## **Bulldogs Beat Seagraves** On Field Goal, 17-14

Rusty Jenning's field goal and Percy Rogers' two touchdowns and and his game-saving tackle on the last play gave the Tahoka Bulldogs a 17-14 district-opening victory at Seagraves last Friday.

It was the first win of the year for Tahoka and put the Dogs in a four-way tie for first place in district standings, as Coach Ted Wiley's team this week prepares for a homecoming game here against Morton.

The Indians were beaten 20-6 last week by Spur, which like New Deal in 4-AA has not lost a game all season. Shallowater was the other district winner, beating Ralls 47-0.

Friday night's win over Seagraves was sweet and fairly rare for the Bulldogs, as Tahoka had lost six games in a row to

Seagraves since beating them 30-22 in 1965.

Early in the second quarter Friday Rogers broke free and raced down the right sideline 42 yards to score, and after George Morin kicked the point, it was 7-0, Tahoka. But Seagraves came back to score on a 1-yard plunge by Curtis Wilson after Tahoka turned the ball over on a fumble at the Bulldog 13, and the halftime score was 7-7.

The Eagles went in front in the third quarter with a 42-yard scoring pass from QB Glen Allen Phillips to Bryan Legan, and a kick made it 14-7.

In the fourth, however, Seagraves muffed a punt and Bul!dog End Kurt Bryan fell on it at the Eagles 3. Rogers ran 3 yards to score with 8:50 left and Morin kicked to tie the score again at 14.

With just 33 seconds left in the game, Jennings kicked a 28-yard field goal. He had never attempted a field goal in a game, but Morin was injured, so Coach Wiley told Jennings to kick it. The kick was a line drive which just barely cleared the crossbar to give Tahoka the lead.

It wasn't over, however. Seagraves, after the kickoff, made one first down running, then threw a couple of incomplete passes. Then, with just 3 seconds left for a final play, a desperation pass appeared to be intercepted by Tahoka defender · Jim Patterson, but the ball skipped off his fingers to be caught by Wilson of Seagraves, who headed for what looked to be a long touchdown run on the final play. But he was overhauled by Rogers and knocked out of bounds at the Tahoka 5, after going about 60 yards and with time already expired.

Tahoka's wishbone attack ground out 248 yards rushing and 57 yards passing, and two Bulldog backs gained more than 100 yards. Jennings had 104 yards in 14 carries and Rogers gained 101 in 11 carries. The two backs averaged 7.4 and 9.2 yards per carry, respectively.



Mrs. Madeline Hegi introduced the program presented in conjunction with the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs' own project entitled "Stop Elder Abuse". The program was presented by Mike Downing of Lubbock who is with the Adult Protective Services division of the Texas Department of Human Resources. He was accompanied by Mrs. Maxine Looney, the divisions' caseworker for this area. Downing stated that an estimated 110,000 elderly and disabled Texans will be abused, neglected, and exploited by a relative or caregiver this year. In 1983 a law was passed requiring any person who believes such a situation exists to report the circumstances to the department. A person may do this confidentially, and even anonymously, if he prefers. The law provides that the person making such a report is immune from civil or criminal liability, unless he is acting in bad faith or with malicious purpose. The toll-free 24-hour Adult Abuse Hotline number is 1-800-252-5400. Once a report is made, the law requires the department to initiate a prompt and thorough investigation of any suspected need for protective services within 24 hours of the report. In 1985, 49 percent of the cases investigated were situations of self-neglect, 20 percent were situations of caretaker neglect, 18 percent were abuse cases, and 13 percent were instances of financial exploitation. Downing said that the greatest problem in aiding Adult Protective Services victims is a lack of resources such as emergency shelter, medical and psychological services, and supervised residential care for those suffering from Alzheimer's disease and other related disorders. He encouraged club members to get involved individually and collectively to help with this problem. "The best way to begin is to familiarize yourselves with the elderly and disabled of your community, learn about their

needs, and help to meet those





## Armed Robbery, New **Burglaries Reported**

A new round of burglaries and thefts in Lynn County, and an armed robbery in O'Donnell headed a list of incidents investigated by officers in the county during the last week.

Shortly after midnight Thursday, two men wearing stockings over their faces, with one carrying a rifle and the other a knife, entered Allsup's in O'Donnell, threatened clerk Mary Garza and escaped with a little more than \$200 in cash.

The clerk said the men ordered her to put the money from the cash register into sacks, then fled the scene. A white van seen leaving the general area was later found abandoned east of O'Donnell where a 1980 GMC pickup owned by Pat Hensley was stolen from a farm hand's home.

Investigation into the holdup was continuing this week, and Sheriff Clifford Laws said two suspects in the case were in custody in Amarillo Wednesday. Also, the stolen pickup was believed to have been located in Lubbock.

Five burglaries were reported in the county during the week and Crime Line 998-5145, has offered \$500 rewards in each case. The Ernest Perez residence on FM 179 in the Lakeview community was entered and missing items included an RCA video cassette recorder and a turntable, total value \$530.

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## Lynn County Farm Tour Set







## **Face Farmers**

Cotton farmers across the South Plains are again facing the prospect of bark contamination which can reduce their payments for ginned fiber, cautions a cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Because of the late crop, excessive moisture and rank growth in many fields, the problems of barky cotton could be serious again this year, said Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist.

One thing growers can do to minimize the problem, Supak said, is to pay strict attendtion to the way their strippers are adjusted before harvesting.

He said the Extension Service has a limited number of copies of videotape which can help farmers combat bark and stick content which reduce the grade of the fiber. The tape, which runs less than 10 minutes, would be appropriate for use at gin offices or producer meetings, he said. It is available from Supak. It explains basic adjustments and stripper modification developed by U.S. Department of Agriculture engineers. The modification has been shown in area demonstrations to reduce the stick content in stripped cotton.

It has been shown, in USDA and Estension tests with producers, that stick content is closely related to the bark content of ginned cotton.

"Reducing the stick content is a good way to reduce the number of barky bales," Supak said. In USDA tests, this modification reduced the number of barky bales up to 65 percent.




Lynn County boasts some 266 4-H members who are among more then 305,000 in Texas and 4.5 million across the country who will participate in the week-long celebration.







**On Changes** Typically, the shared activity of husband and wife decreases from the beginning of marriage onward, with some variations. Yet this increasing independence of spouses can be part of a close relationship.

Mutual independence may involve separations that allow each spouse to pursue his or/her special interests, or may require a change of household and childcare responsiblities. These adjustments may be strongly resisted in couples who have a division of labor that rests on sex-roles.

Couples may need to ask if they resist taking on the other's responsibilities because they are "bad at it," because it is "feminine" or "masculine," or for what other reason.

Similarly, some husbands feel inadequate to be the warm, sharing, caring person their wives may be growing to expect. And women may feel unable to put their needs on a plane with those of their husbands and children because of earlier training which encouraged them to attend to the needs of others.

What makes a good marriage in middle age? It seems to be one where there is an unusual degree of sharing of personal feelings and values, one that will demanding survive even changes within the relationship. It should have "stretching ability," enabling the partners to adapt to the stresses of change, including the development and growth of the two partners.



Quarry tile is durable and highly impact resistant, but will chip and crack if given a severe blow. It is installed with mastic, a thick, sticky paste, and can be put over almost any base. The colors of quarry tile range

from terra cotta to slate blue. You'll need to clean it with a damp mop and synthetic soapless detergent, rinse and sponge dry, then wax with a water base wax.

Ceramic clay tile is non-fading and very resistant to wear. It's available glazed or unglazed and doesn't stain from grease or chemicals, which makes it a good choice for kitchens.

Ceramic clay tile is available in many shapes and colors. Be aware that certain ceramic tiles are used only for walls, and others are used only for floors. Make sure you get flooring tiles, since wall tiles will not be as durable.

Wash ceramic glazed tiles with a synthetic detergent. If the tiles aren't glazed, apply a coat of water-base wax for protection.

Mexican clay tiles have a crude base with a smooth surface. They are durable and inexpensive, but available in only limited colors.

True Mexican tiles or "pavers" are still produced by hand with local clays and dried in open fields. Firing in primitive ovens leaves them porous. Although they are less expensive, you should order 20 percent more than needed to allow for tiles that break in shipment or those that are defective.

Mexican tile requres installation by a professional on a depressed floor, because they're about one inch thick, uneven, warped and dry.

For care, the Mexican tile requires regular dusting. Wash it occasionally with a synthetic detergent then wax it with a water-base wax.
