## Woodwork...

OVER THE NEXT three years, says Bob Bullock, who is supposed to know everything about Texas finances, the Texas economy will continue to grow, and state revenues will increase. This is good news, and hopefully means there will be no increase in tax rates at the state level, but don't bet on it.

The January issue of *Fiscal Notes* from Bullock's office says the economy will grow in 1990 and 1991 at 3.6 per cent a year (a little more than one per cent faster than the national growth rate). And though it also says the state's tax take will be up 600 million dollars by 1991, I feel sure our legislators will find ways to spend the increase.

Bullock also says that by that time, Texas will have a population of about 17.6 million people (most of whom can be found in Sam's at Lubbock on any Saturday afternoon). This will represent a gain of 700,000 over the 1988 population.

I like those optimistic predictions, but can't help wondering how many of those new people will be burglars and deadbeats.

Anyway, it is good to know that the economy is looking up, and that he predicts personal income will increase also. Most of us could use a little more money.

SOME MORE interesting figures from the *Fiscal Notes*: Statistics on education as related to Texans give a mixed report card, he says. Texas is above average in college-educated adults, with 17 per cent of Texas adults having four or more years of college. Eighteen other states have more, with Colorado's 23 per cent topping the list. (Big deal. I know a guy from Colorado and he ain't so dang smart).

Arkansas and Kentucky have the lowest percentages, with only 11 per cent of adults in each state attaining the four-year college level.

On the other hand, Texas has a fairly high dropout rate for high school students, 36 per cent. Only six other states have as high a dropout rate, and most of these are in the south.

The lowest dropout rates are way up north—Montana loses just 10 per cent, and in Minnesota only 9 per cent of their high school students drop out before graduation.

This no doubt is because the schoolrooms are well heated, while it is so cold and miserable outside in those states that the kids don't want to leave the classroom and have to go out there and work, or steal hubcaps, or whatever they do after dropping out.

practices for fruit and nut growers to follow.

One thing that's important this year is irrigation because of the continued warm, dry weather, said Brett Cypert, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The combination of drought and warm weather is setting up the possibility for serious freeze injury if a severe cold front suddenly hits.

Roots of dormant plants remain slightly active throughout the winter, and drought stress of these roots can make any plant more vulnerable to freeze injury. So, give trees, shrubs and lawns a soaking irrigation now to condition them for the remainder of winter. If the drought continues, water again in about a month.

Pruning is another practice that needs attention, said Cypert. February or March is the best time to do winter pruning of fruit and nut trees. Earlier pruning is all right, but as with drought, pruning stresses the tree, and any form of stress makes a plant more vulnerable to freeze injury.

Applying dormant oil to fruit and nut trees is also important, Cypert said. Spray trees with dormant oil anytime when the temperature is between 50 and 80 degrees F. Oil must be applied before trees begin to bloom or leaf out since dormant oil can damage tender tissue.

Spray dormant oil at a rate of 2 gallons oil per 100 gallons of water or 3 ounces oil per gallon of water.

The oil kills scale insects by suffocating them, so good spray coverage is a must, Cypert. If an air sprayer is used, it should be set to deliver at least 100 gallons of spray per acre.

Dormant oil will work more effectively if an insecticide is added to the tank. Lorsban 4E at 1 pint per gallon is a good dormant oil additive for orchards, or dursban or diazinon at 1 teaspoon per gallon can be added for garden and yard tree sprays.

Counts, serving his first full term as a Democratic lawmaker from Knox City was named to the committees for the 71st session of the Texas Legislature.

Lewis said, "Representative Counts has demonstrated a real concern for the issues facing the insurance industry. He has also expressed a genuine interest in those matters involving our social and rehabilitation programs.

"Representative Counts' insight into the legislative process, as well as his strong commitment to building a better Texas will make him an effective member of these committees," Lewis stated.

**Your HEALTH TIP**

**EXERCISE FOR SENIORS**  
The fear of falling is understandable in folks over 65. Many imbalance problems can be overcome with easy-to-do exercises. While sitting, the head can be rocked back and forth, then side to side, then rotated left to right to exercise neck muscles and loosen neck vertebrae. The arms can be drawn to chest, then extended front, sidewise, overhead, then gently rotated. While lying, similar exercises of the legs are possible. Be creative — start slowly — all muscles can be toned, all joints loosened with simple home exercises that contribute to better coordination and balance.

Just a little more than half the net income of U.S. farm operator households in 1986, the latest year for which complete figures are avail-

able, came from farm earnings. The rest came from off-farm sources, on which many families depend for most of their income.

The average off-farm income per household in the U.S. was \$20,212. In Texas, that figure was \$25,410.

Just as there are very few "Leave it to Beaver" families left in the suburbs, there aren't many stereotype farm or ranch families either. The days when the men ran the agricultural operation and their wives ran the house and helped on the farm are over for many families.

Families may farm or ranch part-time with one or both spouses holding jobs in town. Other families have turned to home-based businesses, offering everything from computer services to specialty food products.

And although many families choose to remain in farming and ranching because they enjoy the rural lifestyle, the dependence on off-farm income means our rural communities may have to change also.

For example, economic development can help small communities provide more jobs for rural residents. And these communities may need more services, such as day care centers, for working parents.

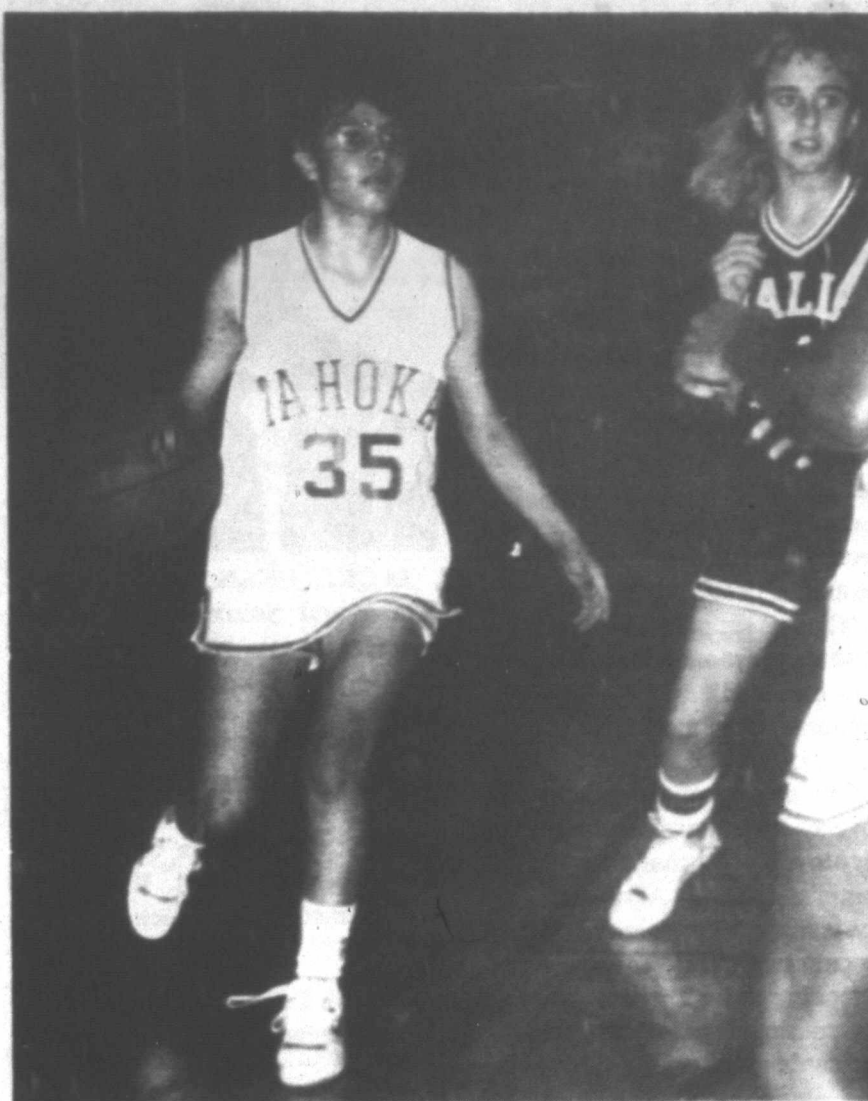

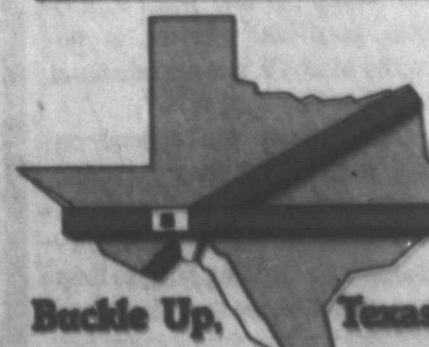

# Farm Bureau Takes Stand On Water Rights, Beef Sale

Texas Farm Bureau President S.M. True of Plainview spoke out this week on a possible threat to farmers' rights to water under their land, and also said that Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower's proposal to sell "specialty beef" to Europe is nothing but a publicity stunt.

On water rights, True said there is an ensuing battle between cities and farmers and ranchers over water usage. "We believe if it is adequately managed, there will be enough for both," he said.

Farmers have voiced concern that efforts to regulate pumping in the Edwards Underground Water District (San Antonio) might set a statewide precedent, and the protection of underground water rights is among issues the Farm Bureau will lobby for during the legislative session.

In a news conference in Austin last week, Hightower called for sale of "specialty beef" to Europe.

"It's his way of trying to soothe the wrath of cattlemen," True said in response to Hightower's announcement.

"Hightower's support for the European Community's ban on imports of U.S. beef is based on fraud," True said. "As Commissioner of Agriculture, Hightower should be the first to know that there is absolutely no evidence of a health hazard in hormone use."

True called the ban by the European Community "merely a

smokescreen."

The Texas farm leader said the U.S. position opposing the EC's ban on U.S. beef is correct.

"It's correct on the basis of domestic law, it's correct on the basis of international trade, and it is correct on the basis of scientific evidence," he said.

True described Hightower's plan for his agency to sell hormone-free beef to Europe as a "pipe dream."

## Tax Return Due From Executor

A taxpayer's death does not necessarily mean that a federal income tax return is no longer required in his or her name, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

If a taxpayer died before filing a 1988 tax return, his or her spouse or personal representative must sign and file a return for the decedent, if a return is required. A personal representative can be an executor, administrator or anyone with legal responsibility to take care of the decedent's affairs. If a return is not required, but the taxpayer had tax withheld, a return should be filed to get a refund.

If the surviving spouse did not remarry before January 1, 1989, a joint return can be filed. Also, joint returns for 1988 and 1989 can be filed if the taxpayer died in 1989 before filing a 1988 return.

Free IRS Publication 559, "Tax Information for Survivors, Executors, and Administrators," can be obtained by using the order blank in the tax return package or by calling 1-800-424-3676.

Only the federal government can issue meat export certificates," he said. "Beyond technicalities, for beef to be so certified, a government inspector would literally have to stay with a herd full-time."

"True said inspections of animals cannot determine whether any hormones detected were administered by man, or manufactured by the animal itself.

"There is simply no way to distinguish meat from animals that were administered U.S.-approved hormones, from meat from animals that were not," he said.

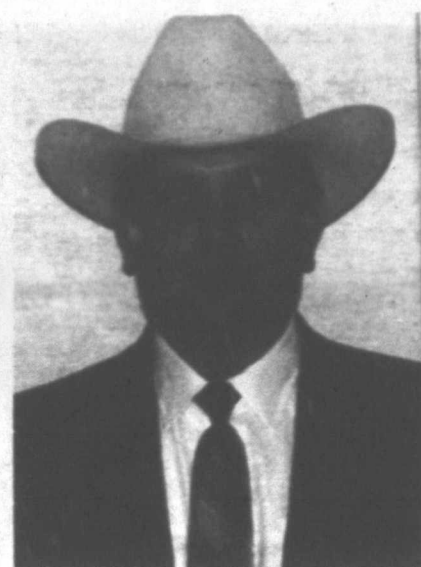
"The tragedy of the present controversy—which was engineered by Hightower—is that the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, by law, is supposed to be an advocate of agriculture, not an enemy. While pretending to be a friend, he is, in fact, causing terrible damage to the beef cattle industry."

## Tahoka Man Continues To Set Trapshooting Records

Britt Robinson of Tahoka has been selected to the 1989 All-American trapshooting first team, according to Randy Freston, Amateur Trapshooting Association (ATA) president.

The 40-year-old has been named to 21 All-American teams since 1960. This included four years as a sub-junior (twice as captain in the under-15 age group), once as a junior (ages 15-17) and 16 years as an adult, during which he was selected captain or co-captain three times. Britt was enshrined in the Trapshooting Hall of Fame in 1984, at age 36 the youngest ever to be accorded the honor.

Robinson smashed 100 straight from 27 yards and prevailed in a two-round shootout to earn the Grand American Handicap Championship at the ATA's yearly tournament, which attracted more than 5,500 shooters from the U.S., Canada and other countries for a 10-day period at the Homegrounds in Vandalia, Ohio. He is just the third 27-yard shooter to win the titled in the 89 years the championship has been held. (In

## Terraces Required Under Some Conservation Plans

Some conservation plans, developed under the conservation compliance provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985, will require terraces to be constructed as erosion control structures. While building terraces will help control erosion, it is only the beginning. How well terraces do their job of protecting cultivated land

depends on how they are maintained.

As part of the conservation compliance provisions, terraces will need to be maintained in accordance with specifications set forth in SCS technical guides. The minimum specifications call for terraces to be at least 1.2 feet high, 20 feet wide at the base, and contain at least 12.5 square feet of dirt in the cross section. Blocks, both internal and end closures where required must also be maintained according to specifications. All blocks shall be at a minimum 0.3 foot lower than the effective height of the terrace. Internal blocks will be required any where that there is a difference of + or - .2 foot or more change in elevation along the terrace channel.

The work required to maintain terraces to the aforementioned specifications can be accomplished by farmers utilizing their own equipment. Both terraces and blocks can be maintained with such implements as moldboard plows, one-way plows or disc plows etc. commonly found on the farm.

Farmers who do not own a farm level or a Philadelphia rod can borrow one from the local SCS office. SCS personnel will also be available as much as possible to furnish technical assistance to assist farmers with their terrace maintenance program.

A mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to women in the Tahoka area Monday, Feb. 13, when the unit will be parked at Lynn County Hospital. Appointments may be made by calling 998-4533.

The unit comes from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa. A spokesman for the center noted that one out of every 10 women in the U.S. will develop breast cancer during her lifetime, and that every year more than 37,000 women die of breast cancer.

"The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists," said the spokesman. "By using modern x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice, and well before the cancer can be felt."

## Nineteen Texas Hospitals Closed in 1988

For the third consecutive year, Texas led the nation in the number of hospital closures, with 19 hospitals closing in 1988, according to the Texas Hospital Assn., the industry's Trade Assn. Since 1984, Texas has lost 72 hospitals.

Slightly more than half (37) of the closed hospitals were located in rural areas, which the hospital assn., defines as a county that is not part of a metropolitan statistical area. Only five of the 72 closed hospitals had more than 100 beds.
