

Brandon Elected Judge; Short Barely Beaten

Just over half of Lynn County's registered voters turned out Saturday to cast ballots in the Democratic Primary, which in the county races is the same as being elected, since there are no Republican candidates for county offices.

County Clerk C.W. Roberts, who won over challenger Catherine Barham by 1452 to 721 votes, and Precinct 4 commissioner E.R. Blakney, who now is in a runoff with Robert Edwards for that job,

were the only incumbents with opponents who survived the voting Saturday. County Judge Melvin Burks was unseated by J.F. Brandon by a vote of 1243 to 930, and Precinct 2 commissioner J.C. Gandy of Tahoka lost to Boyd Barnes of Draw 319 to 252.

State Sen. E.L. Short of Tahoka won the county's vote by 1483 to 724 for John Montford, but Montford won the nomination by virtue of a big margin of 5,700 votes in Lubbock County. Although Montford carried only Lubbock and Borden counties in the 14-county district, the Lubbock margin boosted him to a narrow win by 685 votes over Short.

Close Contest

Montford will face Republican Jim Reese of Odessa in the general election in November for the state senate

post. Montford's total in the balloting Saturday over the entire district was 24,101 to 23,416 for Short. The victory margin of 685 for Montford is significant considering that 1,986 Lynn County registered voters didn't vote Saturday.

The five-woman race for Lynn County treasurer brought on a runoff, as expected, with Cynthia (Cindy) Bryan leading the ticket with 700 votes, and Margie Jester getting in to the runoff with 538 votes. Other candidates were Radene Turner with 345 votes, Blanche Franklin, 307, and Glenda Williams, 283.

Blakney received 225 votes, trailing Edwards' 258, but the third candidate, Charles Smith, had 146 votes to force a runoff.

Another Runoff

Joining the treasurer's race and the Precinct 4 commissioners race on the runoff ballot June 5 will be David M. Smith and Ben Morrison, seeking the Justice of the Peace Pct. 4 (O'Donnell) position. Smith had 157 votes, Morrison 233 and the third candidate, E.L. Follis Jr., drew 115 votes.

Steven A. Carricker of Roby was nominated for state representative in the 78th district, which now includes Lynn County at its western edge. Carricker defeated incumbent Walter Grubbs of Merkel. In Lynn County, Carricker won by 1060 to 812.

I READ SOMEWHERE that security is one of the main goals in life for everybody, that folks yearn to be in the position that they never have to worry about having a roof over their heads, a bed to sleep in and meals every day.

I may be about to reach that goal, since I could be incarcerated in the federal penitentiary for the rest of my natural life because of a \$3 mistake.

On one of my quarterly tax returns last year, the one on which you send the federal government the money you have withheld from your workers' salaries, plus a matching amount of social security, there was a \$3 error in addition, and consequently, the payment was \$3 short. Five months or so later I get this letter from IRS saying I owe them the \$3, plus a penalty of \$46 for making such an asinine mistake.

I sent them the \$3 I owed, and a note saying "I refuse to pay any such ridiculous penalty for a \$3 error." The IRS computer was not impressed. It merely recorded the \$3 payment, and sent me a letter saying "we have previously written you asking for payment...the tax is overdue and the law authorizes us to file a notice of federal tax lien" and seize your property, wages, wife, children, dogs, tennis racket and other assets to satisfy your unpaid tax.

Meanwhile, I overpaid them \$17 by mistake on another tax deal since then, and I urged my accountant to add a \$46 penalty on the overpayment when they return the \$17 to me. But he says it doesn't work that way. The law, it appears, is all in favor of the government.

I could pay the \$46 (and probably will, when they send Matt Dillon or somebody after me), but there is a principle involved here. To assess a penalty like that for a simple error, when they were sent a bunch of money the first time (short by just three bucks) is nothing but extortion. They assess their penalty on the total amount that was due, rather than the amount not paid.

It's a crooked deal, and IRS shouldn't be allowed to get away with it. But they probably will.

ONE THING I learned after a recent criticism of the movie we attended, "Chariots of Fire," was that not everybody disliked the movie. I didn't exactly dislike it myself, but neither did I find it unforgettable. I also learned that some folks who saw the movie agreed with me about its being a bit boring and hard to understand.

Someone said that I'm always criticizing the movies and television and that I'm not positive enough in my subject matter. So I am now offering a few bouquets for movies I have seen over the years which I think are good. And I realize again that a lot of folks will think some of these shows were lousy; the fact that not everybody likes the same things makes us all unique.

I tried to think of what I would judge as the best movie I ever saw, and I couldn't come up with a clear winner. I will say that the funniest movie I ever saw would have to be "The Court Jester" with Danny Kaye, although several others stand out in my memory too. These include "Born Yesterday" with Judy Holliday and "Arsenic and Old Lace" with somebody (Cary Grant?) made in about 1937. Of course I didn't see it then, because my eyes had just barely opened.

"Patton" would have to be rated as the best war picture I ever saw, and perhaps the best overall picture would be "Gone With The Wind," which proves that I don't always disagree with the critics.

Phone Folks Trying Hard, Says Hearn

General Telephone Co. is doing a lot of work in Tahoka and is trying hard to take care of the problems that have plagued the system in recent months, division manager O.D. Hearn of Brownfield told members of Tahoka City Council Monday night.

Using graphs projected on a screen, Hearn showed what the company has been doing in regard to answering trouble reports and providing new service. The graphs indicated that in the last few months the phone company has met or surpassed Public Utility Commission standards in most areas.

"We're not satisfied with that, however," Hearn said. "We sincerely want to give Tahoka the best possible telephone service, and we're fully aware that problems still exist." He added that the company now is working on "general cable relief and replacement of exhausted plant in the west and northwest parts of the city." He also said that this work sometimes causes a temporary loss of phone service by individual customers because of work being done.

Hearn said some circuits which have been causing problems in Tahoka are being replaced now with a new type of circuit which requires less maintenance.

In other action, the council voted to go ahead with installation of concrete at intersections of four streets and alleys with Country Club Road, which has long been plagued with drainage problems. The work is expected to cost around \$8,000.

Tornado Drill Goes Smoothly

A system wide tornado drill was held Friday, April 30, in the Tahoka Schools. All students are taken to designated areas of safety, asked to kneel down, face the wall, place their hands over their heads, and remain until the all clear is sounded.

The entire alert was completed in less than four minutes with the elementary buildings taking less than one minute to get into position.

Supt. Jim Coulston said. The school has the following alert systems:

1. Weather alert receiver with the U.S. weather bureau in all three buildings.
2. Citizen Band radio receiver to monitor fire department and the school lookout person.
3. City alert system.

"Every employee has been trained to provide the greatest possible protection for the children of the Tahoka School System," said Coulston. He added:

"The most dangerous place a person or child can be during a tornado is in an automobile. Our schools are considered some of the safest structures in our community. We want to encourage all parents to assist the school in protecting their children by not blocking the streets and taking their children out of the buildings and into their cars during an alert. Approximately two-thirds of the people killed in the Wichita Falls tornado were in their cars."

During an alert all buildings and playgrounds are checked to see that every child is in a place of safety.

Shooting Wounds Tahoka Resident

A Saturday evening shooting incident which put a 27-year-old Tahoka man in the hospital for a couple of days will be brought before the grand jury for possible action, said Sheriff Stanley Krause said.

Krause said no charges had been filed in the shooting of Maximo Castenada Jr., who was treated at Lynn County Hospital for a gunshot wound in the groin before being

released two days later. The shooting occurred at a residence in the southeast part of town about 6:30 p.m. Saturday, according to officers' reports.

"Just right" was the expression of farmers regarding the timely rains over Lynn County the past week.

The rain Tuesday night put most or all the county's soil in excellent shape for planting, according to a quick survey made by The News Wednesday morning.

Tahoka received .81 inch of rain Tuesday night bringing the past week's total to 1.44 inches. National Weather Service was predicting more rain for Wednesday and possibly Thursday.

The rains have covered all of the county, even areas that had not received quite enough for planting, reports indicate.

Very high winds and spotted areas of hail were reported in some areas. Three utility poles were blown down on the Ronnie Hill farm east of Tahoka.

Tuesday night's rain brought total rainfall in Tahoka this year to 3.75 inches, according to the local National Weather Service observer.

Dynamic Changes Recommended for 4-H

Dynamic changes lie ahead for the 5 million youths in the national 4-H system if recommendations of a grassroots delegation are carried out, says Brent Drennan, County 4-H program coordinator.

The recommendations -- ranging from use of computers to making 4-H relevant to more of today's teens -- were made by some 300 youths and adults from the 50 states, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands and Canada at the recent National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C.

Recommendations are as follows:

Technology--Create a National task force to develop a local, state and national computer project in which 4-H young people can take part. States would be responsible for producing materials for this program.

Agriculture -- Emphasize activities that stimulate more livestock breeding and crop-growing projects, push for better visibility of soil and water conservation efforts, put a higher priority on agricultural education, and build closer links with the Future Farmers of America, a nationwide high school youth organization.

Relevance to Teens -- Make 4-H more relevant to the needs, issues, problems and interests of modern youths, especially older teenagers. Specifics include more college scholarships, asking school systems to give credit for 4-H projects, projects for older members that don't require record-keeping, increased sharing of new ideas across state lines, and higher visibility for 4-H achievements.

Leadership--Train volunteer 4-H leaders better, conduct a national survey of present leaders, adopt new leadership communication methods for today's nearly 600,000 adult leaders, do more to recognize adult and youth leaders, encourage more teenagers to be leaders, and involve more young members in leadership planning steps for 4-H programs at local, state and federal levels.

Worldwide--Increase 4-H international activities. Because nations are becoming more dependent upon each other, many youths now think globally rather than nationally. This calls for an emphasis on the cultural makeup of communities, more training for 4-H'ers with international projects, and more exchange visits by U.S. 4-H'ers and their counterparts abroad.

Government--Boost youth's knowledge and understanding of how governments are formed and make policy. Vehicles for this would be seminars, new activities and county workshops aimed at involving youngsters in government.

Careers--Start a new nationwide career exploration project for 4-H'ers. This would include a career education specialist on the staff of each Cooperative Extension Service in the states, use of computers to locate jobs, and closer cooperation with local units of government to create job opportunities for young people.

America's Heritage--Seek more support for beautification projects, urge programs in each state to focus on environmental needs, develop a project book on parliamentary procedure in

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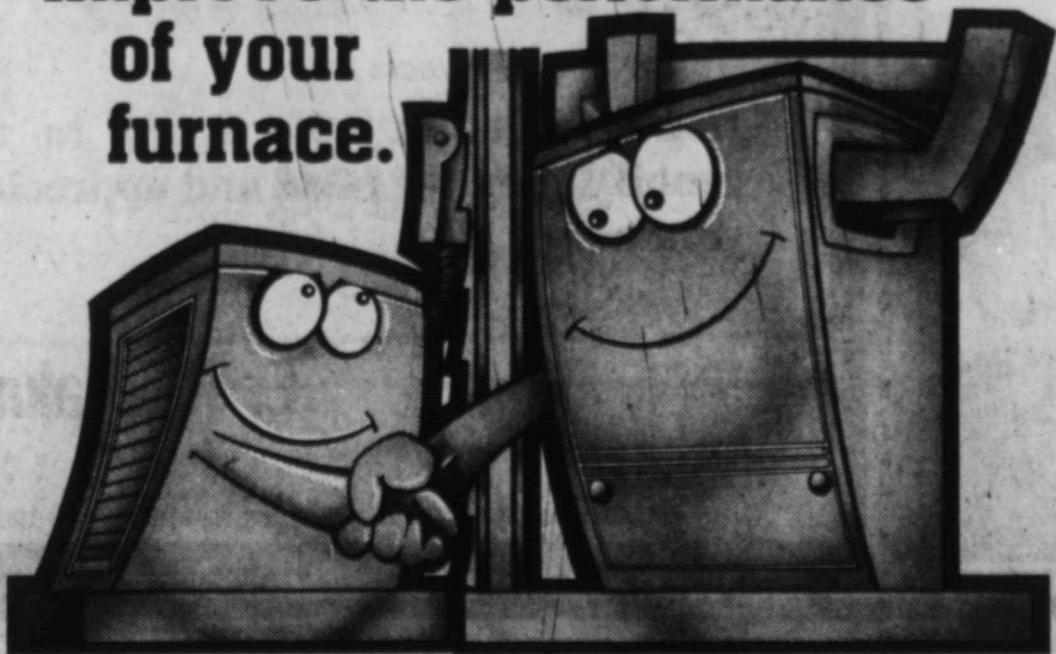

Family Focus

How much food in your home goes to waste? How many grocery dollars does it stand for?

Most consumers throw away more food than they realize in many cases -- leftover vegetables, meats, milk that turns sour and bread that goes stale.

Throwing these nutritious foods out is the same thing as throwing away pennies, nickels, dimes and quarters and even dollars at meal time.

Try some of these tips to conserve food you spend money for -- real savings depend on your storage and preparation habits, as well as on buying:

Buying

Buy foods in amounts your family will eat for one meal -- or amounts you can set aside in the freezer or refrigerator for late without wasting.

Don't get "carried away" buying fresh foods on special if you can't store them properly to prevent spoilage.

Fresh peaches at 49 cents a pound are no bargain if you buy four pounds, eat three pounds and throw one pound away.

Storage

Wrap leftovers properly for freezer or refrigerator.

In the refrigerator, always cover foods with wax paper, foil or plastic wrap -- or store them in a plastic bag or a container with a tight-fitting lid.

Foods stored uncovered lose moisture and can pick up flavors from other foods.

Foods for the freezer should be packaged in moisture, vapor-resistant packaging such as plastic containers, foil or freezer paper.

Label packages before putting them in the freezer.

Bread needs special storage, too. Store breads in their original container or in an air-tight container.

It's true that breads keep longer in the refrigerator, but they also can become stale there. For toasting later, this is no problem. But for other uses, freeze bread. Freezing is best for long-term storage.

Keep fresh vegetables in the refrigerator crisper or a plastic bag -- all except potatoes and dry onions. Potatoes and dry onions need cool, dry storage.

Keep milk fresh by placing it in the refrigerator IMMEDIATELY after shopping.

Don't leave milk sitting on the counter -- even during mealtimes!

Store flours and grains in containers with tight-fitting lids.

Whole-wheat flour becomes rancid rather quickly, so keep it in the refrigerator for long-term storage.

Preparation

If your family doesn't like leftovers, prepare only the

amount of food they will eat at one meal.

Involve family members in meal planning. Ask them what and how much they will eat. A cooperative effort is a definite key to saving money on the food bill.

Here are two food-saving-success steps to use in preparation itself:

For "no-like bread crust" families, trim off the crust and save it to toast for croutons or bread crumbs atop casseroles -- if the family will accept crust any of those ways.

In buying frozen vegetables buy the bags, take out only the needed amount and save the needed amount and save the rest for later.

Create your own food-saving success steps, and before long, you'll have a long list of ideas that really make an impact on the food budget.

Watch Your Habits

With rising food costs, economy is more important than ever before -- in buying, storing and preparation.

To ensure your family the greatest economy possible, keep a list of foods you throw away for one week. Study the list and decide what changes you can make.

Those changes can mean a big savings on the family food dollar.

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General Telephone Cites Need For "Fair Return"

A "fair rate of return" is critical to General Telephone's planned \$1.9 billion, five-year construction program in Texas if the company is to meet growth needs and to carry out its modernization and service improvements programs, according to E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president.

Langley made the comments April 26 during the final day of hearings before a hearings examiner for the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin. The hearings on General Telephone's request for \$110 million in increased revenues started April 15.

"We must have a return on equity capital equal to or greater than the cost of long-term debt and higher net increases in known expenses because financing will be hard to find, and costly when available as investors review our financial

picture," Langley said.

Dr. Richard H. Pettway, a professor from the University of Florida at Gainesville, Fla., testified the company required an 18 percent return on equity and a 13.88 percent rate of return on rate base.

Langley said the company proposed a number of recommendations during the hearing on how to recover the needed revenues with the basic premise of placing the cost of providing identifiable services on the customers benefiting from the service rather than all ratepayers.

"We are faced with enormous capital requirements, unprecedented changes in technology, high customer growth and demand for new services. We must have new revenues to meet our earnings and capital needs."

Prior to the hearings, the Public Utility Commission staff found a preliminary revenue deficiency of \$48.6 million.

Attorneys for the parties involved in the proceedings will now file briefs with the hearings examiner within the next few weeks. The hearings examiner will then issue her findings for study by the three-member commission. The commissioners will hear oral arguments from attorneys involved in the hearing and issue a final order. Changes in rates and charges are expected to become effective in August.

It is very important for the school to know how many kindergarten students to expect next year. If any parents will not be able to attend the meeting they should notify the school by calling 998-4350.

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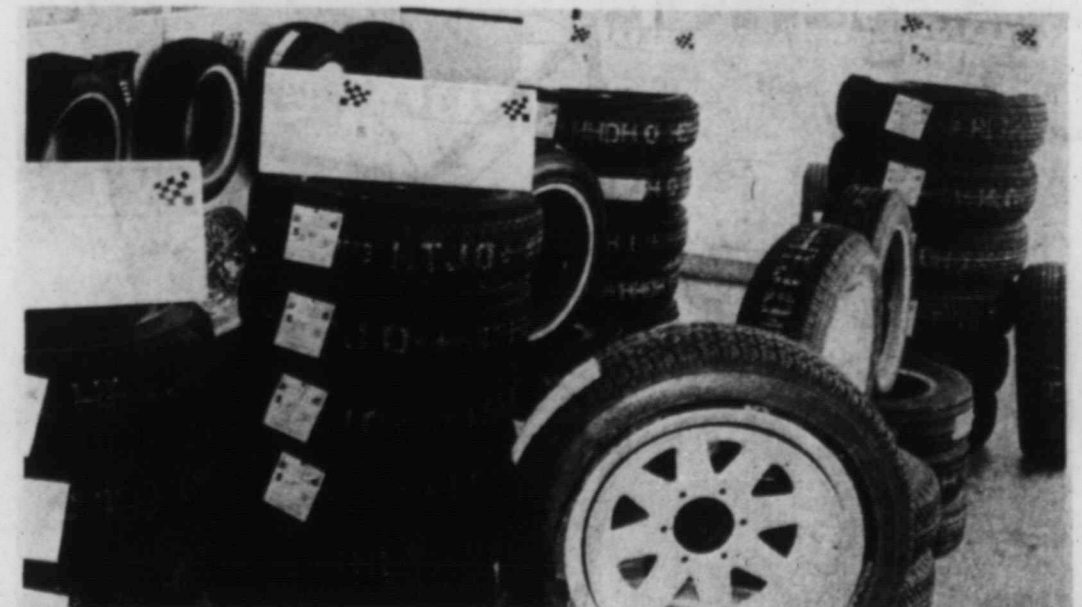
