisting of a glass of skim milk, a bowl of corn flakes, a half glass of orange juice, toast, margarine and a medium-size egg, adds up to 16 cents.

Cost of instant breakfast mixed with a glass of skim milk cost the same for one brand and ranged up to 29 cents for other brands.

**Bill Griffin,
County Agent,
Says.....**

Sugar may be good for coffee, but it doesn't help keep a Christmas tree fresh and green.

It is a myth, says County Agent Bill Griffin, that sugar or aspirin added to the water container in a Christmas tree will help keep the tree fresh.

There are some things that can be done to safely keep the tree fresh for a longer time, he says.

If the tree isn't to be put up right away, it should be kept in a cool and shaded location and sprinkled frequently with water. When the tree is moved into the house, the lower tip of the trunk should be cut off at an angle, exposing new wood. The base of the tree should be placed in water. A new tree may absorb as much as a quart of water in a day, so the water container should be checked daily.

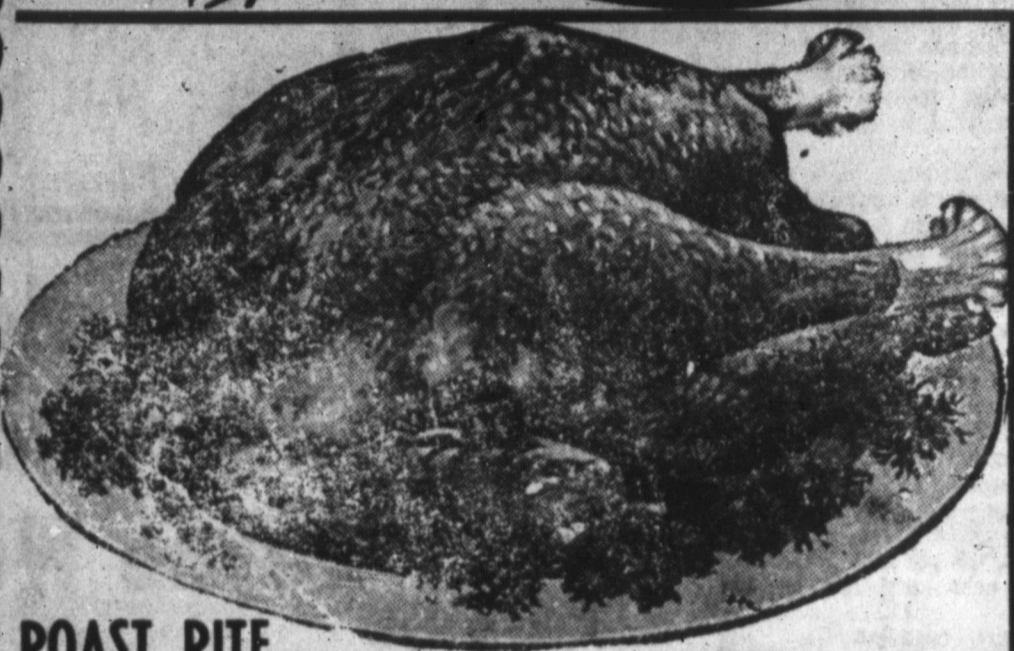
Here are other tips from the county agent. Place the tree away from heating units, fireplaces and television sets. Heat dries out the tree and creates a fire hazard.

Lights should be carefully hung on the tree. Each light puts out heat. If needles from the tree touch a bulb, it will dry them out and they will burn. Most important, place the tree so that if it accidentally

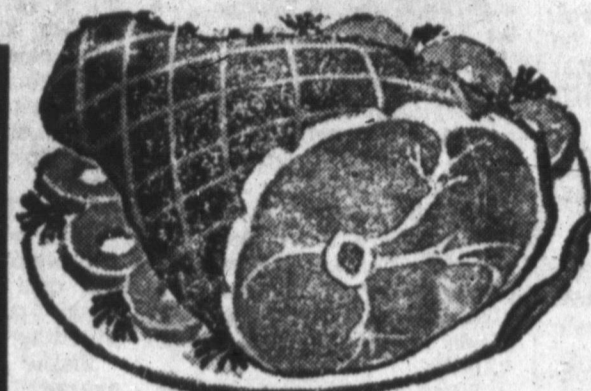

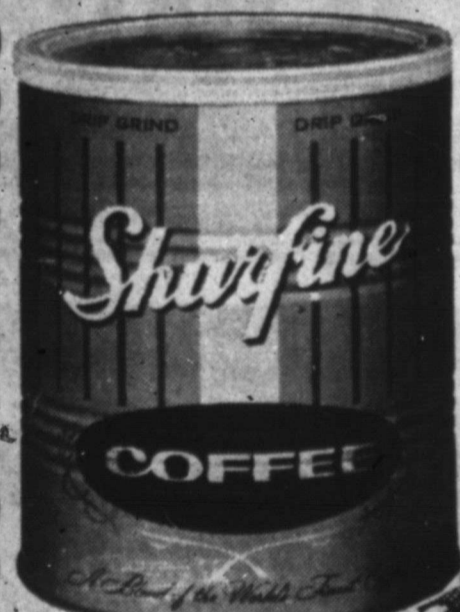

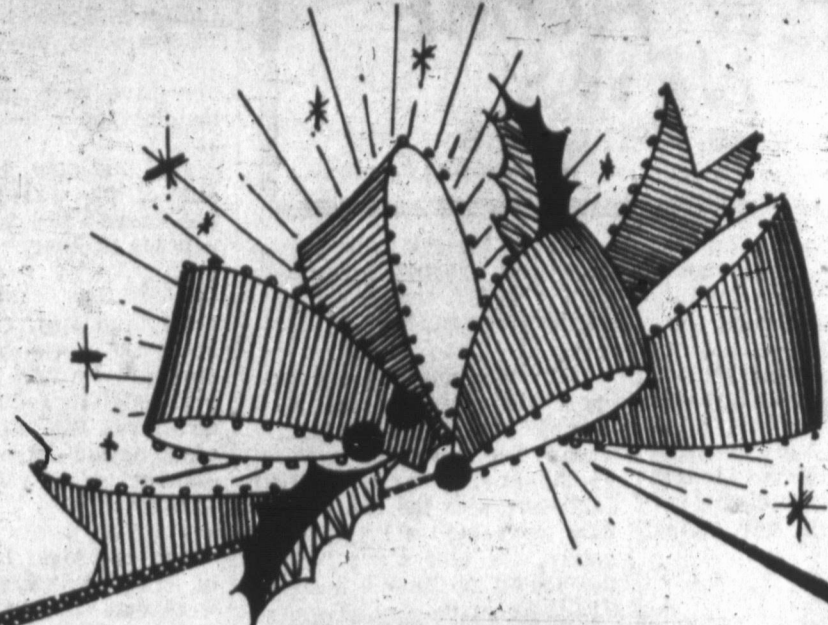
