Norman Thomas Is Guest Speaker

Norman Thomas of the Muleshoe State Bank was the guest speaker when the Future Business Leaders held their regular monthly program meeting last Wednesday in Room 13 at the high school.

Mr. Thomas' subject was "A Career In Banking." He discussed the types of jobs and the opportunities banking available in a bank, the qualifications a student should have offers. The speaker pointed out that banking offers opportunities for both the short and long-term planners. He stated that a knowledge of money and banking is helpful to students whether they make a career of it or elect to be housewives.

Mr. Thomas said the qualifications listed for an applicant for a job in a bank are: Personal Characteristics, one of the most important being honesty, and special skills and knowledge.

The speaker pointed out that banks provide training on the job and that there are various outside studies available for furthering a banking education.

In conclusion he stated that salaries paid by banks do not fluctuate as rapidly as those of other industries, and the fringe benefits of banks are higher according to results of a study by the U. S. Research Department of the Chamber of Commerce.

In concluding his talk to the members of the chapter, he said, "Any business course you take while in high school will put you one 'leg ahead' in preparation for a position in a bank."

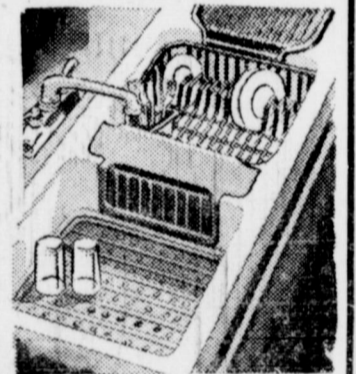

Trinity Church Erects Building

Construction of an educational building for Trinity Baptist Church here began this week and the building is expected to be completed by July 1.

The building will have 2400 square feet of floor space and will have facilities for two nurseries, a beginners and primary Sunday School department, junior and intermediate department and the pastor's study.

The building was contracted by Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., of Muleshoe at a cost of \$18,200. It is being erected alongside the other buildings of the church, and its brick trim will match the other buildings.

Water Table Reports Ready

The Board of Water Engineers this week issued a bulletin which adds to the available knowledge of the Southern High Plains water resources.

Bulletin 6101, Water Levels in Observation Wells in the Southern High Plains Texas, 1960-1961, reports ground-water-level measurements in observation wells in 25 Southern High Plains counties which include the most extensive irrigated farming development in the state. The bulletin may be obtained without

cost at the Board of Water Engineers office, P. O. Box 2311, Capitol Station, Austin.

Systematic measurement of water levels in observation wells is useful as an index in maintaining a current inventory of available water supplies and in making quantitative predictions of the future availability of those supplies. Collection of data for the report began September 1, 1960.

The bulletin contains tables of water-level measurements made in observation wells and maps showing their location in the 25 counties during 1960 and 1961. Changes in water levels from 1960 to 1961 are also shown.

personnel were assisted by the U. S. Geological Survey and the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in making field measurements of observation wells.

Counties covered in the survey are Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Donley, Floyd, Gaines, Gray, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Oldham, Parmer, Randall, Roberts, Swisher, Terry, and Yoakum.

Lone Star Agriculture

FOOD COST COMPARISONS

While the most frequent public complaint about rising living costs concerns food, the fact is that rent, medical care and transportation have gone up twice as much as food during the past ten years.

This is a point frequently emphasized by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman during his brief term in office, and it is apparent he wants to have

it repeated again and again. For understanding of the farm problem, says the secretary, "I am convinced that success depends in no small measure" on how well the message can be carried to the non-farm public.

"Evidences of this need for greater understanding abound," he has pointed out. "Only recently a Gallup Poll revealed that the most frequent complaint on the part of the general public was concern about the increased cost of food; yet the fact is that costs of rent, medical care and transportation have increased twice as much as that of food during the past ten years.

"The relatively slight rise in food costs has been one of the

principal non-inflationary aspects in our economy in recent years. If the prices received by farmers had increased in proportion to other prices, and if such increase had been increased had been passed on to consumers, Americans would pay billions of dollars more each year for food and clothing. And thus, in a very real sense all American consumers have gained, at the expense of the American farmer.

"But there is so little general public understanding of these facts that we must, in effect, become salesmen for American agriculture. We must develop

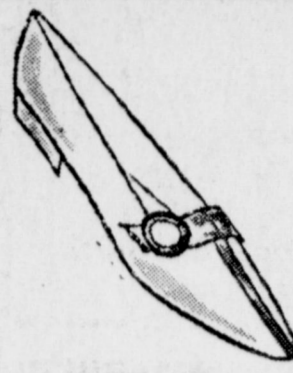
