## Agriculture Priority Suggested

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford) and 18 other legislators have called on President Reagan to give agricultural trade issues top priority at the upcoming world economic summit.

The lawmakers said unfair trading practices by the European Economic Community have hurt U.S. farm exports, thus depressing American farmers' incomes. New international trade talks are needed to avoid a trade war, the legislators said in a letter to Reagan.

"Export barriers impose a great burden on America's privately controlled agricultural sector, from farmers to grain exporters," according to the letter from 19 members of the Congressional Agricultural Forum, a bipartisan group led by Stenholm and Congressman Pat Roberts (R-Kansas).

The annual world economic summit will be held in London June 7-9. Each year leaders of the major industrialized democracies gather to discuss major economic topics. President Reagan will represent the U.S. at the summit, which last year was held in Williamsburg, Va.

"Too often in the past, agriculture was neglected at these summit meetings," Stenholm said. "Certainly that happened last year at Williamsburg. We just can't afford that any more."

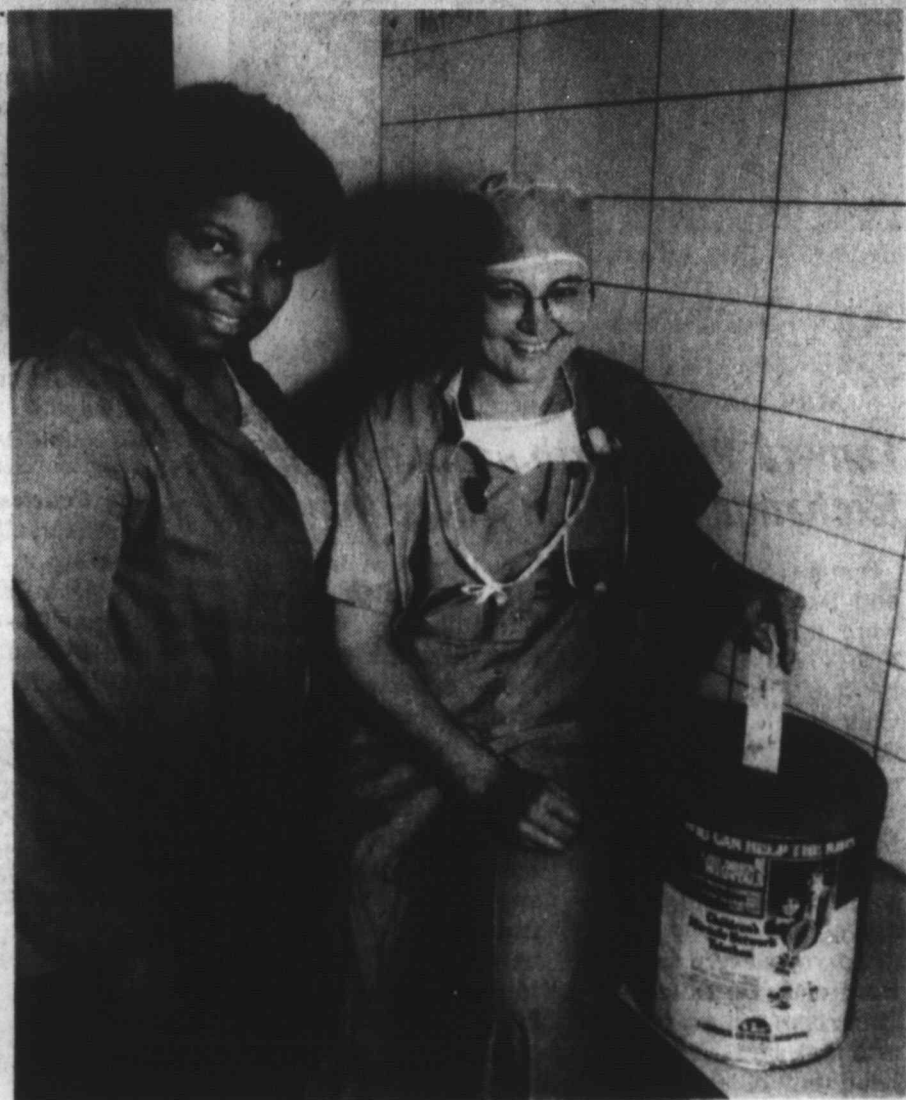
## 17th District Third In Voter Turnout

Voters in the 17th District had the third highest voter turnout in the state during the recent Texas Primary elections, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm said.

"The 17th District had a voter turnout of 32.9 per cent or 92,179 voters," Stenholm said. "District 2, in east Texas had the best record with 111,785 people casting ballots in the primary. In northeast Texas, District 1 had 92,220 voters at the booths for the second best turnout."

Only 25.2 per cent of the registered voters state-wide participated in the May primary, Stenholm said.

The votes in the June 2 Senate run-off could be even higher, officials estimate. "In the 17th District," Stenholm said, "there are

Co-sponsored by the Lubbock General Hospital Foundation and the Texas Tech Medical School Foundation, the telethon will begin Saturday at 8 p.m., June 2 and will continue on until Sunday at 5 p.m. June 3.

"The purpose of the Children's Miracle Network Telethon is not just to entertain, of course," said Dub Rushing, Chairman of the Lubbock General Hospital Foundation, "but to also raise money for hospitals for children and to introduce people to the many specialties these hospitals provide."

The ideology behind the telethon is that hospitals for children treat the whole child, regardless of affliction. Telethon contributions will go toward helping children with all types of diseases such as cancer, muscular diseases, cardiovascular diseases, birth defects and children victimized by accidents.

Unlike most national telethons, 100 percent of the proceeds raised locally by the Children's Miracle Network Telethon stay in the community. In the Channel 11 viewing area, proceeds will benefit Lubbock General's pediatric and neonatal patients through the purchase of costly, life-saving equipment.

Tahoka Dairy Queen is also participating with the entire proceeds from sundaes sold June 2-3 going to the telethon.

## Motorcycle Wreck Hurts Two Persons

Three wrecks were investigated by law enforcement officers in Lynn County during the last week, with six persons suffering injuries, at least two of them serious.

Early Saturday morning, a motorcycle driven by Robert Sosa

On Country Club road just north of 4th St. in Tahoka Thursday night a Chevrolet Blazer driven by Timmy James, 26, of Tahoka, overturned, causing the driver and three passengers cuts and bruises. James, passengers Cheri Bragg, 21, and Melanie Tekell, 22, were treated at Lynn County Hospital and later released. Another passenger was Jim Bragg Jr., 26.

On FM 1054 Monday afternoon about 12.5 miles northeast of Tahoka, a 1983 Ford pickup driven by Preston Hall, 47, was involved in a collision with a 1982 Chevrolet pickup driven by Leslie D. (Pug) Paris, 29, with resulting minor damage and no injuries.

In jail during the week were one person each for reckless conduct and traffic warrant.

Tahoka police were busy during the past week answering several calls that included the thefts of two bicycles, thefts of chickens and breaking of bottles and glass at McCord Motor Co.

Police received two calls on Monday from residents who had reported their bicycles had been stolen from their residences. ## Commissioners Contest Draws County Interest

Voters in Lynn County will return to the polls Saturday to settle runoff elections in three state Democratic races, with those persons living in Lynn County Precinct 4 also to settle the nomination for commissioner of that precinct.

J.T. Miller and Leland White are in a runoff for the Democratic nomination, which means election, since there is no Republican candidate for the Precinct 4 Commissioner job.

Precinct 4 includes New Home and the northwest part of the county and part of the city of Tahoka. In the first primary, Miller led the ticket with 277 votes, while White had 235. A third candidate, Robert Edwards, had 88 votes, enough to require a runoff between White and Miller.

Traditionally turnout of voters is light in a runoff election, and both candidates have expressed concern that too many persons may simply fail to vote.

One race which should help get out the vote Saturday is the statewide runoff between Kent Hance of Lubbock and Lloyd Doggett for the nomination for the U.S. Senate race. The winner of that runoff race will face Republican Phil Gramm in the November election for the seat being vacated by John Tower.

Polls will be open Saturday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in Lynn County.

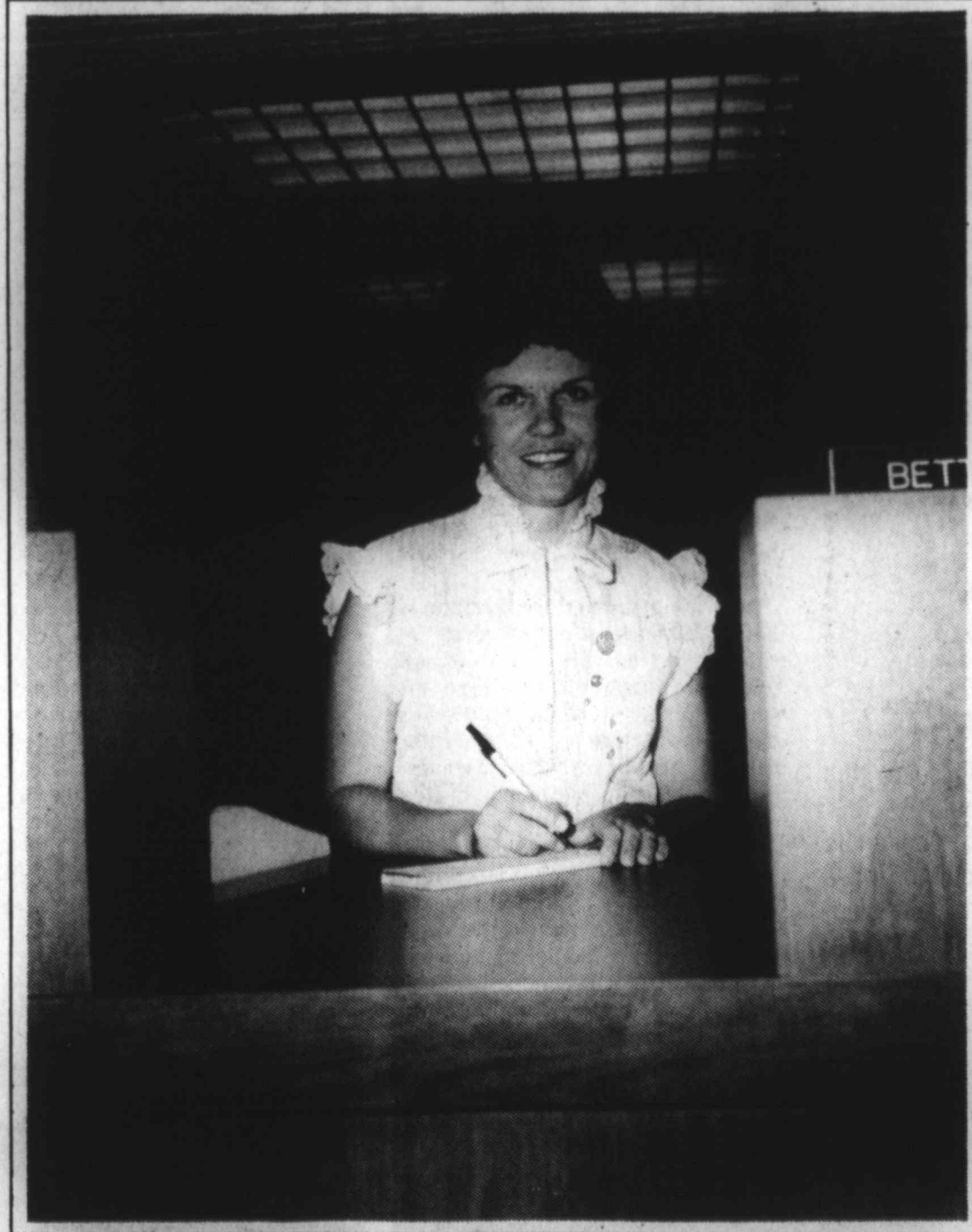

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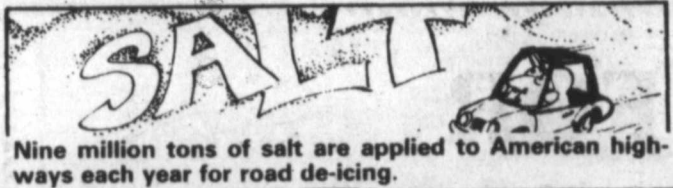

The annual South Plains College Junior Band Camp, open to young musicians throughout the area, is scheduled June 4-8 in the band hall.

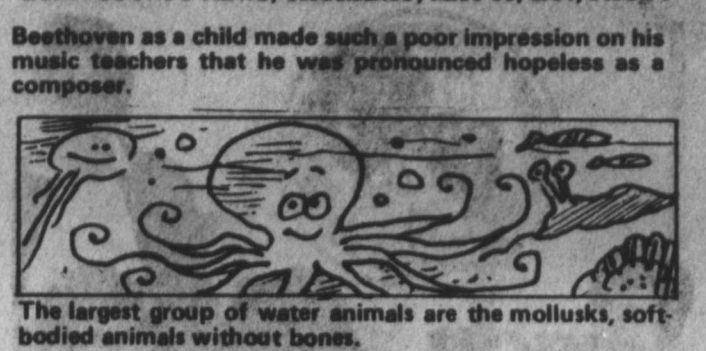

**Motorists Urged To Drive Safely**

Now that school is out and vacation time is here motorists are heading for the road in droves, thus increasing their chances of having unfamiliar driving conditions.

Major V.J. Cawthon, Department of Public Safety Commander of Region 5 said, "When driving in the rural area, slow down before, not after entering a curve. If you wait until it seems urgent to slow down, it is too late. Your engine should be pulling your vehicle through the curve. This pulling force aids in directional control, when you use a safe speed in a curve."

The Major reminds the Texas motorists to be alert to the fact that many people lose their lives within 25 miles of departure and/or destination. This fatal fact of the road is due in great part to abusing the speed laws.

**Home Economics In The '80s**

**Thread Choice Makes Difference**

Selecting the best thread for sewing is an important part of the job of constructing quality fashions at home.

These tips from Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialists will help you take the tangles out of sewing so that it is easier and more fun.

Before you start sewing, check the sewing machine needle. Make sure that you have selected the correct size and point for the weight and type of fabric you are sewing. In both hand and machine sewing, ball point needles are recommended for knits, while regular points are best for woven fabrics.

Be sure to change the machine needle and clean your machine often. Finishes on many synthetic

and blended fabrics tend to dull the needle. They also form lint which clogs the needle's eye and accumulates in the feed dogs and bobbin chamber.

Before you begin to sew on the garment, test your machine stitching. Use a double thickness of your fabric and stitch on the bias. Check the stitch tension and stitch length.

For regular machine stitching, use the same type of thread in both the machine needle and bobbin.

When sewing by hand, cut the thread between 18 and 20 inches long. This gives you plenty of thread to work with. Too much thread will become tangled and get in your way. When using the sewing machine, just as in hand sewing, never break the thread—always use scissors to cut the thread

on an angle so you can thread the needle easily.

When basting, use a slightly contrasting color of thread. If you are sewing a pale green, for example, you might baste with white. Avoid using a strongly contrasting color for basting as it may leave marks when you remove it.

When selecting the right color thread for a particular fabric, choose a slightly darker shade. Thread tends to sew in a little lighter than it appears on the spool.

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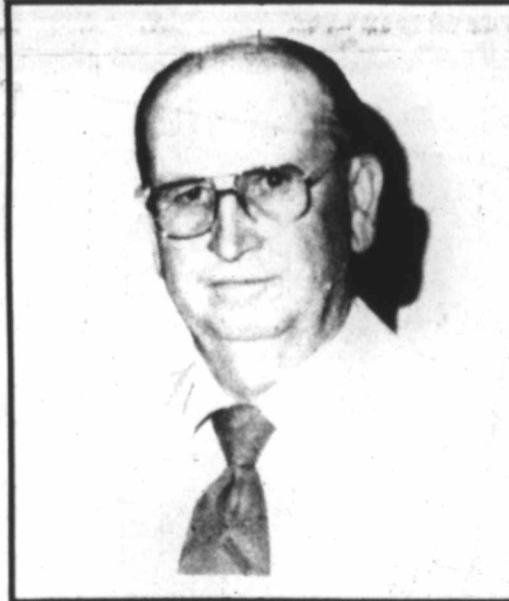

## A Visit With Your County Agent

### TIME TO TREAT FOR CATTLE GRUBS

Cattle grubs are under-cover workers—all their damage is unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests

have already done their damage.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are currently active over most of the state.

The time to control grubs is during the period of May through August when they are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to manage.

Heel flies lay their eggs on animal's hairs in the stomach and leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's skin.

Then they begin a migratory course through the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few months, and after six to eight months, appear in the grub stage in the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd, Young recommends treating each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide during the May through August period.

Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulate throughout the body, and kill grubs while they are small.

These insecticides come in various forms—dips, pour-ons, injections and spot-on treatments. A listing of approved insecticides and methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the county Extension office.

### FROM THE CEA'S DESK BY GREG HENLEY

Leadership has always been an important part of the 4-H program. Now with new guidelines and emphasis, the leadership project will be even more important to 4-H'ers in the future.

The purpose of the 4-H leadership project is to teach life skills necessary for effective leadership and to provide individual practice suggestions for members to use to practice these life skills, says Greg Henley, county 4-H program coordinator.

The project is based on the rationale that every person needs leadership skills during his lifetime—to become a leader or have control in his own personal life, to provide leadership as parents and in families, and to provide leadership in groups. These same skills also make it possible to be a good follower and group member when these roles need to be assumed.

The 4-H leadership project is further based on the rationale that boys and girls are assuming leadership roles even before they reach 4-H by being captains of teams, providing leadership to classrooms and in their peer groups, and the development of leadership life skills can begin as soon as a boy or girl joins 4-H at the age of nine.

These life skills can continue to be developed and improved through the teen years and into adulthood. The development of these skills will enhance a young person's ability to function in all groups in which he or she is a member, Henley says.

Lastly, this project is based on the rationale that every person has potential leadership ability and that leadership skills can be learned. "Leaders are made, not born..."

## COTTON TODAY

**Council Board To Meet:** National Cotton Council directors will hold their Spring meeting May 22 at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis, with Board Chairman Gerald B. Brewer, Fresno, Calif., presiding.

Council President Duke Barr, Oak Ridge, La., will lead off reports to the Board. Other industry leaders reporting will be L. Sykes Martin, Producer Steering Committee chairman, Courtland, Ala.; Frank M. Mitchener Jr., chairman of the Committee for the Advancement of Cotton, Sumner, Miss.; Tommy Funk, president of the Cotton Foundation, Harlingen, Tex.; and Samuel B. Hollis, Finance Committee chairman, Memphis.

Directors also will hear from staff leaders and from Maid of Cotton Valerie Bendall, who will have just returned from a 40-day fashion and good-

will tour of Europe and the Far East.

**Korea Gets Credit:** USDA has approved an additional \$100 million in GSM-102 export credit guarantees to South Korea for purchase of U.S. cotton. Terms are for 24 months, with registration and shipments to be completed by Sept. 30, 1984.

The approval came after a Korean delegation, accompanied by Cotton Council International officials, met with government leaders in Washington. The group also called on Western Cotton Shippers in Fresno, Calif.; AMCOT in Bakersfield; Texas Cotton Shippers in Dallas; and American Cotton Shippers and the National Cotton Council in Memphis.

**Reasonable Guidelines Urged:** Wayne Martin, chairman of the National Cotton Council's task force on cottonseed oil-

pesticide use, has urged the Environmental Protection Agency to issue reasonable guidelines regarding cottonseed oil's use as a carrier for pesticides.

The Lubbock crusher said there is no evidence that cottonseed oil's use as a carrier causes any adverse health effects. Its use in place of water would result in smaller

amounts of pesticides being introduced into the environment, and would also expand cottonseed oil markets, he added.
