City Council Approves Single-Member Districts

Tahoka City Council members Monday evening approved a plan for single-member districts for council members, subject to the approval of attorneys for a Tahoka man who has sued the city claiming the present at-large system of electing council members prevents fair representation on the city's governing body.

A committee of Tahoka citizens came up with the "4-1-1" voting district plan after attorneys for Manual Moya of Tahoka indicated they would drop the lawsuit filed in federal court if the city adopts a satisfactory "ward system" plan which would have voters in each section of the city voting on their representatives on the council.

The plan would set up four districts which would each elect a single member to the council, plus one councilman-at-large on which all city voters could vote, plus the mayor, also elected at large.

The Dept. of Justice also must approve the plan adopted by Tahoka City Council Monday. A plan is supposed to be ready by October of this

year, according to City Manager Barry Pittman.

Members of the committee which recommended the plan included Wayne Huffaker, chairman, and Jim Wells, Mauro Marez, Andrew Nance and Ray Don Box.

Pittman, Mayor Jim Solomon and council members Dayton Parker, Wayne Tekell, Mike Mensch and Joe Calvillo were present. Councilman Wayne Huffaker was absent because of illness.

Also present were members of a committee which presented a plan for construction of a new and separate fire department building, proposed for a site just east of the city hall.

No action was taken on the plan, which would call for expenditure of just under \$50,000, pending study of possible ways to finance the project. The committee presenting the plan includes Kent Stone, Clint Gardner, Tony Botkin and Tommy Botkin.

A report of police department activities for the previous month was presented.

Runoff Vote To Be Tuesday

Lynn County voters are being asked to return to the polls next Tuesday to vote on runoff elections in both the Democratic and Republican primaries, with major interest in the county on the runoff for the Democratic nomination for sheriff. The Democratic nominee is assured of being elected in November as there was no GOP candidate for sheriff.

Seeking to serve out the unexpired term of former sheriff Jack Miller, who resigned, are Elton Childress,

now a deputy, and current Sheriff Jake Diggs, who was appointed to serve as interim sheriff until an election could be held. Winner of the nomination will serve as sheriff through 1996.

There are a couple of statewide runoffs on both the Democratic and Republican ballots.

Democrats who voted in the first primary or who did not vote at all may vote in the runoff election at one of four polling places in the county: Lynn County courthouse, for voting precincts 1, 6, 7, 9, 12, and 14; all Tahoka boxes; Green Building, for all Wilson voters in precincts 2 and 8; New Home High School, for voters in precincts 4, 11 and 13; O'Donnell High School, for voters in precincts 3, 5 and 10.

Early voting by personal appearance at the courthouse will end Friday.

Republican votes for the entire county will be cast at the Reddy Room of Southwestern Public Service Co. in Tahoka.

Entry fee is \$10 per person, plus a concession item or silent auction

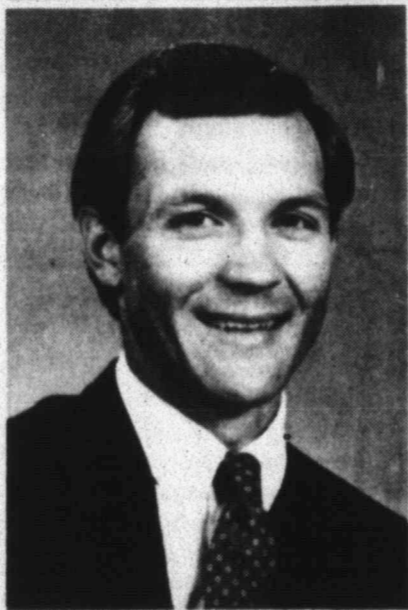
Hospital District Election Has Seven Candidates

A size 10 dress was reported stolen from a residence in Tahoka Sunday, and two other thefts were investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week.

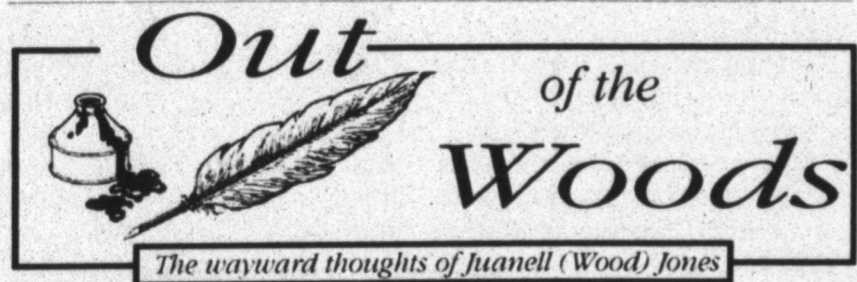

All parents, eventually, will get to the point where their children think they know more than they do. This usually happens at the onset of the teenage years, and may last for 4, or possibly 57, years.

My 12 year old son, whom I've been able to impress for years with my brains and bravado, forced me to prove myself the other day with, unfortunately, a timed math quiz. Practicing for fifth grade UIL Number Sense competition, he brought home a couple of sample problem sheets which his teacher told him to practice with against one of his parents.

My husband, who catches on faster than I do, took one look at the quiz and told our son to practice against me. I said "sure thing" before I even looked at the quiz. Big mistake. One quiz was 20 addition problems, 2-and 3-digit numbers added three and four across, horizontally. There was a blank space to write each answer, and my son held up his stop watch expectantly and told me I could start when I was ready.

"Can I have scratch paper?" I asked my son, who rolled his eyes and said, as only 12 year old boys can do with great exasperation, Mo-o-m-m-m-mmm. "Just thought I'd ask," I said, wondering how fast I could calculate numbers in my head, something I hadn't done in more years than I care to remember, other than how much five 35-cent newspapers added up to (\$1.75).

"You don't need paper to figure your answers on?" I asked, just to make sure he wasn't gaining any advantages. "You're kidding, right?" he said, with great disdain. So I thought, okay, here goes, and told him to punch the timer.

I was already telling myself that since it was just addition, I probably wouldn't beat him too badly, and hoped he wouldn't take it too hard. A minute and 42 seconds later, I held up my pencil triumphantly and told him I was finished.

We switched places, with me holding the stop watch and his pencil hovering over another 20-problem quiz. I said "Go" and he whizzed through that sucker in just over a minute, beating his poor old mom by over 30 seconds.

Never one to give up, I suggested we check each other's answers. Mine was 100% correct ... so was his.

He was on a roll now, and brought forth another quiz and laid it on the table in front of me, this time dealing with multiplication. Horrified, I noted that this one, too, had 2- and 3-digit numbers which multiplied three and four times across. "You know how to do this?" I asked weakly. "Of course I do ... you do know how to multiply don't you?" he asked me with a worried frown.

"Oh, sure ... yeah," I said with a sick grin, muttering to myself that he'd do better to time me with a calendar rather than a stop watch, because this one could take me about a week to finish. Being a really good sport, however, I told him I was ready.

About three minutes into the quiz, at which point I was laboring over the fifth problem, he took pity on me and gave me some tips about how to match up the coordinating numbers. Oh ... yeah ... I remember those. I plodded along and finally finished the quiz in something like 6 or 7 minutes.

He beat me by over 3 minutes. I missed 5 out of 20 problems. He missed none. I checked his answers with a calculator. He checked my answers in his head ... and finished quicker than me at that too. I told him I thought he was ready for competition.

An hour or so later, when he was going to bed, he told me, with big apologetic eyes, "Mom, I didn't mean to embarrass you ... I won't turn in these quizzes to my teacher if you don't want me to." What a kid. What a smart kid.

I told him: "Son, I'm proud of you. You turn those in to your teacher, it won't embarrass me." He sighed with relief.

"By the way," I added, "Your dad said the next time you bring home a quiz, he wants to do it."

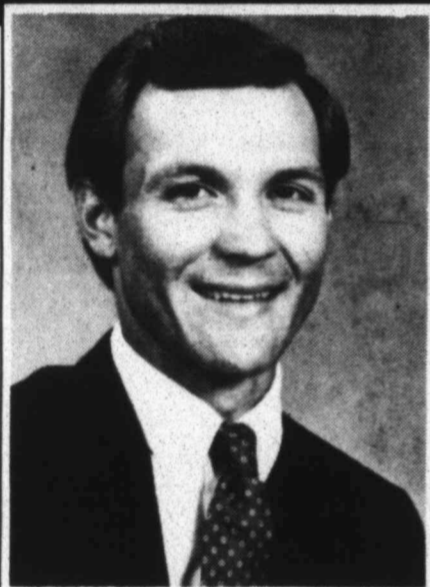

THS Students Advance To Regional UIL Academic Meet

Thirteen Tahoka High School students placed high enough in the District U.I.L. Academic Literary Meet to advance to the Regional Meet as competitors or first alternates.

The Regional Academic Meet will be held in Abilene on the campus of Abilene Christian University, April 22-23.

Tahoka hosted the District Meet last Tuesday and Thursday. The top three individual qualifiers advance to the Regional Meet. Also, the top team advances to the Regional Meet for those events which are designated team events.

Post High School accumulated the most points to be named the District Meet Academic Champion. Idalou was second place and Tahoka was third. Other schools participating were Sundown, 4th place; Seagraves, 5th; Ralls, 6th; and Crosbyton, 7th.

First place winners from Tahoka include Blanda Miller, Literary Criticism; Jeremy Brandon, Informative Speaking; and Annie Dunlap, Science.

In addition to the over-all Science winner, Miss Dunlap was the top scorer in Chemistry, second in Editorial, and fourth in Ready Writing.

Joining Miss Dunlap on the first place Science team are Susan Draper, who tied for third, and Josh Dunlap. The Science Team is coached by Mrs. Betty Stennett.

Brandon's third place finish in the Calculator Applications contest also gives him an opportunity to compete in that event at the Regional Meet.

Third place medalists who will compete at the Region Meet are Ginger Malone, News Writing; Miranda Martin, Headline Writing; Lisa Martin, Editorial Writing; and Clay Taylor, Prose Interpretation.

Freshman Abby Wells won second in 9th Grade Oral Reading and 4th (first alternate) in high school Prose Interpretation.

Robin Martin placed third in 9th Grade Oral Reading and 6th in Persuasive Speaking.

Other fourth place, first alternates, were Marisa Martin, Feature Writing; and Bonnie Stennett, 9th Grade Oral Reading.

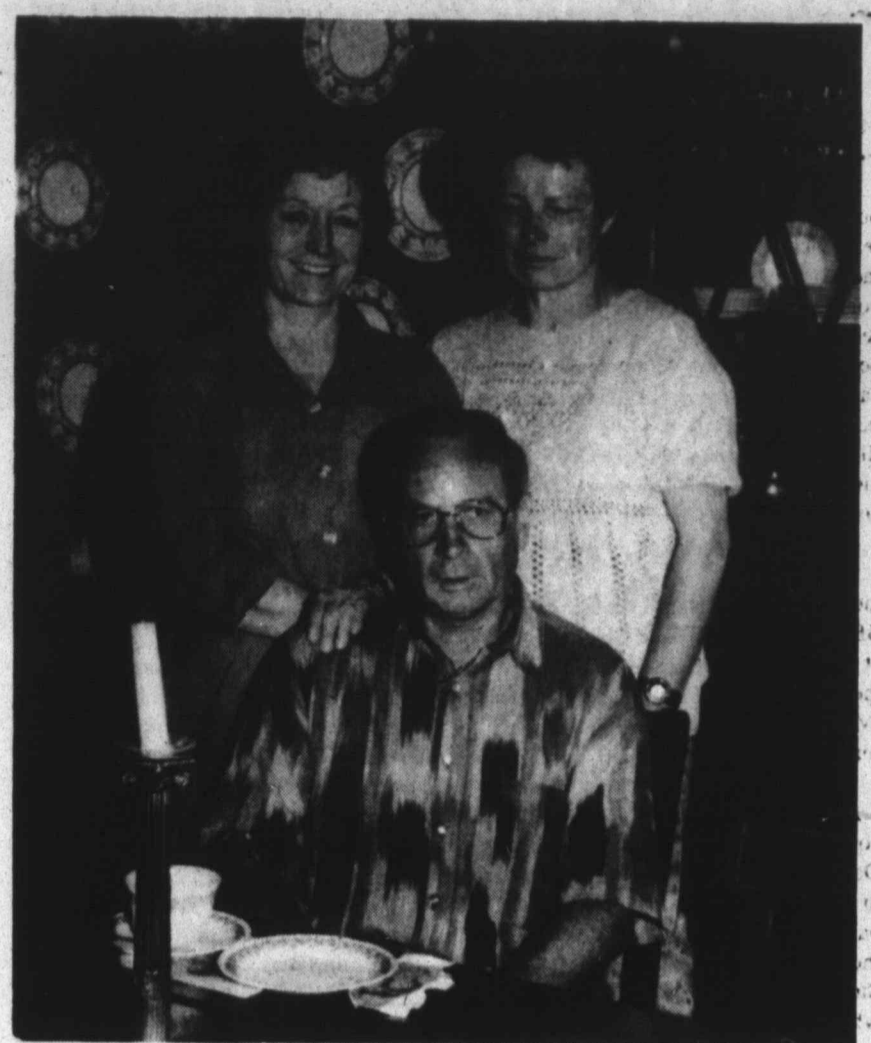

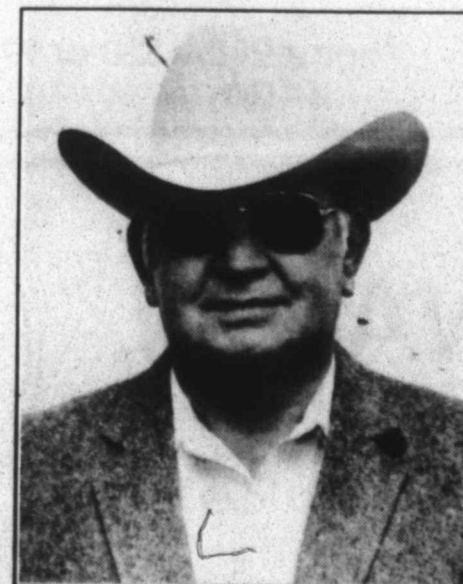

Furrow Diking Aids In Conserving Water, Says SCS

Water conservation is one of the most important factors to be considered by farmers in semi-arid regions such as the South Plains. These areas are characterized by low rainfall, low humidity, and high temperatures. When rains do fall, they are usually high intensity, hard rains that are more prone to loss by runoff than slow, easy falling rains. Therefore, agricultural producers in these areas must do everything they can do to preserve every available drop of moisture they receive.

There are many cultural practices in use today that help farmers conserve moisture in their fields, thus improving yields, and also controlling soil erosion by water. Furrow diking is among the practices that has proven to be effective, both in laboratory and field conditions, according to the Lynn County office of the Soil Conservation Service.

One way that furrow diking conserves water is by slowing or preventing runoff. This results in additional benefits as well. One such benefit is the control of soil erosion. Another added benefit is improved water quality and quantity. As we have entered the decade in which the "Double Q" will be the subject of heated debate and the focus of major farmer and environmental legislation, agricultural producers in this country will become ever-aware of this major issue.

The reduction of rainwater runoff increases the amount of water available for production agriculture. Also, reduced runoff has a positive effect on water quality, as sedimentation of playa lakes and streams is reduced. Sediment and associated pollutants that may be transported by sediment, such as nutrient, organic, and chemical substances are all potentially detrimental to water quality. The accumulation of these substances in water supplies and playa lakes is greatly reduced with water conservation techniques.

Furrow diking is a technique used by farmers in the Great Plains region of the United States. This practice may be carried out in almost any row crop operation. Furrow dikes are actually "microbasins" formed in furrows using specialized equipment. The practice involves mechanical construction of dams at regular intervals across between furrows. This forms a reservoir to catch and hold water where it falls in the field, virtually eliminating runoff. This allows more time for the water to infiltrate into the soil, and little moisture is lost.

There are several types of furrow dikes in use today. The three major types are hydraulic, paddle-type, and wheel-type dikes. Each type can be attached to other farm implements which are used in normal farming operations. Using dikes in conjunction with other operations can reduce the cost to the producer, due to a reduction in both labor and fuel costs.

Some farmers leave the dikes in place for the duration of the crop year. However, in some situations, such as having dikes in every furrow, the producer will plow the dikes down, especially before harvest. Most farmers design and build their own plow out devices. These devices usually mount on the front of the tractor. This allows for a smoother trip across the field, and less wear and tear on equipment.

Research at various locations world-wide has proven that furrow diking can and does increase soil water storage, decrease erosion, and increase crop yields. The benefits of

furrow diking depends on many differently factors. These factors include the amount and intensity of precipitation, soil characteristics, such as infiltration rate, and the water-holding capacity of the dikes.

Furrow diking has been proven, since the 1930s, as a low cost, low labor method of conserving soil moisture. Therefore, it has the potential of being a powerful tool to be used by farmers of the South Plains to agriculture more profitable. For more information on water conservation practices, contact your local USDA Soil Conservation Service.



There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing fluoride at this level except that it could cause mottling (brown stain) on the teeth of children under 14 years of age.

The City will continue to search for alternate sources of supply and will investigate any available treatment techniques to lower the level of our fluoride if they are affordable at all.
Bottled water is available for families with children under the age of 14 years at the City Office at no cost.

They Call Him 'Cookie'

He stands 6 feet tall, weighs 215 and his nickname is "Cookie." He is a team captain for the Tahoka Bulldogs and was all district as defensive and offensive tackle, and gained a spot on the Texas team in the Green Belt Bowl. He throws shot put and discus for track, is student council vice-president, works 24 hours a week sacking groceries at Thriftway, and shows pigs in FFA.

This is what John Quintanilla does in his spare time, because most of his time is spent serving as the Texas Distributive Education Clubs of America (DECA) State President.

Quintanilla is not an ordinary, average Tahoka senior. He is an extraordinary student whose story is one of strength, near defeat and victory.

Last year Glo Hays, Tahoka DECA supervisor, persuaded Quintanilla to run for state DECA president.

"I knew he had tremendous leadership skills, plus a personality ev-

eryone liked. I felt he would be a great candidate," she said.

Quintanilla had the theory "you only live once," and decided to run for president.

He spent weeks preparing for the interview and practicing his speech. There were three candidates running for State president, and after the interviews only two were nominated by the interview committee.

Quintanilla was not nominated. He said, "I was humiliated. I had been so nervous I totally blew the interview."

However, Doug Smith, a DECA student from Tahoka, nominated Quintanilla from the floor, which put him back in the race.

Quintanilla knew he could not give up; he had been given a second chance.

Mrs. Hays said, "He gave his speech perfectly, and because of the humor in it he had the audience rolling with laughter."

That was his first time ever to speak publicly, and it was in front of

2500 students and teachers.

The votes were counted and as the speaker was about to announce the new president, the students started chanting "Cookie, Cookie."

They were right. For Quintanilla, life suddenly took a new direction. He went from wearing T-shirts and jeans to slacks and ties.

"I was so glad Mr. Denny Belew taught us how to tie a tie in ag," said Quintanilla.

His travels this year included two leadership conferences in Trinidad, Texas, a District 10 conference in El Paso where he spoke to 600 DECA students, and the state conference in Houston.

He also attended and spoke at a District 8 conference in Amarillo, and attended DECA contests in Orlando, Fla., Wichita Falls and Detroit, Mich.

"The hardest thing for me was having to speak in front of 550 DECA supervisors in Dallas," said Quintanilla.

During March 10-13 Quintanilla presided over the State Career Development Conference in Houston. He was responsible for planning, organizing and chairing the opening assembly. His invited guest was State Rep. Jim Rudd of Brownfield, who was honored for his contributions to education during his tenure in Austin.

At the conference Quintanilla was guest at a reception held in his honor before the Grand Assembly. Dressed in a tuxedo, John addressed the 2500 DECA members, handed out awards and gave his farewell speech.

Although the new state officers for 1994-95 have been elected, Quintanilla will continue presidential duties through the National Career Development Conference in Detroit. There he will help determine who Texas will support for National DECA officer positions.

Quintanilla is the son of Rita Quintanilla of Tahoka, and Johnny Quintanilla of Farwell.

He plans to attend college next fall and is hoping for a scholarship to play football at a junior college.

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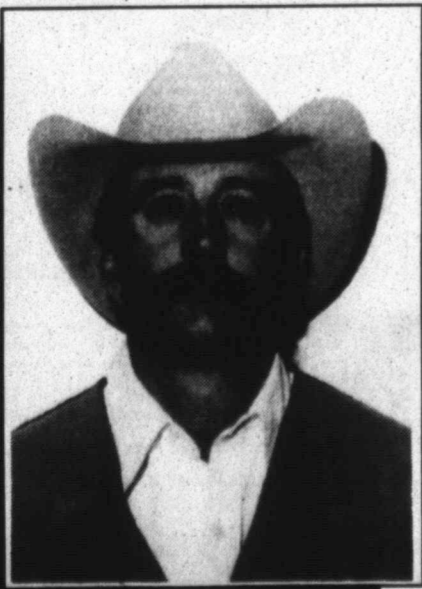

Crop Conditions:

Although the dry weather continues, feed and cotton crops are reported to be holding up well in Lynn County, especially is this true of the cotton crop. It is estimated by reliable farmers from different communities that the yield will be anywhere from one-third to one-half bale to the acre and this without any more moisture

- August 18, 1922

Bathing Of Both Sexes Stopped At Brownfield

Brownfield, TX, Aug. 27 - A mass meeting was held Saturday to protest against the use of a bathing pool by men and women at the same time. A committee had previously conferred with the proprietor on the matter, and he agreed that if the majority of the citizens wanted separate days for the sexes, he would agree to place the rule in force, otherwise he would continue as before.

Eighty citizens attended the meeting, and voted almost unanimously for the change.

- September 1, 1922

Old Stokes Hotel Destroyed By Fire

Fire broke out in the Lynn Hotel in Tahoka Sunday afternoon, and the building and contents were a total loss. The hotel was owned and conducted by C.A. Miller, and valued at \$7500.00; insurance \$4000.00.

The fire originated in a bedroom on the second floor and the flames quickly spread to the roof, which made it hard for the fire department to fight. The wind was in the east and this was in favor of the firemen in keeping the flames from spreading to adjoining buildings.

Craft's Tailor Shop, which is located on the lots north adjoining the hotel, was badly damaged and it looked for a time that it too would go up in smoke, also the Anchor Filling Station was in danger of being destroyed for a time, although both of these buildings were stucco structures.

HAVE YOU FILED YOUR HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS FOR TAX PURPOSES?

1. If you did not file in 1993.
2. If you purchased additional land in 1993.
