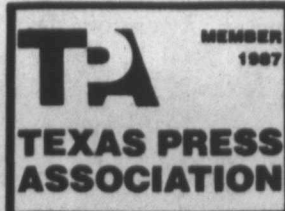

## Sale Of Mill To Benefit Many Farmers

The boards of directors of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association (PCCA) and American Cotton Growers (ACG) announced Tuesday the transfer of ownership of the ACG Denim Mill at Littlefield to PCCA.

The sale means that farmers in Lynn and other counties will receive cash payments based on their participation in the cooperative.

Completion of the transaction follows the April ACG membership meeting in Lubbock when authority to sell the mill was granted to the ACG Board of Directors and a subsequent meeting of the PCCA Board of Directors on June 19 at which PCCA Directors voted overwhelmingly to purchase the 11-year-old facility.

The estimated \$100 million transaction comes at a time when many cotton producers need the cash generated by the sale of the denim mill after suffering through several consecutive years of unfavorable weather and low cotton prices.

## Work To Start Soon On City Paving Jobs

Workers with Caprock Highway Construction Co. of Lubbock are expected to start within the next couple of weeks paving of parking areas and some streets in the vicinity of the city swimming pool and baseball and softball parks in the south part of town.

City council members Monday night discussed the project with civil engineer A.C. Bowden of Lubbock and earlier in the day Caprock representative Wayne Turner was in town talking with city officials about the project.

The parking area around the swimming pool is to be paved, plus the street between the pool and the Little League park and some other streets or portions of blocks around the pool and ball parks. Also there will be some parking areas paved near the ballfields.

Bids on the job have been a little less than anticipated, so the money left over from a Community Development Block Grant to the city will take care of

the paving. About \$72,000 was left from a three-year grant which specified that the money be spent in the south and east portions of the city, and the city has obtained permission to use the leftover funds for the paving.

Mayor Jim Solomon said Monday night he wants all Tahoka citizens to be aware that no-city money from taxes or fees is being used for the paving.

Councilman and the mayor also pointed out that if any firms or individuals want any paving done by Caprock while the crews and equipment are in the city, they may be able to get the job done at less expense than they would otherwise. One firm wanting a parking lot paved and an individual wanting some street paving done already have inquired about this. Anyone interested may contact the company direct, or call City Manager Barry Pittman and he will put the two parties into contact with each other to make their own arrangements.

Appearing before the council Monday to discuss possible new franchise agreements were Weldon Self of Energas and Jerry Slaughter of General Telephone Co.

The council members spent some time looking at a preliminary proposed budget for

next year. Councilmen present were Wayne Tekell, Dayton Parker, Nick Summitt, Milt Uzzle and Leonard Dunn.

## Juvenile Is Charged After Pedestrian Hit

Tahoka police arrested a 15-year-old on Monday for driving an automobile on private property and he was charged with aggravated assault with a motor vehicle and he was turned over to juvenile officers.

Police reported that the juvenile's vehicle had struck Martin Edwards of Tahoka while he was walking in the parking lot at Ince-Tant-Stop convenience store. Edwards was treated for minor injuries at Lynn County Hospital and released.

Police picked up a runaway juvenile during the past week out of Post who had been driving a motor vehicle without authorization. The juvenile was turned over to a probation officer.

Police also arrested one person on a DPS warrant out of Lubbock and arrested one person for public intoxication during the past week.

A Dept. of Public Safety patrolman investigated a multi-vehicle accident on U.S. 380 east of Tahoka just after midnight Saturday, when several vehicles carrying young persons were involved. A fight also was related to the collisions, which reportedly came after Tahoka youths and

some from Post had a confrontation.

The DPS officer said no serious injuries resulted, but said he was continuing his investigation this week and would have a full report later on the wrecks.

Robert Abbe Jr. of Wilson reported two calves, each weighing about 425 pounds, were killed by an unknown vehicle on U.S. 87 about 8 miles north of Tahoka on July 14.

Eleven persons were in jail during the last week, mostly on traffic and liquor offenses. Four were jailed for public intoxication, one was held on three counts of speeding and two counts of failure to appear and two counts of no liability insurance. One each was held on charges of speeding plus failure to appear, driving while intoxicated, second offense, plus unlawfully carrying a weapon, theft by check, DWI, DWI subsequent offense, and one had no liability insurance plus an expired inspection sticker plus DPS traffic warrants.

Football teams at Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell schools will start workouts in earnest next week, and in Tahoka Coach Ted Wiley issued shoes and shorts Wednesday and voiced optimism that this season will be a good one for the Bulldogs.

Both pre-season scrimmages will be away from home, with the team going to Anton on Aug. 20 and to Ropesville on Aug. 28. Following a fun time game and get-together of coaches and players this Saturday, two-a-day workouts will begin at 9 a.m. Monday, and full pads will be issued Aug. 14.

In the Saturday fun game, the coaches and freshmen will take on sophomores, juniors and seniors at 7 p.m. at the softball field.

Coach Wiley's assistants will be Joe Paradis, defensive coordinator; Ron Yancy, Jerry Henley, Larry Dearen and Charlie Mac Holland.

Season tickets for the five Bulldog home games will go on sale next week at the school business office. Price again will be \$17.50 for the five games.

### SHOP IN TAHOKA

GRANDPARENTS Day in Texas is supposed to be celebrated on Sept. 13, and is being promoted by the Texas Dept. on Aging, which does a lot of good things for older persons, although I'm not yet convinced that special recognition for grandparents is all that necessary.

Grandchildren are really great (or grand, or whatever), but grandparents can be a pain sometimes. Some of them whip out pictures of their grandchildren and go down the street showing them to everybody in sight. If you're 25 years old, you're bored to death, and if you are a grandparent yourself, you can't wait for them to get through showing their pictures so you can pull out your own set and demonstrate clearly that your grandchildren are a lot prettier and smarter and cuter and just plain better than theirs are.

Most grandparents are not like that, though. Most are pretty nice folks, and they love their grandchildren as much as any other grandparent. But they show their pictures only

when someone asks. Come by and ask, and I'll show you mine.

WHEN you are dusting roses or spraying trees, it's easy to get pesticides on your body as well as the plants, says the Texas A&M Ag Extension Service, adding that "Taking a shower removes the pesticides from you — but what about your clothes?"

Dr. Ann Beard, a home economist with the Aggie organization, says that clothing should not be washed with other non-contaminated clothing, but should be pre-washed with a hose outside, or soaked in a bucket and then washed on the pre-wash cycle to get all the bad stuff off the fibers.

Dr. Beard also suggests that "it's best to change clothes in the garage, if possible, and put contaminated clothes aside before going inside to shower."

I guess you could do this in a carport if you don't have a garage. That ought to give the neighbors something to talk about.

## Patricia Davis In Capitol For Young Leaders Event

Patricia Davis of Tahoka this week is joining approximately 260 other outstanding recent high school graduates at the week-long National Young Leaders Conference Postgraduate Program. Based on the proven qualities of citizenship, leadership and academic achievement, Patricia has been selected as a Congressional Scholar by the Congressional Youth Leadership Council.

The Conference focuses on the three branches of government, the media, and world affairs. Throughout the week, the Scholars meet with numerous government leaders and others who participate in the American constitutional process. On a daily basis, the Scholars confer in small groups with faculty advisors to prepare for meetings with these leaders.

The Legislative Day opens with welcoming remarks from Congressmen Ray McGrath of New

York and Mike Synar of Oklahoma on the Floor of the House of Representatives, followed by seminars addressing the most pressing issues facing the 100th Congress. Patricia is then scheduled to meet with Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, Sen. Phil Gramm and Rep. Charles Stenholm or their designated staff members. To gain insight into the lobbying process on Capitol Hill, the scholars attend a government relations forum with representatives from the trade and telecommunications industry.

The Judicial/Foreign Policy Day will begin with an address by Judge Ruth Bader Ginsburg of the U.S. District Court of Appeals on the role of the judiciary. Dividing into small groups, the scholars will visit the embassies of India, South Korea, Egypt, Australia, Somalia and the Vatican City. Next, they attend choice of informal foreign policy

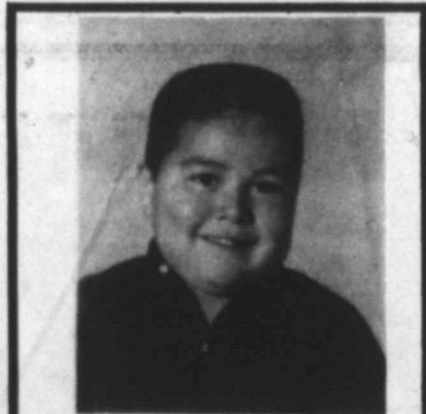


seminars taught by Johns Hopkins University graduate students, followed by a series of career seminars led by successful young Washington area professionals.

The Executive Branch/Media Day examines the executive branch of the government and the role of the Washington press corps. Breakfast at the National Press Club includes a question and answer period with leading journalists such as Bill Plante, White House correspondent for CBS News, and Fred Barnes, senior editor of the New Republic. Then members of the administration, among them Michael B. Smith, Deputy U.S. Trade Representative, and Judge William Weld from the Criminal Division of the Justice Department, discuss executive branch functions. To culminate the conference, the scholars conduct a mock Congress in the Capitol building by simulating a debate and vote on immigration legislation.

### Bingo Tax Rebate Told

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent second quarter checks totaling \$1,428,396.92 to 96 cities and 62 counties out of the 124 cities and 71 counties that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent local gross receipts tax on the game.

As of Friday, July 31, a total of 1,625 non-profit organizations were licensed to hold bingo games in Texas.

Lynn County received \$1,382.97 net payment this period compared to \$1,687.25 received during the same period last year.

I am extremely proud to thank the area jump rope students in Lynn County for the \$755 they raised in the 1986-87 Jump Rope for Heart event, co-sponsored by the American Heart Association and the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Our outstanding Jump Rope Coordinator made this possible. Ilene Beard, Gardner Elementary School, was the teacher who helped our Lynn County youngsters "get a jump" on a heart healthy lifestyle by promoting the importance of regular exercise through the Jump Rope for Heart team competition.

Not many people know that of the total number of deaths in Lynn County in 1985, almost half were due to heart disease. The money our students and Jump Rope for Heart coordinator raised helps support the American Heart Association in its mission to prevent premature death and disability due to cardiovascular disease, including heart attack and stroke.

In fact, 70 percent of \$755 helps to support research, public education, and community service programs conducted by the American Heart Association. Another 5 per cent is channeled back to Texas school physical education programs through the American Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (AAHPERD) and the Texas Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (TAPHERD). The remainder supports the promotion of the Jump Rope for Heart program, including the student, teacher and school prizes, curriculum guides, etc.

Thanks to the students in the Lynn County Division, a major effort has been made in the fight against heart disease.

The committee welcomes suggestions of new activities for the Harvest Festival day.

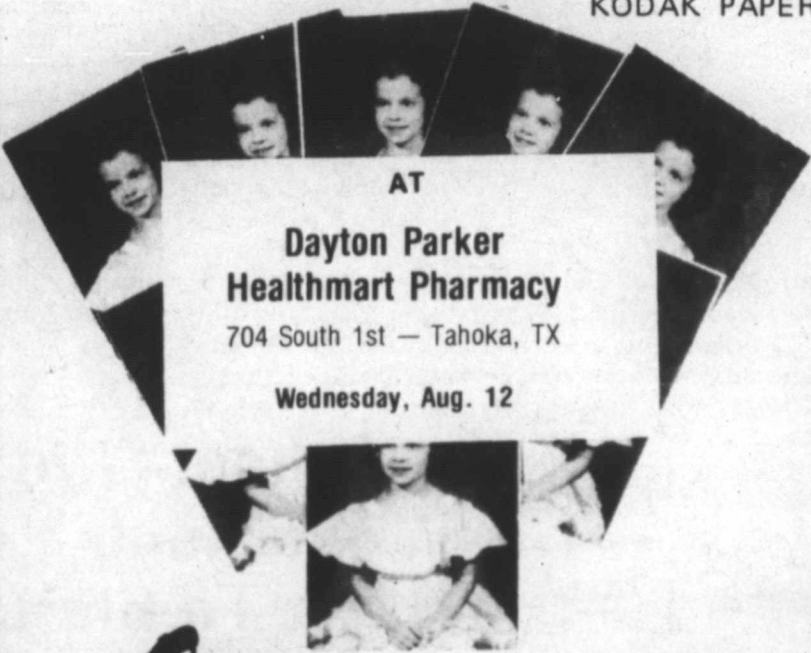

**Panel Approves Textile Trade Bill:** By voice vote, the House Ways and Means subcommittee on trade has approved the textile trade bill despite opposition of Subcommittee Chairman Sam Gibbons (D-Fla.). The bill mandates separate global import quotas for each textile product category, and limits 1987 imports to a 1 percent increase over 1986 levels. It also freezes 1987 footwear imports at 1986 levels. The measure is expected to go to full committee the week of July 20, and House Speaker Wright (D-Tex.) has set July 29 as the tentative date for floor action. Meanwhile, 11 National Cotton Council representatives were among a group of 150 fiber, textile, apparel and labor leaders who succeeded in signing six additional sponsors for the bill in a two-day effort this week, including Rep. Richard Lehman (D-Calif.). Co-sponsors now

number 246 in the House and 50 in the Senate. **Cotton Textile Imports Rise:** Cotton textile and apparel imports continued to rise in May, reaching 453.9 million square yard equivalents and topping year-ago imports by 14.5 percent. Cotton imports for the first five months of 1987 hit 2.4 billion square yards or 12 percent above the same period in 1986. Expanded Boll Weevil Program Readying For Take-Off: Preparations for expanding the South-eastern boll weevil eradication program to Georgia, South Alabama and North Florida this fall have shifted into high gear following President Reagan's signing of the supplemental appropriations measure including the federal government's 30 percent cost share of the program. Growers in the three-state area will pay 70 percent of the cost of the

program, which will be administered by USDA's Animal, Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS). The agency's first move will be to hire personnel to map the cotton fields involved, and get bids for chemicals and aerial applicators. A diapause program will start this fall with insecticide applications to reduce the number of boll weevils going into overwintering habitats.

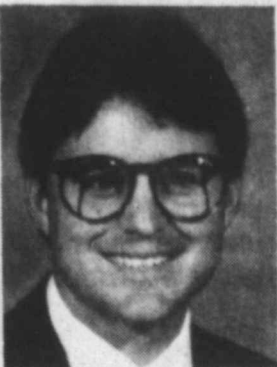
### Hank Murray Concert Slated

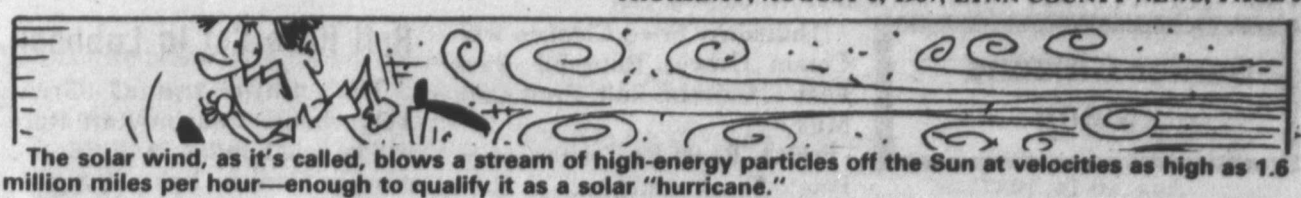
#### Hearing Tests Set For Tahoka

The purpose of this notice is to inform you about your taxes. The 1987 effective tax rate is a tax rate that would levy the same amount of operating taxes the taxing unit levied last year on property taxed in both years, plus the amount the unit needs to pay certain long-term debts this year. The rate is calculated as follows:

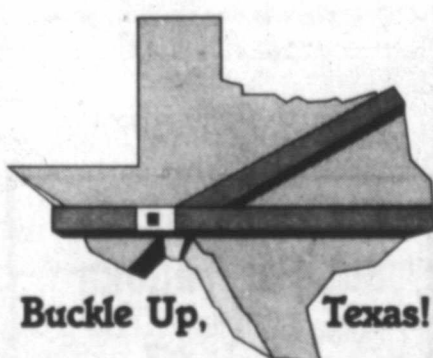

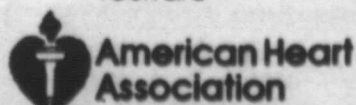

# End Of Irrigation Nears For Cotton Crop

South Plains cotton producers should seriously consider terminating irrigation by Aug. 15-20, advises a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Not only would continued irrigation be an additional expense farmers certainly don't need this year, it could delay maturity of a crop already well behind schedule, cautioned Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist.

"Pay attention to the calendar and look at the probability of making a bloom after mid-August," Supak advised producers who irrigate.

The Extension specialist said two factors influence his recommendation. First is the rapid drop in the probability that blooms after mid-August will develop into mature bolls. Second is that, for this year's crop, heat unit accumulation, a guideline for fiber maturity, is running well behind the long range average.

"A large percentage of this year's cotton (on the South Plains) is June-planted," Supak noted. Across the area as a whole, the average date for the first blooms was around July 25-27, approximately two weeks later than normal.

Supak cited research studies at Lubbock by Dr. Don Wanjura, USDA agricultural engineer, and others which show that historically cotton plants which bloom here on Aug. 15 have a 71 percent

chance of maturing. Bolls initiated on Aug. 20, however, have only a 36 percent chance of maturing, and another ten-day delay of bloom, to Aug. 30, means only a 14 percent chance of maturing.

South of Lubbock, Aug. 15 blooms have near-perfect potential and Aug. 20 blooms have a 71 percent chance.

Rainfall is another consideration, the Extension specialist said. "Our probability for rainfall increases in late August and September," he noted.

"If we apply irrigation and also get rain, it will further delay the maturity of the crop and cause excessive vegetative growth," he said.

He urged producers to keep in mind the old guidelines that with furrow irrigation, don't start any water after Aug. 15 and plan to terminate all irrigation by Aug. 20-22. With center pivot irrigation, where controlled amounts of water can be applied, the deadline can be extended until about Sept. 1, he said.

# Imports Hurting Farmers

The Textile and Apparel Trade Act of 1987 is the only fair way to deal with an import problem which continues to hurt the U.S. cotton industry and other related industries in the national economy, National Cotton Council president Aven Whittington told the Senate Finance Committee today.

Whittington, a Greenwood, Miss., producer, said cotton textile and apparel imports have more than doubled since 1980 and now account for 39 percent of the cotton consumed by the U.S. population.

"Those imports are taking precious dollars out of U.S. farmers' pockets," said Whittington. "While cotton textile imports have increased 133 percent, the price of cotton in this country has fallen by more than a third since 1980 and this--combined with lost markets--has cost U.S. cotton producers billions of dollars."

Whittington said American consumers are buying more cotton than they have for the past 20 years and cotton consumption has grown by 3.4 million bales during that time period. But, he pointed out, imports of cotton textile products have taken two-thirds of that growth.

He disputed claims of critics who believe limited textile growth will cause higher prices for consumers. In markets such as cotton velveteens, Whittington said U.S. manufacturers have been eliminated by unfair competition, and prices of imported products have risen higher than previously quoted.

The Council president said many factors have contributed to the increase in textile imports: cheap foreign wages, restrictive U.S. environmental and workplace regulations, foreign government subsidies, and loop holes in negotiated import quotas. "It is naive to believe that foreign textile and apparel manufacturers will hold their export growth to the percentage allowed under international and bilateral agreements," Whittington concluded. "Experience over more than two decades proves that negotiated textile trade agreements are not an adequate solution."

**Dear John:**  
John Deere Answers Your Lawn and Garden Woes

**Water Wheel of Fortune**

Dear John: I'm playing vegetable roulette by growing a garden in a drought. How can I improve the chances that the plants will survive?

Dear Garden Gambler: Only a roll of the dice can determine whether vegetables will make it through a drought—but there are some ways to improve the odds of their survival.

Take a plunge and plant earlier than usual if you expect a particularly dry season. There's more moisture in the soil in early spring than any other time of the year. Also, water escapes rapidly from the ground when the soil is bare, so grow vegetables in wide, dense rows or blocks to trap moisture.

Use weed-free mulches that hold in moisture by reducing evaporation. Cultivate around plants before watering to loosen the soil, so water will soak into the ground easily.

Also, be sure your garden gets 1 inch of water a week. Water in the early morning so foliage dries by evening.

Dear John: Do the flowers in my window box require a different treatment from those in my yard?

Dear Pondering Pandora: The

flowers in your window box do need a little extra care.

For one thing, containerized soil dries out quickly and needs watering more frequently than soil in your garden. Water flower boxes when the top ½ to 1 inch of soil dries out.

Also, window box flowers need to be fertilized frequently—about every other week.

Prune containerized flowers often to maintain their appearance.

Dear John: My neighbor says his lawn is infested with grubs. Is this problem contagious?

Dear Nervous Neighbor: Your lawn won't "catch" a grub problem from your neighbor's lawn. Even so, you should probably give your lawn a check-up to see if it's already grub-infested.

To diagnose grub damage, pull up a piece of the damaged turf. If it lifts easily, like a carpet, grubs are probably at work and the lawn may have to be treated with a pesticide.

To cure a grub problem, consider applying an insecticide. Water thoroughly, so the insecticide can get below the root system where grubs are feeding. See a county extension agent for advice on specific chemicals.



# Hot Air Balloon Rally Scheduled

Plans were made Tuesday night by representatives of the Lubbock Balloon Club and the Board of Directors of Buffalo Springs Lake for a colorful spectacle that will be viewed by an estimated 40,000 people from over the West Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Colorado area.

Annual Hot Air Balloon Rally to be held at sunrise on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 19-20 at the Buffalo Springs Lake site located just southeast of Lubbock's city limits.

Agreements were reached between the two groups with emphasis being placed on the actual launch site area, insurance coverage, and parking for so large a group. Assurances were given by the Lake officials
