Green Murder Suspect Is Charged

A suspect in the July 4 murder of Geneva Louise Green, 37, formerly of New Home, has been charged after Callahan County Sheriff Bill Skinner went to California where the man was held in another stabbing case.

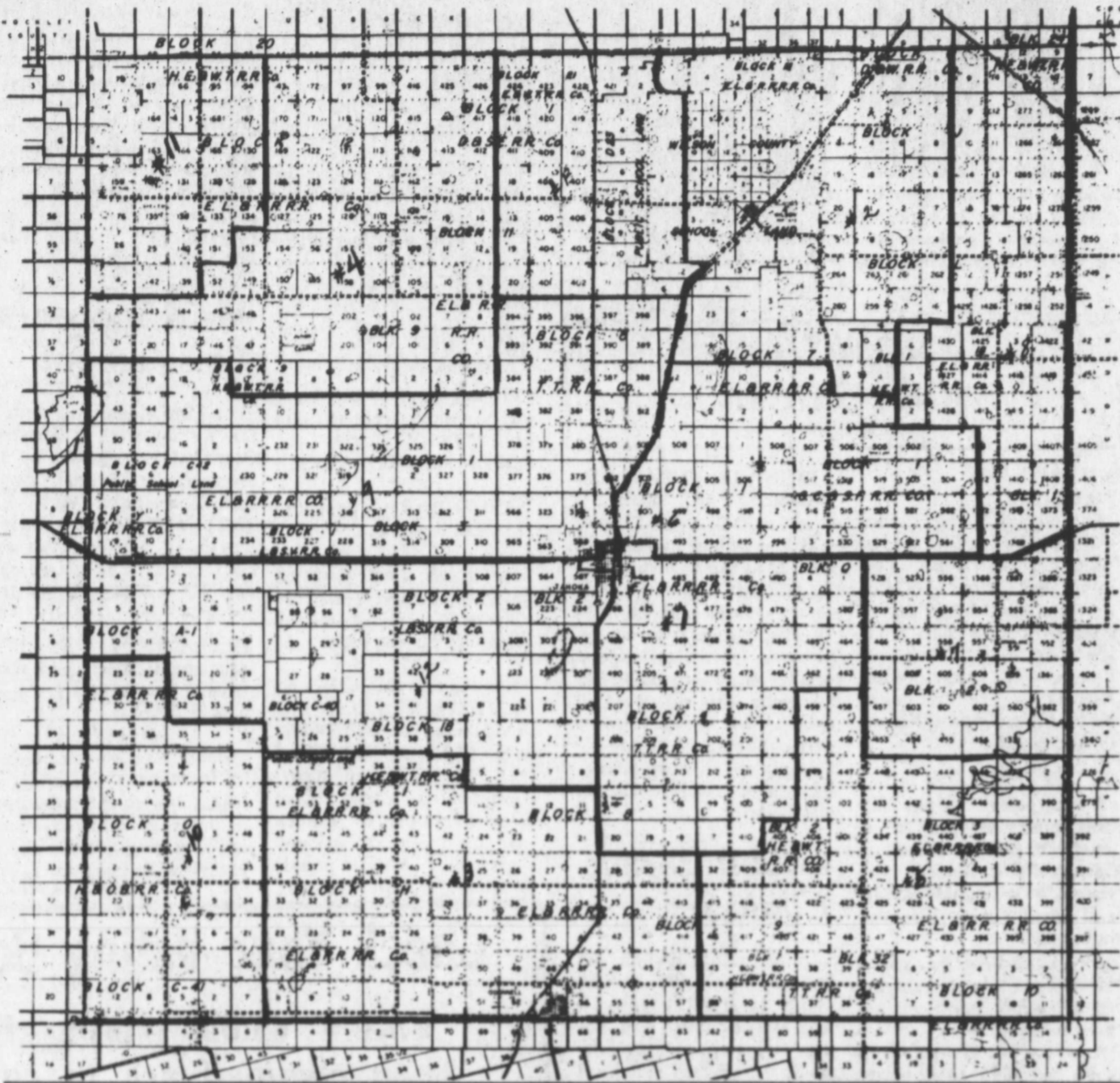
Charged with murder in the slaying of Mrs. Green at a roadside rest stop near Abilene was David Nichols, 28, a former Abilene resident. He was arrested on charges of attempted murder in Placerville, Calif., and became a suspect in the Texas murder partly on the basis of testimony by an Army major under hypnosis. The major had already picked Nichols' photograph from a group of photos shown him before the hypnosis, identifying him as the man he had seen running from the restroom after he heard screams that July 4 morning.

According to Deputy Mac West the major, under hypnosis, came up with two numbers from four on the license plate of the suspect.

On Wednesday of this week, Nichols was reported as charged in the Texas case. Extradition proceedings were anticipated.

Voting Boxes Changed For Some In County

Boundary lines for voting boxes have been drawn to conform to the Commissioners Precinct Boundary lines as per changes mandated by the Federal Court Order in 1980, county officials said this week.

No changes were made in Box No. 5 at Draw, Box No. 8 at Gordon, Box No. 7 at Grassland, or Box No. 11 at Lakeview.

Box No. 1, South Tahoka, is changed to include all voters residing in City Limits East of Highway 87 and East of South Ave. J, South of North 4th St., East of Ave. N and North of Highway 380. Box No. 1 also includes South of Highway 380 and North of South 4th St.

Box No. 6 votes at Production Credit with boundary lines as follows: West of Highway 87 and North of North 4th St.; East of Ave. P and South of North 8th St.; North of Highway 380, South of North 4th St.; East of Ave. P and West of Ave. N.

Box No. 9, West Tahoka, votes at Tahoka High School. Boundary lines are as follows: West of North Main St. and North of North 8th St.; North of Highway 380 West of Ave. P.

Box No. 12, Southwest Tahoka, votes at Show Barn. Lines are South of South 4th St. and West of Ave. J.

The new Box 13, North Lynn County, will vote at

Poka-Lambro Building. Boundary lines are from North Lynn County line to Farm Market Road 1317 on the South; West line is 3 miles West of Highway 87; East line is FM Rd. 2192 from North County Line South about 4 1/2 miles then continues South 2 miles to a dead end; thence East 3/4 miles to FM Road 400 one mile just North of the Earl

Cummings' farm following FM Road 400 one mile Southwest to a point East of FM Road 1317.

Any voter who lives in an area where the voting boxes have been changed should contact the Lynn County Tax Office in order that the voting box number may be corrected so that names will be listed on voting list, county officials said.

WOODWORK

PEOPLE WHO live in this area who visit in other parts of the country, especially in states north of here, frequently find themselves on the defensive about the climate. Many times we have told some resident of northern Arkansas or Indiana or someplace up north where we live only to be bombarded immediately with:

"West Texas? Isn't that where they have all those tornadoes?" (or blistering hot weather, or sandstorms). "Why would anyone want to live there?"

So, often in the past I have tried to explain to someone about how the climate around here isn't so bad, and that the sand doesn't blow all the time, and that tornadoes don't blow people away every day in the spring. Later on I discovered I not only was wasting my breath, but also was doing this great area a disservice by trying to sell someone on its virtues.

Many oldtimers say—and I have come to agree with them—that we ought to be thankful for all the duststorms and tornadoes and hot weather, and certainly ought not to try to convince outsiders that this is a great place to live. "If we didn't have these things, we would be overrun with people from up north moving down here," they explain, usually adding "We don't need them."

It's true that the places with the most desirable weather climates are so crowded that people are stumbling over each other. We understand that native Hawaiians, while happy with the tourists' money, aren't too happy with everyone wanting to move there. Switzerland has strict rules about who can move into that country. California is full of all kinds of creatures, as is Florida, and the Rio Grande Valley towns are pretty crowded.

People are moving from up north to the south, west and southwest in droves, trying to get away from frigid winters, high prices and Tip O'Neill.

Well, of course we could stand a few more people right here in our town, but we wouldn't want to be outnumbered by folks who have different sets of values from ours.

We don't mean to say that people from up north are undesirable. There are some really fine folks from up north. We like you Yankees just fine, even if yawl do tawk funny.

Water Rates Going Up

Tahoka residents' water bills are going up, as city council this week voted to increase the base rate of water, sewer and sanitation charges, all of which most folks consider their "water bill." The minimum charges will total \$15 per month for all three services, where present total at minimum is \$12.50 per month.

With Mayor Mel Leslie absent, the meeting Monday night was conducted by Mayor Pro Tem James Roberts. All council members and City Manager Carl Reynolds were present.

Councilmen voted to increase the rates for city services after studying figures showing the water-sewer-sanitation budgets were operating slightly in the red in recent months. It was noted that the city's allocation of Canadian River water has been cut back, requiring more pumping of city water wells, and that pumping those wells is more expensive.

Basic rates were increased to \$6 minimum for water (3,000 gallons or under), \$4 for sewer and \$5 per month for sanitation and garbage pickup. The current rates for those services are \$5.50, \$3 and \$4.

In addition, the current rate of a dollar per each additional 1,000 gallons of water used over the 3,000-gallon minimum is being increased to \$1.25.

Councilmen considered the position of Code Enforcement Officer for the city's federally-funded substandard housing renovation and removal program and took no action pending a search for more qualified applicants.

A resolution authorizing the mayor and city administrator to borrow funds from the First National Bank of Tahoka was approved.

Fire Dept. Planning For Annual Fish Fry

Plans for the annual Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. fish fry in Tahoka Mini-Park are making progress, fire department officials said this week.

The Fire Dept. is paying for the food this year and not seeking donations, but hoping instead to make a profit on ticket sales, said Fire Chief J.T. Miller. Firemen will serve the fish, french fries and hush puppies from 7 to 9 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 15, in the park, and the \$3.50 ticket allows each person to refill as many times as he or she wishes.

Miller noted that the fish would be "the kind that everybody liked last year," commenting that one kind not so popular last year would not be used at all. Tickets are available from any fire department member in advance or at the park.

Ex-Bulldogs On Tech Grid List For '81

Two former Tahoka High School football stars are listed in the new Texas Tech Red Raider 1981 Football Media Guide. They are Jerry Hatchett, who will be a junior, and Brad White, who will be a sophomore.

The book lists honors won in high school by each player. Hatchett, a 170-pound strong safety, lettered last season, getting into six games. He is the son of Johnny Mae Hatchett of Tahoka, where he played running back in high school.

White, son of Mr. and Mrs. Binie White, played tight end and defensive end in high school, where he was salutatorian of his graduating class. At Tech he is listed as a defensive tackle, 201, 225 pounds.

White is listed as a probable starter on defense for Tech. Hatchett is expected to play more this season, but is playing behind all-SWC safety Tate Randle.

All students in kindergarten must be 5 years of age on or before Sept. 1. All kindergarten students must bring their birth certificates and health records. Any first grade student who was not in school in Tahoka last year will need a birth certificate or school record from prior school. All other students entering Tahoka Schools for the first time must bring school record and health record from prior school.

Aug. 7, 1981 marks the 25th anniversary of the Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the Soil Conservation Service. Farmers and ranchers in 10 states - from North Dakota to Texas - have used the program to reduce erosion and conserve moisture with conservation practices. In 1980 there had been 58,000 contracts signed covering 110 million acres. GPCP farmers and ranchers solve problems of wind and water erosion, drought and other resource-related problems with technical and financial aid based on the needs

of the land. In Lynn County 266 contracts have been signed protecting 144,558 acres. The first Great Plains contract was signed by Glen Brewer of O'Donnell. The land is still owned and operated by him. The second contract was signed by Tommy Sterling. In 1980 Tommy signed a contract through the Agriculture Stabilization & Conservation Service (ASCS) to modernize the farming operation by replacing his standard terraces with parallel terraces and applying wind strips to control wind erosion.

A Visit With Your County Agent

USE INSECTICIDES PROPERLY IN VEGETABLE GARDENS

If an insecticide doesn't always give good pest control in the home vegetable garden, it might be due to improper use.

Often improper handling, mixing and application can reduce insecticide effectiveness, points out Stanley Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

First, properly mix the insecticide. The most effective

mixing rates are given on the product label. Using lesser amounts will reduce the material's effectiveness. On the other hand, using more than is called for on the label is not likely to improve control and may leave harmful residue on produce at harvest or cause burning or other injury to the plant. When using a wettable powder formulation, continuously agitate the mixture in the sprayer to prevent settling of insecticide particles. This is important for even distribution

on the plant.

The second precaution is to make certain spray equipment is operating properly. Calibrate the sprayer and clear the spray nozzle or orifice of any foreign matter. Some sprayers can be calibrated to teaspoon or table-

A fourth consideration is to apply insecticide at the proper time and intervals. Begin control measures when pests first appear on the plant or cause detectable plant injury. This is particularly true in cases of spider mites, squash vine borers, corn

earworms, tomato pinworms and leaf miners. Continue treatments at intervals recommended on the label until the pest is under control or the crop is no longer threatened.

A fifth point is to mix only the amount of spray to be used immediately. Once an insecticide is mixed with water, it detoxifies rapidly and should not be stored for future use.

Another precaution is to apply insecticide to the entire plant. Perhaps the most common mistake is to spray or dust only the top leaves. It is equally important to spray the undersides of leaves since this is a favorite location for sucking insects.

Finally, purchase only the amount of pesticides to be used within a one-year period. The shelf life of most garden pesticides is shortened when improperly stored in freezing temperatures or temperatures near or in excess of 100 degrees F.
