Show officials said Tuesday that the total from the sale was nearing \$50,000.

Added to the traditional steers, lambs, barrows, baked goods, and broilers, with large numbers in these events, a barrow show for youngsters under nine years of age was staged with every participant receiving a blue ribbon.

Shawn Ballard of New Home 4-H exhibited the grand champion steer, a Cross-bred; Kris Belew of Tahoka 4-H showed the grand champion lamb, a heavy weight Suffolk.

In the crowded barrow show, Kyle James' heavy weight Hampshire won the grand champion award for the New Home FFA member.

Jana Wuensche of Wilson FFA won the grand champion honors in the broiler event and Craig Wuensche, Wilson FFA, won the reserve grand.

Kris Belew of Tahoka 4-H won the baked good grand championship with a German chocolate cake; and Bruce Cook of O'Donnell 4-H won reserve championship with a pecan pie.

Stenholm Cites Needs For New Farm Bill

Farmers cannot continue to produce more than the market will bear, and the 1985 farm bill needs to address ways to take some acreage out of production as well as put some emphasis on selling the product, U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm told a group of farmers and other citizens at a meeting of Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday.

The popular congressman for the 17th district, which includes Lynn County, received a standing ovation from the crowd of about 75 club members, wives and other guests at the meeting held at noon in Fellowship Hall of First United Methodist Church.

Many farmers were in the audience as Stenholm, who lives in Stamford when he's not in Washington, said the 1985 farm bill which Congress is about to tackle must meet three criteria: "It must be budget responsible, it must improve net farm income; and it must be passable."

On the budget angle, the Democratic member of the House of Agriculture Committee emphasized that "we must do something about our national deficit. You can live beyond your means only so long; there comes a time when the chickens come home to roost." He added that spending "absolutely must be cut straight across the board, except for those programs helping the elderly poor." He pointed out that this means spending on farm programs also must be cut.

He said the farm program must in some way rescue as many of the family farmers in the nation as possible, but warned that "we're not going to be able to save everybody."

Expanding his comment that the farm bill must be passable, he explained that no farm program would do any good if the Congress and the President refuse to

go along with it. Stenholm, who also is a member of the House Small Business Committee, discussed briefly some suggested alternatives to the farm program which have been mentioned often in recent weeks, and why he does not believe most of them would work.

Noting that one suggested option is to fine-tune the existing farm program, Stenholm said he didn't think farmers wanted more of the same thing they've had in a farm program. Suggestions of free markets and man-

datory controls also were labled as "dreaming" by the congressman, who said neither of these ideas would work.

He observed that mandatory controls on production coupled with high loans would not work because it didn't work with OPEC in the oil industry. He also said the free market concept is idealistic, because "the American farmer cannot survive without government programs." He mentioned that he recently was in Europe to study farm programs and quickly learned that food costs in the United States are

cheaper than anywhere else in the world, "but we don't appreciate it."

Stenholm said he favors the "market-oriented supply management" approach to solving the farmers' problems, which means some kind of plan to cut production back and get a good price for what is grown. He suggested a lower loan guarantee, but support for domestic consumption of cotton at a fair price, mentioning a figure of 81 cents per pound. "Let's admit we cannot farm every acre of every farm and expect a good

price, because we have a production capability greater than the market will bear," Stenholm asserted. "We must target a farm program to help those growers grossing from \$40,000 to \$200,000 a year," rather than the very largest farmers, he said, meaning a limit on how much government aid one farmer can receive.

"I think the 1985 program will contain some kind of conservation feature—a second cousin to the soil bank," Stenholm predicted.

He also said the U.S. tax code should not be structured so as to encourage outsiders to get into farming for tax write-off purposes rather than for the profit-motive.

In a question-answer session, the congressman commented on the uproar caused by the new rule requiring auto mileage records on vehicles used for business.

"We saw some abuses in this area and instead of taking a rifle and aiming it at the offenders, we took a shotgun and fired it at everybody in sight," he said. He added that a meeting is scheduled Feb. 3 to consider some easing of the requirements of a daily log on vehicles.

Accompanying Stenholm to Tahoka was an aide, Dale King of Stamford.

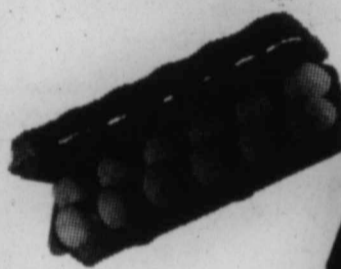

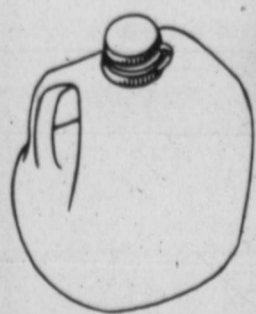

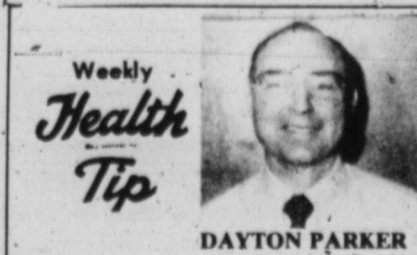
Don B. and Clint Rudd of Bedford were here Friday until Sunday with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E.M. Rudd and family.

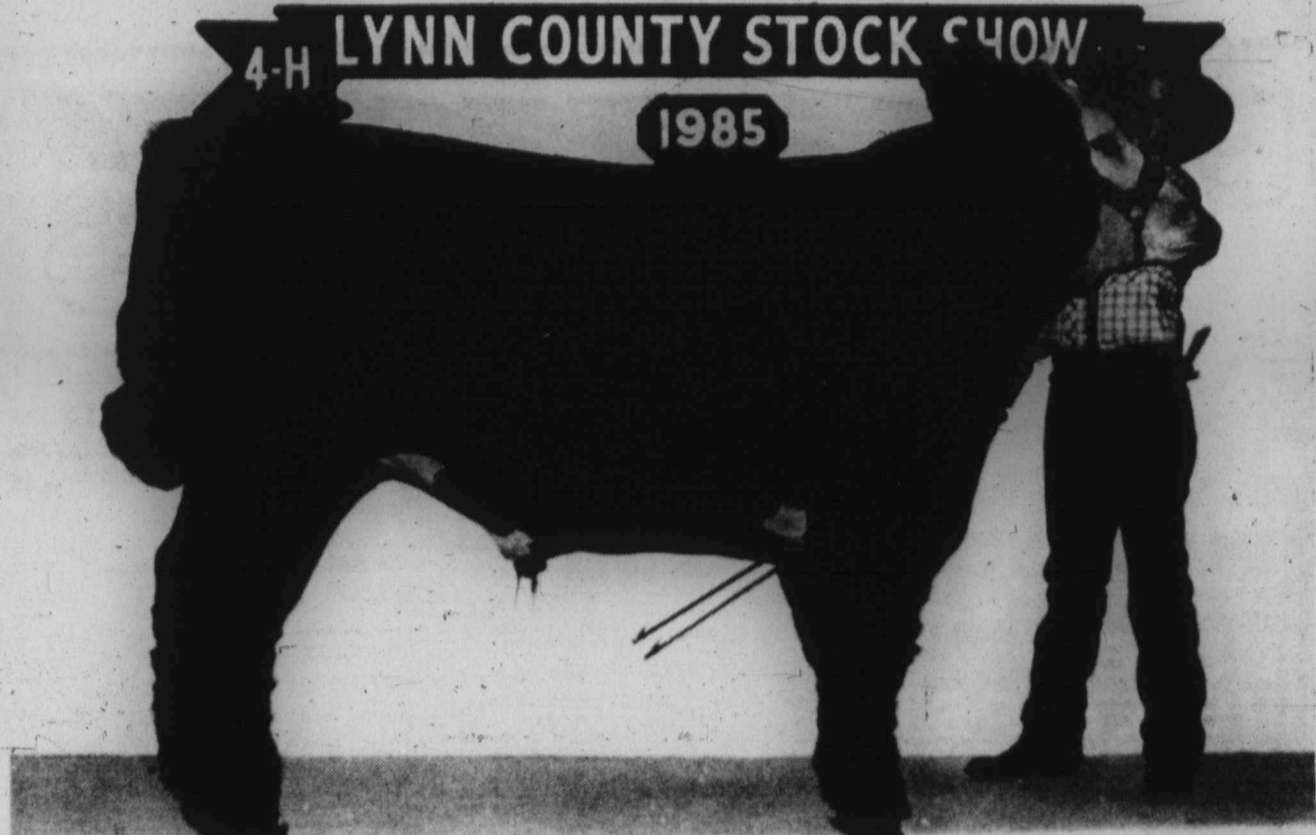
