Drivers License Changes Noted, Begin January

L. J. Foster, Brownfield, a member of the Texas Department of Public Safety Drivers License Service, was in Tahoka Tuesday testing new equipment which will be used after the first of the pear.

Beginning January 1, 1968, all Texas drivers, upon renewing their drivers license, will have to take an eye test and have their photograph taken as a minimum requirement for renewal, with special equipment designed to be used in meeting photo

and eye, test requirements. Foster pointed out that after the first of the year, automatic renewals may no longer be made through the mail and that some drivers may be required to take proficiency tests of some nat-ure in addition to having their eyes checked.

Beginning in January, the Drivers License Service will be in Tahoka one day per week at the County Courthouse for the purpose of renewing licenses, although renewels may be made at any regular DPS main office. As in the past, drivers will be notified by the state when their licenses are expiring.

Announcement of the day when Foster or other DPS personnel will be in Tahoka will be made at a later date. Foster noted that the new license would be about the size of a gasoline credit card and would have a color photograph of the driver as an integral part of the license.

these suggestions to help save
time and money, making "plans
ahead" for food easy.

To shell or not to shell may
be a question regarding pecans. Compare the cost of the
nuts in the shell and those
shelled. Two pounds of wellfilled out pecans will yield
about one pound of nut meats.

If pecans in the shell cost
69 cents a pound, one pound
of nut meats would cost \$1.38.
Shelled pecans will cost about Shelled pecans will cost about \$1.70 a pound if bought in that quantity. If you buy three or four ounce packages of pe-cans, then the cost per ounce is more, the Texas A & M Uni versity , Gwendolyne Clyad, says. Broken pieces may be less expensive than whole kernel-check prices. The pecan crop is late this year and better prices may be available later in the season,

You may be wondering whether to buy canned cranberry sauce or to make your own from fresh cranberries. A one pound can of cranberry sauce is two cups and makes 8 servings of one- fourth cup each. One pound of fresh cranberries will make three to three and a half cups of sauce and provide 12 to 14 servings of the same size. Of course, sugar must be added to the fresh cranberries when making sauce so add this to the cost of the fresh cranberries for accurrate cost comparison.

To have all your cookies at their best on Christmas day, classify the kinds you plan to make according to their storage life, The first cookies to make are those that need to be stored for a time to mellow their spicy goodness (such as fruit cake cookies).

Next bake those that are ready for eating as soon as they are baked but keep well for several weeks -- these include refrigerator cock ies. These are tender and store best in a loosely covered container. Rocks and hermits should be stored in a tightly covered container to keep moist and tender. Bake last, cookies you will use soon, such as rich butter cookies.

This is the peak season for coconuts, cranberries and tangelos. Grapefruit, tangerines, navel and juice oranges, app-les, pears, grapes, avocados, bananas and persimmons are other good fruit choices.

In fresh vegetables, at mo-derate prices, are cooking greens, cabbage, squash, ce-lery, sweet corn, sweet po-tatoes, turnips, rutabagas and

It is better to eat your breakfast than to drink it. While the fast breakfast drinks cut the time you spend in the kitchen in the morning, they add dol-lars to your food bill.

A recent Extension Service

survey shows you can pay up to 5 per cent more for the fast breakfast than a full breakfast, says Doris Myers, Extension nome management specialist in Texas A & M University.

A breakfast consisting of a

glass of skim milk, a bowl of corn dakes, a half glass of orange uice, toast, margarine and a medium-size egg, adds up to 16 cents.

Cost of instant breakfast mixed with a glass of skim milk cost the same for one brand and ranged up to 29 cents for other brands.

Sugar may be good for cof-fee, but it doesn't help keep a Christmas tree fresh and green. It is a myth, says County Agent Bill Griffin, that sugar or aspirin added to the water container in a Christmas tree

will help keep the tree fresh.

There are some things that can be done to safely keep the tree fresh for a longer time,

he says.

If the tree isn't to be put up right away, it should be kept in a cool and shaded location and sprinkled frequently with water. When the tree is moved into the house, the lower tip of the trunk should be cut off at an angle, exposing new wood. The base of the tree should be placed in water. A new tree may absorb as much as a quart of water in a day, so the water container should be checked


