Sheriff, Commission Races Draw Interest

Lynn County voters will join others throughout Texas Saturday in casting ballots for candidates for office from the county and precinct level on up to the U.S. Senate race.

In this county, primary interest is focused on two contested races, one for the county sheriff and the other for commissioner of Precinct 4. Voters who want to have a say in these three-man races will have to vote in the Democratic primary, where nomination means election, as there are no Republican candidates for the county offices.

Incumbent Sheriff Stanley Krause is seeking his second term in office, and is challenged by Kenneth Cawthron of Rt. 4, Tahoka, and Randy Smith of Wilson.

In the race for commissioner of Precinct 4, the unexpired term of the late E.R. Blakney, two New Home area residents, Leland White and Robert Edwards, and one Tahoka resident, J.T. Miller, are seeking the post.

District 17 U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm is opposed for the Democratic nomination by Noel S. Cowling, who has not campaigned in this area.

Six persons are seeking nomination for the U.S. Senate post vacated by John Tower. They include former U.S. Congressman Kent Hance, Bob Krueger and Lloyd Doggett and three lesser-known candidates.

Four Republican candidates are seeking the U.S. Senate post, including well-known former congressman Phil Gramm. In Lynn County, Republicans will vote Saturday at the Tahoka city hall.

The Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department will maintain the election board this Saturday evening after the polls close. The board will be

set up south of Whitaker Hardware in downtown Tahoka. Democratic polling places in the county are follows, with all polls to be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.:

Officers Here Seek Missing Girl, Age 15

Lynn County sheriff's officers Wednesday asked the public for help in locating a 15-year-old Tahoka girl who has been missing for more than a week.

Officers said Isabel Perez, 5-1, 109 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes, apparently left her home voluntarily sometime during the night Monday, April 23. Although foul play is not considered likely at this time, officers and relatives were concerned because the THS freshman student apparently gave no indication to close friends or brothers or sisters at home that she was leaving, and she has not turned up at the home of any relatives or known acquaintances.

She is the daughter of Jesse Perez of Big Spring and Josephine Atkinson of Tahoka. She left home sometime between 10:30 p.m. April 23 and about 7 the next morning, and none of the family members reported being aware of her leaving. She was wearing a blue shirt and jeans and took no other clothing with her, officers said, although she did take a small amount of cash from the home.

Anyone with any information is asked to call the sheriff's office, 998-4505, or Crime Line, 998-5145, where they can give information without identifying themselves if desired.

Tahoka Police Dept. had one call involving a boy riding a motorcycle. In county jail during the week were one person each for driving while intoxicated, second offense, and revocation of probation.

THS Graduate Montemayor Wins Pulitzer

Robert Montemayor, Tahoka High School and Texas Tech graduate, was part of a group of 15 Los Angeles Times reporters and editors who were awarded the Pulitzer Prize gold medal for meritorious public service, it was announced April 16. Montemayor, who worked on four of the 27 articles in the series, "concerning the impact of Latinos in Southern California," spoke to representatives of the Tech University Daily last week about the excitement

of winning a Pulitzer. Montemayor once was editor of the UD prior to his graduation from Tech in 1975. Montemayor said he heard several days before the official announcement that the group had won the award, but he said he did not really believe it until the official verdict came across the news wire.

He had been up for Pulitzer Prizes twice before for work at the Dallas Times-Herald. One of those times he was told in advance that he was a winner, only to be disappointed when the announcement was made. The Tahoka native went to work for the Times-Herald immediately after graduation from Tech and stayed there 3½ years. He began working

at the San Diego bureau of The L.A. Times in 1978 and moved to Hollywood last August.

He said a key to his success has been that he did not let the fact that he came from a small town stop him from "making it in the big time." "If students there think anybody from a small town in West Texas can't do well, they can't tell me that," he told UD editor Robin Fred.

Chamber Hears WTCC Official

Members of the board of directors and guests of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce met at noon Tuesday in the Pioneer Museum to hear Kirk Woodward of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce who also presented a video taped chamber message.

About 18 persons were present, with President Charles T. Louder presiding.

Woodward told the group that the WTCC has three main thrusts, as follows:

1. Political action—"most of the good and bad things which happen affecting chambers of commerce come from Washington or Austin."
2. Economic development—"This puts money in our pockets."
3. Water needs and a water development plan for West Texas.

Again, I would like to say, please take the time to vote! It is time you start receiving the law enforcement you are paying for.

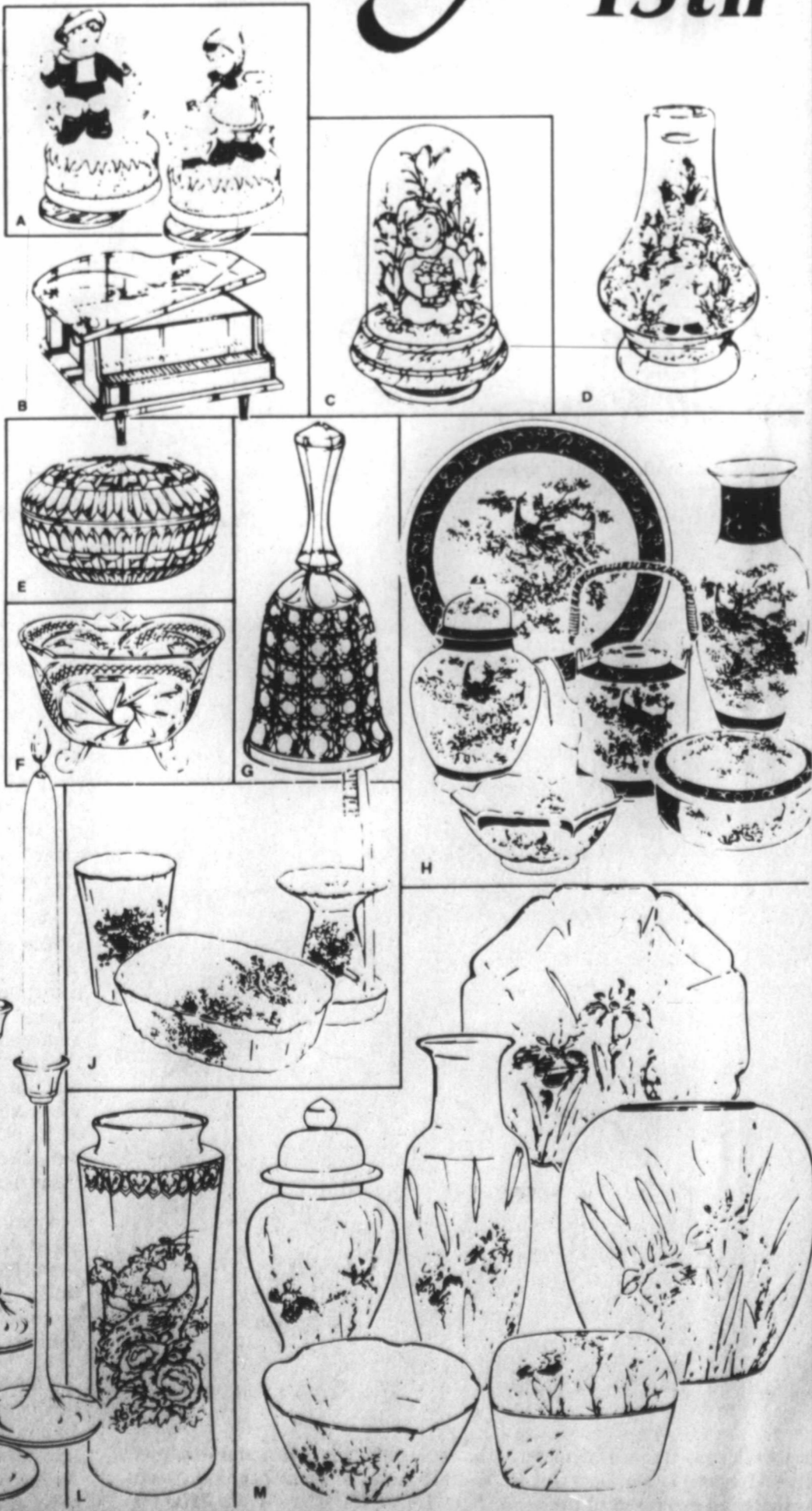

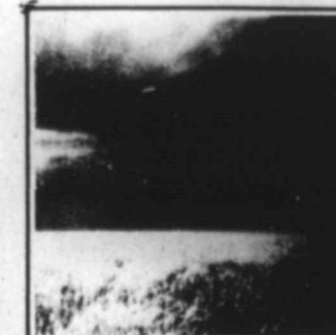


Nan Adams Honored By SWCD

granddaughter of Mrs. Lula Williams Busby, formerly of Draw.

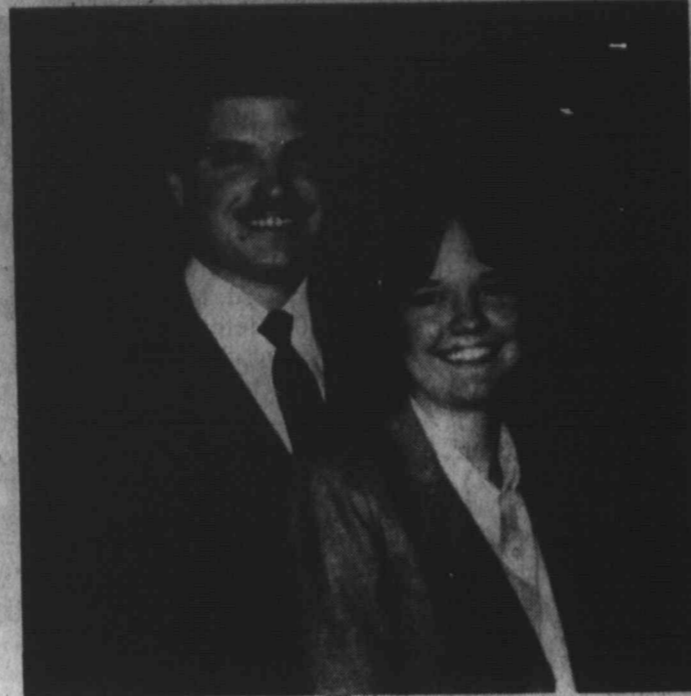

PRESERVING HEIRLOOM TEXTILES—Many heirloom textiles can never be restored to their original condition, but further deterioration can be prevented with proper storage and handling says a clothing specialist. A dark, cool, dry place provides the best storage conditions for heirloom

textiles. When preparing items for storage, do not starch or iron them. Also remove any jewelry or pins, since metal will harm the fabric over time. Vacuuming or using canned aerosol air will help remove dust before storing the fabric. Label and store like things together to reduce later handling.

Then store the textiles flat, with heaviest items on the bottom. Don't use tightly closed plastic containers, since they will retain moisture. Use wood or cardboard drawers and boxes or cardboard tubes instead, and line all containers with unbleached and pre-washed muslin or sheets.

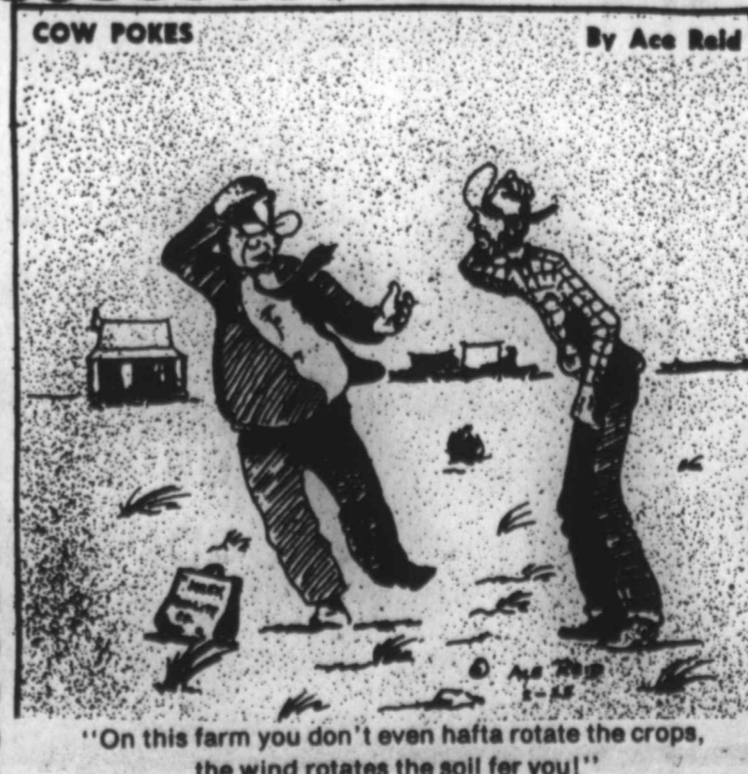

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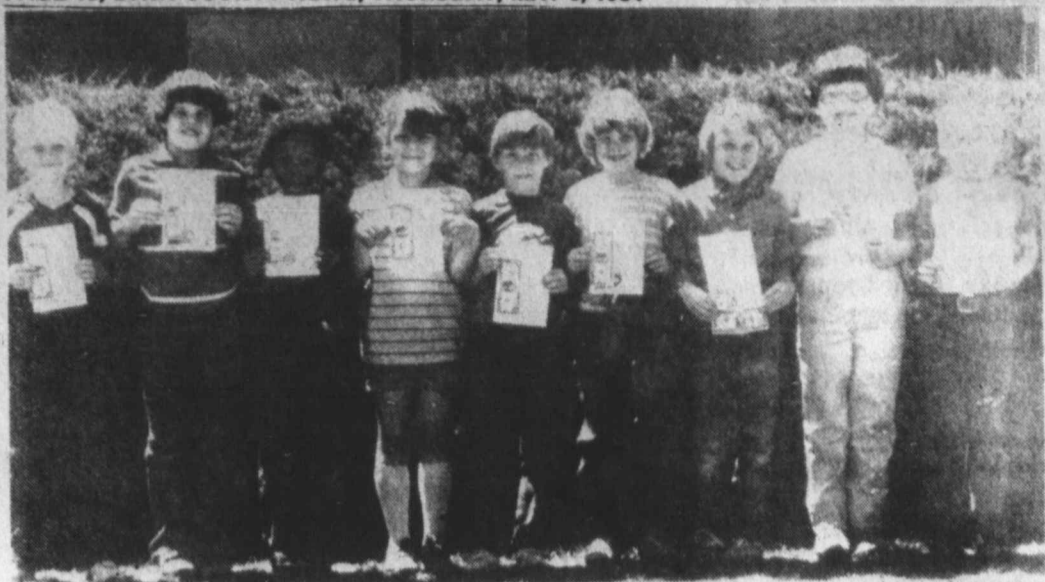

The following represents the breakdown of how each dollar raised last

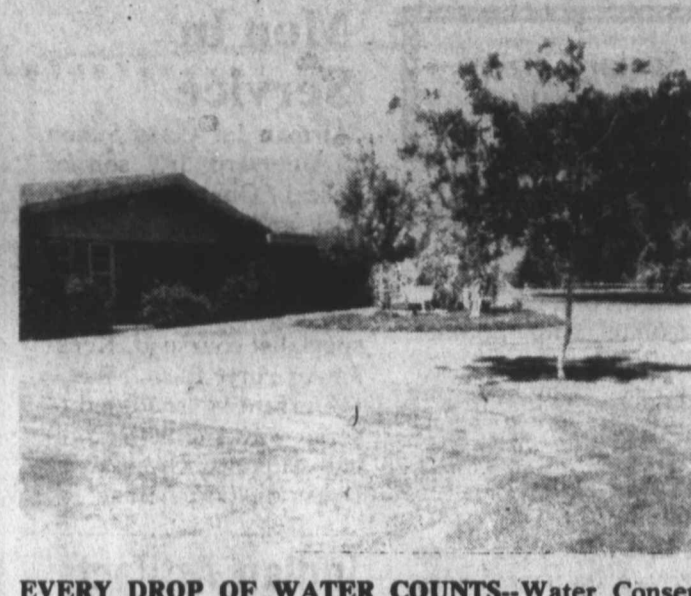

This 108 percent expenditure reflects increased research allocation to Texas by our National Society.

"The ACS is currently sponsoring research investigations in 9 major Texas hospitals, medical schools and universities totaling over \$3.8 million," said Mrs. Turner. "Because Texas has so many research institutions, the National Society allocates additional funds here."

"In spite of severe inflationary trends, we were able to keep tight control over our administrative costs and keep them within acceptable limits as this breakdown indicates," Mrs. Turner commented.

ACS programs such as patient services and rehabilitation (Research to Recovery, I Can Cope, CanSurmount, etc.) public education (films, pamphlets, exhibits, the Great American Smokeout) and professional education for the medical community are mainly administered through the Society's volunteer system. "Volunteer manpower helps maintain these impressive figures," said Mrs. Turner.



EVERY DROP OF WATER COUNTS--Water Conservation is everyone's business. The average city or urban household uses 170 gallons of water per person per day, while the rural household uses half that amount.

Here are some tips for homeowners: Use a broom, not a water hose, to clean driveways and sidewalks.

Water lawns during the cool time of the day. Avoid watering on windy days.

For lawns, use a well-adjusted sprinkler which waters evenly.

For trees and shrubs, use a garden hose, bubbler or drip irrigation system. Deep soak root zones around your plants so roots will grow down.

For vegetables and ornamental plants, use a soaker hose or drip irrigation. Use a mulch to reduce surface evaporation.

Wash your car with a bucket of water; use a water hose only to rinse.

LAUNDRY EQUIPMENT ENERGY COSTS--There's no way to know exactly what it costs to operate home laundry equipment unless you connect a meter to your appliances to measure their actual energy use, says a home economist. Your costs, however, are probably close to the average cost of operating home laundry equipment, which is 20 cents per cycle for an automatic washer; 19 cents per cycle for an electric dryer; and 6 cents per cycle for a gas dryer. Of the energy used to operate a washer, about 10 percent operates the appliance, while the other 90 percent is used to heat the water. By using more cold water washes and rinses, you save energy with your automatic washer and reduce its operating costs.
