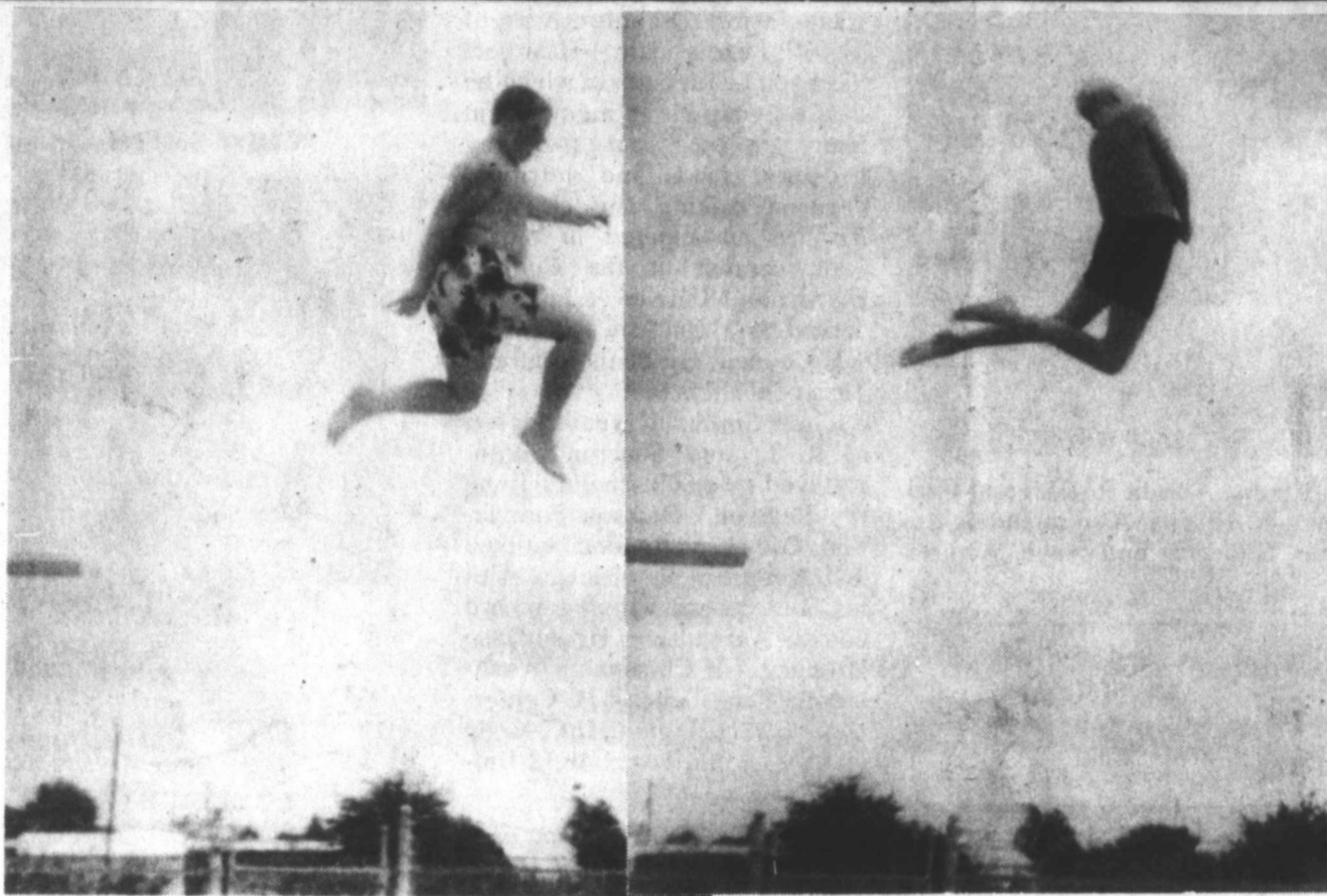
County Pays Bills, Okays Vehicle Repair

Lynn County commissioners Monday approved routine payments of several budgeted expenses and authorized the sheriff's department to have a new engine installed in one of the department's vehicles, a Ford Bronco.

Payments approved included \$392 for April food commodities, \$213 for a law firm working on the possible consolidation of justice of the peace precincts, and \$10,980 to the Texas Assn. of Counties for workman's compensation.

County Clerk C.W. Roberts and District Clerk Joy Laws were given permission to attend the annual convention of county and district clerks in Corpus Christi June 20-24.

All commissioners and Judge J.F. Brandon were present for the session, which ended before noon Monday.

Spence, Woodard Win Four-Year Scholarships

Two Tahoka High School graduates were awarded \$8,000 scholarships each in special ceremonies last Thursday night at the Astrodome in Houston. Jody Woodard and Jason Spence were presented the four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo Future Farmers of America (FFA) scholarships, two of 50 such scholarships awarded statewide.

Jody, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Woodard, recently graduated from Tahoka High School where he was valedictorian. He was involved in FFA, serving as chapter president. Jody was Star Greenhand, Star Chapter Farmer and Star Lone Star Farmer. He was on the junior chapter conducting and the livestock judging teams.

While in high school, he was vice president of the National Honor Society, captain of the baseball team and sophomore representative of the student council.

Jody, who plans to major in agricultural business at Texas Tech University, was one of more than 200 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship winners honored.

Jason, son of Mrs. Jean Ann Spence, recently graduated from

Tahoka High School in the top quarter of his class. He was a 4-H member for nine years. He was the recipient of honors such as the Gold Star, Danforth "I Dare You" and State Fair of Texas awards.

While in high school he was National Honor Society president, FFA Lone Star Farmer and student council reporter.

Jason plans to major in animal science at Texas Tech University.

For the first time in Show history, many of the student recipients sharing in the Show's annual educational commitment exceeding \$1 million were gathered in one place, along with committee volunteers, Show officials and guests.

"We wanted our 6,000 volunteers, who make this Show and these scholarships possible, to be able to see the results of their efforts," said Show president Hal Hillman. "It's such a thrill to be able to meet these outstanding young people personally. They represent a very promising future for agriculture."

The winners are carefully selected from hundreds of applicants, based on leadership qualities and academic excellence. They then must attend a Texas college or university and major in some form of agriculture.

The funding for these scholarships is earned at the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. The Show is a charitable, civic event with all efforts, actions and revenues benefiting youth and education.

Tahoka Sales Taxes More For Month

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas cities can expect handsome revenue increases from their local sales as the Texas economic recovery continues to pick up steam.

This month's city allocation checks showed a 23.5 percent increase over June 1987, a growth rate too high to attribute to the broadened sales tax base.

"Local governments will continue to see a healthy increase in revenues from their sales taxes as the state's economy mends and consumer confidence grows," Bullock said.

Tahoka's payment for the month was \$4,238.49, compared to \$3,336.14 for the same month last year. So far in 1988, the city has received \$31,409.13, about \$3,000 more than for the same period last year.

Texas' economic outlook will continue to improve, barring a national recession or a collapse in oil prices, according to Bullock.

Since January, the state has sent \$465.9 million in local taxes to cities across the state, an increase of 10.3 percent over last year's allocations during the same period.

"This increase is too great to be attributed to the Legislature's broadening of the sales tax base, which was estimated to bring in an extra 3.5 percent in local revenues," Bullock said.

Bullock projected that local sales tax revenues statewide will continue to increase at an average rate of more than eight percent a year through 1991.

Water/Lead Ratio Okay In Tahoka

Citizens of Tahoka will be receiving a mailout this week from the city notifying them of "Lead and your drinking water." Every public water system in the state is required, by the Texas Department of Health, to notify everyone in their systems of the effects of lead in drinking water. The notification is required even though the Tahoka system is in compliance with contaminant levels, according to City Manager Barry Pittman.

Another reminder from the city is that dumping grass clippings in the dumpsters is not allowed. Dumpsters that are found in violation of this rule could be red tagged and not emptied until the situation is remedied, Pittman said.

Also, the city is picking up brush in the alleys, for no charge, when time allows. "Please centralize all brush next to the dumpsters. The brush truck will not be picking up anything other than brush," he said.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10-year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

Zero-92 Bill For Cotton

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm sponsored and successfully moved a provision through the U.S. House Agriculture Committee that will aid drought-stricken, cotton farmers.

Congressman Stenholm introduced in Ag Committee his bill, H.R. 4615, which extends the "zero-92" program to cotton. Zero-92 allows farmers to set-aside amounts of their crop base and protects deficiency payments. With allowances made for 1988, this option allows cotton farmers to sign up for program participation an avoid soil erosion by planting on

drought-stricken land. In order to comply with government programs in place now, farmers must plant or risk losing some of the crop base.

"This bill will allow cotton farmers, who experience drought problems, to have an option," Congressman Stenholm said. "The same kind of program is applicable for wheat and feed grains. It just seems fair and makes sense to apply the same standards toward cotton."

Noting that the bill was introduced on Tuesday and marked up on Wednesday, Congressman Stenholm said, "I believe the quick attention given to this bill show the importance and timeliness of such legislation,

Chairman of the Governor's Task Force on Agricultural Development is Jerry Harris, a Lamesa cotton producer.

Members of the task force include farmers and ranchers serving in leadership positions in Texas commodity groups and agricultural organizations, as well as leaders in private agribusiness and education.

The task force has divided itself into five committees to focus on the following areas: Research and technology, taxation and finance, federal issues, state planning, and rural development.

KLBK Rodeo Set In Lubbock

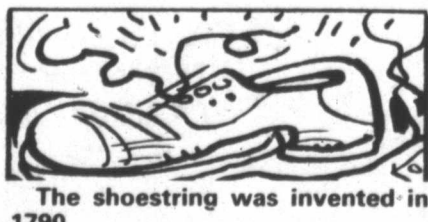

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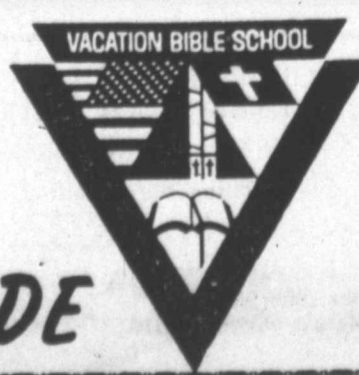

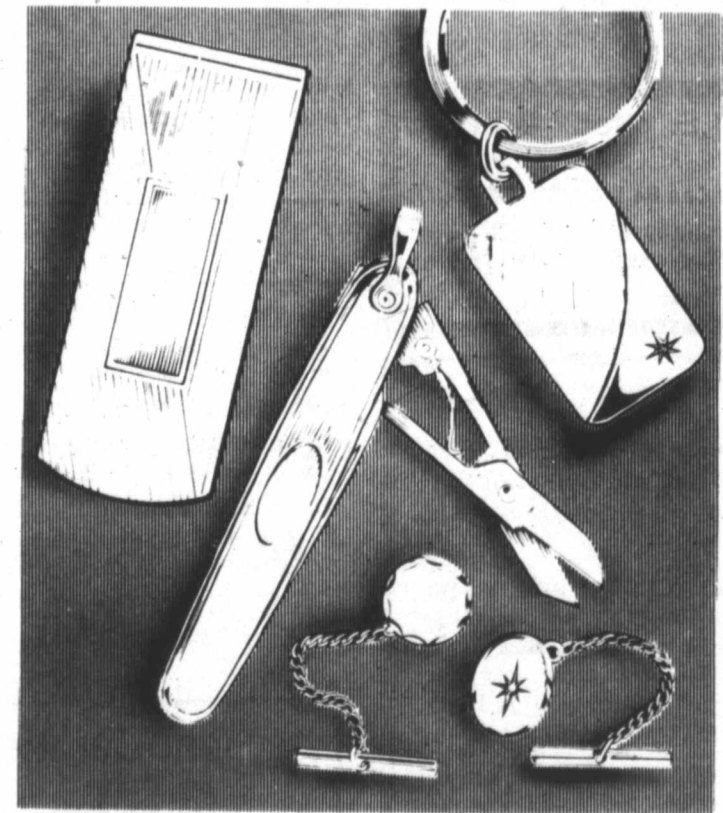
