Large Crowd Attends 13th Annual Festival

Saturday's Harvest Festival, the 13th annual celebration to be held on the Tahoka square, drew a large crowd as participants enjoyed a variety of food, crafts and games at booths and listened to country sounds from The Wooden Nickel band who entertained on the stage. Hourly merchants drawings were again popular this year, and ticket drawings were held late in the afternoon.

Mark Tekell of Tahoka won the Puerto Vallarta trip from the Queen ticket drawing. From the Princess ticket drawings, Eloisa Mendoza won the Tech weekend, Andrew Curry won a 10-speed bicycle, and Yvonne Chavarria won the girl's bicycle. Beverly Carlisle won the \$50 cash prize from the bubble gum drawing. All winners were from Tahoka.

Chelle Thomas, a senior at Tahoka High School, was crowned 1988 Harvest Festival Queen at ceremonies on stage Saturday afternoon. Miss Thomas is the daughter of Joe Thomas and Tommie Sue Pebsworth of Tahoka. She will receive a \$100 scholarship from Tahoka Chamberettes upon her graduation from high school.

First runner-up to the Festival Queen was Connie Parker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dayton Parker of Tahoka. She was also named Miss Congeniality by the other Queen candidates. She is a junior at THS.

Jay Jay Wiseman was second runner-up, a sophomore, daughter of Charlotte Mullanax. Other finalists were Jodi Williams, Kim Ingle, Kathy Davis and Christy Huffaker. Miss Huffaker sold the most tickets and was named Queen of Sales.

Judges for the contest were representatives of the Robert Spence School of Modeling in Lubbock. Last year's queen, Lacey Jolly, crowned the queen.

Melissa Resendez, a fourth grader, sold the most Princess tickets to capture the title of Harvest Festival Princess. She is the daughter of Romelia Resendez. First runner-up was Victoria DeLeon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip DeLeon. Second runner-up was Sarah Stringer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Stringer. Altogether, the 17 candidates sold over 3000 tickets.

In the Kiss-A-Pig contest sponsored by the Lynn County 4-H clubs, O'Donnell 4-H Club raised the most money for the American Cancer Society. Of the total \$1,712.38 raised, O'Donnell raised \$953.90, Tahoka 4-H'ers raised \$405.75 and Wilson 4-H'ers collected \$352.73.

Wilson School Principal Randy Moczygema was the representative of the club who raised the least amount of funds, and he had to kiss a pig on center stage at the festival. However, Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon and O'Donnell Mayor David Smith both good naturedly took their turn at pig-kissing, to the crowd's approval.

In Friday's Homecoming Parade, the THS sophomores won first place with their float, "Roast the Rabbits", followed

Bulldogs Falter Against Ralls

The Tahoka Bulldogs never could overcome the free touchdown they gave Ralls in the first quarter of last Friday's Homecoming Game here and finally went down 16-15 after playing a good second half.

This week the Dogs travel to Morton, whose Indians have been pretty docile this year so far in losing four games. Tahoka, now 1-2-1 overall, and 0-1 in district, should win this one unless they are destroyed by overconfidence, which could happen.

With just over three minutes gone in the game Friday, Tahoka had a punt blocked squarely by Ralls Sven Appleton, who chased the ball back into the end zone and fell on it for a Jackrabbit touchdown.

In the second quarter Ralls went up 10-0 after a 25-field goal by Maury Martinez, and this was the score at halftime.

The second half was more exciting for the large homecoming crowd, as Tahoka got moving with a 52-yard pass from QB Ramior Rodriguez to Thomas Glisson, who caught the ball behind the defender, but was chased down on the Ralls 14. A few plays later running back Charles Jurden scored from a foot away. Then on a fake placement kick, Jurden ran for 2 points to make it 10-8, Ralls, with 2:39 left in the third.

Late in the third, a penalty

with loss of down for Ralls set the Bulldogs up with a first goal at the Jackrabbit 8, from where Rodriguez ran for a touchdown, then he kicked the extra point to make it 15-10, Tahoka. The jubilation didn't last long, as Ralls came back to score early in the fourth quarter, with Appleton running 18 yards. The point try was no good, but Ralls led by a point.

Good defense by Shannon Clift, Michael Isbell, Cory McCleskey and Tim Young and others kept Ralls in check for the rest of the game, but Tahoka never could get the score they needed. One of Rodriguez' passes was intercepted in the Ralls end zone after almost being caught by a receiver and a pass in the last 40 seconds also was intercepted.

On offense for Tahoka, Jurden gained 59 yards in 11 carries, an average of 5.4. Mike Ramirez gained 24 yards in 6 carries and Rodriguez had 17 yards rushing in 5 carries, plus passing for 72 yards, although he completed just 2 of 13. One of these was the big one to Glisson.

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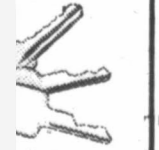

McCord Motor Co. Sets Opening, '89 Model Show

McCord Motor Co., a Tahoka business for more than half century, will show off its new facilities at the intersection of U.S. 380 and U.S. 87 today (Thursday) through Saturday. The grand opening celebration at the dealership, which moved to the new location Aug. 8 after years of operations on Main St., will include free refreshments, showing of the new 1989 models of Buicks, Olds, Pontiacs, Chevrolets and GMCs, and drawings for several prizes. Top prize to be offered in the drawing is a trip for two persons to Las Vegas. Persons may register at the dealership today, Friday or Saturday up to time of the drawings. McCord's is operated by H.B. McCord Jr. and Gary McCord, son and grandson of the founder of the business, H.B. McCord Sr., who first opened a Phillips service station in Tahoka in 1931 at the present site of the recently-closed Bain antique store. In 1936 McCord moved his station across

the street to the present location of Williams 66. In 1938 H.B. McCord Sr. was awarded the Pontiac franchise and established McCord Motor Co., also continuing to operate McCord Oil Co., both from the service station location. In 1945 the business was moved into the present location of Spruiell Automotive and in 1956 the building now occupied by Balloons and Flowers was built and was added to the auto dealership operations. When Wharton Motor Co. was purchased by McCord in 1978, Buick, Oldsmobile and GMC were added to the Pontiac line, and the business was moved to the Wharton location on east side of Main. Chevrolet was added in the 1987. H.B. McCord Sr. died in February, 1972. H.B. 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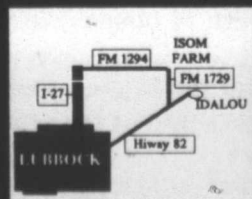

We like the idea of the Harvest Festival drawing visitors to admire the good work and at the same time have fun.

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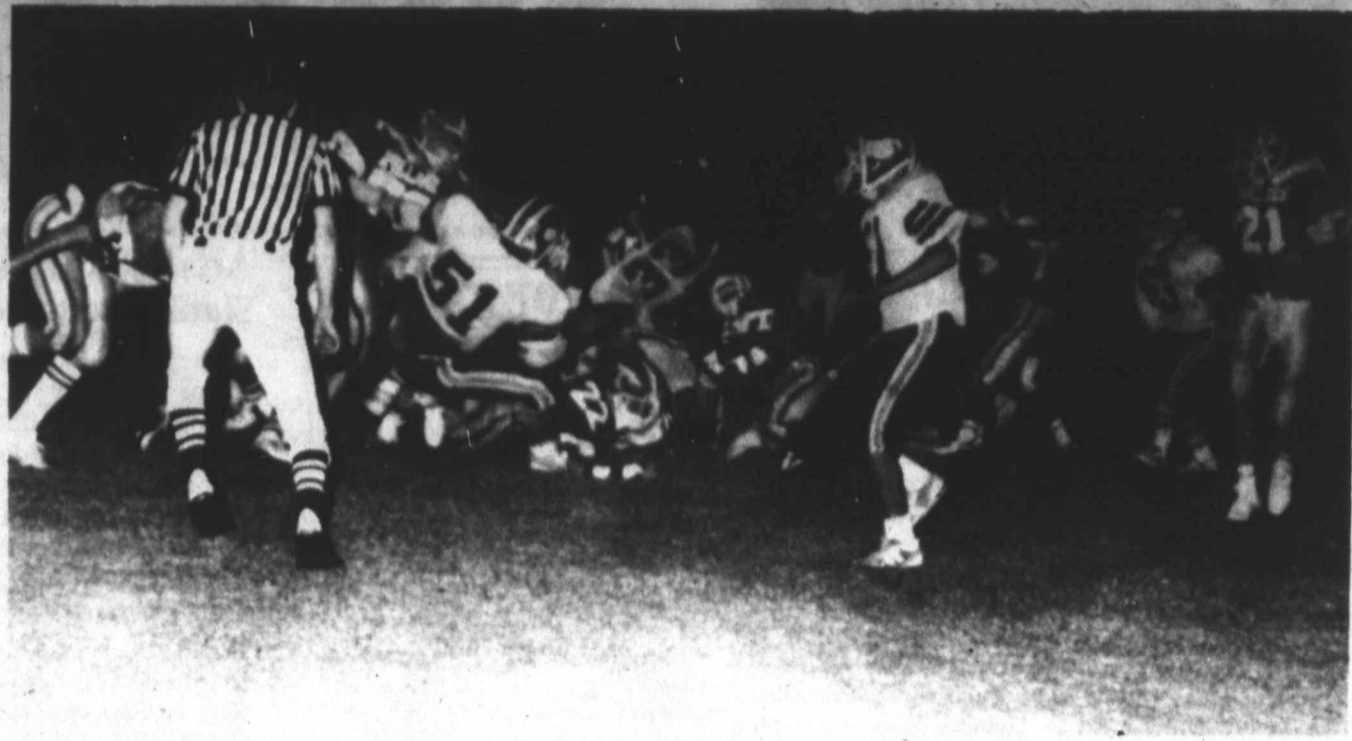
