Plans For Work On New Cemetery Given Approval

Plans for preliminary surveying and other work on part of a proposed new cemetery for the city were given approval Monday night by Tahoka City Council, after representatives of the Cemetery Assn. met with the council to explain what they would like to do at this stage of the project.

Also approved were proposals for erecting an archway at the entrance to the new cemetery, some fencing, and landscaping. Money for these projects has been donated.

Representing the Cemetery Assn. at the meeting were Nadine Dunlap and Edward Bartley.

City councilmen also passed a resolution supporting Amendments 1 and 2 on the November referendum ballot. These amendments relate to a statewide water

plan, and Mayor Jim Solomon commented that "the people in West Texas particularly need to go vote for these amendments."

In other action Monday night the council voted to retain Love, Hays & Schaffner as the auditing firm for the city's finances during a six-month period ending Sept. 30. Also approved were some housing assistance applications under a federally funded program.

Police Chief Gary Morrison reported to the council that during the last two months, the department issued 27 citations, 38 warning tickets--many in the school area--and investigated 14 accidents, 23 disturbance calls, two assaults, two driving while intoxicated, one theft and some other incidents.

Three Arrested In Sex Crimes

Three men were arrested and jailed in the last week in separate sex crimes in Lynn County, the latest being the arrest of a 30-year-old man in Lubbock Tuesday evening after a young woman reported being robbed and sexually abused at her residence west of New Home earlier in the day.

James Ray Evans, 30, whose address was listed as New Home, was arrested by Lubbock County authorities near the Panhandle South Plains fairgrounds about 6:30 p.m. after the car of the alleged victim was sighted.

Evans was charged with aggravated robbery and was to be returned to Lynn County Wednesday for filing of additional charges of sexual abuse, according to Sheriff Stanley Krause. Krause also said he would recommend that bond be set at \$100,000.

The victim of the assault said she was alone in her residence about 3 p.m. Tuesday, taking a bath, when someone knocked on the door. She said she called out that she would answer the door in a minute, but heard no response. The man forced the door open,

forced her at gunpoint into a bedroom and forced her to commit a sexual act, according to officers' reports. He then allegedly tied her, took \$60 and the woman's car and left. Officers said Evans did not know the woman.

The suspect, Evans, is a convicted male prostitute, according to officers.

Edward Gutierrez, 26, of Gail, was in jail this week on charges of sexual abuse of a young woman with a mental handicap. The incident allegedly occurred in an O'Donnell residence on Oct. 5. The victim is in her late teens.

A 23-year-old Tahoka man posted \$10,000 bond after being arrested on charges of indecency with a child, a 16-year-old Lubbock girl. Charged was Bryan Lowell Harston of Tahoka, arrested Oct. 3 by sheriff's officers.

According to the girl's statement, the incident occurred at the home of the suspect on Sept. 27.

Others in Lynn County jail during the week were one person each for driving while intoxicated, second offense; DWI third offense and bond forfeiture; and public intoxication and disorderly conduct.

Tahoka police issued three tickets for running stop sign, four for speeding and 10 warning tickets in the last week. Police also advised they have stored a bicycle found in the city, and anyone missing a bike should call the department with a description.

Wagon Train May Bring 1,000 Visitors To Tahoka

1986 is Texas' 150th birthday. The Texas Wagon Train Association is planning a historic wagon train tour that will circle the state of Texas for six months in 1986. The wagon train will cover over 2,800 miles and will visit more than 100 communities, including Tahoka and O'Donnell.

The train will leave Sulphur Springs on Jan. 2, traveling south through Houston, Austin, Corpus Christi, then will be moving up to San Antonio, and west to Ft. Stockton and El Paso then to Odessa, Midland, Lubbock, Amarillo, Abilene, Wichita Falls, ending the route on July 4 at the Fort Worth Stock Yards. Tahoka will be the host for the Wagon Train on Thursday, May 8, upon the train's arrival from O'Donnell.

Tahoka's Sesquicentennial committee met in August with spokesperson Nadine Dunlap presiding. Special guest was Mrs. Jan France, the Executive Direc-

tor of the Sesquicentennial Wagon Train. Mrs. France will be driving the lead wagon of the train.

Lots of Visitors
According to Mrs. France 150 wagons and 300 horseriders will ride into Tahoka sometime after noon on May 8, make a circle around the courthouse square and form two circles of 75 wagons each at the campsite. West Texas Industries has offered the use of their cotton compress yard for the campsite.

Tahoka will be asked to furnish water for livestock and people, an EMT unit, and shower facilities, ice and fire wood (approximately 2 trailer loads of mesquite).

Approximately 500 support vehicles could be traveling with the wagon train, as each horseback rider and wagon is allowed a support unit.

This means more than 1,000 persons may be with the wagon

train.

Tentative plans of the local committee are a barbecue allowing Tahokans to sit around the train campfires, a flag ceremony, a calf or steer roping, musicians and talent to add to a short program by wagon train participants. Wagons and authentic pioneer dress will be judged by local community members, and the school and businesses will be asked to also decorate and promote special projects celebrating the Birthday of Texas.

Math Bartley and Steve Miller will serve as local camp jacks. Working behind the scenes will be other Sesquicentennial committee members--Chief of Police Gary Morrison, City Manager Carl Reynolds, County Judge J.F. Brandon, Chamberette member Dean Bartley, County Agent Stanley Young, and local teacher Leah Taylor, as well as numerous other Chamberettes and community leaders.

Local individuals who wish to be an actual participant on the wagon train by driving a wagon, or buggy or as a horseback rider should pick up registration papers and a list of rules and regulations from Mrs. Dunlap at the Mirror or at City Hall.

Registration fees are \$15 per person or \$25 per family. Participants may apply to travel for short distances as well as the entire trip with 50 places reserved for the short distance participants. In order to receive an official certificate of participation, participants must travel from at least one campsite to another. No one will be allowed to travel any distance without being officially registered.

Committee members said, "All community members are invited to become a part of this endeavor. Planning is in the early stages and ideas and workers are needed." Any business or individual may serve as an official

sponsor if goods or services are donated.

Well-Known Helpers
Walt Garrison is the Honorary State Wagonmaster. Billy Bob Barnett and Tom Landry are assistant Wagonmasters. Official state sponsors are Wrangler, Copenhagen-Skoal and Skoal Bandits, Western State Bank of Denton, Billy Bob's Texas, Ft. Worth Stockyards, Glen's Sporting Goods of Irving, WBAP/820 of Dallas-Fort Worth, Morrison Milling Company, Valley Ranch Cowboys Center, Grandy's.

The wagon train will also be a travelling school with certified teachers for those children whose parents or grandparents will be making the entire trip.

Any tax deductible donations will be kept on record. Donations may be made to the General or Education Fund to specifically support the travelling school.

The Texas Wagon Train Assn. is a non-profit organization and will rely on official sponsors, private donations, registration fees, and the sale of wagon train souvenirs to fund this historic event.

All other states of the Union have been invited to send a representative wagon or rider. Many towns, cities, and counties are planning their Sesquicentennial celebrations around the wagon train's arrival in their area.

"The wagon train, authentically recreated to represent the wagon trains that brought our pioneer ancestors to Texas, will be an important part of one of the largest celebrations ever, and it is expected to be the world's largest wagon train ever," said a state committee member.

Refreshments were served by Stacy Adams, Cory Whitley, Jeff Brooks, Jason Belew and Leah DeLeon.






High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Met Sept. 19 In Lubbock
