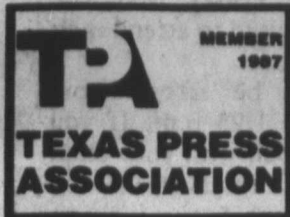

## O'Donnell Boys Win Bi-District

Cody Crouch poured in 23 points to lead O'Donnell to a 79-62 triumph over Sanderson in a Class 1A boys bi-district basketball clash at the Monahans gym Tuesday night.

The District 13-1A champion Eagles now have a 28-4 record.

Charles Sanchez and Kyle Summers chipped in 14 and 12 points, respectively, for O'Donnell.

O'Donnell's girls, unbeaten in 31 previous games, lost a stunning 51-38 decision to Borden County girls at Lamesa Tuesday night, knocking the Lady Eagles out of the playoffs.

It was a penalty-filled game, with 27 fouls called on O'Donnell and 26 on Borden County, whom the Lady Eagles had beaten twice in district play.

O'Donnell's leading scorer, Stacy Bessire, fouled out, and the Lady Eagles scored only 5 points in the third period and 9 in the last after leading 24-21 at halftime. Bessire still led O'Donnell with 15 points, but Borden County's Kelli Williams scored 31.

## Races Assured In Two City Elections April 4

With the deadline already passed last week for signing up for city elections in Texas, contests are assured in two of four Lynn County cities which will have elections April 4.

In Tahoka, the final lineup shows incumbent Mayor Jim Solomon unopposed in seeking re-election, but three persons are seeking two places available on the city council. They are Milt Uzzle, Nick Summitt and Bernice Phipps; none are members of the council at present.

School board candidates have until midnight next Wednesday to sign up. In Tahoka, one candidate, Thalia Burks, had filed for the school board by Tuesday. Terms of Jim Wells and J.E. Nance Jr. are to expire.

In New Home, four persons have filed for four spots on the city council, and one candidate, Roy Blevins, has filed for the office of mayor now held by Clifton Clem. Lee Roy Nettles and Cecil Kieth have filed for two-year terms. Filing for one-year unexpired terms are J.A. Evans and Louis Rodriguez.

Two incumbents whose terms are to expire have signed up for the New Home School board. They are Danny Nettles and George Dozier.

In Wilson, incumbent Mayor Jackie Bishop has filed for a one-year term designed to get

the expiration of that office back on the proper schedule. Incumbent council members Victor Steinhauser and Charlene Webb have filed for re-election, and also filing for the council were Roy Isham, Oscar Ortega and Arthur Castillo.

Terms of Keith Wied and Servando Benavides are to expire on the Wilson school board, but no candidates had filed by Tuesday, and school officials urged citizens in the district to consider serving on the board.

No city contest has developed in O'Donnell, where three incumbents whose terms are up on the council have filed for re-election. They are Tommy Woolam, David Smith and Billy Edwards.

And on the school board, only the two incumbents whose terms expire, David Franklin and Finis Rogers, have filed so far.

Four places are up for election on the Lynn County Hospital Board. The terms of Bobby Cox and Roger Doss, both of O'Donnell, and those of Nick Summitt of Tahoka and the unexpired term of the late Jess Dorman are to expire. According to Hospital Administrator John Brooks, candidates must present a petition of 25 or more signatures to Brooks' office by March 12 in order to get their names on the ballot. No candidates had done so by Tuesday.

## Telephone Book Copies Available At Post Office

Extra copies of the Feist Area-Wide South Plains Telephone Directory are available free of charge at the Tahoka Post Office, Postmaster Leonard Dunn said this week.

Anyone who failed to get a copy in the mail or anyone who wants an extra copy of directory may get them at the post office.

The directory includes numbers in 65 area exchanges, including Tahoka, Wilson, O'Donnell, New Home, Meadow, Ropes, Lubbock, Brownfield, Post and Slaton, but not Lamesa.

## Police Investigate Burglary, Break-In At High School

Tahoka police were busy during the past week with an incident that occurred at approximately 3 a.m. on Monday as officer Hipolito Zuniga, while patrolling the school grounds, noticed some lights on inside Tahoka High School and also heard glass being broken in the area. Zuniga reported that he first noticed that the trophy case had been damaged and had then found a girl hiding in the building. She was located lying on the floor in a hallway on the second floor. DPS trooper Carl Mayfield was called on the scene to assist Zuniga in apprehending a 16

year-old Tahoka female student and the officers arrested her after she was seen running from the school. Lynn County Sheriff's personnel also assisted by taking photos of damage that included seven large class pictures damaged, a D.E. classroom which was ransacked, 34 windows broken, one door glass damaged, a trophy case and damage to several canned drink machines and candy machines. The juvenile was transported to Lubbock Juvenile Detention Center by Elton Childress and juvenile probation officer Jerry Akerd. The girl was put on juvenile probation and was put on restitution to pay \$4000 in damages.

A Tahoka woman reported to police on Wednesday, Feb. 18, that she had been receiving several harassment calls from another Tahoka resident.

Edith Kuwaski of 1829 Ave. R reported on Saturday that someone had stolen a tailgate from a 1978 brown GMC pickup which was parked at her residence. Police arrested a 21 year-old

Tahoka man for DWI subsequent offense during the past week.

Police arrested a Tahoka man in the 1700 block of North 6th on Saturday. A resident reported to police that he had caught a prowler. The subject was arrested for public intoxication.

**LOTS OF** folks are mad at Gov. Bill Clements for plans to divert money from teacher retirement and highway funds to bail out the prison system and workers compensation fund. President Reagan is attacked because of diverting funds to Contra rebels. Of course, the attacks on Reagan are mainly politics by those who want to crucify him. But the governor's plans, like any other he or anybody else can come up with to alleviate the state's financial problems, are under strong attack from those who would stand to lose.

The Texas Good Roads Assn. has mailed out a release saying that Clement's plan to use highway funds for anything else is immoral, and that such diversion of funds

would cause highway improvement projects to be delayed or cancelled, and no doubt the TGRA is right about that.

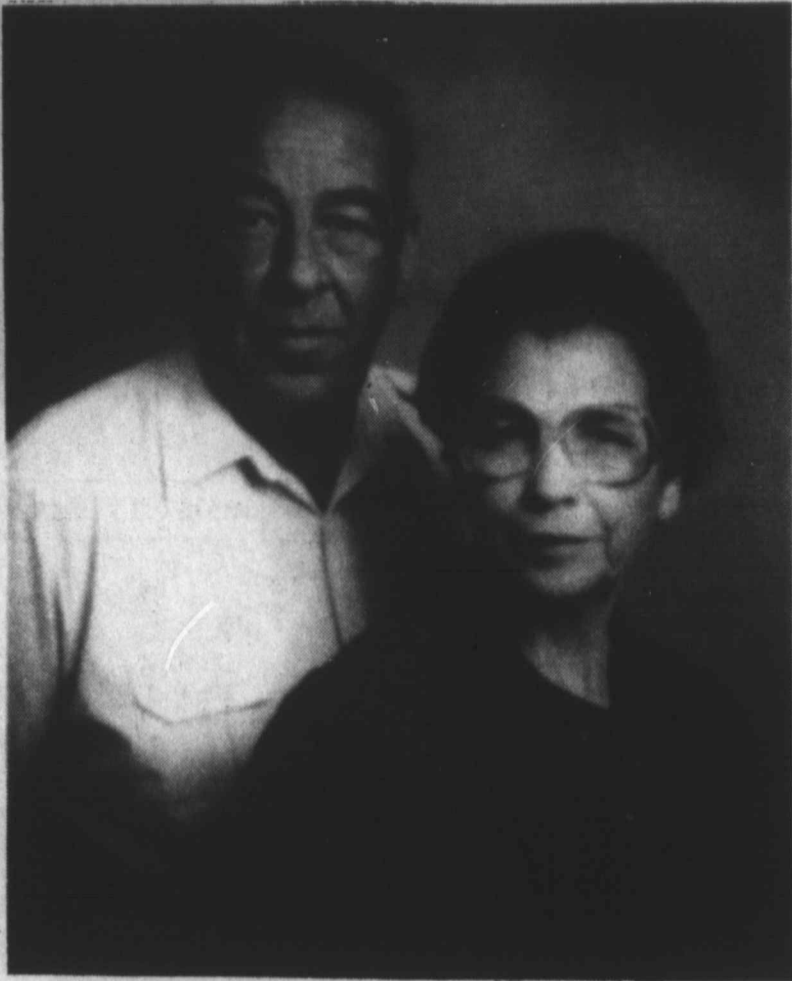
Following Open House, the senior class will sponsor a basketball contest between the high school faculty and students and members of KAMC 28 employees.

## Guitar, Banjo Pickers Invited To Levelland

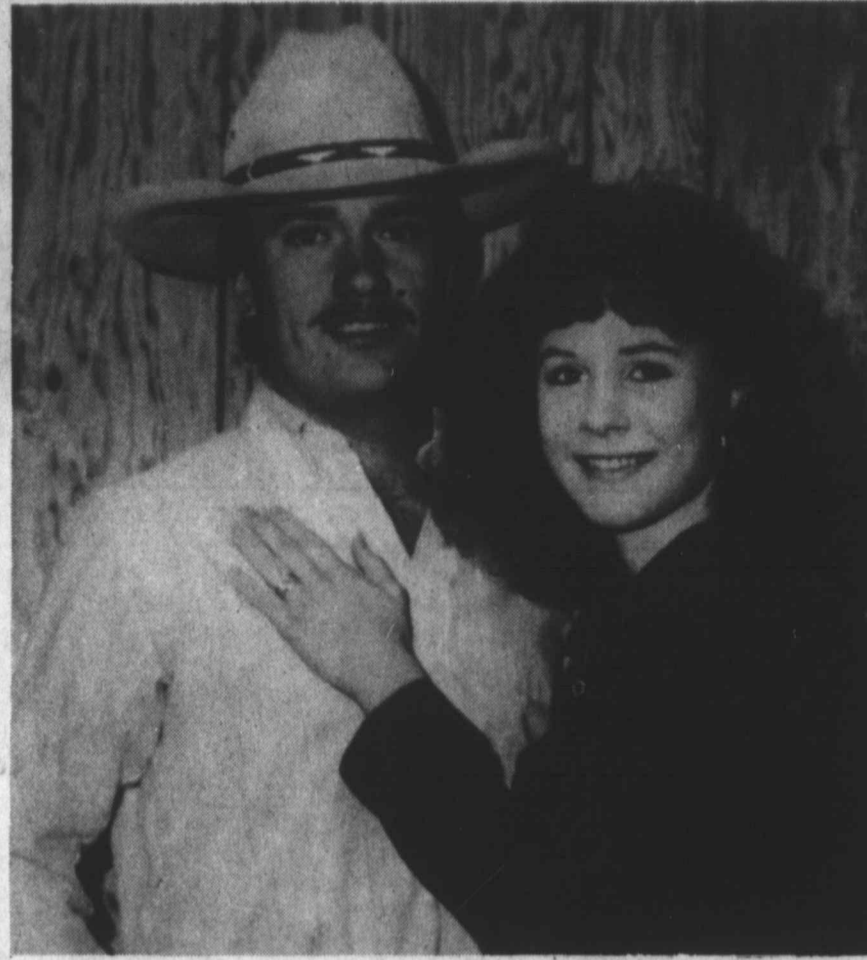
Plans are shaping up to assemble what organizers hope to become the World's Largest Bluegrass Band to honor country music artist Tom T. Hall when he visits South Plains College in Levelland March 26 for the dedication of a \$500,000 recording and production studio in his honor.

Hall, his promoter, and college officials have decided to make history and go for the Guinness Book of World Records. "We are inviting anyone who can play banjo, guitar, mandolin, fiddle, string bass, dobro or any other string instrument that is non-electric to join the fun and come pick in the World's Largest Bluegrass Band," said John Hartin, coordinator of South Plains College's two-year program in country and bluegrass music.

Hartin said his department has already mailed invitations to more than 800 former students who have taken classes in country and bluegrass music at the college since 1975 when the program was initiated. "We are getting some favorable response, but our success will rely on the average guitar picker who wants to come pick with us," he said. Plans call for the group to play bluegrass standards "Fox on the Run," "Cripple Creek" and "Foggy Mountain Breakdown."

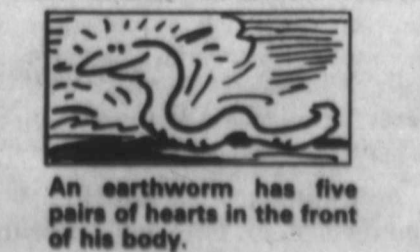

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### A Visit With Your County Agent

#### GROW YOUR OWN GARDEN TRANSPLANTS

Get your spring garden off to a good start by growing your own transplants indoors, suggests Stanley Young, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

The key to growing transplants successfully is to plant seed at the proper time so the young plants will be ready to set out when your garden is ready and weather conditions are favorable.

For the best survival and quick recovery after planting in the garden, transplants should be young, sturdy and in good nutritional condition.

Usually four to six weeks is sufficient time to grow most transplants. Vine crops take two to three weeks to develop two to three true leaves while lettuce takes three to four weeks. Tomatoes need five to seven weeks to reach transplanting stage.

To determine the optimum seeding time for most transplants, figure back four to six weeks from the average last spring frost date in Lynn County, which is around April 4.

Some transplants such as cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, lettuce and onions can be set in the garden four to six weeks before the last frost date.

When starting plants indoors, Young suggests using a soilless or synthetic soil mix available at garden centers or nurseries.

Seed can be started in almost any type container such as flower pots, milk cartons or cake pans. Be sure the container has holes for adequate drainage. Other popular containers are seed flats, peat pots and peat cubes or pellets.

Once you've got the needed materials and planting time is at hand, fill the containers with the synthetic mix, firm it in well and then water thoroughly. Space the seed evenly, cover lightly and water again.

To improve germination, slip the container into a plastic bag and place it in an area at room temperature but out of direct sunlight. Remove the bag when the seed first emerges and place the container in sunlight.

Once the container has been removed from the plastic bag, add water to maintain good moisture. Frequent watering will be necessary but use care to avoid saturation.

When plants are of adequate size and outside conditions are suitable for plant growth, transplant them into the garden area and you've got a jump on the planting season, says Young.

## Capitol Journal

With a sagging economy, volatile oil prices, and constantly changing sales tax collections, there is talk that annual sessions would give the Legislature a better grasp of budget problems. While the constitution calls for the Legislature to meet only in odd-numbered years, circumstances have caused Governors to call numerous special sessions over the past decade. Several bills amending the constitution have been introduced (HJR 23 by Kubiak, HJR 34 by Yost, and SJR 5 by Parmer) which would provide for annual legislative sessions. Questionnaire responses from the 78th District indicate that about two-thirds of you support the idea of annual legislative sessions.

The 1983 and 1985 Legislatures set a poor precedent when they chose to raid the Teacher Retirement Fund to make ends meet in other areas of state spending. With the prison crises, lack of funds for Mental Health and Mental Retardation, and other spending pressures, Governor Clements has decided to take his own Teacher Retirement "dip" by suggesting pulling \$45 million out of that program. Along with Representative Betty Denton, I am co-sponsor of a constitutional amendment which would prohibit the state from taking money from that fund. Representative Denton and I are also sponsoring a bill to increase benefits for long-time retired teachers who have not received adequate cost of living increases.

The Texas Department of Health has proposed a reorganization of the regional health system which could adversely affect health services throughout the state. In the 78th District, the plan calls for dividing operations now in Abilene and spreading these operations to Lubbock, Arlington and Midland. There is concern from West Texas and South Texas about this plan. The central issue is whether the Health Department is cutting ad-

ministration or cutting local services. Groups opposing the changes are working to have the health department come up with cost-saving options other than their proposed reorganization. The State Board of Health is now scheduled to vote on the plan at its March 14 meeting, but the mood among West Texas legislators is to slow the process down for more careful consideration of the costs of the plan and alternatives to it.

Comptroller Bob Bullock has come out with his own suggestion for re-vamping the state's tax system. He proposes expanding the sales tax to most sales and services, exempting only the most basic essentials, according to Bullock, of food, medicine, and farm supplies.

**PARENTS AND STRESS—A** sequence of ordinary little events—like spilled juice, thrown toys, and overflowing sink and ringing phone—can quickly lead to a screaming child and distressed parent. Stress is something that parents of young children can't avoid; it's the reaction to stress that counts, says family life specialist Diane Welch. "Parents should be aware of the symptoms that signal stress pile-up and potential danger," says Welch. Some people react by developing physical symptoms such as headaches, dizziness, appetite loss or an increase in eating, she explains. Other parents become aggressive, which can lead to child abuse. "Even when parents don't develop physical symptoms, they may cry, become fatigued, sad, angry, very irritable or feel depressed and guilty," Welch says. "It's not unusual for a parent experiencing stress to feel helpless and doubt his or her worth as a parent." Lack of adequate sleep often contributes to parents' stress, notes the specialist. Sleep requirements vary from person to person, she says, but it's easy for any parent to lose sleep because of a young child's erratic sleep schedule.

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### Hispanic Educational Issues Symposium Slated At Texas Tech

LUBBOCK—School and community leaders from across the state will brainstorm for solutions to a major problem in educating Hispanics—an estimated 45 percent public school dropout rate—at the Second Texas Symposium on Hispanic Educational Issues March 1-2 at Texas Tech University.

The symposium will include presentations and panel discussions by educators, Hispanic leaders and public school officials and work sessions by teams of civic leaders and educators from cities across the state. Around 200 people are expected to participate.

The dropout problem was selected for focus at the symposium after being identified by participants at the first symposium in April 1985 as the major problem in educating Hispanics and other minorities, said education Professor Clyde E. Kelsey, a conference planner. Issues in educating Hispanics from kindergarten through advanced schooling will be studied.

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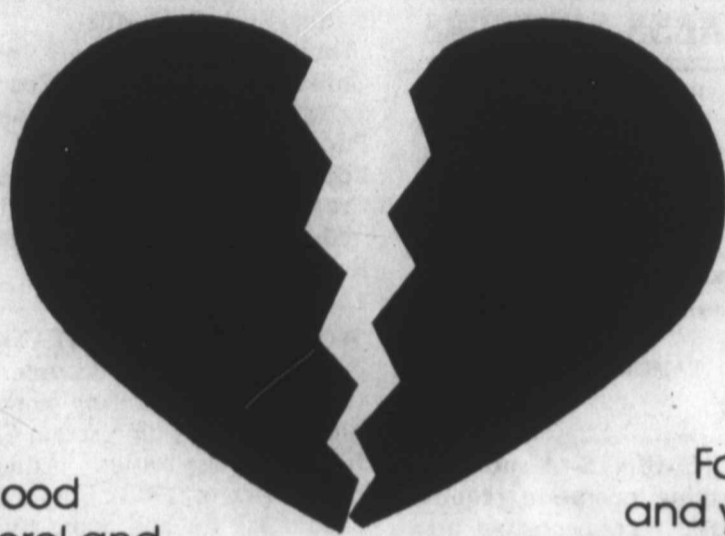
