K. Adams the snow contained very little penetrating moisture which would be beneficial to crops. Adams said, however, that the snow will tend to prevent evaporation of moisture already in the ground and aid in conserving existing moisture until spring.

D. B. Lancaster, manager of Bailey County Electric Cooperative, proudly reported that there had not been a single service call due to the snow. He did state that they were still having some difficulties due to last December's snow and ice. Spokesmen for Southwestern Public Service also reported no difficulties arrising from the bad weather.

Another new sound brings hurrahs from yours truly and that is our new Fairchild Scana-Graver. With this device we put a picture on a drum which revolves while an electric eve on another drum engraves the

picture on plastic. All of this carrying on accompanied by some buzzing of varying pitch results in an engraving from which we can print pictures in the paper immediately. This also means we can get a pictures in right up to the last minute.
