False Report Charge Is Filed In Stabbing Case

A 21-year-old Lubbock woman was charged Monday with filing false statements with a peace officer in connection with an alleged stabbing incident last Thursday which resulted in an aerial search for a suspect and a second apparently non-existent female victim.

Lynn County law enforcement officers still are seeking a white male, age 50 to 60, who supposedly was involved in an altercation with the Lubbock woman, Lenett Mitchell, on a county road near FM 400 just northeast of Wilson.

Officers said Mrs. Mitchell apparently met the man at a Lubbock location Thursday, and that the two may have driven around the area before getting into an argument and pulling knives on each other.

The Lynn County Sheriff's office reported receiving a call just before noon Thursday from Mrs. Mitchell, who claimed she had been stabbed and that another woman she knew from high school also had been stabbed by the male suspect. Deputies searched all day Friday for the other victim, using a DPS helicopter and a private aircraft. It later was indicated that there never was another victim, and Mrs. Mitchell was

charged with making the false report. She was jailed Monday night but released Tuesday after posting \$2,000 bond set by County Judge J.F. Brandon.

Mrs. Mitchell had been treated at Lynn County Hospital and then in a Lubbock facility for cuts on the hand and leg.

John Deere and Thorsen brand hand tools valued at more than \$1,000 were reported stolen from a pickup parked at the 9th St. home of complainant Charles Gass of O'Donnell on July 29.

Shirley Bell of Wilson reported a burglary of her home on 15th St. in that city last Saturday. Three white gold rings were missing from a bedroom.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated an accident on Thursday at 1600 Ave. L involving a 1984 Mercedes driven by Beatrice T. Noble of Tahoka and parked 1981 Buick owned by Mabel Morgan. Mrs. Noble was treated at Lynn County Hospital for minor injuries.

Fidel Garcia of 1228 S. 2nd reported to police on Friday that someone had stolen an Oldsmobile 350 motor and radiator from his 1979 Chevrolet pickup while it was parked

at his residence between Aug. 2-4. Value of the missing items was set at \$500.

Bruce Montes, 1715 S. 8th, reported to police Sunday that someone had stolen a pair of size 8 L.A. Gear tennis shoes, valued at \$50, while he was at the Tahoka swimming pool.

Police investigated one family disturbance call during the last week.

In jail during the week were one person for application to revoke probation on a charge of driving while intoxicated, and one charged with DWI.

Hospital Tax Increase Is Proposed

Lynn County Hospital directors, faced by increased expenses of operation and declining revenues, have voted for a tax increase of 2.752 cents per \$100 valuation in the county, calling for a public hearing on the proposal Monday afternoon, Aug. 21.

Although the proposed increase is less than 3 cents, the percentage of increase over the current 17.248 cents tax rate is 15.96 per cent. The proposal is to raise the tax rate to 20 cents.

According to the notice of public hearing on the proposal, the average home in the county, valued at \$40,000 for taxes, would pay \$11.01 more in taxes in a year under the new rate than is presently paid.

Hospital officials have warned in recent weeks that something must be done to assure that the hospital will continue to function as a facility for county residents. "People need to be aware that if they want to keep the hospital in service, they need to use it whenever they have an option. And they should know that Lynn County Hospital is adequately and competently staffed and equipped," said a spokesman for the directors.

Hospital taxes are added to county taxes on tax bills received by Lynn residents.

Requirements On School Attendance Are Tightened

New regulations passed by the Texas Legislature require student to attend school at least 80 days during a semester to get credit for a class, Tahoka school officials advised parents this week.

Semesters this coming year in Tahoka school run 86 and 89 days, so that does not allow many days for absences, according to High School Principal Charles Cate.

If a student does not attend school the required 80 days, he or she may petition for credit anyway by an appeal to an attendance committee which will be appointed by the school board. The committee may give class credit to students because of extenuating circumstances, which

are mostly spelled out in guidelines provided by the State Board of Education.

"This also means that a student will not automatically be excused from classes just because momma calls up and says junior is sick," said one official. The reason for an excused absence "must be stated in writing and signed by the parent or other person standing in parental relation to the child."

Guidelines on what is considered "extenuating circumstances" and procedures to follow when a student is in violation of the attendance rules are available at the Tahoka school principals' offices.

THS Band To Begin Rehearsals

The Tahoka High School band will begin summer rehearsals for all band students in grades 8-12 Monday, Aug. 14. Each student will have a one-hour section rehearsal each day: 9 a.m.- auxiliaries, 10 a.m.- flutes, 11 a.m.- clarinets, 1 p.m.- cornets, 2 p.m.- saxophones and horns, 3 p.m.- low brass, 4 p.m.- percussion. The band hall will be open at 8 a.m., 12 noon, 5 p.m., for any student unable to come at their scheduled time. There will be a reception to meet the new band director for Tahoka I.S.D., Stephen Morgan, on Monday, Aug. 14 at 7 p.m. in the Band Hall.

Woodwork...

THIS NEWSPAPER, like all others, periodically receives from some syndicate pages of what we call "fillers," which means they are handy for completing the layout of a page in the newspaper when the news and advertising and photos are all placed and there still are little spaces left that need something in them.

Consequently many newspapers, including this one, have little fillers here and there with such interesting information as "hummingbirds flap their wings 600 times a minute" or "male whales in the Fiji Islands have larger mouths than females" and such stuff as that. Frequently someone will comment on one of these fillers to a newspaper staff member, who usually has no idea of what they are talking about.

This week a Tahoka resident who moved here from Wales informed me that a statement we had in the newspaper about the official Welsh flower was incorrect, and in fact, would insult residents of Wales, at least one of whom gets this newspaper (potential advertisers please note: we have coverage 'way out there).

Since I hadn't read the filler he was referring to, I had no idea of what he was talking about. But he told me the statement was that "the official Welsh flower of Wales is a leak, which resembles an onion." He said that isn't true, and is sort of like saying the official American bird is a buzzard. The official flower is a daffodil, he said, adding that the Welsh emblem is a leak, but the picture and plant looks more like a spring onion, or flower, than the onion itself.

I never had even heard of a plant called a leak, a word which I always associated with Watergate, any home plumbing jobs I ever attempted, or maybe McDonald's at Sweetwater.

LAST WEEKEND I participated in the annual Hubert Burgess Tennis Tournament at Hillcrest Country Club in Lubbock, an event started several years ago to honor a man who has played tennis in the Lubbock area longer than anyone else ever has, or ever will.

Players age 45 and over who have known Hubert for many years get together, choose different partners for each set of tennis played, and generally have a good time while paying tribute to a man who not only has set an astounding record of longevity in playing tennis, but is also one of the nicest persons anyone ever met.

Last Saturday, Hubert Burgess, now age 88, and wearing a T-shirt which says "Mr. Tennis," played his four sets of tennis in the 98-degree heat just like everybody else. Last year, he told me (when he was 87) that he planned to play for at least three more years, which would take him to age 90.

He is slim and trim and alert, and it looks like he will achieve his goal of playing another couple of years at least. I hope so. I have a feeling he will still be playing when some of the rest of us give up the game.

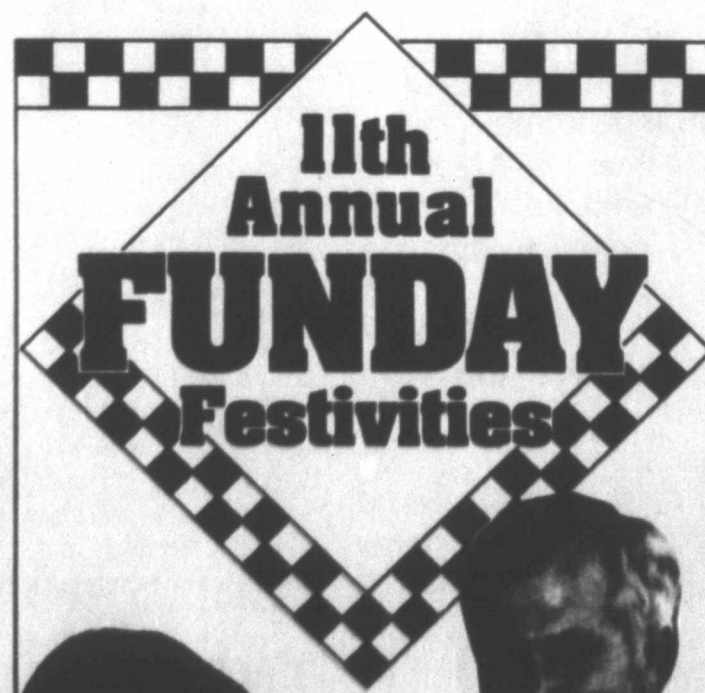
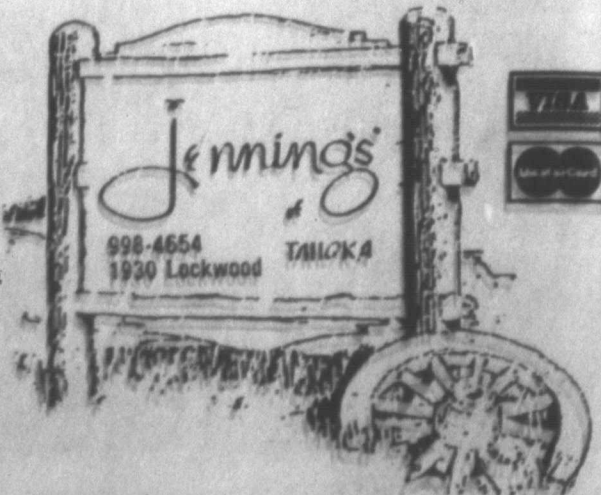

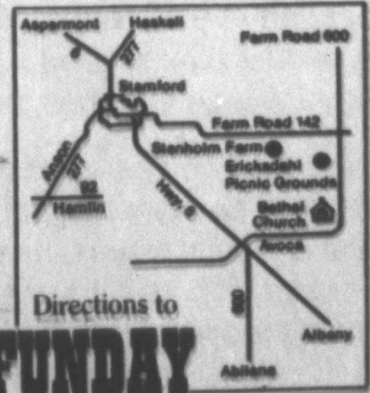

School Supplies Listed For County Elementary Schools

TAHOKA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Kindergarten: 1 school box, 6-#2 pencils, 1 box crayons (eight count only, no fat crayons or fluorescent), 2- 4 oz. school glue, 1 glue stick, 1 eraser (pink or green), 1 pair plastic safety scissors (please do not get metal kind), 2 large boxes of Kleenex.

First Grade: 2-#2 pencils, 1 big green eraser, 1 large size Elmer's glue, 1 pair scissors, 1 box Kleenex, 1 old shirt for Art work, 1 cigar box, watercolors.

Second Grade: 2-#2 pencils, 1 pair scissors, 1 box crayons, 1 eraser, 1 clipboard- notebook paper, 1 Elmer's glue (not paste), 1 small size watercolors, 2 large boxes of Kleenex, 1 ruler, Addition and Subtraction flash cards.

Third Grade: 1 clipboard- No Notebooks, 1 box crayons, 1 ruler-inch and centimeter, 2-#2 pencils, 1 eraser, 1 pair safety scissors, Notebook paper, 1 watercolors, 2 large boxes of Kleenex, 1 white glue (not paste), 1- 8 count map colors, 1 school box, Addition and Subtraction Flashcards (from last year), Multiplication and Division Flashcards.

Fourth Grade: 2 large boxes of Kleenex, 1- 24 count crayolas, 1 pair scissors, 1 Elmer's glue, 2-#2 pencils, 1- 12 inch ruler, 1 red lead pencil or pen, 1 large spiral, ball point pens, loose leaf paper, colored folder with pockets and brads.

Who's considered creditworthy? That depends on the creditor. Creditors set up their own systems to decide who's creditworthy and who's not. However, there are three decision-making systems—credit scoring, judgmental (subjective) or a combination—that creditors may use.

Most major lenders use credit scoring. With this system, creditors assign points to factors they consider to be the most important. Although these may vary from place to place, they often include the applicants stability (as demonstrated by length of residence and employment, or home ownership), age, income, occupation and credit history. Points are assigned to each of these factors. Those whose scores fall within acceptable ranges are granted credit.

Jacqueline Jo Hays of Tahoka has been awarded a one year \$1000 Thomas Hall Shelby scholarship by the Texas Interscholastic League Foundation. Cover Crop Replenishes Soil

Your fall garden plans don't include your entire plot, so what do you do with the extra space? Give it a boost for spring.

A cover crop will keep the soil from blowing, prevent water erosion and provide additional organic matter when the soil is turned under in the spring, said Bret Cypert, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

This increased organic matter helps the soil's water-holding capacity and causes the soil to more easily release the nutrients that plants must take in to grow vigorously.

Good cover crops are tall-growing wheats such as Tascosa and Siouxland, which also make good windbreaks, the county Extension agent said.

Turn the cover crop under when it is fully grown but not yet headed out, Cypert said.

This provides the maximum organic matter and avoids seed production that might cause problems.

Some areas may have to plow the cover crop under earlier if the garden space is needed for very early crops.

One home-gardening trick is to leave swaths or strips of the cover crop growing in the spring to act as a windbreak. If a swath 12-inches wide is left on the side of the prevailing wind, then a quiet, comparatively wind-free area six to 10 feet wide is provided for early spring vegetables.

When the winter grain has grown to its growth to its full height and while the seed is very immature, the crop can be killed and left standing with a rope-wick application of glyphosate. The plants will be killed but the standing straw will continue to provide a windbreak, said Cypert.

Before cutting the swaths, fertilize the crop with one cup of ammonium nitrate per 100 square feet. Irrigate the fertilizer into the soil with an overhead sprinkler and let the soil absorb the moisture for a day or two. Then come in with the tiller and prepare the planting areas, leaving the strips of windbreak to grow.

County Receives Bingo Tax Returns

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on Friday sent second quarter 1989 checks totaling \$2.2 million to 67 counties and 108 cities that have legalized charity bingo and levy the two-percent local gross receipts tax on the game.

Total payments to counties for the first half of 1989 are \$3.6 million, an increase of 24.7 percent over payments sent to counties last year during the first two quarters of 1988. In Lynn County, the net payment this period was \$2,386.16; net payment same period last year was \$2,517.24; 1989 payments to date \$7,516.81; 1988 payments to date \$7,621.87; percent change to date -001.4.

Cities have received a total of \$2.9 million in the first half of 1989, an increase of 19.7 percent over payments sent to cities last year during the first two quarters of 1988.

The Comptroller's office collects the two-percent local bingo gross receipts tax and the two-percent state bingo gross receipts tax on the game.

Any student enrolling in Tahoka Public Schools for the first time will need to bring a report card from the previous school, plus their immunization record, birth certificate and social security card for verification purposes.

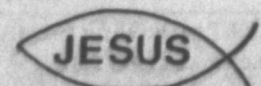

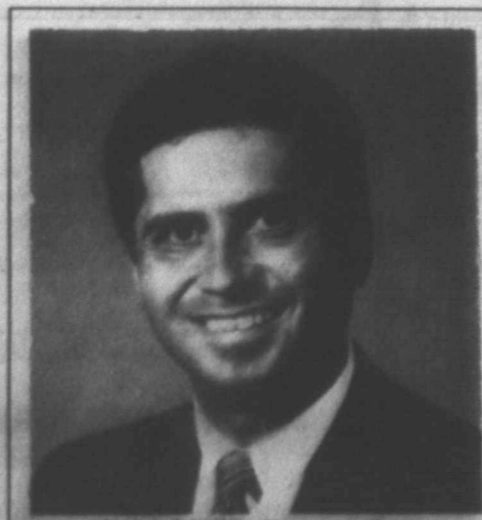
