Show Barn Open Again; Strict Rules Affirmed

The Lynn County Show Barn again is open to the public for events by responsible organizations, including dances, but county commissioners in making the facility available again Monday stipulated that the rules which have been in effect must be strictly enforced.

Because of some problems in the past, particularly with some of the dances and events which occurred in connection with them, the commissioners recently put a temporary stop to use of the facility, pending study of what was needed to keep things in order.

It was decided that the existing rules are okay, but they need to be followed to the letter. A committee including Bob Ballard of New Home, Benny Edwards of O'Donnell, Donald Klaus of Wilson, County Agent Stanley Young and County Judge J.F. Brandon is in charge of the show barn. Anyone wanting to use the facility is asked to contact Young. He in turn will notify Sheriff Stanley Krause about who is using the building for dances, and he will supply a list of auxiliary officers from which the sponsoring organization will choose who they want on hand for their event. The sponsoring group also must pay the officer.

No alcoholic beverages are allowed, no private parties, use is limited to residents or organizations of Lynn County, and if a dance is sponsored by school organizations, at least four sponsors must be present.

Also discussed by the commis-

sioners at the meeting Monday was the possibility of putting up lights outside the show barn.

Reports by the county treasurer,

payment of bills and a resolution related to South Plains Community Action were among the other matters taken up by the group.

Good Rains Fall In Parts Of Lynn

About two-thirds of Lynn County received sufficient rain for planting cotton Monday and Tuesday nights, from about a half inch up to three inches or more.

Tahoka received 1.53 inches Tuesday night up until 7:30 a.m. Wednesday and .07 inch Tuesday morning for 1.6 inch total, bringing the total rainfall, with melted snow, to 6.01 inches total this year.

West Point, Three Lakes, Wells and Newmoore, however received little or no rain, and O'Donnell reported "a good shower". Grassland, New Lynn, an area west of Wilson, and an area north of Tahoka received two inches or more. Wilson reported 1.6 inches, New Home, Lakeview and Petty farmers reported one to two inches.

Most of the southeast area of the county was reported to have received a half inch or more.

Some hail had been reported east of Tahoka but no damage had been

reported. Prospects were good Wednesday morning for additional rainfall.

U.S. 87 northbound lane was under water about five miles north of Tahoka for a time around 10 p.m. Tuesday, and one car went off into water about three feet deep between the lanes. No one was injured. Some county roads were washed out north of Tahoka also.

A 27-year-old Wilson man suffered a broken hip and other injuries as the late model Ford pickup he was driving, owned by Western Geophysical Co., overturned about 14 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 Monday night.

Allen Dale Noble, only occupant of the pickup, was taken to Lubbock General Hospital where his condition was reported satisfactory Wednesday.

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Fugitives Hunted In Rural Areas

New Jersey State Police this week sent this newspaper the following release regarding some dangerous fugitives who possibly are hiding in a rural area of the southwest.

On Dec. 21, 1981, New Jersey State Trooper Philip Lamonaco, the father of three small children, was shot to death on Interstate-80, Warren County, New Jersey. Lamonaco

was one of New Jersey's most highly decorated Troopers. As a result of the investigation into the shooting, Felony Murder warrants have been issued for the arrests of:

Thomas William Manning - W-M-36; 5' 10"; 150 lbs.; brown hair; hazel eyes; place of birth, Boston, Mass.

Richard Charles Williams - W-M-34; 6' 0"; 200 lbs.; brown hair; blue eyes; place of birth; Beverly, Mass.

Also wanted for questioning is Raymond Luc Levasseur - W-M-34; 6' 0"; 200 lbs.; DOB: 10-10-46; brown hair; green eyes; place of birth; Portland, Maine.

The subjects are members of a self-styled revolutionary terrorist group,

initially called the "Sam Melville-Jonathan Jackson Group". Early in their development, in furtherance of their terrorist ideology, the group has been responsible for the bombings of government and private sector buildings in the New England area. In order to sustain themselves, the group relies on criminal activities; principally, bank and armored car robberies. Investigation has indicated that the group maintains a tangential affiliation with such better-known terrorist groups as the "Weather Underground" and the "Black Liberation Army."

On Feb. 7, 1982, near Boston, Massachusetts State Troopers became involved in a shootout

en they checked a vehicle occupied by two known associates of the Manning, Williams, Levasseur group. These subjects were: Jaan Karl Laaman - W-M; 5' 10"; 200 lbs; and Christopher Everett King. King has been apprehended - Laaman escaped and is still at large.

The fugitives maintain a secluded and austere life-style; residing in rural areas and demonstrating a preference for farm house rentals. When necessary, however, they can easily adapt to an urban subsistence. The group generally keep to themselves and attempt to avoid socialization with neighbors. Manning has worked as a part-time carpenter. He and Levasseur have indicated, when approached, that they are over-the-road truck drivers.

The fugitives are known to have delivered their children by natural child-birth techniques or utilized small medical clinics, doctors' offices, or midwives. Their children are often enrolled in private schools, especially the Montessori-type, where prior enrollment data is not an issue. When required, medical-dental attention is conscientiously sought. Manning and his wife, Carol, have three children: Jeremy 9, Tamara, 3, and Jonathan, 2. Williams is not married but has two children who reside with their mother: Raymond Levasseur and his wife, Patricia Gros, have three daughters: Carmen, 7, Simone, 4 and Rosa, 3. They also have a light-colored German Shepherd dog. Jaan Laaman and his commonlaw wife have one son, Michael E. Curzi, 2. Laaman's wife also has two other children by a previous marriage, who are thought to be traveling with them. They are Lucie, 8, and Nina, 7.

stream sportsmen, expert marksmen, and are proficient in home repair crafts. They are known to maintain their vehicles (older model pickup trucks and automobiles) in good operating condition, using local repair services. The one exception to the above life-style is Williams, who is a known drug user with an urban proclivity. Williams in the past, has been employed by moving and storage companies.

The fugitives are known to become totally familiar with the area in which they operate, and use two or three aliases at the same time. They obtain and use authentic identity documents (driver's licenses, birth certificates, etc.). With their false identification, they are known to use makeup and wigs to change their appearances to comport to the assumed identity.

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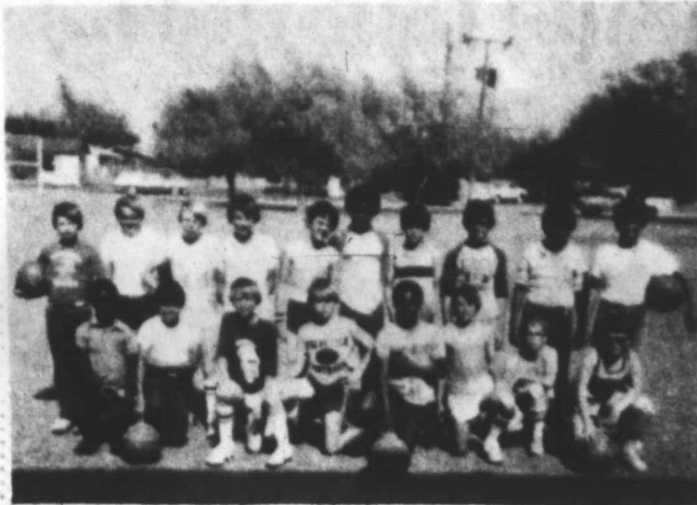

Speaker Says Many Lives Can Be Saved In Emergencies

Heart attacks claim 850,000 victims a year in the U.S. and 350,000 of them die before reaching a hospital. Many of these could be saved by proper treatment by Emergency Medical Service personnel accompanying an ambulance.

Many people die from car wreck injuries who could be saved by proper care at the scene of the wreck.

These were facts emphasized in a talk at Rotary Thursday by Terry L. Bavousett, EMS public health technician with Texas Department of Public Health, District 212, Lubbock. Lynn County Hospital in Tahoka is doing a good job, but only three ambulance attendants are qualified to handle emergencies whereas O'Donnell has 10 qualified attendants, he said. Tahoka Fire Department plays an important role in emergency work.

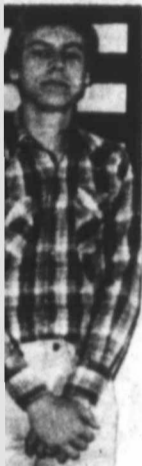
