## Livestock Show Success

Curt Terry, Marci Miller and Cody Smith exhibited the grand champions in three divisions of the annual Lynn County 4-H and FFA Livestock Show last weekend, as more than 140 youngsters showed animals before good crowds Thursday through Saturday at the Lynn County Show Barn.

With the barbecue and auction sale Saturday a highlight of the show, sponsors were elated at the excellent turnout and the cooperation given by the many show supporters. The sale brought \$48,000, sponsors said, less than last year's \$52,000, but considered very good in view of the area economy at present.

"We're very grateful to all those who helped out this year," said Stock Show Assn. President Edward Bartley. "Considering the agricultural situation as it now is, the sale was very good...and it seems like

everyone we asked to help out did so."  
Tahoka 4-H Club members

took five of the top six awards in the show. Cody Smith had the grand champ-

ion steer, with Debra Sanders of O'Donnell FFA showing the reserve grand champ-

ion steer.  
Curt Terry's cross lamb was judged grand champion, and Byron Norwood had the reserve grand champion.

In the barrow division, Marci Miller's Duroc was named grand champion and her sister, Sharla, showed the reserve grand champion. Showmanship awards were presented to Smith, winners; Terry, lambs; and Mike Rivas of Tahoka, barrow. Herdsman awards were presented to Jeff Martin of Tahoka in sheep; Miss Sanders in steers, and Matt Pugh and Kenny Pugh of O'Donnell in barrows.

## County Races Draw Lots Of Candidates

The race for Lynn County Treasurer, to be settled when the Democratic Party makes its nominations, has drawn the most candidates for office in the county, with five persons having signed up. The Democratic Primary May 1 shapes up as an interesting election in the county, with six county offices having at least two candidates.

Seeking the county treasurer's job when present treasurer Mrs. Jessie J. Stevens finishes her term this year are Cynthia Bryan, Margie Jester, Blanche Franklin,

Radene Turner and Glenda Williams. Mrs. Turner lives at New Home; the others are Tahoka residents. Mrs. Stevens is not seeking re-election.

E.R. Blakney of New Home, commissioner of Pct. 4, is seeking re-election and will face two other residents of the New Home area, Robert Edwards and Charles Smith.

There also are three candidates for the position of Justice of the Peace, Pct. 4, which is not the same as the commissioner's precinct 4, since the JP precinct is in the O'Donnell area. The current

JP, Cliff Lambert, is not seeking re-election. Three O'Donnell residents have filed, including Ben Morrison, David M. Smith and E.L. Follis Jr.

The other county commissioner whose term is up this year is J.C. Gandy of Tahoka, who has filed for re-election in Pct. 2, and is opposed by Boyd Barnes of the Draw area.

Longtime County Clerk C.W. Roberts of Tahoka is seeking re-election, and is opposed by Catherine Barham of Tahoka.

County Judge Melvin Burks is seeking a new term and will face opposition from J.F. Brandon. Both are Tahoka residents.

Unopposed for re-election are Pct. 1 Justice of the Peace Ed Hamilton and 100th District Court Clerk Joy Laws.

On the state level, State Sen. E.L. Short of Tahoka is seeking re-election from the 28th District, and will face Lubbock Dist. Atty. John Montford in the Democratic Primary. The winner of that race will meet the republican nominee in the general election. Republicans who have announced for the state senate seat are John Smith of Odessa and attorney John J.C. O'Shea of Lubbock.

So far as the Lynn County state representative race is concerned, things remained unsettled this week. The county is in the 77th district of Rep. Jim Rudd of Brownfield, who has announced for re-election, but an earlier re-districting bill put Lynn County into the district of longtime Democratic representative W.S. (Billy) Hearty of Paducah, who also is

District Judge George H. Hansard has announced that he will seek re-election to the state bench he now occupies.

Hansard, who presides over the 100th Judicial District Court, sits as District Judge in Dawson, Gaines, Garza and Lynn Counties.

In announcing his candidacy for re-election, Hansard said, "It is an honor to serve the people of the 100th District and to work with the people and members of the bar to improve the judicial system."

"We have always believed that justice and the courts should be everyone's business, and certainly the courts belong to the people. With the help of interested citizens, and with the suggestions given to us by jurors and prospective jurors, we have and can continue to improve the judicial system of our district," said Hansard.

The District Court handles approximately 1,000 cases each year.  
Judge Hansard has lived in Lamesa 43 years and he and his wife, Melba, have four sons.

**WOODWORK**

FOR YEARS NOW, newspapers with which I have been associated have received regularly a publication called Texas Business Review, which comes from the University of Texas at Austin. This week I opened one for the first time ever, because included on the list of contents on the outside cover was "The Characteristics of Pick-Your-Own Vegetable Marketing on the Texas South Plains."

I know my wife and mother-in-law sometimes go out into somebody's field (with permission, of course) and pick beans, and then later they snap them or string them or whatever they do with them before they wind up on the table. But I couldn't think of any unique characteristics of the enterprise, except maybe you can save money by picking your own.

Turns out that the authors, Claud and Judy Davidson, are geography teachers at Texas Tech (I didn't even know they taught geography past the third grade).

Anyway, the article was kind of interesting, pointing out that in 1980 there were 55 pick-your-own operations in Lubbock County.

They said the most popular crop was blackeye peas, and that most producers also raised green beans and okra. They also mentioned corn on the cob, tomatoes, cantaloupes and other stuff, including such inedibles as squash.

It was gratifying to note that the Davidsons found that all of the 45 persons they talked with placed ads in the newspapers.

It was noted, too, that most of the producers of the crops took the word of the people doing the picking about how much they had, and often didn't even check cars or trucks to see exactly how much they had picked as they checked out and paid up. Only seven of the producers listed cheating as a problem. It's good to know that most pea-pickers are still honest.

There also were articles in the Review comparing the economies of Texas and Alberta (I thought that was a peach), auto insurance in the state, something about the baseball player's strike and a story about the expanding labor force in Brownsville.

Big deal. We've got some pretty fat workers around town ourselves.

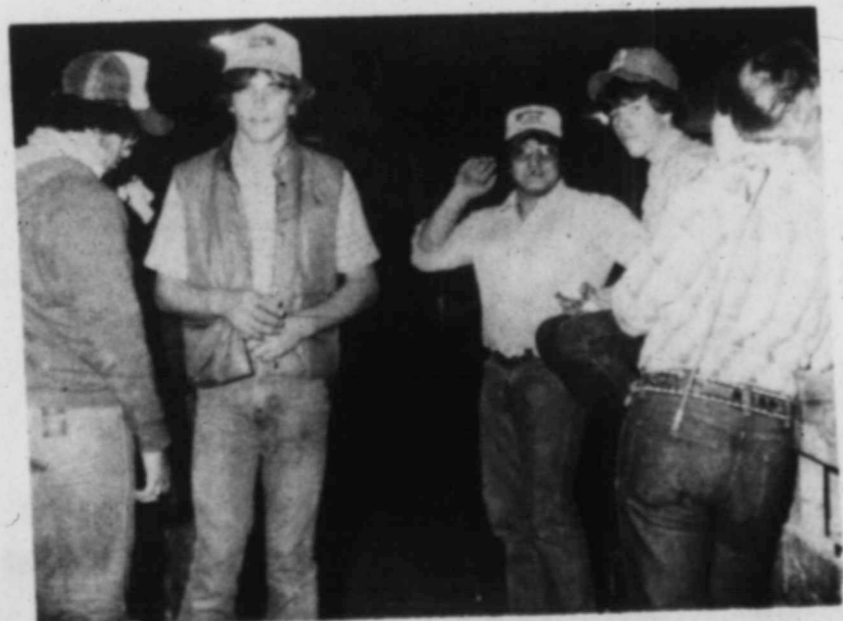
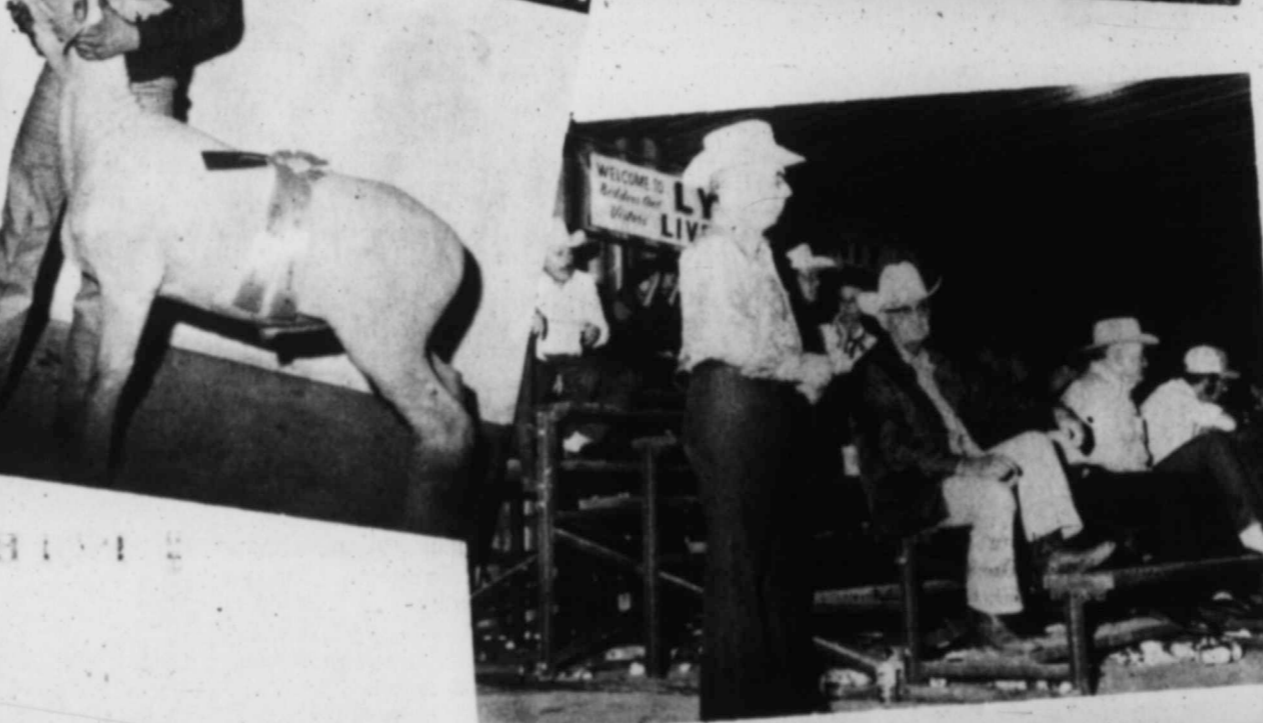

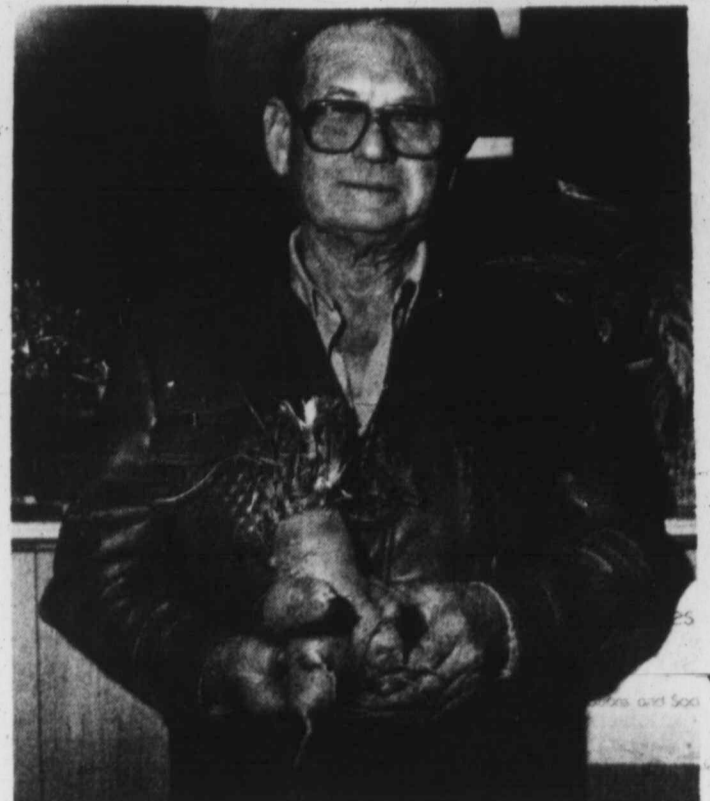

## Lutherans To Provide Lifeline To South Plains Elderly Persons

Lifeline is a personal emergency response system that helps elderly or disabled persons to maintain their independence. Through Lutheran Social Services, the Lutheran Community is developing this system as a service to the South Plains.

Lifeline provides immediate 24-hour access to community medical and social services at the press of a button. Each subscriber has a Lifeline Communicator at home and a portable button that can be worn on clothing or carried around the house in a pocket. At the first sign of trouble, the person can push the button which sends an electronic message, via the telephone, to the Emergency Response Center where trained personnel arrange for help.

Lifeline has the ability to send a signal for help even when a person is unconscious. A timer, if not reset, will automatically send the signal.

At the Emergency Response Center there is an information card for each subscriber, listing the person's name, address, telephone number, medical condition and the names of persons to be called in an emergency. These helpers, called emergency responders, are selected by the subscriber and usually include neighbors, friends, and relatives.

They are backed up by community service providers such as police, ambulance

service, visiting nurse associations and fire fighters. Lifeline is a person-to-person service involving no tape recorded messages. Further information about Lifeline service may be obtained at the Lubbock office of Lutheran Social Service, 763-7081.

### HOW EARNINGS AFFECT PAYMENT OF SS BENEFITS

Social Security benefits are affected by earnings. All benefits will be payable if the annual exempt amount is not exceeded. This limit in 1982 is \$6,000 for people who are 65-72, and \$4,440 for people under 65.

The age at which the earnings test no longer applies is changed to age 70 beginning in 1983. The 1977 Amendments had prospectively changed the age at which the earnings test no longer applies from age 72 to 70 to be effective in 1982. The 1981 Amendments delay that reduction in the retirement test exempt age from 72 to 70 until January 1983 instead of 1982.

Beginning January 1983, the earnings test will not apply to any month in which a beneficiary is age 70 or over. Prior to January 1983, the age at which the earnings test does not apply remains at age 72 or older.

#### 4-H'ERS BECOMING WISE ENERGY MANAGERS

Energy management and conservation are high on the list of priorities for young people from 9 to 19 who are enrolled in the national 4-H electric energy program sponsored by Westinghouse Electric Corporation. In one phase of the program, practical projects and activities give 4-H members an opportunity to get basic facts on the energy situation, says Brent Drennan, county agent. For example, 4-H'ers learn that: \*It takes 300 gallons of oil or 36,000 cubic feet of natural gas each year to produce enough electricity to heat

water in their homes--reason enough to plan for efficient use of hot water. \*Just a flip of the wrist to turn out a light will cut down on the 150 gallons of oil the power company burns to light an average home during the year. \*A thermostat setting just a few degrees cooler in the winter and just a few degrees warmer in the summer will conserve some of the 800 gallons of oil, or 100,000 cubic feet of natural gas used to generate electricity to heat and cool their homes each year. Other program features are workshops, "hands on" experiments and educational aids that provide learn-by-

More traditional 4-H electric energy projects are oriented toward the mechanics of electricity--applying it to everyday tasks like safely changing a fuse or growing houseplants under lights. Whether they work with homemade "solar" hot dog cookers or make basic electrical repairs, 4-H'ers can earn awards donated for the 42nd year by Westinghouse and arranged by National 4-H Council. Incentives range from six \$1,000 scholarships at the national level to four medals of honor for county winners. One program member from each state is awarded an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago each November. All winners are chosen by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Westinghouse also supports the program. Two units, "Exploring the World of Electricity" and "Electricity's Silent Partner--Magnetism," are in print. A third unit, "Working with Electricity," will be available soon. More information on the 4-H electric energy program is available from the county Extension office.

### Classing Totals Pass 2 Million

About 214,000 samples were classed at Lubbock during the week ended Jan. 28, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing Services Office at Lubbock. This brought the season's total to 2,144,000, well past the record for one season's classing total at one office. The previous record was 1,805,000 set in 1962, also at Lubbock, Bennett said. The night shift was terminated Thursday after ten weeks of operation. Out-of-town cotton classers were returned to their homes all across the cotton belt.

About 13 percent was grade 42, 42 percent was grade 52 and 25 percent was grade 52 during the week. About 9:0 percent of the samples were reduced one grade because of bark. Seven percent was classed below grade.

Staples were 12 percent staple 29, 37 percent staple 30, 36 percent staple 31 and 11 percent staple 32 for an average of 30.5 thirty-seconds of an inch.

Micronaire 35 - 49 was 18 percent, 33 - 34 was 14 percent, 30 - 32 was 31 percent, 27 - 29 was 25 percent and 26 or below was 12 percent for an average of 31.

Fiber strength averaged 23 grams per tex. Growers sold mixed lots of mostly grades 42 and 52, staples 31 and 32, mike 35-49 at about 45.30 cents per pound, unchanged from one week earlier.

Grade 52 staple 32, mike 30 - 32 sold around 40.00 cents per pound, down 40 points from last week. This is about 245 points over the loan. Gins paid growers \$70 to \$85 per ton for cottonseed, mostly \$75 per ton.

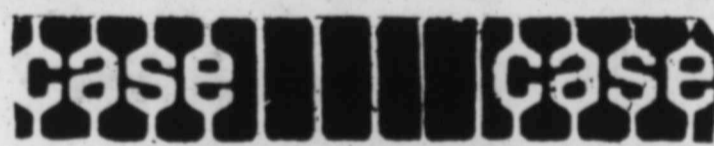

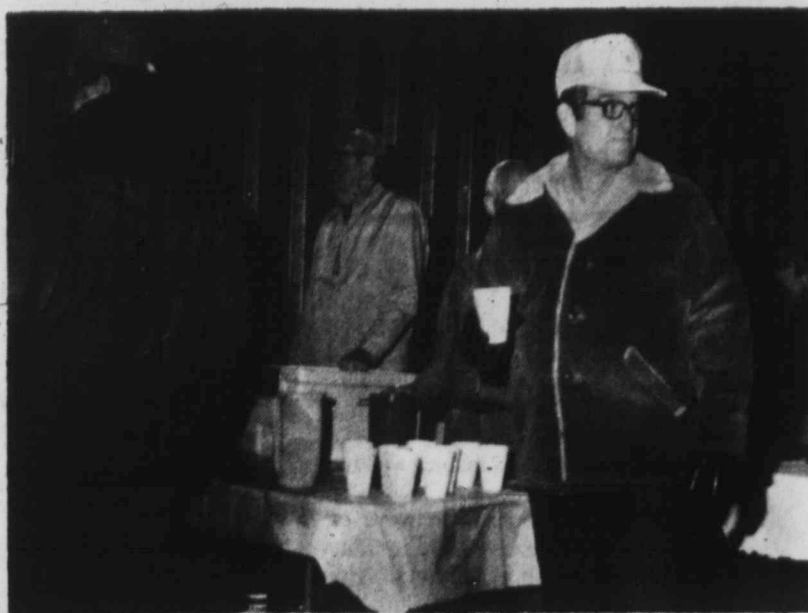

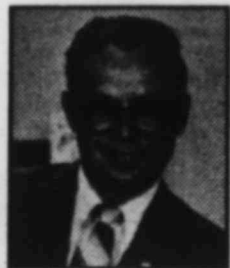

## North Elementary News

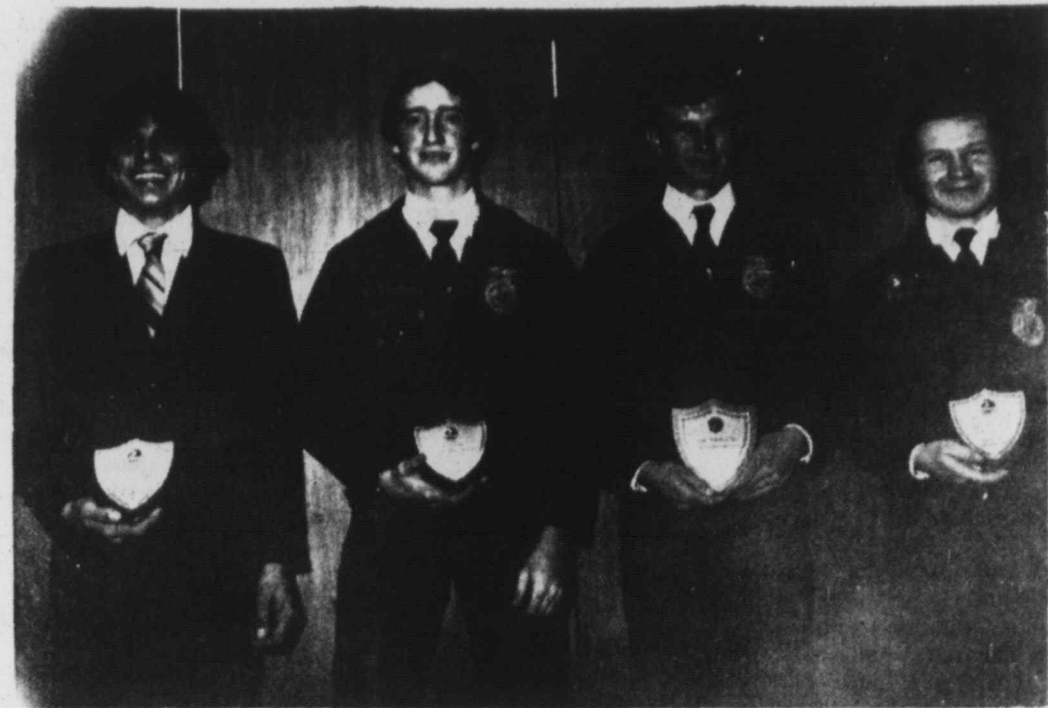

## Wilson Wife, New Home Farmer Are Honored By SWCD

A farm housewife who lives just north of Wilson and a New Home farmer whose conservation practices are considered among the best in the area were named Lynn County Conservation Home-maker and Conservation Farmer of the Year Tuesday night.

Honored at the second annual conservation awards banquet in Lyntegar meeting room were Gilbert Wuensche and Mrs. Donald (Carolyn) Klaus.

Also honored were outstanding FFA students from the four county schools, as nominated by their agricultural instructors. They are Tracy Smith of New Home, Jay Durham of O'Donnell, Tim Trotter of Wilson and James Strickland Jr. of Tahoka.

All six honorees received plaques at the banquet, emceed by James Harold Sanders, vice chairman of the Lynn County SWCD, and featuring an address by State Sen. E.L. Short of Tahoka.

Short, a candidate for reelection this year, mentioned some of the unusual and sometimes strange things he has witnessed as a member of the legislature, noting a law which requires hoe handles to be at least four feet long and another piece of legislation which prohibits an undertaker from profane language while embalming a

body. In a serious vein, he commented that "most of the state's legislators make tremendous financial sacrifices in order to serve in the Legislature."

He also touched on a new law which exempts farm equipment from property taxes and the impact it will have next year on governing bodies such as school boards and counties. He said this was just one line in a comprehensive measure which had many good points in it, such as homestead exemptions for persons over 65. He also pointed out that the farm equipment exemption does not apply to partnership operations or corporations.

Admitting that all the agricultural news isn't good right now, Sen. Short nevertheless closed with the optimistic comment that "I would like to say we have been in trouble before in agriculture and we're going to make it back on top again."

In announcing Mrs. Klaus as the Homemaker of the Year, W.R. Steen, a SWCD director, pointed out her many activities as a mother and farm wife. He noted that she and her husband farm 914 acres in Lynn and Garza

Counties, and that she raises a garden, cans and freezes much of the family's food, bakes and creates many of her own main dishes, sews for the family, builds furniture, restores antique pieces, does maintenance work and electrical wiring, does book-keeping and drives a tractor.

She is an active member of St. John's Lutheran Church in Wilson, is active in PTA, band boosters, Girl Scouts and in the Lions Club wife's organization. She formerly was a writer and editor for the Lynn County News.

She and her husband, Don, have three daughters, Tonda, 17; Cindy, 15; and Melissa, 7.

Presenting Wuensche his award, Sanders observed that the New Home farmer has built parallel terraces on his farm where he and his wife Barbara live. He also used the ACP program to install irrigation pipe, and he has put half his land in cotton and half in grain sorghum. Crops are rotated each year.

Wuensche's grain sorghum has been as high as 6,000 pounds per acre, and his dryland cotton in 1981 made 72 bales on 78 acres. Active members of the Lutheran Church, the Wuensches have three married daughters.

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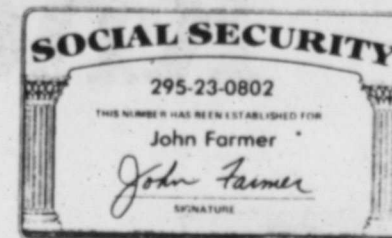
