Contests For Seats Will Be Decided On Saturday

Contests for places on school boards and city governing bodies in several Lynn County elections are expected to generate a fair turnout of voters Saturday.

There also is a contest for three places on the Lynn County Hospital Board, with four candidates seeking the places available in this county-wide vote. The candidates for hospital board are Jimmie Lou Tejada of Tahoka, Dale Zant of Wilson, Billy Tomlinson of Tahoka and Roger Doss of O'Donnell.

Running for Wilson school board are Woody Follis, Antonio (Tony) Villarreal, Lowen Young, Robert Abbe, Gary Russell Moore, Donald Klaus and James Wuensche. These seven candidates are seeking three available spots.

Six persons are seeking three places on the Tahoka school board. They are Mike Huffaker, Wesley Boone, Billy Davis, Carroll Rhodes, Bettye Green and Joe Hays.

Lonette Smith, Dwayne Smith and Kay James are running for two spots on the New Home school board.

O'Donnell has no contests in either school board or city elections. Seeking the three school board places are Larry Moore, Kenneth Eaker and Bobby Joe Furlow. The first two are incumbents. A third incumbent, Rober Bessire, did not seek reelection.

The O'Donnell city election has Mayor Truett Hodnett and councilmen Bill Klopton and Bobby Knight seeking reelection.

New Home has David Gandy, Roy Blevins, Gayland James and Harold Nettles vying for three places on the city governing body.

Unopposed in Wilson's city election are Virginia Gatzki and Lupe Arellano.

Seven persons are in a battle for three places on the Tahoka City Council. They are Dayton Parker, Danny Preston, Leonard Dunn, Kathy Dorman, Wayne Tekell, Rudy Tejada Sr. and

Nicky Summitt. Only Summitt is now on the board; he was appointed to fill an unexpired term. Terms of H.B. McCord and Richard White also are expiring, but they did not file for reelection.

In Tahoka, all balloting will be at the school cafeteria. In Wilson, voting in both elections will be at the city hall.

Fire Causes Damage At Witt Butane

Fire caused heavy damage to the John Witt Butane building on Lockwood east of U.S. 87 Tuesday evening, destroying a pickup and various equipment and stored items inside the building.

Owner Guy Witt reportedly was working with a welder beneath a late model Ford pickup owned by Monty Witt when the fire started. The pickup was destroyed as the blaze caught items stored on top of an office inside the metal building.

Firemen called to the scene risked the danger of stored butane in bottles inside the building as they battled the fire. There was no explosion, but some of the butane in bottles escaped and fueled the fire, which took more than an hour to control.

No estimate of the monetary value of the loss had been made early Wednesday.

The Witts praised the fire department volunteers for the work they did in the face of an obviously dangerous situation.

THE FINNEY CHRONICLES: Part IV

Marilyn, Says Tahoka Man, Was 'Sweet, Naive'

(This is the last of four stories on the recollections of C. Edmund Finney of Tahoka, who has known several famous people and done lots of different things in his lifetime.)

Few people have led more eventful lives than C. Edmund Finney of Tahoka, who tried a lot of different things, particularly in his younger days, before settling on photography as his main profession, one in which he was very talented. Many of his top-quality photographic portraits hang in homes and businesses in Tahoka and throughout this area.

Finney worked with several good professional photographers to learn the things that distinguish a professional from someone who just takes pictures. He recalls opening a studio in Santa Paula with a local man who would stay in the studio and do the darkroom work while Finney went out to take the pictures, driving a Graham-Paige car which Finney had at the time.

"Working for good photographers was better than school"

"We did real well ... But I discovered he was involved in drugs — we had drug problems just like now, only now they get more publicity — and I sold out to him." From there Finney went to Los Angeles and then got a job with a well-known photographer named Horrell in Torrance, Calif. After working for Horrell a short time, he went to work for a man named C. Edmund Williams, then for a couple more good photographers. "Working for these good photographers was better for me than going to school; I learned a lot."

Finney said he took pictures of Marilyn Monroe when he worked for a top photographer named Paul Kelly.

Marilyn Monroe was often maligned, Finney said, but "she was a sweet, naive sort of person. I photographed her in the nude. She didn't come to me; I worked with Paul Kelly who had one of the first color laboratories in the United States. He had a warehouse building which covered about a block. And in there he had all kinds of sets — ocean scenes, parlors, bedrooms, bathrooms, everything you could possibly stage. He had about 20 or 25 models there ... General Motors was running a set of color postcards and the theme was 'Miss America' (although Finney said this had no relation to the Miss America pageant which later became famous). They'd start out in the wintertime, with a girl in a fur coat and hat and go through the months, and it would end up with her nude in the last picture ... They would mail one once a month to a potential customer."

He remarked that many of the girls who came out to California

trying to break into the movies in those days were from Oklahoma and Texas. "They'd come out there and get jobs as waitresses. Kelly would hire these girls as models and he had a very famous agency there."

"I had three one-dollar bills" left after the fire

Finney said he has no pictures he took of well-known people. "The only important pictures I have left are of Tahoka citizens. We had a fire (in 1953) and our house was burned out completely. We were middle-aged and I had three one-dollar bills and a pair of overalls with the seat out of 'em. We were raising rabbits out on 40 acres of desert country. All our money was in the house; we had just bought the place and we had been there about three months. It was 20 miles to Victorville, Calif., and I didn't want to go that far to the bank, so all our money was in the house. I had that three dollars and the oldest clothes I could find because I had been out there shoveling manure — you have no idea how much manure 200 rabbits can make."

Finney interjected that rabbit raising was profitable for awhile, but that later a government contract for rabbits was canceled and that ended the rabbit business at that time. "People these days don't eat rabbits like they do other meat. I don't know why; maybe it's a sentimental thing, Bugs Bunny and other different bunnies, you know."

"After the fire, we still had the rabbits. I had a big barn, 80x16, and in front, rows of hutches. We had 200 white New Zealand does and 10 or 12 bucks ... and they were prolific. Two hundred rabbits can produce three times more meat a year than an equal number of cows, at a better price."

Finney said he had a job killing chickens and another job de-beaking turkeys for a brief time after the house burned, noting that they were in bad financial shape after the fire, so he went looking for work.

"One day I killed 200 chickens"

"There was an ex-bootlegger who had a chicken hatchery. He felt sorry for me and gave me a dollar an hour (for part time work). I'd clean the chicken pens and every day he'd tell me to take a couple of chickens home...He butchered them and sold them someplace. So one day he offered me a job two days a week killing chickens. One day I killed 200 chickens. He had racks with metal cones in them and he'd shove these chickens head first down into these cones and I'd kill them with a sharp knife. It was horrible ... the most horrible job I ever had in my life."

About that time, Finney said, he also worked for a man de-beaking turkeys. "I had fought in the ring and did a little wrestling, but I never got so beat up in any of those deals as I did de-beaking turkeys. Some

of those turkeys weighed 30-35 pounds, and it was a rough job just catching them. Then you had to hold this turkey under one arm and hold his head while you cut off his beak with a little electric device. Just letting them go was a trial and tribulation."

Mrs. Finney said they rebuilt after the fire, but soon moved to Los Angeles, where both of them worked for a firm which sold photos taken in homes. "I would sell coupons for pictures, Mr. Finney would take them and then I'd go back to show the proofs," she said.

Later the Finneys went on the road on their own, with two trailers, traveling around the country taking pictures, and returning to Tucson, Ariz. in the winter.

"We'd set up in a grocery store"

"I had a contract with a chain of grocery stores," Finney said, "and we'd set up in a grocery store and take these kids' pictures."

Mrs. Finney's mother died and the Finneys took David Stevens, her father, with them to Arizona.

"He had lived in Tahoka all his life and he was terribly unhappy in Arizona," Finney commented. "So we brought him back here (in 1957), and I told Audrey that we'd stay with him, but that someday we'd go back on the road and take pictures."

"Mr. Stevens was a good man — good men are few and far between, and he was a marvelous man. I don't think he ever had an evil thought ... Later my mother came to live with us also."

"People loved us and we loved them"

"So I set up a studio in what used to be an old theater building (on N. Main St. in Tahoka, next door south of Tahoka Drug). It took me three months to clean it up and build some partitions. We did very well there. It was very nice. People loved us and we loved them. So when the old folks passed away, there was no reason for us to go back on the road, so here we are."

In 1966 Finney had a lung removed in an operation in Houston. Now he raises several varieties of onions and is considered an authority on the subject and also has other plants, including some rare herbs known for their medicinal properties. Twice a day, he and his wife drink Gota Kola tea made from herbs.

All these many things Finney has done in his lifetime are at odds with his own statement that "I'm really a very ordinary man." For an ordinary man, he has had some extraordinary experiences. His reply to a comment that he always seemed to be willing to dare to try something new perhaps sums up some of the philosophy which has kept him going at full speed over the years:

"Well, I always had an enthusiastic spirit. Every day was a magnificent day. It still is."

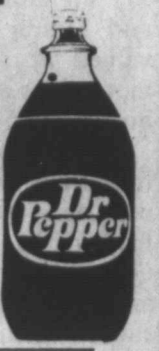
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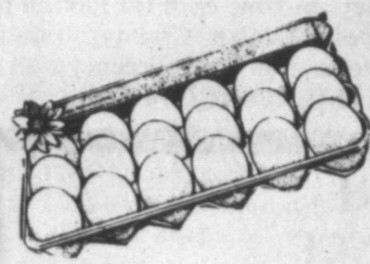


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Boat, TV Set Stolen From New Home Area

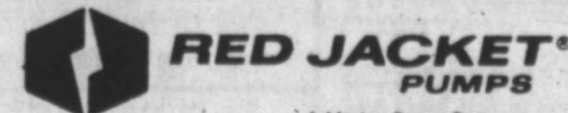

DAYTON PARKER
SUGAR vs EYESIGHT

"You can improve your eyesight, especially your nearsightedness, by cutting down on sugar, and reducing prolonged eye strain," said optometrist Ben C. Lane, addressing the Optical Society of America. Tests on 100 patients to check diet, eye strain, and hair samples indicated that the intake of sugar and other refined carbohydrates may force the body to use its supplies of B-complex vitamins, needed to regulate fluid pressure in the eye. "Folks with worsening nearsightedness consumed relatively more sugar and refined carbohydrates than those folks with unchanging eyesight," said Dr. Lane.
