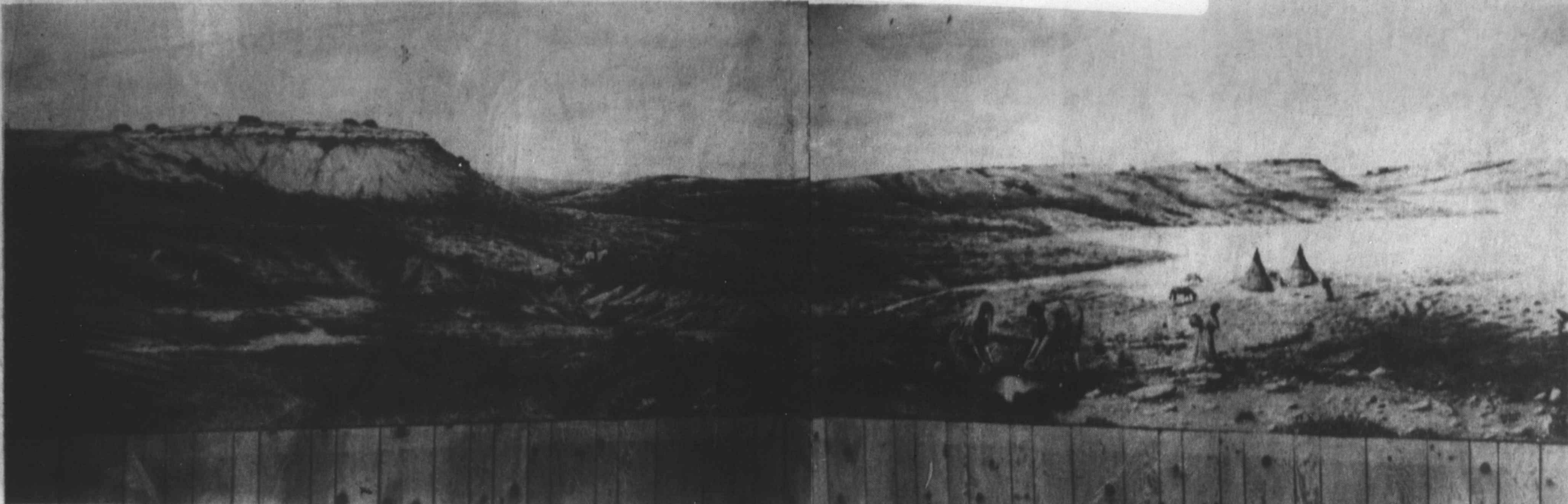

## Mustangs Kick Tahoka 27-7

Tahoka's homecoming football game last Friday night was a fun game for the Wilson Mustangs, but not so good for the Bulldogs, who lost their third

straight game of the season 27-7, doing themselves in by jumping offside, going in motion and otherwise making errors which kept them from scoring. This week the Mustangs, now

2-1, will be open, while the Bulldogs, 0-3, open district play at home against perennial power Seagraves, which started out the

## Police Here Get Their Man, Barely

A Tahoka Police officer last Saturday morning finally cornered a man who had been reported running through the streets of town without any clothes on.

In an incident reminiscent of the days of "streakers" a few years ago, officer J.W. Jolly arrested the suspect near Ave. L and North 1st about 12:33 a.m. after someone called the police department. After getting the man into the patrol unit, Jolly radioed for someone to "bring a pair of coveralls."

The 22-year-old Tahoka man was fined by City Judge Melvin Burks after pleading guilty of public intoxication and disorderly conduct.

Most of the reports investigated by officers during the last week were of more serious nature. Among them was a burglary of Das Kraut Haus in Wilson Friday night, when burglars broke out a plate glass window to gain entry and then took about \$300 cash and some cigarettes. Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$300 reward for information leading to the clearing of this case.

Two men, both 23, were charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle this week after being arrested in connection with theft of a tractor owned by Nolan Jones of O'Donnell. The tractor was stolen early Thursday from Jones' farm near the intersection

of FM 1054 and FM 2053. Deputies called to the scene arrested one of the suspects in a car stuck near the scene. The other man was arrested near Woodrow, where he had driven the John Deere 4440 tractor with a juvenile girl as his companion. Charged were Martin Rodriguez of Lamesa and Dion Santos of Los Ybanez, both of whom posted bond.

A trailer house owned by Michael D. Graves of Rt. 4, Tahoka, burned Thursday night and the owner told officers he suspected arson. Investigators from the state fire marshal's office in Lubbock confirmed this and investigation is continuing. The trailer house was located a mile and a half southwest of Petty.

Four tires were reported stolen off a vehicle owned by Raul Caballero, a half mile south of New Home, about 3 a.m. Sunday. A neighbor reported seeing three persons taking the wheels off and reported they went West on FM 211.

Tickets given by city police included one each for impeding traffic, exhibition of acceleration and alcoholic consumption by a minor.

In jail during the week were the two persons for unauthorized use of a vehicle, two for driving while intoxicated, two for theft by check, one for public intoxication and disorderly conduct, one for enticing a child and harboring a runaway child, one for traffic and one charged with terroristic threat after reportedly brandishing a weapon at O'Donnell.

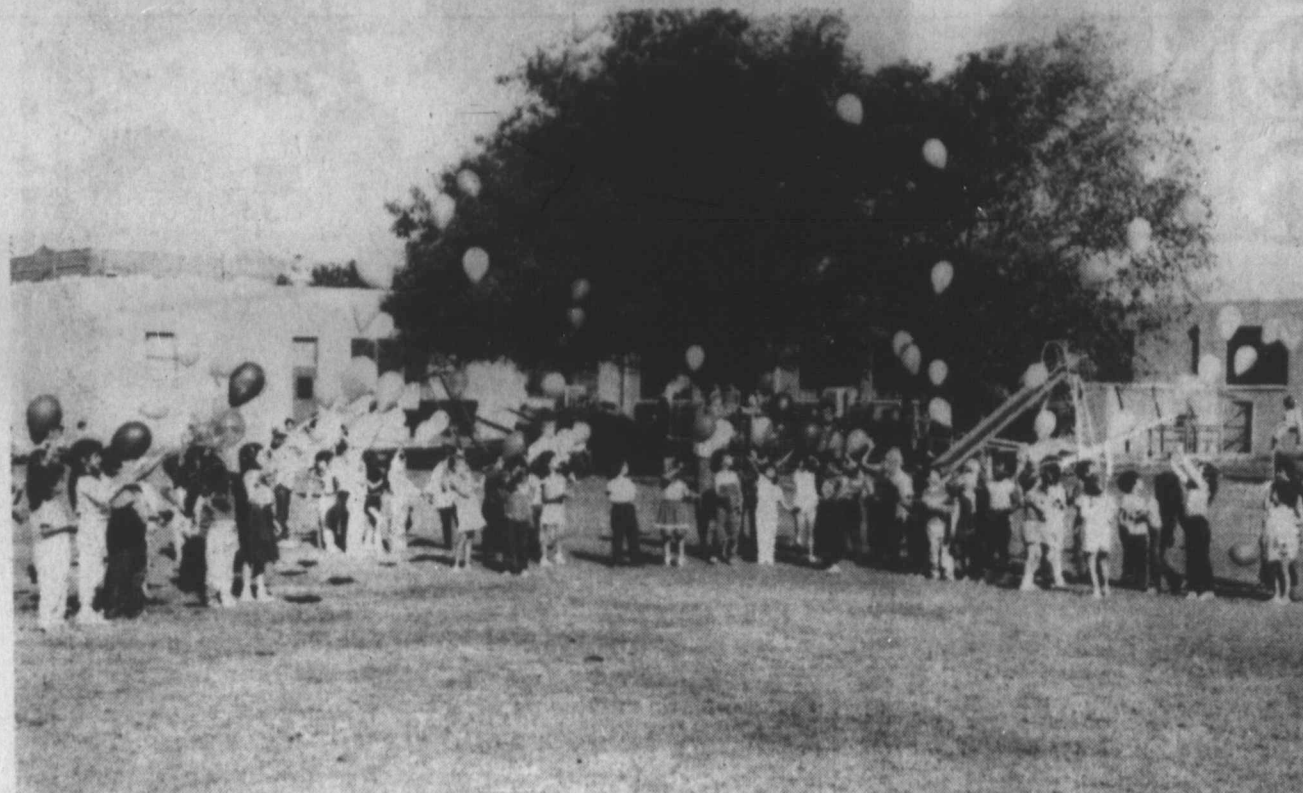

year with an unusual two losses, but last week knocked over previously unbeaten Lockney 20-14.

There were nine turnovers in the game, five of them by Tahoka. It started in the first period when Wilson tackle Jayson Bartley recovered a fumble in Tahoka territory and after tailback Justin Bednarz ran 13 yards to the 14, fullback Chris Burch carried it in from there. A

pass try for two points was no good, and Wilson led 6-0 with 10:35 still left in the first.

Later End Joseph House recovered a fumble near mid-field, but the Dogs immediately gave it back on a pass interception by Bednarz. Still another turnover came in the first when linebacker David Brooks of Tahoka intercepted a pass at the Tahoka 45. Running back Todd Nance got away for 17 yards, and then QB Randy Taylor hit wide receiver Thomas Glisson for 21 yards to the Wilson 14. On the last play of the first quarter,

Glisson made a fine catch of a Taylor aerial which apparently was not even meant for Glisson, but was slightly overthrown toward Anthony Justice. Glisson came streaking in to catch the ball in the end zone from 7 yards out. Mike McDonald kicked the point and Tahoka led 7-6.

In the second period, Bednarz came roaring in to block a punt and Wilson took over on the Tahoka 5. Bednarz ran 2 yards to score and then Burch ran for 2 points to make it 14-7 Wilson. Late in the half Bulldog defender Jim Patterson intercepted a pass to halt a Wilson drive.

The third period was dominated by Tahoka, and the Dogs kept Wilson from making any first downs in the quarter, and moved the ball well, but each time Tahoka got deep into Mustang territory, some kind of procedure mistake halted the drive. And at the end of the period, Bulldog coaches elected to go for first down near midfield on 4th down, and after Wilson stopped the run for a big loss, the Mustangs completed their only passes of the evening on a quick drive for a touchdown which pretty well iced the game for the visitors. QB Greg Spears passed 27 yards to end Wes Earwood, then 12 yards to Burch to the Tahoka 1, from where Bednarz scored, then kicked the point to make it 21-7.

Halfback Ruben Garcia scored the final touchdown for Wilson with 3:59 left, going a yard after Tahoka held for three downs from the 4. A kick was wide and the final score was 27-7.

For Wilson, Bednarz gained 73 yards in 19 carries, Garcia 49 in 10 trips and Burch 23 in four carries. Bednarz at linebacker, and linemen Chad Joy and Craig Wuensche turned in good work on defense.

For Tahoka, Nance gained 82 yards in 23 carries, James Antu had 44 yards in just 4 efforts and McDonald was held to 35 yards in 10 attempts. On defense, top jobs were by cornerback Marty Hammonds, John Aldous, Brooks, tackle George Morin and Rusty Jennings.

The Tahoka Bulldog Booster Club met Tuesday night and set Friday as Blue & White Day. They ask that everyone attending the game Friday night wear blue and white.

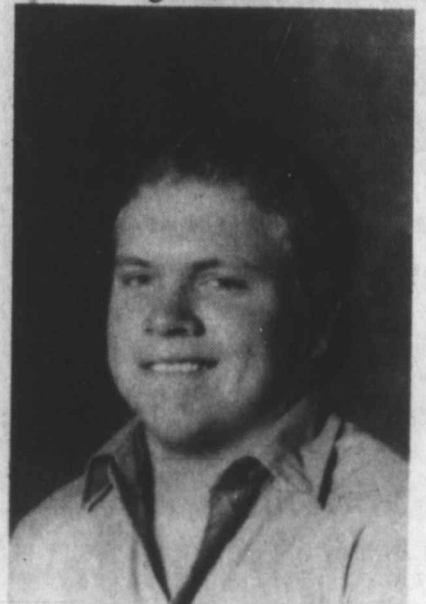
The club would like to thank Gary Brooks for the trailer used for the football boys during the bonfire and for the parade.

**Sales Tax Rebate Told**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$54.8 million in local sales tax to 1,022 cities that levy the one-percent city tax.

Bullock said the 1986 payments were down .5 percent as compared to the payments to date in September 1985. The decrease in August and September check amounts reflects a downturn in the Texas economy, he said.

September checks represent taxes collected on sales made in July and reported to the Comptroller's office by Aug. 20.

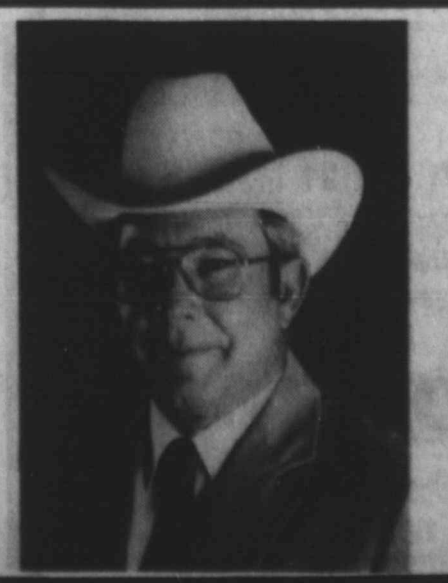

# COTTON TODAY

A NATIONAL COTTON COUNCIL SERVICE

**Cline Praises Farm Law:** Speaking to National Cotton Council directors at their fall meeting in Memphis, President Lloyd Cline described the 1986 cotton program as "the right move at an extremely critical time." He said the program is working just as the industry designed it to work.

"It's helping our farmers maintain income while making our cotton price-competitive at home and abroad."

Cline said, however, that the program must be allowed to continue in its current form if it is to maintain its momentum. The Lamesa, Tex., producer added that retaining the farm program without further changes could be as difficult as the fight to achieve the 1985 bill.

**Cotton Program Working:** The 1986 farm program has dramatically reestablished U.S. cotton as a price-competitive in-

dustry at home and overseas, says Dr. Dean Ethridge, director of the National Cotton Council's economic services.

He noted that U.S. cotton exports for 1986/87 are projected at 6.5 million bales or nearly triple those for last year. Projected off-take is 13.3 million bales—up 59 percent from last season and 21 percent above the average of the past five years. Ethridge said prospects for a larger off-take could conceivably result in ending stocks of around 6 million bales in contrast to last year's 9.4 million.

The economist said the program also has (1) moved cotton out of the government loan into the market, and (2) accelerated foreign production adjustments to lower world carryover stocks.

**Weevil Eradication Scores:** Boll weevil eradication programs in the Southeast and the Far West are proving to be highly successful both economically and technically, a National Cotton Council official says.

Dr. Andy Jordan, the Council's technical services director, says the typical Southeast cotton grower has gotten a return of nearly \$2.50 for each dollar he has invested in the program. This year only 35 weevils were caught in the eradicated South Carolina zone and none at all in North Carolina.

In California and Arizona, weevil populations already have been reduced 98 percent from the level they were last year when the program started.

**'Grown & Made' Gets Boost:** The National Cotton Council's campaign to offset the rising tide of textile imports has received a boost as the result of a \$40,000 grant to the Cotton Foundation from Union Carbide's Agricultural Products Department.

The grant will enable cotton wives to help expand the cam-

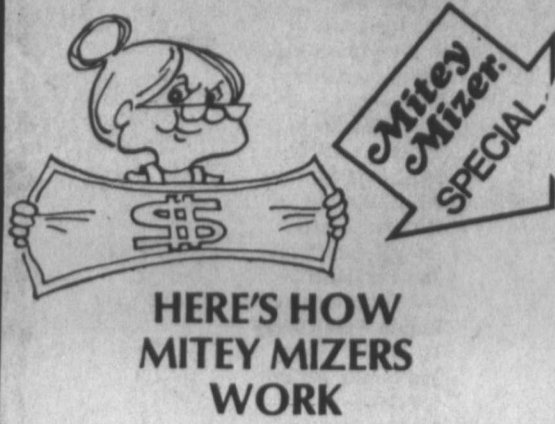

**Farm Credit Banks File Suit**  
 Texas' largest source of agricultural loans, the Farm Credit Banks in Austin, announced recently that it has filed suit against its Washington D.C. regulator, the Farm Credit Administration (FCA) and the newly created Farm Credit System Capital Corporation. The suit challenges the lawfulness of

regulations issued recently by FCA governing the Capital Corporation's power to transfer funds from financially strong Farm Credit System districts to others throughout the U.S. that are financially weak. The Texas Farm Credit Banks, made up of the Federal Land Bank, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank and the Bank for Cooperatives, are strong financially. Joint plaintiffs in the suit are three other healthy Farm Credit banks in Springfield, Mass. The complaint, filed in the United States District Court for the District of Massachusetts, alleges that the regulations issued by FCA on June 12, 1986, do not comply with the Farm Credit Amendments Act of 1985. The Banks are challenging the regulations as written because they do not properly take the continuing viability of contributing banks into account.

A person who plans to retire before age 65 should know that if he or she plans to start getting Social Security benefits, these benefits will be reduced. Social Security benefits are permanently reduced for people who start getting them between 62 and 65. The amount of the reduction depends on the number of months benefits are received before age 65. Also, benefits can be paid only for months the person is eligible throughout the entire month. This means that unless a person is born on the first or second day of the month, he or she cannot receive a benefit for the month of his or her 62nd birthday. Also, a person who applies for benefits before age 65 generally cannot get benefits for any month before the month he or she applies. A person who applies after reaching age 65 can get benefits for up to 6 months before the month of application but not before the month he or she became 65. Other factors can influence a person's decision about retirement. Availability of a company pension can influence decision. So can a person's ability to continue working. Once a person decides to retire, he or she should contact Social Security 2 or 3 months before the month benefits are to start. And, even if a person has no retirement plans, he or she should apply for Medicare health insurance 2 or 2 months before his or her 65th birthday to arrange for this protection. A person needs certain information when applying. This includes: His or her Social Security card or a record of the number. Proof of date of birth, preferably an official record or birth or baptism recorded before age 5. Form W-2 or self-employment tax return, including Schedule SE, for the previous year. A person should not delay applying if all this information is not available. Call the nearest Social Security office. The people there may be able to suggest other evidence that may be used. 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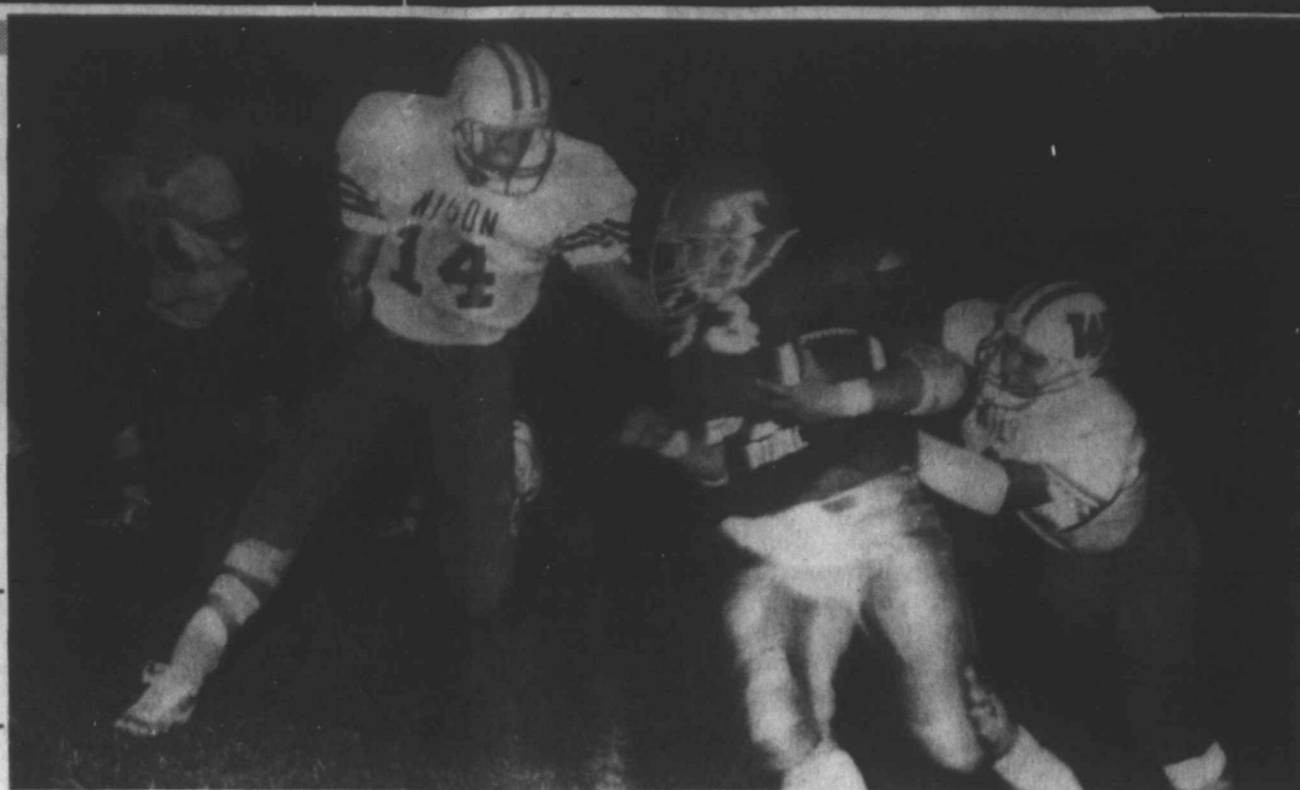

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### Devotional

**SCRIPTURE:**  
Exodus 24:12-18  
Matthew 17:1-9

Reading from Exodus, Moses went upon Mount Sinai. A cloud covered it six days and on the seventh day, God (Yahweh) called to Moses from the cloud, and the glory of the Lord was like a burning, devouring fire.

This scripture in Matthew is the narrative of the transfiguration of the Lord. Jesus led Peter, James and John up a high mountain apart. There He was transfigured, and Moses the lawgiver and Elijah the Prophet appeared with Jesus, a brought cloud overshadowed them and a voice said, "This is My beloved Son, listen to Him." And the three disciples were filled with awe.

The glory of the Lord settled on a holy mountain, and the human response is awe and fear. This kind of fear which gripped Peter, James and John was a reverent or holy fear of the Lord, and they fell on their faces in awe. Only when Jesus touched them, saying, "Rise, and

have no fear," did they dare to lift their eyes.

Then these New Testament Christians, who loved and remembered the transfiguration found themselves again and again in clouded and windswept places, yet in every peril and agony and terrifying thing, these did not overcome them. Their heads were up and their hearts were bold. They had been to the mountain! So now they could live and serve Him down in the valley.

When someone complained about life's tragedies, demanding that God give full explanation of the awfulness here, these New Testament men looked at far deeper realities and mysteries, more tremendous until they finally lead us to that Cross.

"There is God's beloved Son," they say, "That's what happened to Him in this world of God, and with God in charge. Now, listen to Him. Follow Him. He will lead you to the other side of darkness."

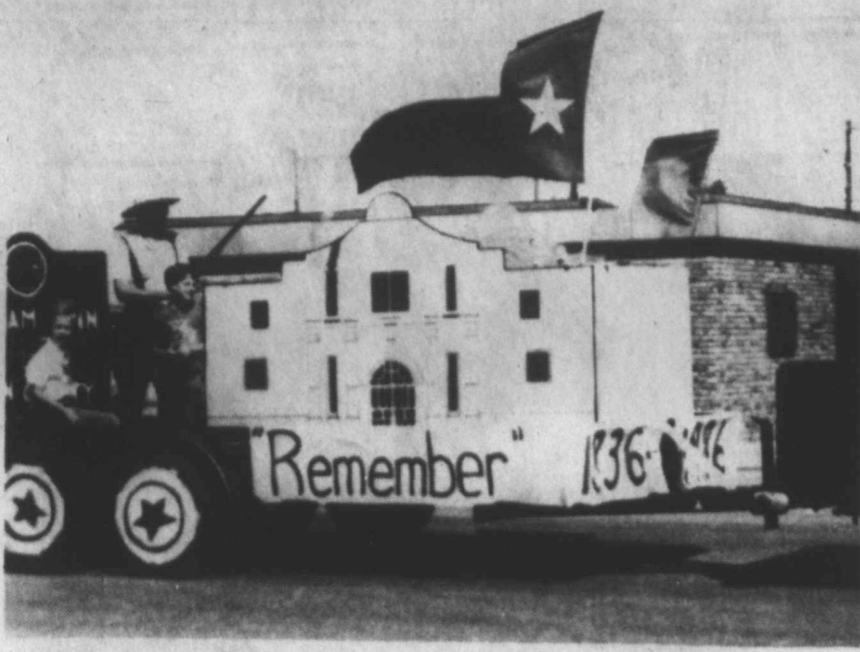

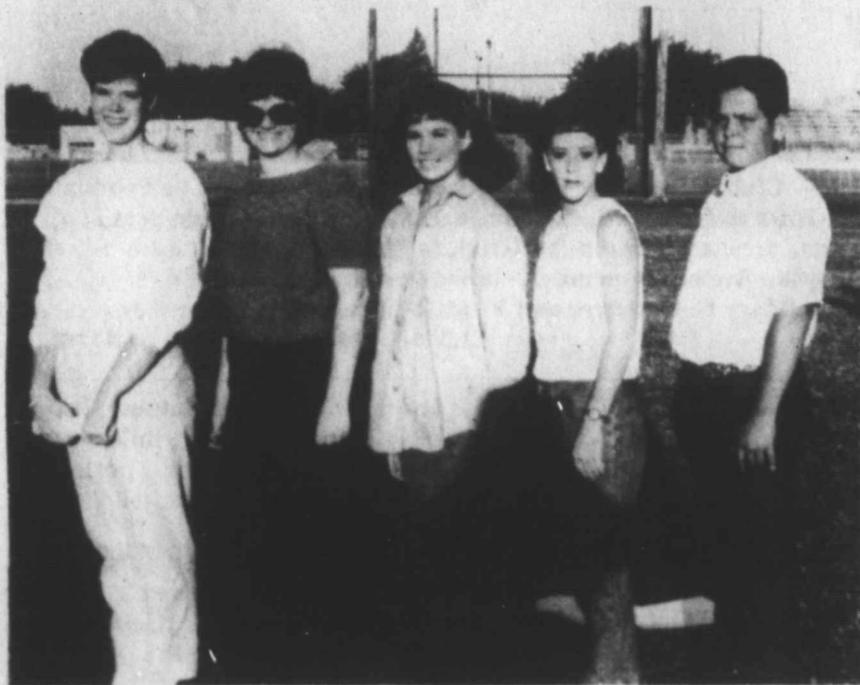

Hoskins is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Hoskins of Tahoka.

He was graduated from Texas Tech in 1974 with a major in business management and marketing.

While attending Texas Tech, he worked for Dunlap's store in

Lubbock, starting out in the receiving room where incoming freight is processed. He progressed soon to a sales position in the boys' department, and then worked in sales in the mens' department. Then it was back to the receiving room as the manager of that department.

After that came positions as assistant buyer in linens and in the store's office. And then came management. Hoskins was named manager of a suburban store in Lubbock, the main downtown store and two smaller suburban stores. The suburban stores were closed when the large one was built and remodeled.

Dunlap's sent Hoskins to Waco in 1975 as operations manager of three stores there that the corporation had just purchased. In 1976, he was transferred to Victoria, where he managed a Dunlap's store. He stayed there until 1982.
