
Read John 16:1-11

Mois ture conditions are good at the write Governor Daniels right present, but there may be need for pre-irrigation on some fields. Before we can make determnation we have to know our land. Soils have horizontal layers or bands whch can be seen readily from the surface down-

ward. These layers vary in number and in proportion in different kinds of soil. Some soil profiles will allow easy penetration of roots with

high yields resulting, while other profiles restrict root de-Bureau had compromised on velopment with low yields resulting. Your soil is like a tank, it

can hold a definite amount of water and no more. It doesn't make sense to say "I am going to give my cotton a good soaking so I don't have to irrigate

next month. Water applied in excess of the soil reservoir capacity percolates through the soil and moves out of the root zone, and at the same time takes valuable plant food with it. To the irrigator

these soil properties are important. They are: Soil texture, soil structure, and soil depth.

By considering their relationship to one another these can be used to estimate: the capacity of the soil to store water

for plant use, the rate of entry of water into the soil, and the

water holding capacity of the soil. Your farm very likely has inacteristics, that differ from those of other farms. Therefore, it is important that the method own land.
