

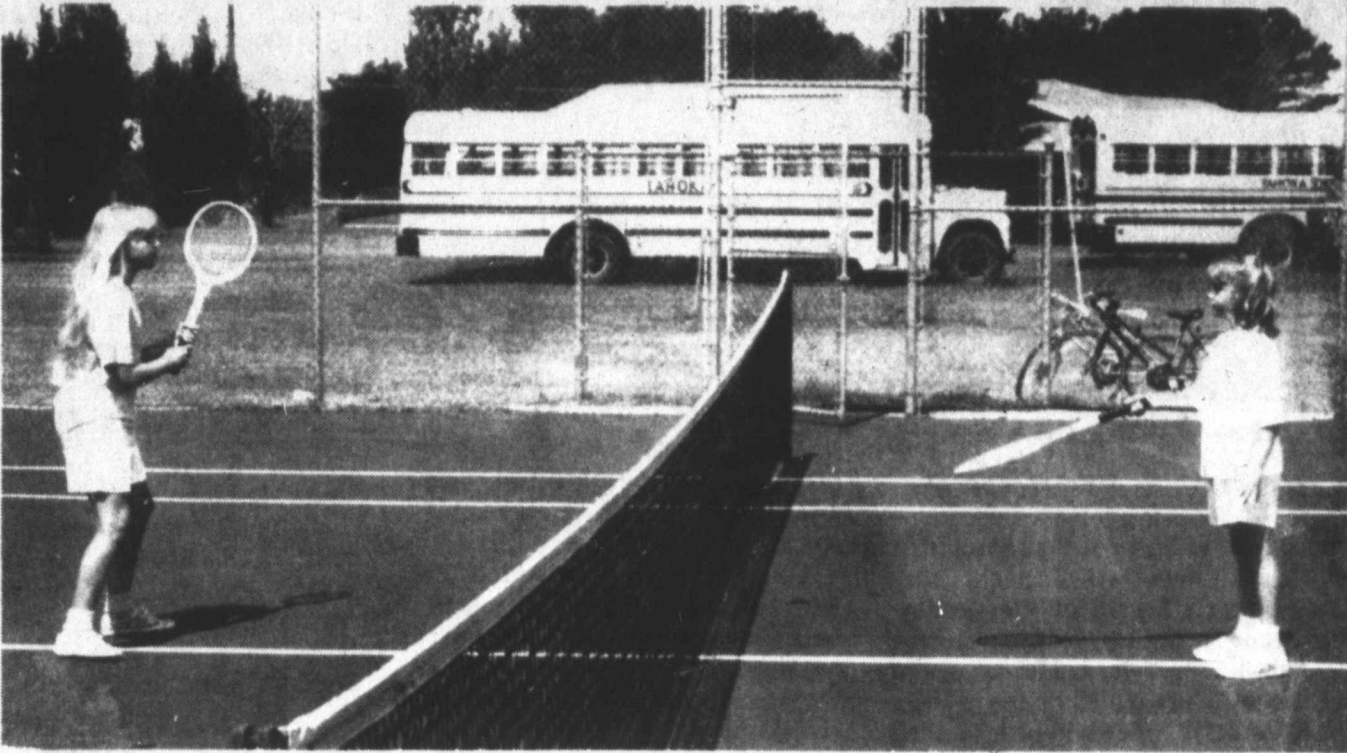

Lower Rates Ahead For SPS Customers

Customers in Texas cities served by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) soon should receive their second electric-rate decrease of the year. Also, SPS's rural customers should have their rates lowered to match rates within city limits, SPS announced this week.

The decreases in effect and proposed total \$20.6 million, or 4.3%, and reflect lower SPS expenses resulting primarily from federal tax reform, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

The proposed decreases were agreed to Friday, July 8, by SPS, the staff of the Public Utility

Commission of Texas (PUCT), the state's Office of Public Utility Counsel, the Texas Industrial Energy Consumers and the U.S. Dept. of Energy.

Details of the agreement are being worked out, and once approved, the reduction would be considered effective as of July 8, Hunter said. Approval from city and state regulators is expected within 35 to 60 days. A customer's first bill on which the reduction is calculated would include a credit recognizing the effect of the lower rate since July 8.

"This timing allows our customers to, in effect, receive lower rates even before the regulatory process is complete," Hunter said. "We worked out this arrangement in order to extend lower rates to all of our customers as soon as possible."

Because of an earlier agreement between SPS and the Texas cities it serves, customers within city limits received a 3.1% decrease effective March 28. Upon approval from the cities, these customers will receive an additional 1.2% decrease, Hunter said, to match the rural reduction of 4.3%.

In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates within their city limits. The PUCT regulates rates in rural areas. SPS will file with the PUCT for approval of the rural rate decrease and with 74 Texas cities it serves for approval of the rate decrease within city limits.

The percentage of rate decrease varies slightly among types of electric customers. Residential customers will receive a net 5.2%

decrease compared to rates in effect at the first of the year.

A monthly electric bill for a rural residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours would drop \$4.09, from \$73.51 to \$69.42. The bill for a customer within the city limits using 1,000 kilowatt hours dropped \$3 on March 28 and should decline another \$1.09, resulting in a bill of \$69.42.

County Okays New Contract On Juveniles

Lynn County commissioners Monday approved a new contract with the Lubbock Youth Center to house juveniles from Lynn County who must be confined. The court also approved payment to the Youth Center of \$1,518 for 92 days.

Adult probation officer Jerri Akard appeared in regard to her program, and commissioners were authorized to appoint election judges and alternates for the November general election.

All commissioners were present, plus Bobby Cox, commissioner-elect for Precinct 3.

Judge J.F. Brandon presided for part of the meeting, and Commissioner Bart Anderson presided for a portion of the time when the judge was attending a funeral.

Payment of \$830 to a law firm working on consolidation of the justice of the peace precincts was approved.

Spray Rig Stolen; Four Sentenced To Prison

Theft of a spray rig off a tractor and sentencing of four persons who pleaded guilty before District Judge George Hansard in Tahoka headed the list of law enforcement activities during the last week.

J.T. Miller of Tahoka reported a 2-gallon pressure tank and accessories stolen off a tractor Tuesday night, a quarter of a mile north of Tahoka near a county dirt road which is an extension of Ave. P. Crime Line, 998-5145, has offered a \$300 reward in the case.

Omene Montano Jr., 29, of O'Donnell, revocation of probation for burglary of the Ince Oil Co. convenience store in O'Donnell in 1983. He received a 7-year prison sentence.

Sylvester Rudolph Jones, 42, of Lubbock, four years in prison for theft of aluminum pipe from Johnny Armes on April 2.

Charles Landis Parker, 24, of Amarillo, five years in prison after pleading guilty of burglary of Haney Gin in Tahoka on Feb. 23.

Scott Hargrove, 23, of Amarillo, 15 years in prison after admitting his part in a holdup of Allsup's in O'Donnell last Sept. 24.

Terry Lynn Garvin reported to police that someone had damaged his 1982 Chevrolet pickup while parked in the 2000 block of Ave. L on Wednesday, July 6 between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. The driver's side door was reported damaged.

A Tahoka man was charged for public lewdness on July 7th and the subject was transported to Big Spring State Hospital for treatment.

Police investigated an accident on Saturday in the 1700 block of South 6th that involved a 1976 Ford flatbed truck driven by Domingo Saldana of Tahoka and a 1979 Chevrolet pickup driven by Cruz Rivas III. No injuries were reported.

In jail during the week were one person each for driving while intoxicated, theft, terroristic threat and aggravated robbery.

Sealcoating Of 12 Blocks In City Okayed

Kerr Construction Co. of Lubbock was awarded the contract for sealcoating 12 blocks of the city to prevent further deterioration of the streets. City council awarded the contract Monday night to Kerr on a low bid of \$12,645.

The council also approved purchase of a vehicle for City Administrator Barry Pittman. Pittman, Mayor Jim Solomon and all commissioners were present, plus A.C. Bowden of Lubbock, the city's consulting engineer.

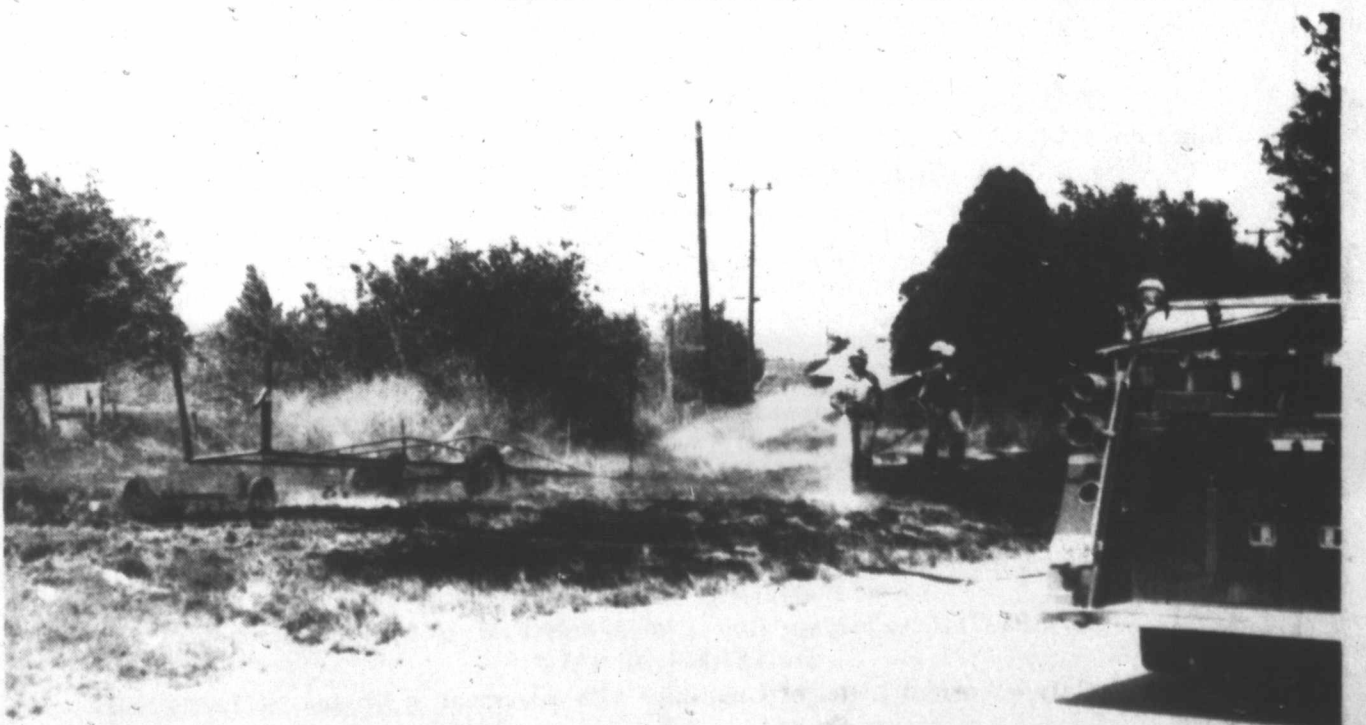

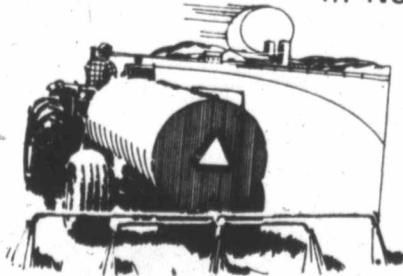
