## Budget Requests Heard By County

County Commissioners Monday interviewed department heads regarding their budget needs for the next year, asking questions of most of them about why they needed more for the coming year.

The commissioners will take the budget requests and work out a budget later.

Other than that, the commissioners took little official action Monday, deciding to wait on most items until further developments or investigation.

No bids were received on an old

photostat machine no longer used by the county, and only one bid was received on re-roofing the courthouse.

Discussed without action were pauper burials in the county and the possibility of drilling a well for watering the courthouse lawn.

The group did vote to authorize Judge J.F. Brandon to attend a probate workshop in Dumas July 26-27.

Present were commissioners Boyd Barnes, Bart Anderson and Eldon Gattis. Absent was Nell Blakney.

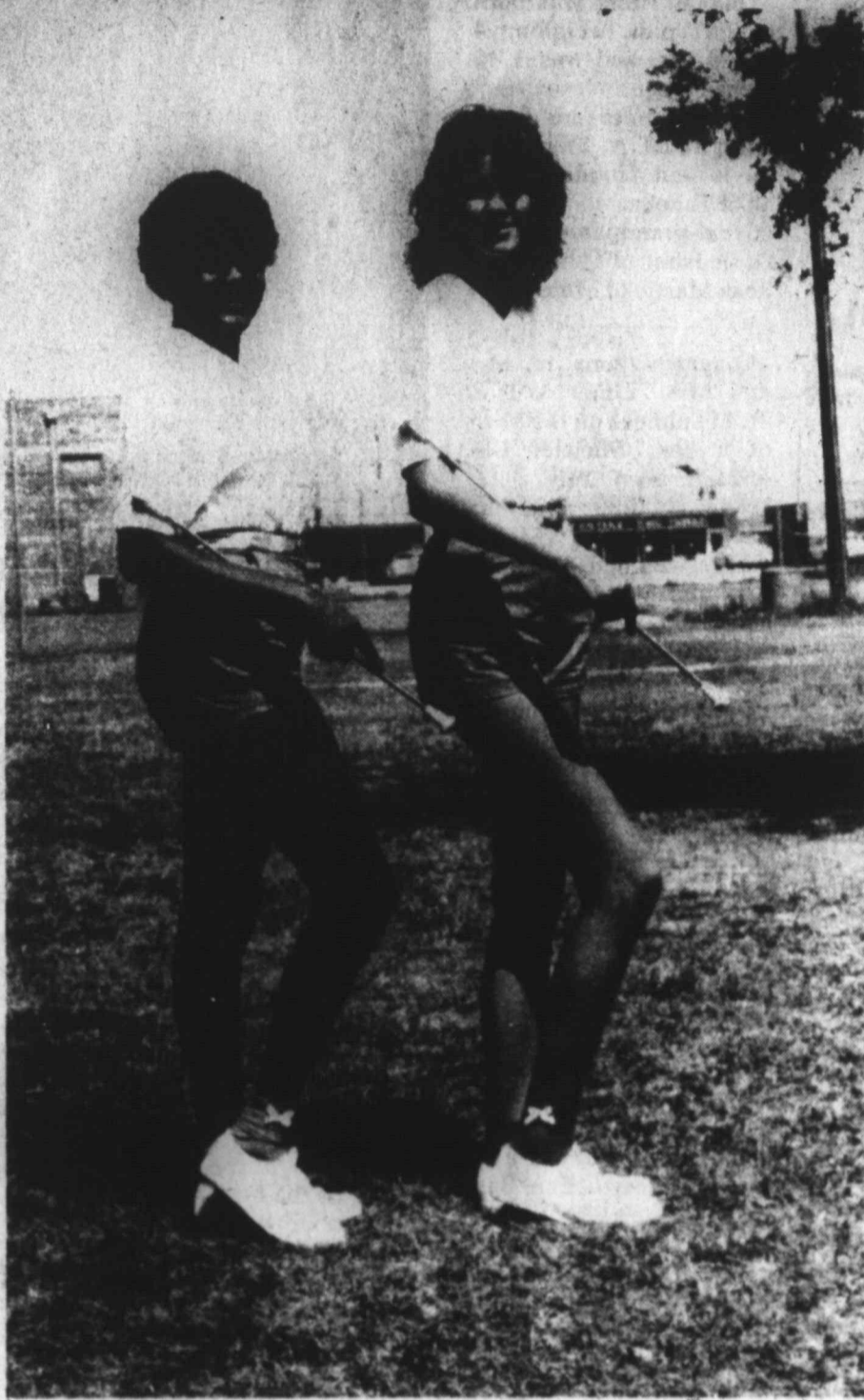
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FINALLY the Olympics games

## Another Wilson Area Home Is Burglarized

Another home in the Wilson area was reported burglarized during the last week, but one suspect in three earlier burglaries in the county was in jail in Lubbock this week.

Darrow Talkmitt of Wilson reported his home 2.5 miles southwest of Wilson was burglarized Monday evening between 8 and 10 p.m., with items totaling \$2141 in value stolen, including an MCS component stereo system valued at \$1600. Also stolen were an RCA color TV set, some knives, a .22 caliber Ruger pistol and four packages of meat from a freezer.

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$500 reward in the Talkmitt burglary.

In jail in Lubbock this week was Odell Ward, 31, charged with burglary in Lubbock County. Impounded was a tan Cadillac which had been identified in connection with some Lynn County burglaries; two of them near Wilson. Officers are seeking two other suspects.

In jail during the week were one person each for public intoxication and contempt of court.

A 1983 Pontiac owned by Joe Childress of Tahoka was struck by a 1971 Buick driven by Shan Delane Underwood of Tahoka on a parking lot on Lockwood Sunday.

A 33-year-old Tahoka woman pleaded guilty July 12 of a charge of "annoying communications" after another Tahoka woman complained she had received threatening calls. The woman was fined by County

Judge J.F. Brandon and assessed a 90-day probated term.

## Absentee Voting On Bingo Starts

Absentee voting on the bingo legalization election in Justice of the Peace Precinct 4 of Lynn County began Monday and will continue through Aug. 8.

Voters in the election were reminded that they must show their registration receipts before voting absentee--or at the polls on Aug. 11.

Voting will be in three boxes in the county, including the one at O'Donnell, one at New Moore and the Southwest Tahoka box. All absentee ballots must be picked up at the courthouse.

## Judge Candidate Stops In Tahoka

Judge Virgil E. Mulanax, Republican nominee for Place 1, Court of Criminal Appeals, was in Tahoka Monday promoting his statewide campaign. He spoke to a group of persons at First National Bank Community Room, after being delayed about an hour in Lamesa with car trouble.

"I am concerned that this extremely important position does not receive the attention it deserves by the voter," said Mulanax, now a district judge, from Gilmer. "This is our state's highest court for appeal of criminal candidates.

"My opponent's name is Sam Houston Clinton. The catchy name has lured the uninformed voter in this low visibility race. This name appears to be my opponent's greatest asset. I suppose some Texans feel they have been good citizens when they cast their vote for this good Texas name. How else could a former American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) lawyer with a record of voting for the criminal be elected in Texas?"

Judge Mulanax is only the second Republican in recent history to campaign for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. By his campaign, Judge Mulanax hopes to give voters in the general election a conservative option.

"My opponent says he rejects the characterization that he is a liberal who finds ways to reverse criminal cases on a technicality," said Judge Mulanax. "However, Texas Monthly reports that Clinton has voted to reverse two of every three cases in which a written opinion is given. This record seems to support his characterization as a liberal."

Judge Mulanax, 46, has served since January 1975 as 115th District Court Judge in Upshur and Marion counties.

## Higher Fees On Car Sale, Registration Set

The Texas legislature has increased the motor vehicle tax to 5 percent effective Aug. 1. Except for sales contracts signed before Aug. 1, any title dated thereafter will be taxed at the new rate. Rates for gift, eventrade or resident taxes did not change.

Vehicle registration fees also will change effective Aug. 1 due to House Bill 122 which was signed by Gov. Mark White on July 13. New rates will not apply to July renewals or title applications supported by certificates of origin or out-of-state titles if postmarked or received prior to Aug. 1.

Any renewals (including July renewals) and title applications postmarked or received after July 31 shall be registered under the new fee schedule.

The annual license fee for a passenger car, city bus, or private bus will be based on the manufacturer's model year or weight in

pounds if the vehicle weighs more than 6,001 pounds. Motorcycle and moped fee schedules may also be obtained through the county tax assessor.

The accompanying schedule shows what passenger car fees will apply.

## EFFECTIVE August 1, 1984 SCHEDULE OF REGISTRATION FEES PASSENGER CARS, CITY BUSES and PRIVATE BUSES

The annual license fee for a passenger car, city bus, or private bus shall be based on the manufacturer's model year or weight in pounds, as the case might be, of the vehicle as follows:

MODEL YEAR OR WEIGHT IN POUNDS	FEE
78 AND OLDER MODELS	\$28.30
79, 80 AND 81 MODELS	\$38.30
82 AND NEWER MODELS	\$46.30
6,001 LBS. AND OVER (irrespective of model year)	\$12.50 PLUS 60¢ CWT PLUS 30¢

The weight of any passenger car for purposes of registration shall be the weight generally accepted as its correct shipping weight plus one hundred pounds.

"Passenger Car" as defined by law means any motor vehicle other than a motorcycle, or a bus transporting persons for compensation or hire, designed or used primarily for the transportation of persons.

Talk about hot! Epic Records is smoking these days with four of the top-selling records in the country. In addition to Culture Club's "Karma Chameleon" and Michael Jackson's "Thriller," the label also boasts Nena's "99 Luftballons" and Cyndi Lauper's "Girls Just Want To Have Fun."

The only label as hot as Epic at the moment seems to be Warners, with the top-selling Van Halen and his smash, "Jump," plus two sizzling albums, one by Van Halen, "1984," and the other by The Pretenders, "Learning To Crawl." Indeed the WEA Group of labels, which includes Atlantic, Asylum, Elektra, Geffen, Sire and, of course, Warner Bros., boast eight of the top 25 best-selling albums in the country.

Things seem to be picking up with the record business, as evidenced by a total of 20 platinum and gold record album certifications by the Recording Industry Association of America... Incidentally, in terms of gold, there's one company that has more chart releases than any other. If you guessed it was 3M, you'd be right. Its Scotch brand recording tape is used virtually universally for the mastering of recordings. So the next hit you hear probably



had its first hearing on Scotch brand audio tape. Speaking of first hearings, Roger Daltrey, former member of Who, has a new album, "Parting Should be Painless." Golden Earring, a Dutch group, offers hard rock in "N.E.W.S." A newly released Elvis album contains five excerpts from live "Louisiana Hayride" appearances in the years 1955-56.

In country music, David Fizzell and Shelly West have a new album, "In Session;" Johnny Lee offers "Til the Bars Burn Down;" Gus Hardin comes through with "Fallen Angel;" Don Williams offers the "Best of Don Williams, Vol. III;" and Mac Davis presents "Soft Talk."

Finally, former Mouseketeer princess Annette Funicello is about to release her first country album on Star-view Records, titled: "The Annette Funicello Country Album."

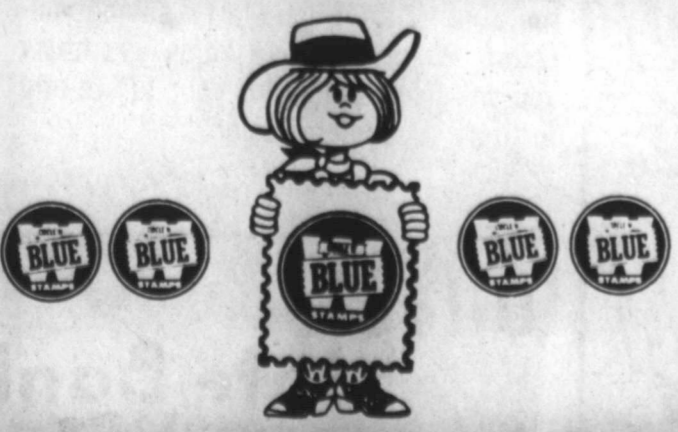

LITTLE-KNOWN FACTS  
Why You Can't Quit Smoking



Nicotine addiction is the main reason most people who'd like to kick the cigarette habit can't. A new prescription-only chewing gum that contains nicotine is helping many smokers over the hurdle of quitting.

Have you tried to quit smoking and failed? You're not alone. Surveys show that more than half of the 56 million adult U.S. smokers have tried to quit one or more times and failed. A 1980 survey indicated that only 20 percent of the 17 million Americans who tried to quit that year—almost one-third of all smokers—considered themselves successful, even short-term. If you've tried and failed, you may have considered yourself "weak-willed"—it's a feeling many smokers who can't seem to quit share. That's probably not true, however, experts say.

While social and psychological factors appear to be most important in determining who takes up smoking, these factors alone are no longer believed to account for why people continue to smoke and cannot quit. Here's the real reason: the nicotine delivered by cigarette smoking is a potent drug which is now known to be physically addictive. Research has demonstrated that quitting smoking can produce withdrawal symptoms similar to those seen in people who are addicted to other drugs.

Called Nicorette (nicotine resin complex), from Merrell Dow Pharmaceuticals Inc., it's a new prescription drug in chewing gum form. It is considered to be effective in helping smokers quit. Used successfully in Canada for several years, the gum releases small amounts of nicotine in the mouth that help the smoker overcome cigarette addiction. While it's not for everyone, in clinical trials, Nicorette, when used as an adjunct to a formal smoking cessation program, has demonstrated long-term success rates of 40 percent or more. That's welcome news to many smokers, and your doctor can tell you more about it.

If the gum is chewed too fast, the effects can be similar to those experienced when a person smokes a cigarette too fast. Most of these side effects are controlled by chewing more slowly. Nicorette is contraindicated in women who are or may become pregnant, in nursing mothers and in certain other conditions.

**AG CHEMICAL SITUATION**—Farmers should have a good arsenal of agricultural chemicals available for their 1984 crop season, notes an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Supplies of pesticides, fertilizers and fuels are holding steady for the current crop season although pesticide usage is increasing as field crop acreage rises. Also, total fertilizer use on field crops is expected to climb 17 percent this year despite an overall rise in fertilizer prices. Farm energy usage is expected to be up 10 percent this year due to increased crop acreage.
