Woodwork...

ANN LANDERS got into all kinds of trouble, or at least she stirred up a hornets' nest of hot letters both for and against the waitress/tipping system when she published some letters about the situation. I may as well get into the boiling water, too, by offering some of my own opinions on tipping at restaurants.

To the original writer, who said he was fed up with waiters and waitresses expecting big tips, Landers replied that "a tip is not mandatory. It is whatever a customer wants to give." This incensed about 38 zillion waitresses who wrote her that the Internal Revenue Service charges them 8 per cent of each tab as income from tips, whether they get a tip or not, and therefore, tips need to be mandatory, and if each customer doesn't tip at least 15 per cent, he is a lousy cheapskate who deserves food poisoning.

One guy wrote in, questioning why only restaurants pay workers small salaries and expect the customer to make up the difference. He said, "if I buy a pair of shoes marked \$40, I pay \$40. I am not expected to give the person who waited on me an additional 15 per cent if he or she was especially pleasant. Why don't restaurants add 15 per cent to the bill and print on the bill...No additional tip is required?"

Well, the answer to that, of course, is that some restaurants do just that, but I never go back there again, because usually the service is terrible. I don't mind giving a tip (I'm a cheapie who usually gives 10 per cent or so) when the service is good. But the service too often is not good. Sometimes you get your order and never see anyone again until the meal is over. Sometimes I become totally invisible after the meal is served. I have ripped off all my clothes and danced around the table trying to get someone to bring me another hot roll. I have stood on my head on top of the table and sung "How Dry I Am" at maximum volume trying to get waiters to refill my empty water glass, empty since the first nachos were served, although the serving person has been by our table 19 times with head carefully averted. When this happens, I don't tip.

Often, though, we get pleasant waitpersons who come around two or three times to see if we need anything else, and I leave them a tip.

Sometimes as much as 35 cents.

Understanding A Lease

A lease isn't just a formality for getting into a new apartment or house. It's a legal document that can serve you well or have a negative impact on your pocketbook and your lifestyle.

Read the lease and be sure you understand all of its terms and provisions. You're committed to pay rent for the duration of the lease, even if you want to move, so know what you're getting into before signing anything. If you're unsure, have the lease explained to you by an attorney or housing counselor.

The owner is not liable for repairs. This means you could have to pay for routine maintenance or repairs, even when you did not cause any damage.

The owner can cancel the lease if the property is sold. Under this circumstance you would have to move even if it's inconvenient and the lease has not ended.

If the owner is "dissatisfied" with your behavior, the lease can be canceled. Since "dissatisfied" isn't specifically defined, the landlord could cancel your lease at any time.

You agree no one else will live with you. The problem with this clause is that your landlord may define it to include anyone who visits. Be sure to add a written clause about visitors.

You agree that all improvements belong to the owner. If you invest in removable improvements, such as light fixtures, cabinet hardware, a fireplace screen or other items, you should be able to take them with you when you move, as long as you replace the original items so the rental unit is in the same condition as when you began the lease.

LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.

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
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
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
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
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SPS To Sponsor Regional Clean Air Conference Dec. 8

Clean Air And Business Expansion: Why Not Both?

The nation can have clean air without threatening jobs and drastically raising prices to consumers. That will be the theme of a Regional Industry Clean Air Conference, sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS).

Many industries could be affected. SPS is studying the potential cost to the area's electric customers of the latest proposals and will announce these results at the conference.

National, state and local representatives from several industries and organizations will address the conference.

SCS Says Conservation Compliance, Terrace Maintenance Needed For Crops

With the 1989 harvest season rapidly coming to an end, many farmers are turning their attention toward preparation for the 1990 crop. 1990 will bring some new requirements for farmers who produce crops on highly erodible cropland. Producers who farm highly erodible land, will have to start actively applying their conservation plans, developed under the conservation compliance provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985.

Actively applying a plan for terraced land will include maintaining terraces and terrace blocks. All terraces and blocks on highly erodible land will have to meet specifications set forth in SCS technical guides. The deadline established by the provisions of the Food Security Act to accomplish this, is Dec. 31, 1994. Therefore, actively applying a plan on terraced land, will include accomplishing at a minimum 25% of the terrace maintenance, required by the conservation plan each year (1990-1994).

The minimum specifications in SCS technical guides call for terraces to be at least 1.2 feet high, 20 feet wide at the base, and contain at least 12.5 square feet of dirt in the cross section. Blocks, both internal and end closures where required must also be maintained according to specifications. All blocks shall be at a minimum 0.3 foot lower than the effective height of the terrace and have the same base width as the terrace. Internal blocks will be required any where that there is a difference of + or - .2 foot or more change in elevation along the terrace channel.

The work required to maintain terraces to the aforementioned specifications can be accomplished by farmers utilizing their own equipment. Both terraces and blocks can be maintained with such implements
