Farm Management Short Course Scheduled Here June 5 to 9

A farm management short course for farmers and their wives will be held from June through 9 under the sponsorship of the Muleshoe High School, according to Neal Dillman, Superintendent and Bill Bickel and Jerry Adams, teachers of vocational agriculture. Since the wife is often the bookkeeper and manager, they are especially invited to attend this course.

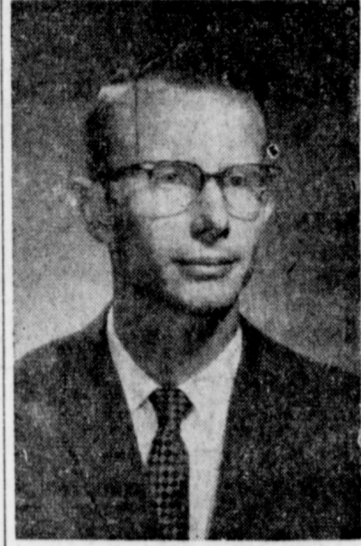
Carl G. Anderson, Jr., farm management specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Economics and Sociology at Texas A. & M. College, will do the instructing in the course.

Mr. Anderson holds two college degrees in Agricultural Economics, a B. S. degree from Texas A. & M. and an M.S. degree from L.S.U. Mr. Anderson has had several years of on-the-farm experience in addition to college and research work in farm management.

Mr. Anderson states that the shortcourse will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but he expects to cover such subjects as agricultural outlook, keeping and using farm records, income tax management, how social security affects farmers, financing your farm operation, and planning the use of farm resources.

Myriad Activities Make Busy Days For The Muleshoe Airport

"OFF THE RUNWAYS"

Two cross-country flights were made by Clifford White on Sunday and Tuesday of this week in the Tri-Pacer.

Sunday's flight was a dual instructional flight under the supervision of Morgan Locker and the course flown was from Muleshoe to Tucumcari, to Ft. Sumner and back to Muleshoe.

They landed at Tucumcari Municipal Airport, visited the office of the Weather Bureau, then took off, flying to Ft. Sumner, landing there briefly before beginning the final leg of the flight back to Muleshoe.

Locker said that except for flying Omni in and out of Tucumcari, White flew by pilotage, which is solely by reference to visual landmarks, and hit all check points accurately and completed the flight around the restricted area of Cannon AFB with ease.

Tuesday, White again flew to Tucumcari, having his course plotted to points west, but anticipated turbulence by the Weather Bureau to the west resulted in a change of course action.

White plotted a new course from here to Amarillo, then back to Muleshoe, called the Muleshoe Flying Service to report the weather conditions and the change of flight path, then flew the route and landed here on schedule.

Both flights were beneficial to Whites training, the first in terrain flying by maps, and the latter, the experience of knowing how and when to take change of course due to unsettled weather which occurs sometimes during all pilots life.

Repairs on the 2-22C Sailplane that was damaged by wind last month have been completed by Fred Boyd, A&P mechanic at the Muleshoe Flying Service.

Boyd replaced the two outboard ribs of the right wing and straightened the wing tip bow

COSMIC SEES:

Hot, Balmy Days Ushers In June

Muleshoe's thermometer stood at a red-faced 96 degrees Wednesday, failing to reach the century mark by a scant breath.

Warm days are to continue, says Cosmic, with century figures anticipated Sunday and again Tuesday. The Tuesday figure may reach 105.

Only .02 rainfall was added to our parched landscape the past week. The May total closed with 1.25 and the 1961 precipitation figure balances at 4.31.

Cosmic looks for continued below normal rainfall as the average over our area, but cautions that a single shower could put scattered locations above the normal. In general we will be dry for about four more weeks. At the close of June or early July heavy rainfall is anticipated. Normal precipitation in June is 2.53.

A closer look at the week ahead calls for: a little cooler Friday, but warmer Saturday and Sunday with the prospect for isolated showers Sunday. A frontal passage Monday should hold the temperature below 100, but aid in making Tuesday hot. Wednesday and Thursday should be below the 100-mark.

Abandoned Well Bill By Osborn Goes To Daniel

House Bill 692 has been passed by both houses of the Texas Legislature and now awaits the Governor's signature.

H. B. 692 is the "abandoned well" bill introduced by Rep. Jesse Osborn of Muleshoe. Representatives J. Collier Adams and Reed Quilliam of Lubbock, Olen Petty of Levelland, H. G. Wells of Tulia, and Richard C. Slack of Pecos co-signed the bill.

Andy Rogers, of Childress, Preston Smith of Lubbock and Gray Hazelwood of Amarillo handled the bill in the Senate. It amends the law under which underground water conservation districts operate by adding several sections that pertain to the closing of open or uncovered wells.

The bill was drafted to give water districts the authority to close open wells in instances where owners refuse to do so. The purpose is to keep some child from falling into such a well.

Weimhold Dies In Levelland

Forrest Weimhold, publisher of the daily Levelland Sun-News, died in his sleep last Friday night. Mr. Weimhold, who was only 46, had suffered two heart attacks, one in 1952 and another in October of last year. He had been publisher at Levelland for twenty years.

Mr. Weimhold's passing at this early time of life has bereft the Plains and Texas of one of its best known newspaper men, and this area of one of its most diligent civic workers.

He had been president of the Panhandle-Plains and of the West Texas Press Associations, and was to have become president of the Texas Press Association in June.

The publisher of The Journal feels a keen personal loss, for Mr. Weimhold has been a fine neighbor, and an unfailing source of enthusiasm and advice. He was considered an expert on newspaper and printing equipment and was at the same time a fine writer and newsmen.

Mr. Weimhold was a full fledged linotype operator at age 9. He and his father many years ago were publishers at Sudan. He is survived by his wife, Ruth.

A San Antonio paving firm was awarded the contract for repairing paved farm to market roads in Road District 1-A when the Commissioners Court opened bids in the meeting Monday.

Centex Paving Company submitted the low bid of \$81,767.12. Others submitting bids were R. L. Garrett, Lubbock; Thomason of Denver City; and Thompson of Amarillo.

County Judge Glen Williams said that the firm likely will begin the job of repairing the approximately 31 miles of roads in the district within the next few days.

change the contract after the road faith check is received. The contractor then has 10 days to study the contract, then the engineer in charge may allow ten more days in his work order. Judge Williams thought this much delay probably will not be needed in this case.

Better Quality Cotton Long Range Goal of Plains Growers

LUBBOCK — Consistency in production of better quality cotton is one of the long-range goals of cotton producers on the Texas High Plains and proof that this is underway and that progress is being made is evident in the 1960 cotton Quality Survey recently released by the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

Cotton on the High Plains in 1960 showed an average grade of Middling Minus in the white cotton, and a full Middling grade in the Light Spotted cotton. These two groups account for about 86% of the 1960 crop. George W. Pfeifferberger, Executive Vice President, explained.

The remaining 16% of the 1960 crop did not include some 7% spotted cotton and wastes totaling 4 1/2% and all other such as grays, tinges, and light grays totaled 2 1/2%.

Average staple length of the 1960 crop on the High Plains was 30.7 thirty-seconds inch with more than half of the crop, 52%, measuring 31/32-inch or longer.

The micronaire average of the 1960 crop was 3.7 with 2/3 of the crop testing 3.5 or better. Pressley fiber strength averaged 77,000 pounds per square inch with 2/3 of the crop testing above 75,000 pounds.

In 1959 on the High Plains white cotton averaged only Strict Low Middling plus in grade and Light Spots averaged Middling. In that year 61% of the cotton was graded as White cotton and about 34% Light Spotted. Average staple length in 1959 was 30.5 thirty-seconds inch with about 54% measuring 31/32-inch or longer. Micronaire was only 3.4 with about 4 1/2% above 3.5 and Pressley fiber strength average was 75,000 pounds with about 47% 75,000 and above.

In 1958, the all-time record high in production on the High Plains when 2,025,000 bales were produced, white cotton that year averaged Strict Low Mid-

been sold and is now in the process of being issued. This money is to be used for the purpose of acquiring right-of-way to widen and four lane Highway No. 84 north and west of Muleshoe to the Bailey - Farmer County line.

The State has re-instated this project for right-of-way purposes and Contractual Agreements between the County and State for the procurement of the right-of-way under the 50-50 Right-of-Way Program have been executed. We are now waiting for the State to get underway with the surveying and other preliminary work.

Mr. Crain, District Highway Engineer has told me that it will take several months to complete this work and get easements prepared. Therefore, it will be several months before we can actually start acquiring right-of-way.

Farmers need not be concerned about their crops or farming operations this year, but any one who plans any improvements along the South side of Highway No. 84 are urged to contact their Commissioners or the County Judge before hand in order to avoid the possibility of improvements being built or installed that might later have to be removed.

Mr. Crain stated that in the interim between now and the time we actually get underway they will make professional services available to answer questions or assist with any matters that might arise in connection with the right-of-way.

The County has done all that can be done at this time. We are waiting on the State. Naturally, they have already scheduled their year's work, but Mr. Crain assured me that they would get to it as soon as possible. We appreciate the patience and cooperation of all the people.

Light Vote Polled Tower Carries Bailey First GOP Senator

John Tower was elected United States Senator in the special election held Saturday, and will become the first Texas Senator to be elected from the Republican party, at least since Reconstruction days. Mr. Tower carried Bailey County and most of the Plains.

His majority over Senator Wm. A. Blakley was better than 9,000.

Mr. Tower's majority in Bailey County was 110 votes. The county polled less than 900 votes. Considerably more than half of the voters stayed away from the voting places. About one million Texas qualified voters likewise "went fishing".

Nicewarner Builds Blue Quail Cover

Cover and food for blue quail in North Texas is being provided on the farm of Joe B. Nicewarner of Morton, who has plan need a real wildlife project on his land.

His work is described in an article in the recent issue of Texas Game and Fish magazine, Edward E. Thomas, a U. S. department of Agriculture clean-tilled, irrigated farm land.

Nicewarner enjoys hunting quail himself and has attempted to provide cover and food as nearly life a virgin area as possible.

He hauls in truckloads of tree limbs. They were placed criss-cross on a stick of posts to provide brush covers. They give protection from both snow and predators.

Livestock is excluded from the area. Weed seed are planted to provide for ample food. Old tires are split to provide water catchers.

He recommends other landowners take similar steps to provide both cover and feed for birds.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 20A AN ORDINANCE DEFINING AND PROHIBITING NUISANCE WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF MULESHOE, TEXAS

Be It Ordained By The City Council of the City of Muleshoe:

SECTION 1. Whatsoever is dangerous to human life or health, whatsoever renders the ground, the water, the air or the food a hazard or injurious to human life or health or that is, or tends to become detrimental to the public health is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

SECTION 2. Any and all of the following conditions are hereby specifically declared to be nuisance dangerous to the public health:

(a) The keeping or maintaining of a public rest room in an unsanitary condition, or allowing immoral and obscene drawings, pictures, paintings and phrases on the walls and area of such a public rest room is hereby declared to be a nuisance;

(b) Any condition or place allowed to exist which constitutes a breeding place for flies;

(c) Any restaurant, food market, bakery, or any place of business or any vehicle where food is prepared, packed, stored, transported, sold or served to the public which is not constantly maintained in a sanitary condition;

(d) All sewage, human excreta, waste water, garbage or other organic wastes deposited, stored, discharged, or exposed in such a way as to be a potential instrument or medium in this transmission of disease to or between any person or persons;

(e) Any collection of unwholesome, impure, stagnated or offensive water, and any water which constitutes a breeding place for mosquitoes;

(f) Any place or condition harboring rats, mice, or other rodents;

(g) The presence of ecto parasites (bedbugs, lice, mites, etc.) known or suspected to be

carriers of disease in any place where sleeping accommodations are offered to the public;

(h) The operation of any gambling device in a public place.

(i) The maintenance of any open surface privy or of any overflowing septic tank or cess pool, the contents of any of which may be accessible to flies;

SECTION 3. Every person possessing any place in or on which there is a nuisance shall, as soon as its presence comes to his knowledge, proceed at once and continue to abate the said nuisance.

SECTION 4. NOTICE AND ORDER TO ABATE NUISANCE.

Whenever any nuisance generally or specifically defined in this article shall exist within the corporate limits of the City, the City Manager and/or the City Health Officer or the Director of the Department of Public Health shall notify, in writing, the owner or occupant of the premises whereon such nuisance exists, and order the owner or occupant to abate or remove the nuisance described in such notice, within such time as may be specified within the order.

SECTION 5. ABATEMENT BY CITY.
If the owner or occupant of premises on which there exists a nuisance fails, neglects or refuses an order to abate, as provided for in the preceding

section, or if the premises are unoccupied and the owner or his agent can not be located, the City Manager and/or City Health Officer or the Director of the Department of Public Health shall cause such nuisance to be abated or removed and shall defray the expenses thereof out of any money in the City Treasury available for such purposes. All expenses so incurred shall be charged against the owner of the premises and shall constitute a lien on the lot, tract or parcel of land and premises whereupon such nuisance exists.

SECTION 6. DUTY OF OFFICERS.
It shall be the duty of all Police Officers and other Officers of the City to watch for any nuisance defined by this Article, or by any other Ordinance of the City, and to report at once all the facts to the City Manager and/or City Health Officer or the Director of the Department of Public Health.

SECTION 7. MAINTENANCE OF A NUISANCE CONSTITUTES A MISDEMEANOR.
Every nuisance defined in this Article whether generally or specifically, is prohibited and forbidden within the City of Muleshoe, Texas, and any person making, causing, permitting, or maintaining any of such nuisances as defined generally or specifically, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

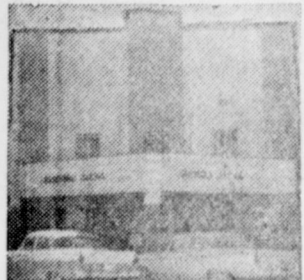
SECTION 8. PUNISHMENT.
The punishment for making, causing, permitting or maintaining a nuisance shall be a fine of not less than One and No/100 (\$1.00) Dollar nor more than Two Hundred and No/100 (\$200.00) Dollars.

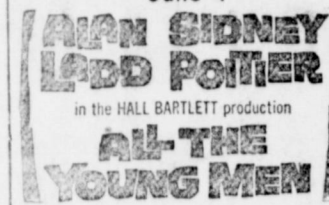

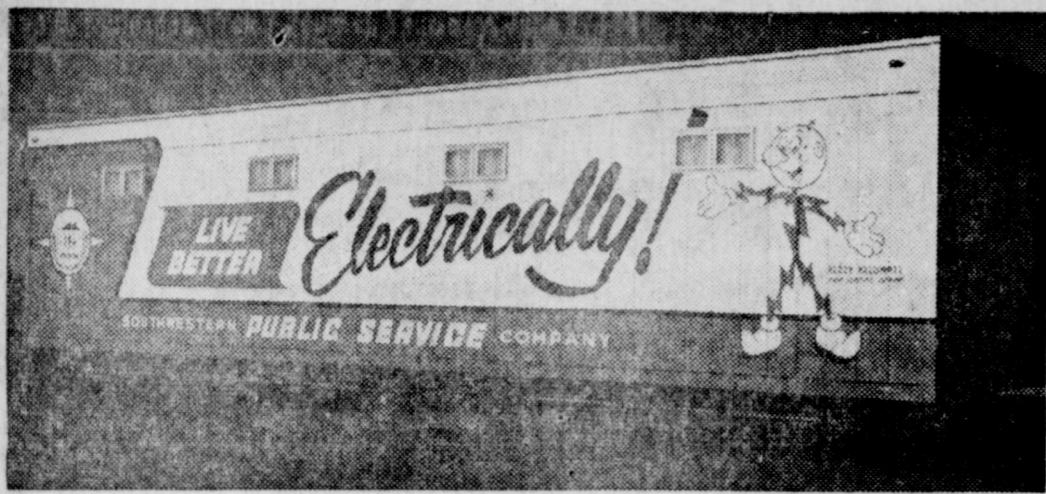

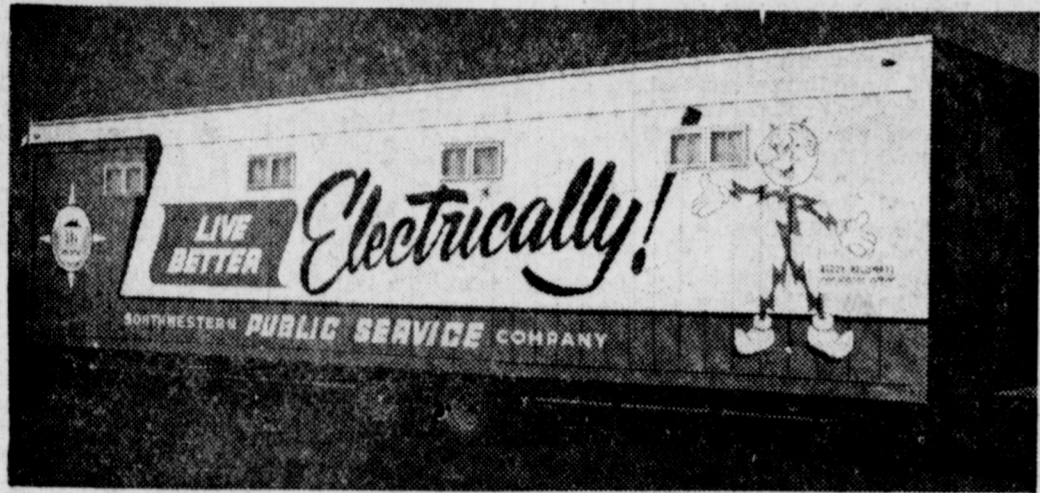

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COSMIC SEES:



The Journal's Cosmic anticipated that Thursday's temperature would be about 100 degrees, but it reached only 99 officially. Friday cooled to 92 degrees.

Saturday cooled more under a mass of clouds early. Warm weather is expected to set in again Sunday and hang on most of the first two-thirds of June.

Warm days are to continue, says Cosmic, with century figures anticipated Sunday and again Tuesday. The Tuesday figure may reach 105.

Only .02 rainfall was added to our parched landscape the past week. The May total closed with 1.25 and the 1961 precipitation figure balances at 4.31.

Cosmic looks for continued below normal rainfall as the average over our area, but cautions that a single shower could put scattered locations above the normal. In general we will be dry for about four more weeks. At the close of June or early July heavy rainfall is anticipated. Normal precipitation in June is 2.53.

A closer look at the week ahead calls for: a little cooler frontal passage Monday should hold the temperature below 100, but aid in making Tuesday hot. Wednesday and Thursday should be below the 100-mark.

A San Antonio paving firm was awarded the contract for repairing paved farm to market roads in Road District 1-A when the Commissioners Court opened bids in the meeting Monday.

Centex Paving Company submitted the low bid of \$81,767.12. Others submitting bids were R. L. Garrett, Lubbock; Thompson of Denver City; and Thompson of Amarillo.

County Judge Glen Williams said that the firm likely will begin the job of repairing the approximately 31 miles of roads in the district within the next few days.

The procedure is to execute the contract after the good faith check is received. The contractor then has 10 days to study the contract, then the engineer in charge may allow ten more days in his work order. Judge Williams thought this much delay probably will not be needed in this case.

Meanwhile, Judge Williams reviewed for The Journal the situation as regards the project of widening Highway 84 north and west of Muleshoe for 10 miles, for which \$250,000 in bonds was voted, also on April 4 by county voters. His summary follows:

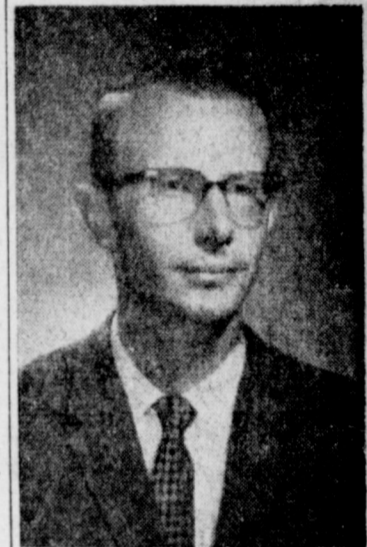
Farm Management Short Course Scheduled Here June 5 to 9

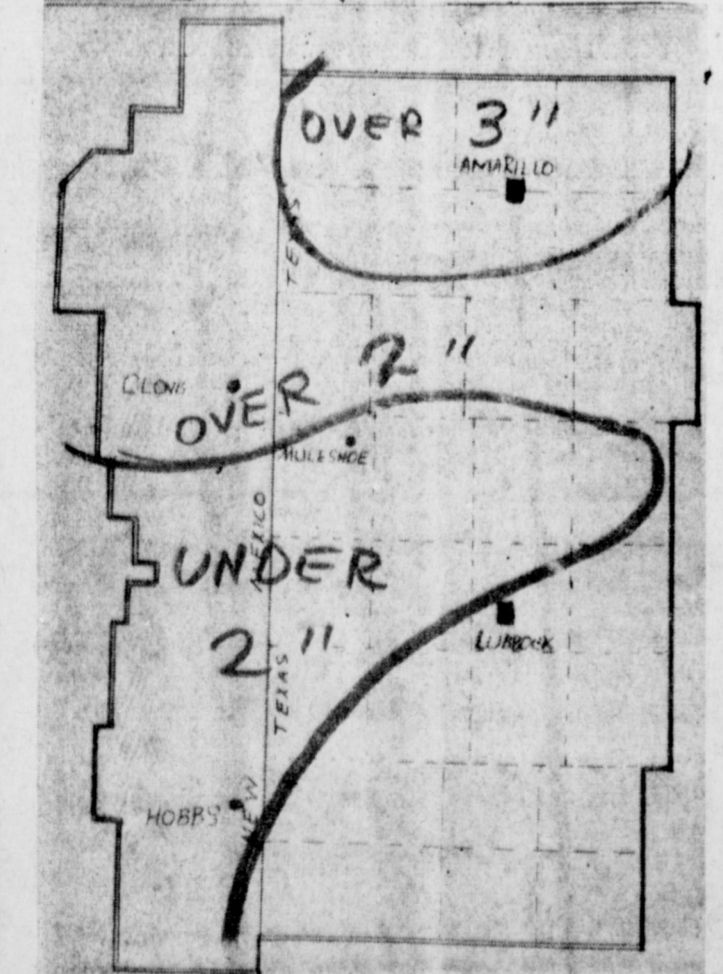

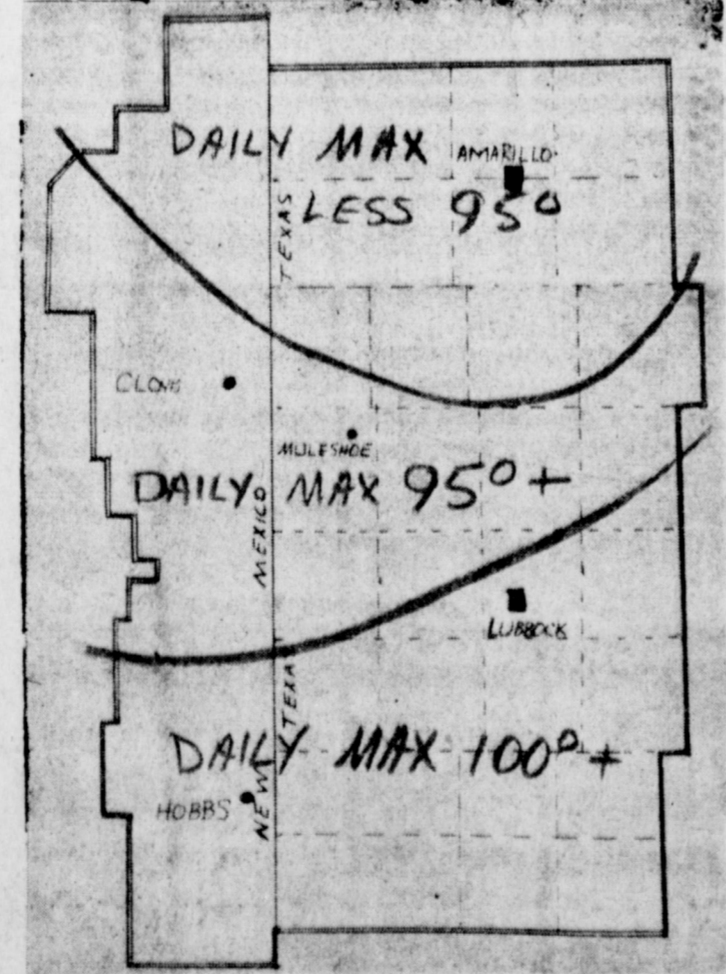

Babson Discusses America's Newest Growing Industry

Babson Park, Mass., June 1. This was the motel industry. Perhaps it continues to be America's fastest growing industry from a money-invested standpoint; but the number of new individual motels declined in 1960. Motels are becoming "big business" and from an investment standpoint may now be classified with hotels. Motels, now, are hotels laid on their sides! Let me venture to say that real estate has become our fastest growing industry.

REAL ESTATE IN GENERAL
 The first English translation of Sir Isaac Newton's Law of Action and Reaction -- upon which the theory of the Economic Cycle and the business of most Investment Counseling are based -- was made in 1729. In those days, this Cycle practically applied only to gold and real estate. The price of gold has since become controlled by the Federal Government; but the cycle theory still applies to real estate. I personally believe that we may have passed the peak of the present real estate cycle.

Of course, the general condition of business always has a profound effect on the real estate situation, -- housing in particular. Since I fear that no great economic boom is now probable, the immediate future of real estate must depend upon other factors. One of these is the availability and cost of money. Another is the cost of new building. Neither of these factors is now helpful to real estate.

CONSIDER HUMAN FACTORS
 Another thing to remember is that the regularity and balance of cycles in real estate activity are especially pronounced. Upward and downward swings tend to match in both intensity and duration. But according to Sir Isaac Newton's Law, it is the product of the intensity and duration which must ultimately balance. As the intensity of the recent real estate boom has been rather magnified, then the duration of the following slump may be greater than expected. This, contrary to most reasoning, but this is Newton's Law.

Overextension and retrenchment are psychological human forces which cannot be measured. Another human factor is the large number of people reaching the age of 20, which means more marriages. This will call for more rented houses and small apartments. The big home-buying age is 30-35. The percentage of Americans reaching these ages has begun to decline. There is, however, a growing trend toward home ownership, especially homes in the suburbs. This figure is now 60 per cent. Hence, rental price rises have fallen below the cost-of-living advance. Foreclosures have been increasing in certain new subdivisions. Office buildings continue in demand, with vacancies of not over 5 percent.

Since the Kennedy Administration's policies should result in higher income for the farmer, I expect a further rise in farm land prices -- especially land near cities, both large and small. The old advice: "Buy by the acre and sell by the foot" is still good. Also remember that each city is growing fastest in some one direction -- it may be "east" or "west" or "south".

should get: Determine the current land values and prices in the area, tax rates and appraisal methods, new roads and highways approved for construction (as well as those in the proposition stage), all pertinent construction plans by government and private enterprise, the growth rate in the area as compared with other sections of the county. You must guess: The length of time before land appreciation will take place, the possibility of being isolated by highways not yet proposed, the danger of sharp taxrate boosts, future cost of utilities, likelihood of industrial expansion, and future prospects for existing industries.

In Summary: Real estate investment at this time can still be sound particularly in relation to many other profit ventures but the absence of any evidence of a great new boom makes it more important than ever for you to select your vacant land investment with great care.

Final thought: Remember how fast interest and taxes pile up!

Fluoridation of water--which must be exacting and carefully controlled--has reduced dental decay in youngsters by 50 to 60

percent in those communities which follow competent scientific advice. Anti-fluoridationists claim there's a difference between natural and artificially fluoridated water. Water with the mineral nutrient fluorine added and food enriched with vitamins have as much purity as ever and certainly more wholesomeness.

To cite an example close to home, in a recent year there was a sudden alarm sent against use of a chemical cotton defoliant containing arsenic acid because some Texas cottonseed oil products were found to have six parts arsenic acid per million. This seemed shocking and dangerous to the uninformed who weren't aware that arsenic acid is also a by-product of sea-food and that a small million. The alarm was soon shrimp cocktail contains harmless 150 parts arsenic acid per quited.

Insecticides, certainly no aid to food enrichment as such, are nonetheless vital to production of healthy and undamaged food-stuffs. Use of such chemicals is carefully controlled and, despite fears and shoutings of alarmists, there is no record of any cancer or other serious human illness resultant from use of agricultural chemicals on food crops.

Fortifying of food is one of the outstanding advances of public health of all times. Vitamin D added to milk and other foods has helped abolish rickets. Salt

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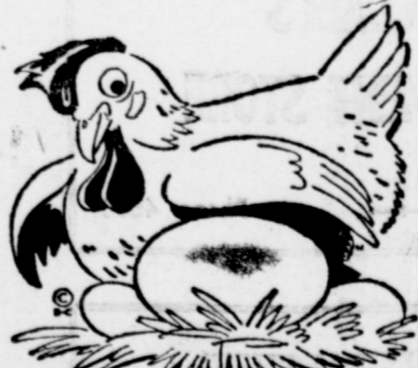
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
