Gerald Huffaker presided at the meeting following the meal, at which Rush Dudgeon gave the invocation, and presented the awards.

Mrs. Donna Ross, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer McAllister, came the greatest distance, 1,650 miles from her home in Frederick, Maryland.

Mrs. H.B. Howell, now of Odessa, who will be 89 in August,

received the award for the oldest lady present. She attended the event's very first meeting and has been coming back ever since although now confined to a wheel chair.

Ray Doak, 85, of Lubbock, who lived here from 1907 to 1923, was awarded the plaque for the oldest man in attendance.

These awards went to persons who had not previously received them. Actually, Mrs. S.L. Shelton of Tahoka was the oldest lady present at age 96. H. B. (Belton) Howell, also 96, was the oldest man present, and he has served the Pioneer Reunion Assn. as president and director

as well as oldest man.

Awards for window decorations went to Dayton Parker Pharmacy, first place, and Jennings of Tahoka, second.

A special plaque was awarded long-time peace officer and member of the Texas Rangers Hall of Fame, Norvell Redwine, who was unable to be present for the reunion because of illness, for his outstanding and unselfish service to the Pioneer Reunion. SPS Stresses Traffic Safety

The Texas Department of Public Safety has estimated that as many as 49 persons could die in traffic accidents across the state during the July 4 holiday period.

Colonel Jim Adams, DPS director, said the estimate

is based on the anticipated volume of traffic and the previous holiday deaths.

"Independence Day can bring more motorists to our streets and highways compared to a regular weekend. We are estimating fewer deaths than we had during July 4 holiday last year because thus far this year we have experienced a decline in traffic fatalities," Adams said.

Last year, 55 fatalities were recorded during the 78-hour period, but subsequent deaths from serious injuries brought the final count to 64 for the three-day holiday.

Adams said if drivers would stay sober, slow down and use seat belts, their chances for survival would increase.

"Drivers who speed or are intoxicated pose the greatest threat to law abiding motorists," Adams said. "Some people will insist upon drinking excessively and attempting to drive during this period. We will do our best to remove these individuals from the roads," he said. "If a person drinks, that is his personal business, but if he drives drunk—that's police business."

Adams encouraged motorists who observe drunken drivers to report them to the nearest police agency or Highway Patrol.

IN THE LAST year, which had 365 days or so, I lost my keys 283 times. I found them every time, which ought to be at least a personal record, but it did take two or three days and some help to locate them a time or three.

I think I mentioned once that in our office, I assign four or five persons work to do and assign one person to follow me around to see where I lay things down and walk off and leave them. Even with all those keys, one of my musician acquaintances told me recently that if I could get the right key, I wouldn't have to break into song.

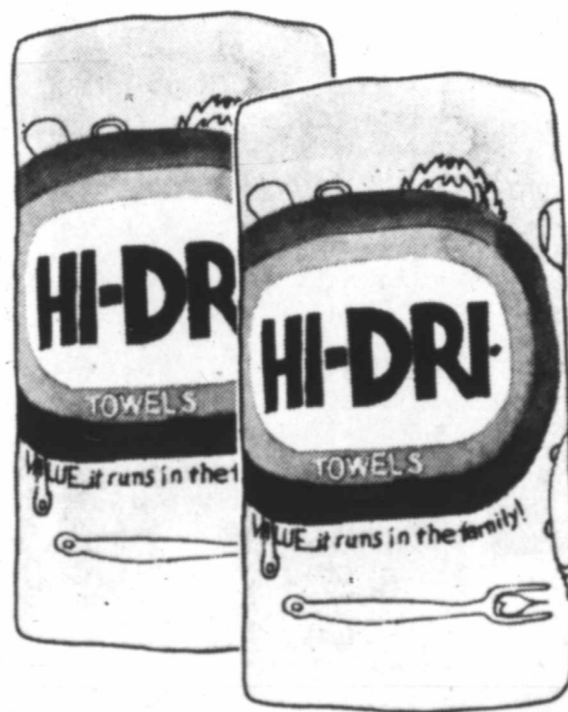

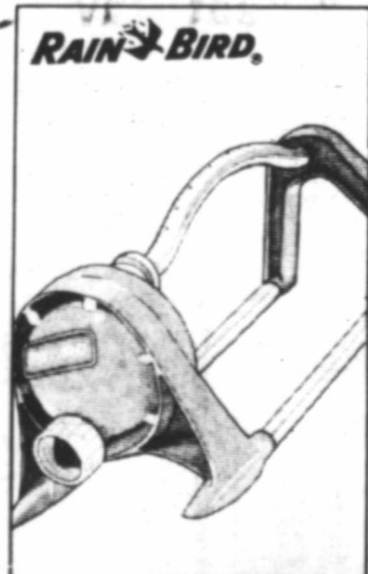

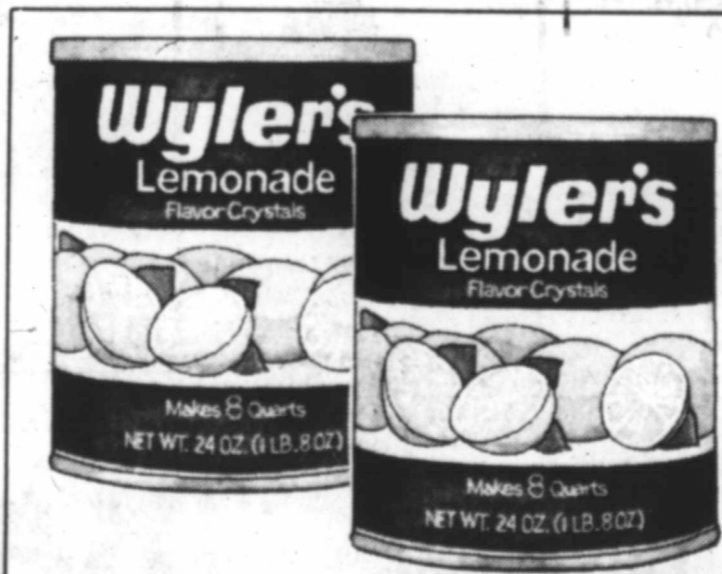
