## Burglaries, Thefts Reported

Two burglaries at Wilson Monday night and three theft cases were investigated by officers in Lynn County during the week, and a suspect in one of the cases was arrested and charged.

B.L. Miller, Rt. 4, Tahoka, reported 150 sacks of delinted cotton seed stolen from his barn 5 miles southeast of Tahoka during the night Sunday. Also stolen were a welder, cutting torch and accessories. Arrested and jailed on charges of theft over \$150 was Senaido Hernandez, 46, of Tahoka. His bond was set at \$15,000 by Justice of the Peace

H.W. Edwards.

Wallace Schafer, owner of Wilson Auto & Machine, reported his shop was burglarized Monday night. Desk drawers and a filing cabinet were ransacked and a vehicle owned by Schafer was left with doors open and trunk lid up, but nothing was reported missing. Across the street and just east of the shop the Phillips 66 station of Wilson Oil Co. also was burglarized that night, with nothing reported missing.

Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered \$300 rewards in the Wilson

cases and in the theft of a 14-foot aluminum Duro Craft boat and 10-hp Mercury motor stolen from the farm of Ray Foster of Wilson, about 3.5 miles northeast of Wilson on FM 400. The boat and motor were valued at about \$500.

A \$200 reward was offered in the theft of an auger for drilling postholes which was stolen from property of Leighton Knox Jr., about five miles south of Tahoka on U.S. 87. Knox reported Wednesday. The auger and shaft were valued at more than \$1000.

Officers during the week arrested and jailed Robert Acosta, 36, of Tahoka, who had been indicted by the grand jury on charges of aggravated assault by use of a deadly weapon in the wounding of another Tahoka resident, Robert Rodriguez.

Tahoka police arrested a 19-year-old Tahoka man on Sunday in the 1500 block of North 1st for contest of speed, failure to appear, minor in possession, speeding and failure to use seat belts. Police also arrested a 23-year-old Tahoka man on Sunday for speeding and no driver's license.

A Tahoka resident reported to police during the past week that they had received an obscene phone call.

In jail during the week were the two Tahoka men arrested in the traffic cases, plus two others in traffic cases, two for public intoxication and one each on the following charges: theft by check and failure to appear, driving while intoxicated, possession of an illegal club and failure to appear, theft by check, aggravated assault by use of a deadly weapon, theft over \$750.

## Tahoka Police Chief Morrison Resigns

Gary Morrison, Tahoka Chief of Police for the last 23 months, Monday submitted his resignation from that position, stressing in his letter to Mayor Jim Solomon and the city council that his action in no way reflects any negative attitude toward the city.

In fact, he said, he and his family plan to continue living in Tahoka. Morrison said he will be involved in law enforcement work outside of Lynn County, and urged citizens of Tahoka to continue supporting law enforcement officers in the city and county.

Morrison was exonerated by a grand jury here last week of charges of excessive use of force during the arrest of a convicted felon, and the resignation coming so soon caused concern by the mayor and some council members that the public may wrongly interpret the resignation as being forced by the city.

"We did not in any way hint that Chief Morrison should resign, nor did we ask him to do so," said Mayor Solomon. "In fact, we would be very happy if he would stay on, because we believe he has done a good job for us." It was noted that Morrison will be taking a job which will pay him more, with what the chief termed "less pressure on me and my family."

Morrison will continue as chief until the end of March. His letter of resignation said, in part:

"My family and I wish for the citizens and administration of Tahoka only the best and hope to see continued support for the law enforcement officers of Lynn County as now they face serious problems with illegal activities being conducted by a relatively small group of people engaged in organized criminal conduct. The officers need your support in order to combat ever increasing crime, and I am sure they will receive the backing they need from the good and decent law-abiding citizens which are a majority in Tahoka.

"Thank you for your support and prayers for me and my family while serving you."

Mayor Solomon issued a statement commending Morrison and also commented on the drug and other crime situation in Tahoka. His statement:

"I want to offer my appreciation to Chief Morrison and his family for their efforts on behalf of our city. Gary has been effective in helping control the criminal elements in our area and I hate to see him leave.

"I want to take this opportunity to say something about law enforcement in our town. We as a city administration made the decision to fight drugs and drug

related crimes in our town. With this decision comes the commitment from both the City and the citizens of Tahoka to follow through to the fullest extent of the law against anyone involved in these activities. Keep in mind, however, that many of these criminals are residents of Tahoka and Lynn County; most probably people you know.

"They are not only criminals, but have violated a trust that is extended to all residents of a small town. This makes the job harder in a lot of respects, but the damage they are doing to our youth and community is unforgivable. Therefore, our com-

mitment must be absolute. If all our law enforcement agencies do is issue a few tickets, we would have little controversy. However, as you are aware, this would leave the real problems, the dangerous problems free to further victimize our community.

"I congratulate the various law enforcement agencies in our county, and I request we all show our support to these people doing this thankless job that makes our community a safer place to live and raise children.

"I wish Gary and Kathy and their family the very best of luck in their new career."

## Three School Elections Will Have Contests

In Wilson, incumbents Servando Benavidez and Keith Wied, and new candidates Jerry Dickson and Bobby Lee are running. In O'Donnell, a three-person race for two places will involve

Jackie Stidham and incumbents David Franklin and Finis Rogers. In Tahoka, incumbents Jim Wells and J.E. Nance Jr. are not seeking re-election.

Seeking the two places are Thalia Burks, Gwen Patterson and Terry Harvick.

Four persons had signed by Wednesday for the Lynn County Hospital Board election also set for April 4, with just a few hours remaining on the deadline for that election. Four places are to be filled. Getting their names on the ballot were incumbents Leland White and Bobby Cox, plus Ann Wyatt of New Home and Joy Brookshire of Tahoka.

THE JUSTICE DEPT. says that five out of six of today's 12-year-olds will be victims or intended victims of violent crimes during their lifetimes, and that half of these will be victimized more than once. These alarming and depressing statistics are projected on 10 years of surveys on the extent of crime.

An estimated three out of 10 persons will be victims of a completed or attempted robbery during their lifetimes, with blacks almost twice as likely to be robbed as whites and males about 70 per cent more likely to be robbed than females. Nearly everyone age 12 to 70 will be victim of a personal theft at least once, with about seven out of eight people victimized three or more times, the report said.

The report predicted that 72 per cent of this nation's 20-year-olds will be victims of violent crimes or attempted crimes in their lifetimes; 36 per cent of 40-year-olds; but just 8 per cent of 70-year-olds.

This is interesting, since violent crimes is one of the main fears of older persons, who perhaps should be more concerned about something happening to their grandchildren than to themselves.

It's a real national tragedy that such predictions should be made. Our prisons are full up, and they're turning criminals loose on the public so they can keep the latest offenders for a brief time in

prison. Nobody wants new prisons built in their town and many states and city and county governments are cutting back on their law enforcement budgets because those governments are hurting economically.

So we have fewer officers, lower-paid than most workers, operating under more and more restrictions (don't drive the cars so many miles, and don't serve so many arrest warrants, and don't beat up any criminals") and more and more thieves, burglars, rapists and murderers out there all the time.

No wonder people are getting paranoid about crime.

IF YOU have \$5.50 you really don't know what to do with, you can order from Ingmire Publications in San Antonio a bound book listing all the marriages in Lynn County from 1903 to 1910. You can get books for other counties and dates also, but the price varies. No doubt this would be an exciting book to read (not much plot, but quite a cast of characters).

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# 18 Texas Hospitals Close Last Year

In 1986, 18 Texas hospitals closed, according to the Texas Hospital Association, a trade association representing the hospital industry. This compares with nine closures in 1985, and eight in 1984.

"Nearly all of the 35 community hospitals in Texas that closed during the past three years were relatively small and the majority (19) were located in rural (non-MSA) counties," said Karl Shaner, Dr. P.H., vice president, research and information services. All but one of the closed hospitals had less than 100 beds. "With regard to their ownership status at the time of closure, seven hospitals were publicly-owned, 10 were private/non-profit institutions and 18 were investor-owned, either by individuals or a corporate system,"

Shaner noted. The problems experienced by small, rural hospitals are caused by many of the same factors affecting urban hospitals, such as lower occupancy rates, more intensely ill patients, stricter enforcement of regulatory requirements, closer scrutiny in the delivery and utilization of services by the peer review organization (PRO), and inadequate payment from Medicare/Medicaid programs.

"Rural hospitals also face the problems of attracting sufficient numbers of qualified professional personnel and physicians, less access to capital and insufficient funding for marketing and diversification in order to respond to a more competitive health care market," said Charles Bailey, JD, vice president of legal

affairs and THA's liaison with smaller hospitals.

"In Texas, small and rural hospitals account for 270 of the hospitals in the state, and serve an estimated 3 million people. Recent changes in the payment and review of care provided Medicare beneficiaries have had dramatic effect on these hospitals," Bailey said. "Because small, rural hospitals also serve a greater average proportion of Medicare patients, changes in payment policies have a more profound effect on their facility and its ability to preserve financial stability," he added.

Since 1980, hospitals have seen a decline in discharges and in their average daily census; however, this has affected small and rural hospitals more severely. "In the first half of 1986, occupancy rates were 25 percent or less in small hospitals with fewer than 25 beds, and 35 percent for hospitals with 26-49 beds," Bailey said.

Small, rural hospitals also have experienced a decline in net patient margins while experiencing higher expenses, including higher malpractice insurance costs.

"Changes in the reimbursements of small, rural hospitals is essential if rural hospitals are to survive and needed services are to continue to be provided to persons living in rural communities," Bailey said.

Among the recommended changes in the treatment of rural hospitals are:

\*Consider exempting rural hospitals from the prospective pricing system (PPS).

\*As an alternate, change the PPS to more adequately reimburse rural hospitals in such areas as reducing the differential of payment between rural and urban hospitals, revising payments to reflect severity of illness, and changing the definition and payment of "sole community pro-

viders." "Increase the flexibility of the Application of Medicare Conditions of Participation to rural hospitals.

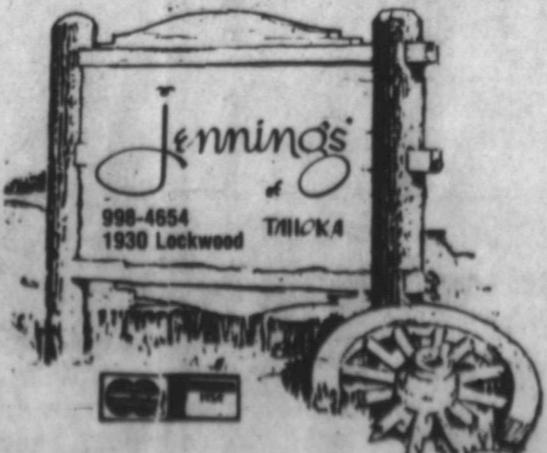

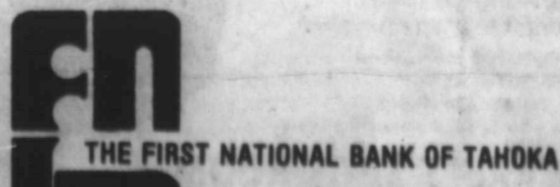

### Breast Cancer Detection Unit Available In Tahoka

The Breast Cancer Detection Unit approved by the American Cancer Society will be at Lynn County Hospital parking lot Friday March 20. A \$50 fee will be charged. Appointments may be made by calling 998-4533.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of 11 women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists, and Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age. One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age. A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over. An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an

x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening is \$50. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard, and American Express.

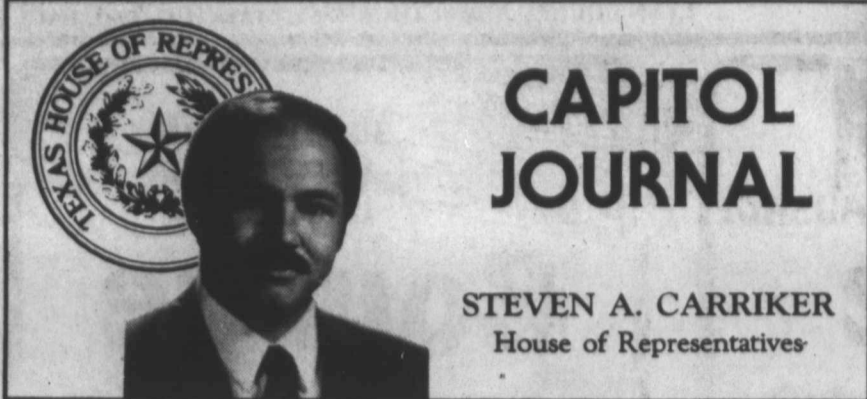

A study by the Legislative Budget Board confirms what many legislators have been saying about the Clements proposals to reduce state funds for public schools. The study projects that if the Clements cuts were enacted, local property taxes would rise as much as 17 percent. In West Texas where rapidly falling oil and agriculture evaluations have eroded the tax base, school personnel say the impact might be even more severe since the LBB study did not take into account the Governor's proposal to do away with one-half of the kindergarten funding and cut \$125 million from vocational education.

Homeowners could retain their current tax exemptions if a bill I have introduced is adopted. HB 1093 would reinstate the option for local tax districts to grant up to a 40 percent exemption for

residence homesteads and would raise the minimum exemption for a homeowner from \$5,000 to \$10,000. On the other end, the exemption for high value homes would be limited. High value homes could receive up to a 40 percent exemption of the first \$125,000 of evaluation. With the mounting pressures on local and ad valorem tax, some exemptions may be necessary for many families to afford to own a home of their own.

The House Agriculture Committee voted unanimously last week to maintain rural services by basing program expenditures on 1985 levels. In so doing, the committee rejected the drastic cuts in farm and rural programs proposed by Governor Clements. The Clements plan would have cut the Extension Service 37 percent and would have eliminated the funding for the soil and water

## A Visit With Your County Agent

### DON'T TOP THAT TREE

This is the season when homeowners and others get the urge to "top" or "dehorn" landscape trees with the assumption that the trees will be better off.

On the contrary, topping is one of the worst practices that can be employed against shade trees, emphasizes Stanley Young, Lynn County Extension agent.

Topping refers to cutting back branches to stubs and sometimes all the way to the trunk. This severely injures trees and sets them up for attack by diseases and insects. Topping can even kill a tree outright.

People top trees to reduce their size (where power lines may be in the way, for instance), to save money on competent tree care, and because they think the practice will help the tree.

Proper pruning, on the other hand, involves removing trashy

conservation service and the predatory animal control service. In adopting its own budget recommendation, the Agriculture committee pointed out that rural services have been cut more than other programs since the budget crunch hit the state three years ago.

Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent urged a tax reduction for oil and gas producers in a speech to the Texas House last week. side branches in the top of the tree. This practice is not nearly as noticeable as topping and therefore often goes unnoticed.

Severe topping causes a proliferation of buds at the point where the branch was cut. Shoots then arise from these buds, forming a dense mat at the end of the branch. This dense growth is shallowly attached and subject to easy breakage by wind storms.

This new mass of growth also puts a strain on a tree's root system since food reserves have to be used to support it. Thus the tree's root system is weakened and overall vigor is reduced, making the tree more susceptible to attack from insects, diseases, and other environmental conditions. Sunscald can also be a problem.

Topping also reduces a tree's life expectancy and therefore affects its value in the landscape. Knowledgeable appraisers will severely reduce the value of a topped or dehorned tree.

Good pruning practices will retain a tree's natural form and enable it to be a much greater asset to the landowner. Considering how long it takes a tree to reach full size, proper pruning and care should be a top priority for the homeowner.

### ADD ORGANIC MATTER TO GARDEN

Adding plenty of organic matter to your soil is one of the keys to a successful garden.

Organic matter improves the drainage and aeration of clay soils and helps sandy soils hold water and nutrients.

Spread a 2 to 4-inch layer of peat moss, hay, compost, leaves, manure or even shredded newspapers over the garden surface and work it into a depth of 6 to 8 inches. Before working in the compost, add the recommended rate of fertilizer so that it will become part of the soil mix.

Many gardeners prefer using a shovel or spading fork when working up the ground, but others like using rototillers.

Young gives these tips to make the tilling job easier:

Till when the soil is fairly dry and friable. Tilling wet soil leaves behind large clods and causes mud to cling to tiller blades, thus upsetting the tiller's balance.

Leave and untilled row between passes since wide turns are easier to make than 'about faces'. This also keeps the machine from pulling itself and you toward the next row.

Reduce engine speed when breaking new ground or when tilling heavy clay soils so the tiller will dig better and bounce less.

Set the brake stake half the desired length when tilling ground the first time around. Then set it to full depth and go over the ground a second time.

HORTICULTURE OFFERS ENTERPRISE DIVERSITY-- Horticultural crops have made inroads in Texas agriculture over the past five years due to declining revenues from traditional agricultural enterprises. Many producers have had to diversify operations to maintain profitability, says a horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Horticultural crops such as blueberries, grapes and vegetables have played a significant role in the diversification process. Horticultural crops are produced under intensive cropping systems that usually require high capital investments and labor inputs along with intensive management. Marketing is perhaps the most critical element in profitable production of horticultural crops.

## City Sales Tax Rebate Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$49.9 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that 1987 payments to date were down 6 percent as compared to payments to date made in March of last year.

March checks represent taxes collected on sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller by Feb. 20.

Tahoka's net payment this period--\$3,259.47; comparable payment prior year--\$3,953.06; 1987 payments to date--\$14,651.37; 1986 payments to date--\$16,539.07.

O'Donnell's net payment this period--\$.00; comparable payment prior year--\$989.15; 1987 payments to date--\$2,820.41; 1986 payments to date--\$4,737.04.

## Mineola Edwards

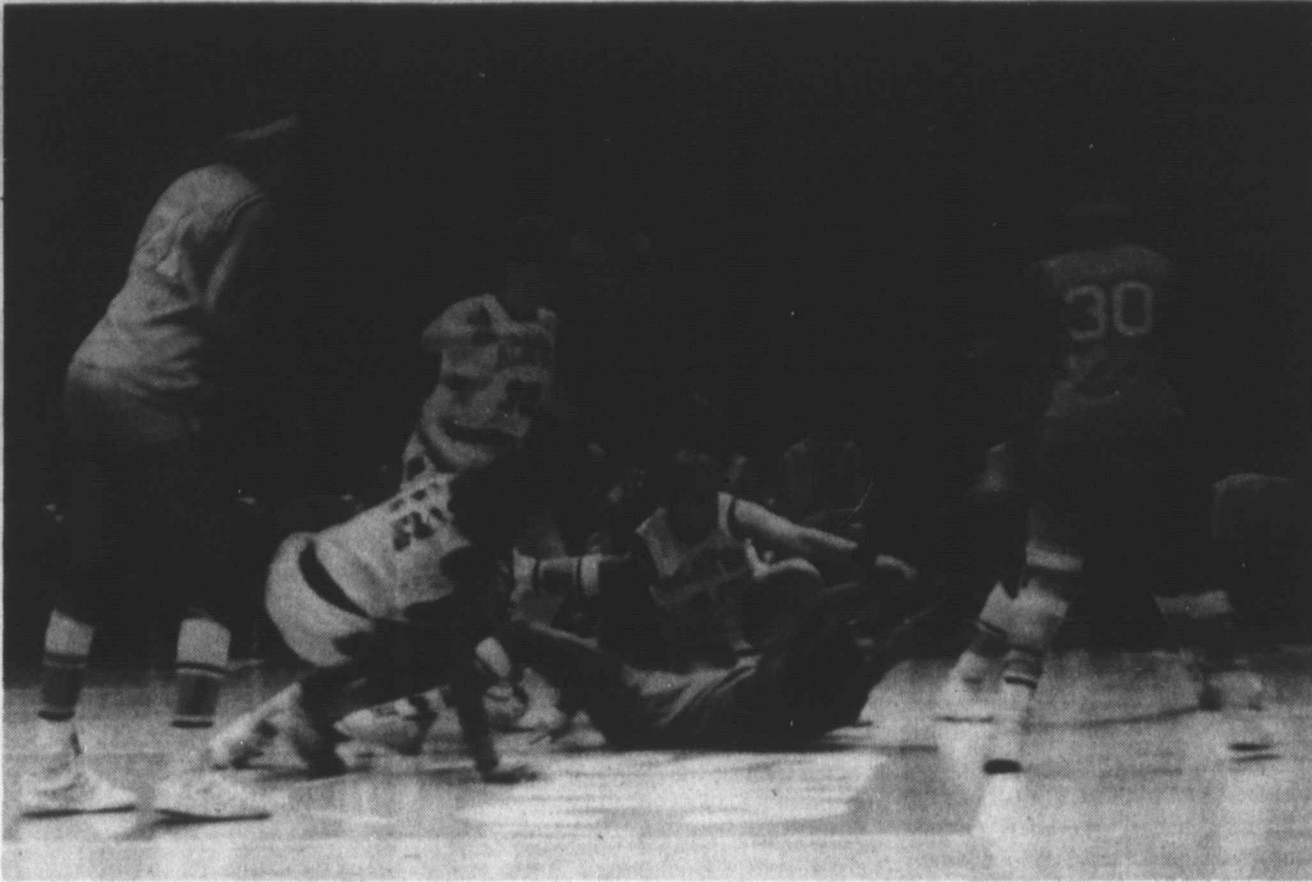
