

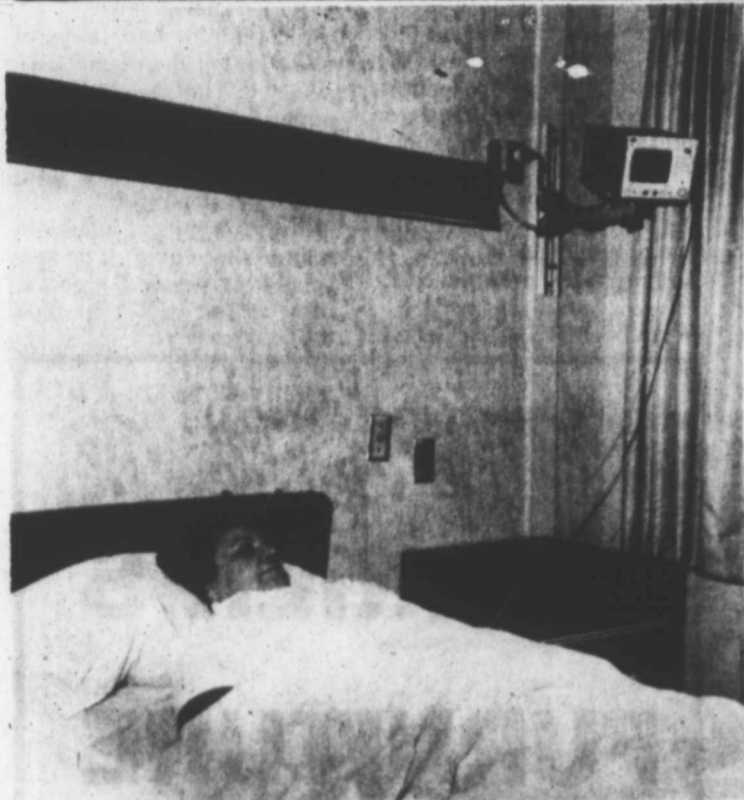

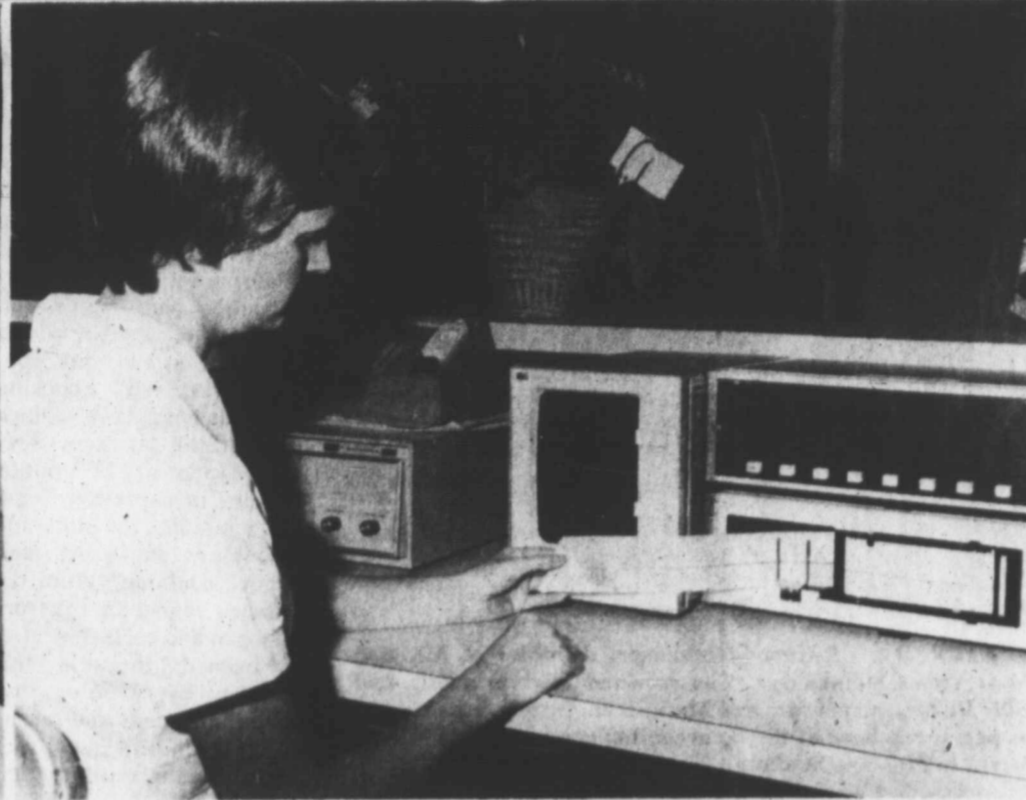

## Wolves Nip Dogs; Post Battle Looms

Tahoka made 16 first downs. Dalhart made only 4. Tahoka gained 242 yards rushing. Dalhart had a net of just 2 yards for the entire game.

Tahoka made 13 points. Dalhart made 14, which just proves again that only one statistic really matters in a football game. That's what happened at Kelley Field last Friday night as the unbeaten Dalhart Wolves stayed that way, and the unbeaten Tahoka Bulldogs went down for the first time this year, and now are 4-1, going into the first district game at Post this Friday night at 7:30.

**Crucial Game**  
If ever a district opener was

important, this one is, because Post also is 4-1 for the season, having lost only to Floydada, and last week the Antelopes gave a 23-0 beat-

ing to Coahoma, a team which Tahoka beat 19-8. And Post would like nothing better than to whip up on Tahoka.

The Antelopes have a good team, and Tahoka should be snarling after the narrow loss to Dalhart, so a good game should be in store.

Dalhart used a swarming defense, with good pursuit and gang tackling, to contain Tahoka when it counted the most, although the Bulldogs appeared to have the edge in most of the contest. In the scoreless first quarter, the biggest play was a 29-yard scamper by Willie Ray Mitchell of Tahoka that the Bulldogs couldn't turn into a score.

### Hudlin Scores

In the second quarter, Tahoka continued to move the ball well, but Dalhart always managed to stop the Dogs until a 58-yard drive finally paid off with only 46 seconds left in the half. Hudlin also kicked the point, and Tahoka led 7-0.

In the third period, with 2:27 left, Dalhart tied the score with a 29-yard pass play into the end zone, QB Chris Smith throwing to Jeff Lloyd, who had set up the play with a 55-yard return of a punt. Tackle Jeff Siebert kicked point for the Wolves. Dalhart almost scored again in the third after a Tahoka fumble was recovered by the Wolves at the Bulldog 8. But the defense, led by Daniel Garcia and Danny Thompson, stopped Dalhart cold, with Garcia mashing Dalhart's Jerrell Tyler as he tried to pass from field goal formation, early in the fourth.

### Long Pass Play

With only 2:20 left and Dalhart unable to do anything on the ground against the tough Bulldog line, the Wolves went to the air again to complete a 79-yard pass play for the go-ahead touchdown. After the ball was tipped by a Tahoka defender, Rick Haasl of the Wolves caught it, stumbled around as two Bulldogs missed the tackle and finally ran on into the end zone from about the 35 where he caught it. Siebert kicked point and it was 14-7 with just over two minutes left.

It took Tahoka just three plays to retaliate. Tony Garcia returned the kickoff 30 yards to the Dalhart 45, with a 15-yard roughness penalty moving it to the Wolves 30. Then Hudlin hit Roddy Williams on a nice 15-yard pass. Then FB Johnny Alvarado, who gained nearly a hundred yards for night, mostly on 3 and 4 yard plunges, ran 15 yards to score. This made it 14-13 with 1:47 left and Coach A.D. Shaver elected to go for the two points, a decision which no Bulldog fans questioned, even after it failed. Most agreed that the only thing to do was to try to win the game, but five Dalhart defenders swarmed on Thompson and knocked him out of bounds short of the goal line on the extra point try. It was time to start singing "Turn Out the Lights..."

An onside kick failed, and that was the ball game.

For Tahoka, Alvarado gained 93 yards in 19 carries and Thompson had 63 yards in 16 carries.

The only passes Dalhart completed were the two touchdown passes. That gave them two of their four first downs, and one of the others was on a penalty.

## Cooperative Road Project Pushed

Lynn County Commissioners Monday heard a request from members of the T-Bar Country Club in Tahoka that the county work with the city to maintain a dirt road going from U.S. 380 north to the club, and immediately tossed the ball to Prec. 4 Commissioner E.R. Blakney.

Judge Melvin Burks explained to country club representative Arlys Askew, who offered a petition which last week had been presented to Tahoka city council, that road maintenance was strictly up to whichever com-

missioner had the road in his precinct. Blakney told Askew he would do whatever he can to keep the road in good repair and would work with the city on the project.

In a mostly routine meeting, the commissioners also looked at an agreement with Lubbock Christian College, City of Lubbock and Panhandle Construction to repair a road in Prec. 1, approved out-of-town trips by Extension agents for October and accepted the resignation of jail cook Amelia Gonzales. Several other items were

considered with no action taken, and the group discussed at length the county's financial situation. Judge Burks observed that there is a strong possibility that revenue sharing won't be funded next year, which would cause the county some budget problems in taking care of some items normally funded from revenue sharing. Commissioners also noted that some departments in the county were going to run over their budgets this year. All commissioners were present.

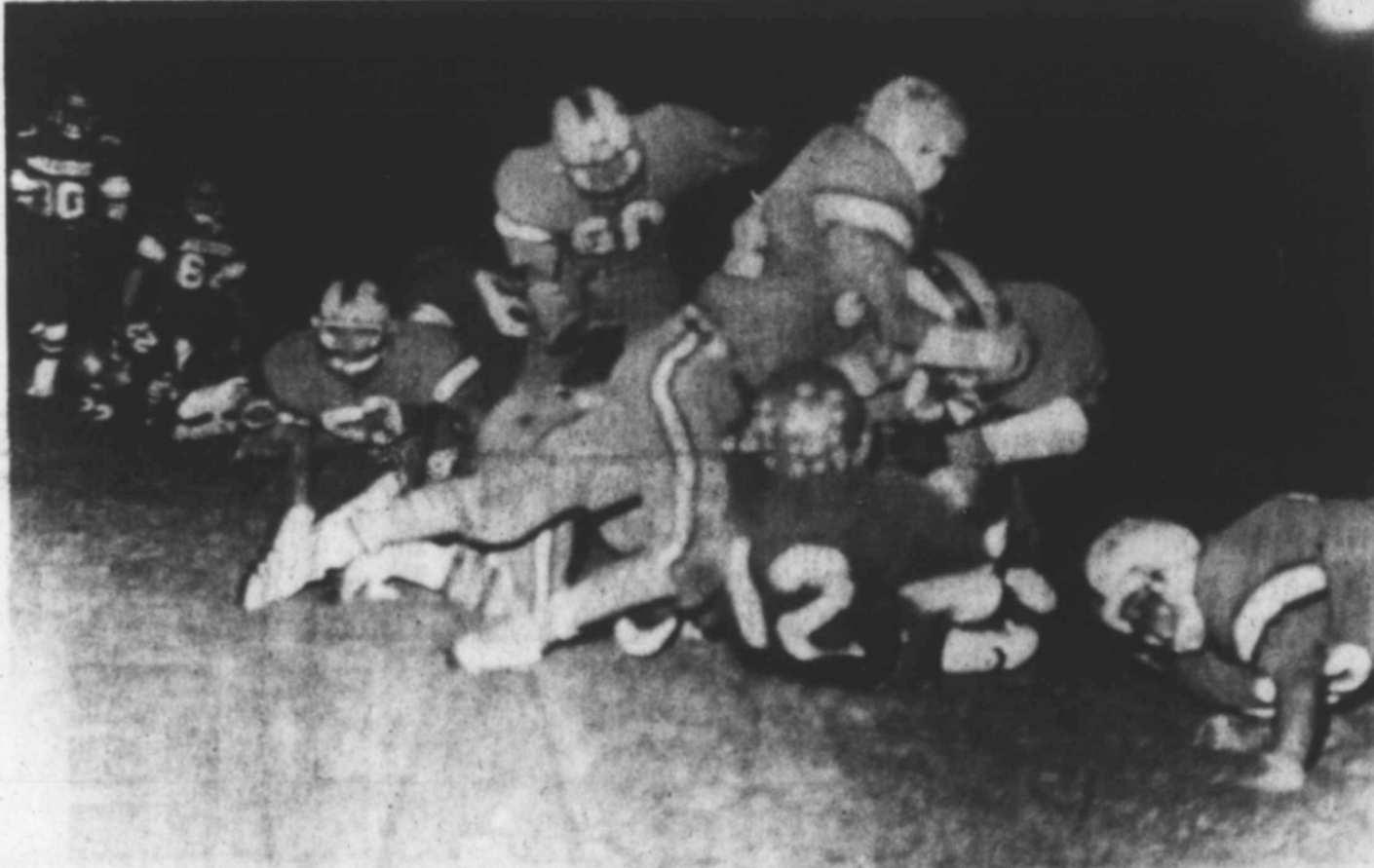
## Short Named To New Study Committee

State Sen. E.L. Short, Democrat, of Tahoka, has been appointed by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby to a 15 member study committee of the Public Servant Standards of Conduct Advisory Committee.

Short, Senate sponsor of House Speaker Bill Clayton's House Bill #3, joins other appointees by the governor and speaker of the house. The committee will do interim study of state laws which bear upon the conduct of public servants, and will adopt guidelines for applying those laws.

Short, an 11-year veteran of the Texas House and Senate, said, "this committee is past due. There is a definite need in state government to establish better guidelines in the ethics law. This interim committee is the proper vehicle to do this."

Continuing, Short said, "This committee calls for an ethics reform package to tighten campaign disclosure requirements for officeholders, set restrictions on cash contributions and prohibit legislators from accepting contributions while in the legislative session."

## Heavy Rain Hurts Crop

An 8-hour rain Sunday dumped excessive moisture over Lynn County that has seriously damaged an anticipated bumper cotton crop and lowered production, grade and staple.

The rain was a climax to 11 days of wet weather this month with total rainfall of 7.73 inches measured in the National Weather Service gauge in west Tahoka, rivaling the all-time October 1941 record of 8.61 inches.

Rainfall was even heavier in some areas such as Grassland, Draw, O'Donnell and

other communities.

The wet weather has delayed cotton maturity, and farmers say late-planted cotton will have a hard time maturing before frost. What is needed now, they say, is three to four weeks of warm, clear weather and a late frost.

In some areas, such as southeast of Tahoka, cotton had reached the stress period during the hot, dry summer, and hard dashes of rain washed open cotton to the ground. Other fields in lakes are still under water.

## New Furniture Store To Open Here Soon

A new furniture business operated by Tom Marrier, formerly of Post, tentatively is scheduled to open in Tahoka next weekend, providing all the new furniture arrives on time.

Marrier's Furniture will be located on the square at the site of the former C.R. Anthony Dept. Store and expanded into the former postoffice building. Work has been underway on the buildings for some time, with an opening made in the back wall of the former Anthony building to join it to the former postoffice building. A new staircase has been built to the upper floor and the facility has been remodeled and carpeted, giving the furniture store about 10,000 square feet of floor space, according to Marrier.

Marrier and his wife, Gwen, who teaches school at Post, lived there for the last two years, but now have moved to Tahoka. A Methodist, he is commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post at Post and was associated with

Hudman Furniture in Post. The Marriers have no children.

Marrier said the new store will have a wide selection of name brands of furniture, appliances, carpet and vinyl, Sony TVs and radios. Appliances will include microwaves, refrigerators and ranges, with Amana one of the major brands.

Among the major lines of furniture will be Riverside, Southland, Broyhill, Garrison, Maddox, Tell City, De-Ville and Benchercraft. The furniture is scheduled to start arriving next week, so the store could be open around the 22nd or 23rd of the month.

"I believe the community will be pleasantly surprised to see the building and the quality of merchandise we will offer," Marrier said, adding that the store would offer a wide range of price, quality and selection.

"We will be competitive in every way with furniture dealers in Lubbock and the surrounding area."

I FEEL SURE that by the time anyone reads this, things will look better than they do at the time it is being written--on a soggy Sunday afternoon, with water all over everything.

Rain is nearly always a blessing in this country, because water is so precious and vital to the crops. But it can, of course, be really bad for the crops when it comes like it did last weekend, washing out any hopes of an excellent cotton crop in this area.

I really didn't want to write much about the rain, because anything I could say will have been said several times by everybody. But I sometimes read the Lubbock paper to see if anything in there will give me any ideas for column subjects, and this Sunday-I couldn't do that either, because the paper was soaked.

Also our new building started leaking in a couple of places (at the top, inside) and it didn't do that when we were working on it, because I checked one day when it was raining as the remodeling project was going on. So I'll have it repaired, but I don't have any high hopes that it will stay that way for long, since flat roofs are designed to leak. There's one building around here that we understand has been leaking for 10 years despite all efforts to fix the roof.

I hadn't emptied it since an earlier rain a couple of days before, so the rain gauge in my back yard ran over. Water was into the yards across both sides of the street most of the day. Finally the newspaper dried out enough that I could read the headlines. One of them said "Slim Chance of Rain Remains," which proves again what the weather forecasters with all their expensive equipment know.

One more thing about Sunday: The Cowboys stunk up my living room so bad in the San Francisco game that the windows will have to stay open for a week.

However, in spite of all this, I remain optimistic. Things will get better. They have to. And we will still make a crop this year.

**Sherry Etheredge Says . . .**

Every year I get calls about canning and freezing pumpkin. 79 percent of all pumpkins are sold during October. Although the supply season is from September to May.

In case you want to make use of those jack-o-lanterns, keep this information handy. **TO CAN PUMPKIN...**

...Cubed: Wash and peel the pumpkin and either discard the seeds or set them aside to roast later. Cut the pumpkin into 1-inch cubes. To hot-pack it into jars, cover the cubes with water and bring to a boil. Pack to within 1/2-inch from the jar top. Cover with hot cooking liquid, leaving a 1/2-inch space at the jar top. Close and process at 12 pounds pressure in a pressure canner 65 minutes for pint jars and 80 minutes for quart jars. Remove containers from pressure canner or pressure saucepan and cool.

...Strained: Prepare the pumpkin by washing, removing the seeds and paring the pumpkin. Cut into 1-inch cubes. Steam until tender, about 25 minutes. Mash or put through a food mill or strainer. Simmer until heated throughout, stirring to keep it from sticking to the pan. Pack according to the

hot pack method. Prepare pumpkin and pack hot pumpkin to within 1/8 inch from top of jar, adding no liquid or salt. Close and process at 12 pounds pressure in a pressure canner 65 minutes for pint jars and 80 minutes for quart jars. Remove containers from pressure canner or pressure saucepan and cool.

**TO FREEZE PUMPKIN**

Wash pumpkin, cut into small pieces, remove the seeds and peel it. Cook in boiling water, pressure cooker or oven until it is soft.

**WHAT ABOUT ALL THOSE**

### SEEDS?

Roasted pumpkin seeds are a real treat. Here's how you do it... Soak the seeds of a pumpkin for 30 minutes in a solution of 1/4 cup salt to 1 cup water. Drain; place on a flat pan and roast in the oven at 350 degrees F. Stir often.

### RECIPE CORNER

#### Halloween Grease Paint

White formula: 2 teaspoons white shortening, 5 teaspoons corn starch, 1 teaspoon white flour, glycerin, food coloring. Using a rubber spatula, blend first three ingredients on a white plate to form a smooth paste.

Add three or four drops of glycerin for a creamy consistency. This should be enough for one child's face. Add any food coloring, one drop at a time to form different colors.

Brown formula: 1 teaspoon white shortening 2 1/2 teaspoons unsugared cocoa. Mix as in white formula above.

**SS Checks Will Go On, Says Rep. Stenholm**

There's no reason for any elderly retired person in Lynn County to worry about whether their Social Security checks are going to stop or be reduced next month or anytime soon," Charles Stenholm, U.S. Congressman for this district, told a Tahoka group here Friday morning. Cuts in amounts now being received by persons on Social Security never have been contemplated, the congressman said, explaining that any reductions in the program are designed for future recipients or at least will not mean any less money than now is being received to anyone now getting benefits. Stenholm spoke to a Tahoka High School assembly, then appeared at the community room of Tahoka First

National Bank to meet with constituents. At that meeting the questions primarily concerned farm programs and what can be done to help the cotton farmer in this area. The congressman agreed that farmers --and small businessmen-- need help badly, and commented that unfortunately, "we didn't get into these problems overnight and there are no immediate miracle solutions," but long-term remedies are being sought.

Asked about a 15 cent set-aside amendment of his own to the farm bill, Stenholm said it would benefit this area's farmers, but that it is opposed by everyone outside of Texas, including the National Cotton Council.

About 50 persons jammed into the room to hear Stenholm.

## A Visit With Your County Agent

By Stanley Young

### PREPARE NOW FOR SPRING FERTILIZER NEEDS

Once this year's crops are harvested, you can get a jump on the next season by getting your soil tested and then arranging for your 1982 fertilizer needs. Soil testing is one of the wisest moves a farmer can make. It provides a "blueprint" for fertilizer practices for the coming season's crops.

Knowing your fertilizer needs for the 1982 season may be particularly helpful this fall for several reasons.

First, you may want to make arrangements or contract for your fertilizer supplies as soon as possible since prices will likely go up in the months ahead.

Fertilizer prices are expected to gradually increase due to energy, transportation and other production cost increases.

You can also reduce your 1981 taxable income by purchasing next year's fertilizer before the end of the year. Due to improved crop prices and the likelihood of higher costs, advance buying of fertilizer could be a wise move. This is particularly true if cash is available so that high interest rates for borrowed money can be avoided.

In addition to these reasons for fall soil testing, another plus is that fall is usually a better time to take soil samples due to more favorable weather conditions. And fall soil testing beats the spring rush.

Young suggests coming by the county Extension office to pick up soil test cartons along with instructions and information sheets.

Since each field should be sampled every two or three years, make certain you are "up to date" on your sampling procedure. Also, when you receive your soil test results compare them to the last results from the same field to see if any changes in fertilizer needs have taken place. Soil tests results provide valuable records.

### CALL "TOMI" FOR MARKET, OUTLOOK INFORMATION

Information on farm bill impacts on peanuts and dairying, the cotton situation, crop reports, cattle on feed, tax cuts and beef marketing alternatives is featured during October on "TOMI".

TOMI (Telephone Outlook and Market Information) is a system of recorded telephone messages to help producers obtain up-to-date information on a variety of subjects, points out Stanley Young, county agent.

Recorded messages are prepared by Extension Service economists, using the latest available information.

By dialing 713/845-TOMI, anyone can get market and outlook information seven days a week, 24 hours a day, notes Young.

Information scheduled to be available through TOMI during the remainder of October is as follows:

Oct. 10-13--Crop Report Analysis, Roland Smith

Oct. 14-15--Farm Bill Impact on Dairying, Bud Schwart

Oct. 16-20--Alternative Marketing Systems for Beef, Bill Black

Oct. 27-29--Tax Cuts Affecting Agribusiness, Dick Edwards.

TOMI can help you keep abreast of the latest happenings in various commodity markets and also provides other pertinent information designed to help you with both short and long-range planning, says Young.

#### 4-H HORSE PROGRAM COVERS MANY AREAS

There is more to the 4-H horse program than just competition.

4-H members in this program become involved in a broad range of projects and activities, points out Brent Drennan, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

The horse program is conducted by the Extension Service and supported by the American Quarter Horse Association and Insurance Company of North America.

Members learn everything from tips on buying a horse to trail and endurance riding. They also learn horse anatomy and safe riding habits as well as how to train a horse for shows.

More than 255,583 4-H'ers are enrolled in the national horse program, including 12,000 4-H members in Texas.

These young people learn much more than horsemanship. One 4-H'er discovered that: "Showing my horse taught me to keep poised in a pressure situation, to show sportsmanship to others, and to do a good job. Judging taught me, above all, how to

organize my thoughts."

4-H horse program members also put their skills to work by helping others in community projects. One national winner, for example, organized a county drill team and conducted several shows for community groups and nursing homes. Another 4-H'er gave low-income youth their first opportunity to ride a horse during several weekend riding sessions.

Across the country, 4-H'ers also are working in special horse-back riding programs involving disabled youth.

A number of incentives and awards are available to 4-H members who excel in the program. These are provided by the AQHA and INA and arranged by the National 4-H Council, and include medals of honor to four members in each county and \$1,000 scholarships and expense-paid trips to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago to six national winners.

Boys and girls, nine to 19, can learn more about this 4-H horse program and other activities by contacting the county Extension office.

### Harding Distributes \$25 Million

State Treasurer Warren G.

Harding announced that \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Fund administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the 67th legislature.

The Lynn County allocation is \$105,640.86, and the funds will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes collected at the pump.

The county allocations are based on the county square mile area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982, as well as interest earned on these funds. The 1982 funds are being distributed now rather than at the completion of the fiscal year.

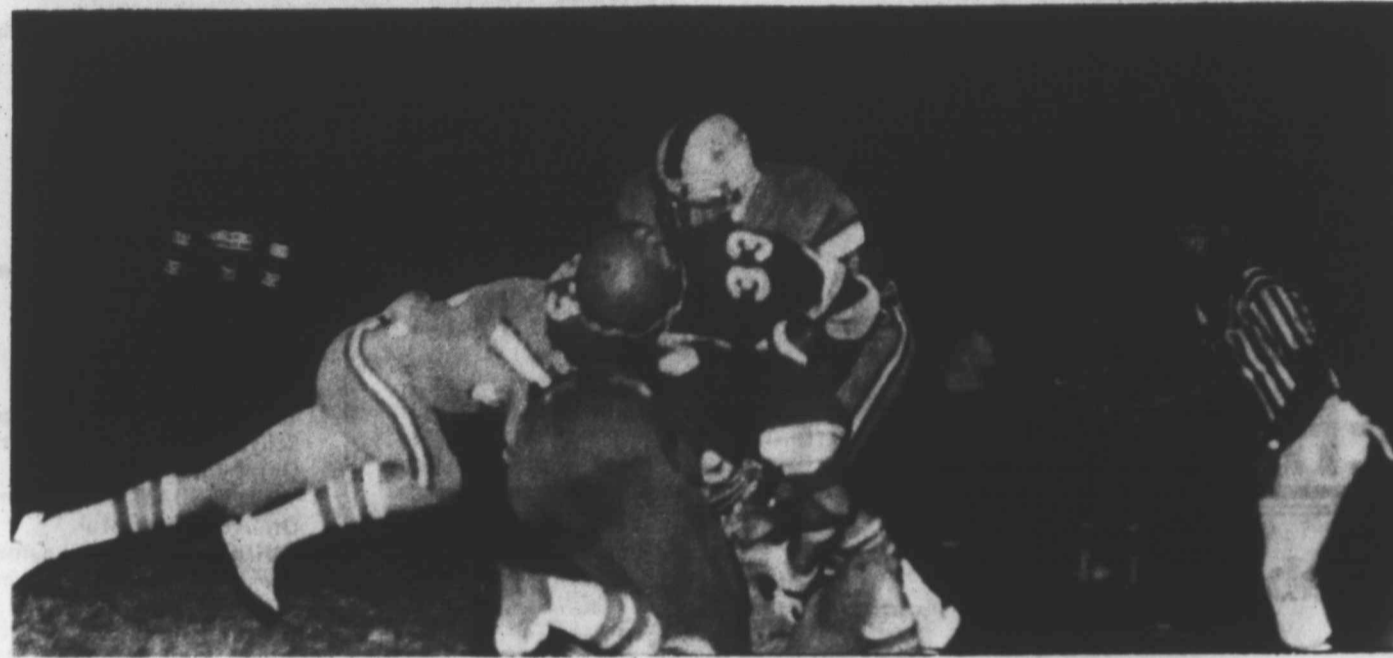


