McKean, Page Indicted By District Grand Jury

A 106th District Grand Jury meeting in Tahoka last Thursday returned indictments against five persons for felonies, including a Tahoka man whose restaurant was destroyed in a fire and explosion May 8, and a Lubbock man who escaped jail here for several hours May 21 before being recaptured.

Raymond Joe Page Jr., 23, of Lubbock, accused in the rape of a Lubbock junior high student and also in other sexual assaults on women, was indicted by the grand jury for escaping from the Lynn County jail where he was being held for a hearing related to theft of pipe in the county. Page used a sharpened toothbrush to threaten a female jail employee and fled from the jail about 4 a.m. May

21. He was recaptured that afternoon about 11 miles north of Tahoka.

Michael McKean, 34, of Tahoka was indicted for felony arson in the destruction of his restaurant May 8. McKean and his brother-in-law, Leonard Flores, 29, of Tahoka, were burned in the incident and Flores later died. This makes the arson a first-degree felony, according to District Atty. Ricky Smith of Lamesa. McKean remained in jail this week in lieu of \$750,000 bond.

Three other indictments were returned by the grand jury, all for felony driving while intoxicated. They included George Wayne Weston, 42, of San Angelo; Manuel Morales, 43, of O'Donnell; and Osvaldo Villanueva, 42, of Tahoka.

Wilson School Changes Starting Date For Students

Wilson Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session July 3, changing the 1995-96 school calendar, selecting a school depository, and accepting several personnel resignations as well as approving new personnel.

Trustees heard concerns about the early start date of the school calendar at the audience portion of the meeting, considering a request to reconsider the school calendar for the 1995-96 school year. The previous calendar with a starting date of Aug. 9 was rescinded, and a new calendar with a starting date of Aug. 21 was approved. Teacher workday and orientation will be on Aug. 18, and classes for students will begin on Aug. 21. The first semester will not include an intersession week, but the second semester will include an intersession week if funding permits.

The board accepted several personnel resignations, including Brad and Diann Lane, and Donna Winkley. Approved for employment with Wilson ISD for 1995-96 were Darren Jansen, secondary social studies/

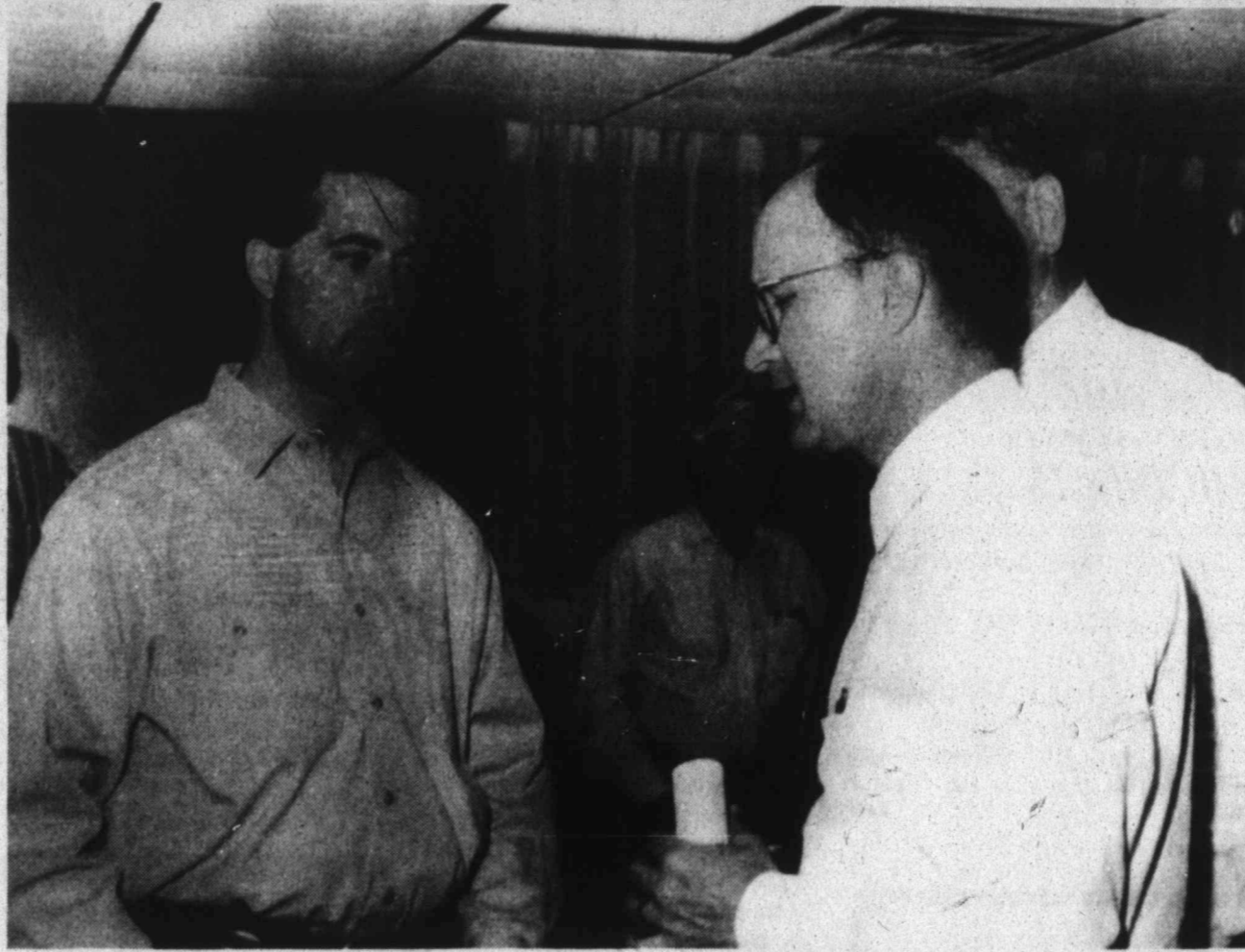
coach; Michael Munoz, band director and elementary music; Arlene Spearman, secondary English; Jennifer Allison, kindergarten teacher; and Yvonne Corro, part-time science instructor. Sandra Stabeno will be a full-time nurse for Wilson ISD for the 1995-96 school year.

Wilson State Bank was selected as the depository for the school for 1995-96 and 1996-97, and a staff development waiver was approved for the 1995-96 school year. The district is requesting three full days and six early release days for staff development.

The board approved Policy Update 49. The new Education Code will be incorporated into local policy with Policy Updates 50, 51, and 52. Student insurance coverage was approved for the 1995-96 school year.

Trustees also approved minutes from the June board meeting, and approved monthly bills.

A public meeting will be held in the school cafeteria on July 13 concerning cumulative voting for future board member elections.

Jerry Ford Named New Municipal Judge Here

Jerry Ford was appointed Municipal Judge for the City of Tahoka, and the Tahoka City Council tabled action on a rate increase for sanitation rates, among other business at the city council meeting Monday evening.

In a unanimous decision, the council appointed Ford as Municipal Judge for a two-year term, effective July 15. He succeeds Melvin Burks, who is retiring from that position.

An impending rate increase for city sanitation rates was postponed Monday night, as city officials tabled any action until a later date. According to City Administrator Jerry Webster, the city is facing rate increases in the near future from Waste Management Company of Lubbock, who contracts with the city for residential and business waste collection.

"We will see a rate increase from Waste Management in October, when the Lubbock landfill is expected to increase their surcharge rates, which will in turn be passed on to Waste Management, and then to us," said Webster. "Also, Waste Management had planned to increase our rates this month by approximately three percent, according to the consumer price index, but we were able to postpone that increase until October, rather than having an increase now and again in October when the landfill surcharge is increased," he explained.

In other business, councilmen approved a five-year renewal of the GTE franchise for telephone service, and approved contracting with Oller Engineering Company for designing and overseeing the lift station project at the city's sewer plant. The \$194,000 lift station project will be paid for with a Texas Community Development Program grant of \$169,130, and the city pitching in the \$25,370 difference in funding. Approved last year, the project includes two new lift stations for the sewer system.

Larry Hagood was appointed as the city's representative to serve on the Board of Directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, effective Aug. 1 for a two-year term. Vernon Jones previously held the position, serving the city for many years in that capacity.

Tools Stolen From Tractor

Hand tools in a black tool box were reported stolen off a tractor about four miles south of US 380 around noon July 4, according to the owner, Jackie Stidham of Rt. 1, O'Donnell. Items listed as missing included wrenches, a hammer and tape measure.

Adelido Rios, 34, of Wilson, was treated at Lynn County Hospital Saturday for stab wounds of undetermined severity and then transferred to a Lubbock hospital following an altercation in Wilson. Sheriff's officers had the name of a suspect in the incident.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated several domestic disturbances, including some with violence, and also issued nine curfew warnings over the weekend. Two of these were second offense, according to Chief Randy Smith, who pointed out that city ordinance sets a curfew time of 11 p.m. on weekdays and midnight on Saturday and Sunday for youths under age 17.

In jail during the week were three persons for driving while intoxicated, first offense; three for public intoxication, with one of these also wanted in Hale County for violation of license restriction; one person for public intoxication plus application to revoke probation on charges of DWI subsequent offense plus grand jury indictment for DWI; and one person for possession marijuana under two ounces.

A FRIEND WHO operated weekly newspapers around West Texas for years before retiring told me the other day that if we had been smarter, we would have published shoppers instead all these years.

Admitting that it's pretty hard to find a city now where there are no really popular shoppers, he told me that one of his family members has published a shopper in Abilene, and now has one in Austin, a Thrifty Nickel kind of operation.

It's all advertising, he pointed out, and you can make a ton of money putting out a Thrifty Nickel or Nickel-clone. And I have to agree that it sounds pretty good. Here are some of the big advantages:

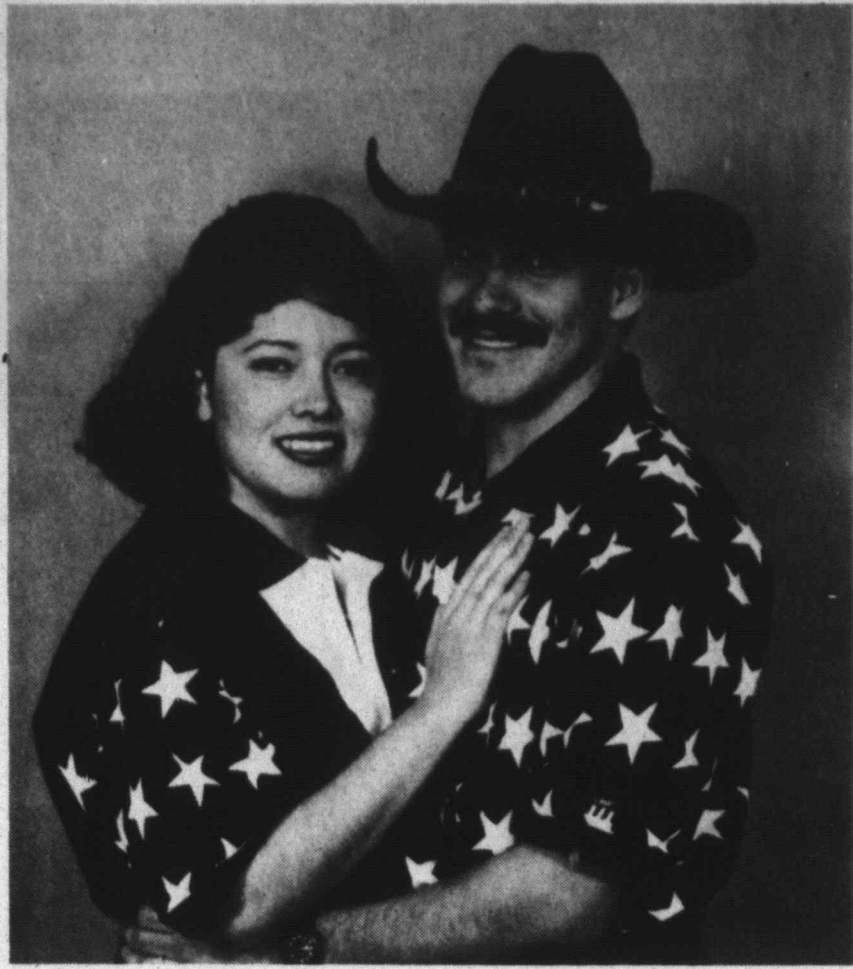
As pointed out, the entire content of the publication is advertising, mostly classified ads, but with some display ads too. People read the publication because of the want ads. It is distributed free; there is some expense here, but the owner of the publication doesn't have to deal with the U.S. Postal Service and its rates and regulations.

You don't need reporters and photographers, since there are no pictures and no stories.

Nobody calls you up foaming at the mouth because little Susie's name was left off the honor roll report or because you didn't print the poem they sent in about recently deceased Uncle Joe. Or because you left out a description of the shoes worn by the bride's mother. Or because you did print that county commissioner Jack Blatz was indicted for driving while intoxicated, third offense.

Of course, there is a down side to printing a shopper. You still have to organize, print and distribute the paper. And you have no medium of creative expression, no chance to write the big news story or feature or column.

And, if what my friend tells me is true, no chance to qualify to low-income assistance.

Electronic Card Replaces Paper Welfare Benefits

In 41 counties of West Texas, the state's Department of Human Services (TDHS) is bringing the electronic age to public assistance. A plastic debit card is replacing paper food stamp coupons and checks for Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC).

Beginning Aug. 1, households in the Panhandle and the South Plains areas receiving aid will use an electronic debit card called the Lone Star card. New applicants for food stamps and AFDC will be issued the card beginning July 24.

The red, white, and blue Lone Star card accesses the state's electronic benefit transfer, or EBT, system. The EBT system transfers funds electronically from the state to vendor's or benefit recipients. Food stamp recipients use the card to pay for groceries at the checkout counter and AFDC recipients use the card to access cash for basic living expenses.

Phase I of the Lone Star card began in parts of Houston last year, and Phase II in the Metroplex went on line June 1. Phase III of the EBT project, brings on line - Lubbock Region, San Antonio Region, Beaumont Region, and the El Paso Region. On Aug. 1, 1995, TDHS will bring over 40,000 households in Region I on the Lone Star card.

The Lone Star card and EBT are expected to be in use throughout the state by the end of 1995.

Poka Lambro Telephone Cooperative Sells FCC License For \$500,000 Profit

Poka Lambro Telephone Cooperative, Inc. of Tahoka has signed a definitive contract for \$6.3 million dollars to sell the license to provide Personal Communication Services (PCS) in the Spokane, Washington and Billings, Montana Major Trading Area. Poka Lambro had purchased the license in the Federal Communications Commission's recent auction for \$5.7 million to provide "the next generation of cellular telephone and mobile communication services."

In selling the right to build a system in the Northwest United States to a consortium of small telephone companies from that region, Poka Lambro will be able to focus on its business plan to be a major telecommunications provider in West Texas.

"The Board of Directors simply felt now was a good time to sell, earn a quick profit, and re-invest that money in upgrading the next generation of advanced cellular-type mobile, digital telephone services here at home," said Mickey L. Sims, Poka Lambro General Manager. In this manner the financial and human resources could be best utilized where "we have traditionally served," he added.

Additionally, Poka Lambro is selling the PCS license for Guam/Northern Mariana Islands that was also purchased in March, 1995 for \$107,000 at auction, the least amount paid for any license. Both licenses had been issued to Poka Lambro by the FCC on Friday, June 23, 1995.

Personal Communication Services are defined by the FCC as "a family of mobile or portable radio services which can be used to provide communication services to individuals and businesses...that will include lightweight, multi-function portable phones, facsimile machines, multi-channel cordless phones, advanced two-way paging and data devices," Reed Hundt, Chairman of the FCC has been quoted to say that the FCC's auction of these licenses represents "selling the telephone companies of the twenty-first century."

In the largest auction of public property (the spectrum) in history, the FCC sold 99 licenses for over \$7.7 billion dollars.

The next FCC auction for PCS licenses in much small geographical

Basic Trading Areas is scheduled to begin Aug. 29, and the new, advanced mobile telephone service will be available in West Texas within two years. While Poka Lambro is planning on competing and bidding for these licenses, the U.S. Government is auctioning off the right to serve defined geographical areas and no automatic awarding of these licenses will occur.

If Poka Lambro is successful in acquiring such a license, by law Poka Lambro would have to divest itself of its general partners' interest in Digital Cellular, a marketing arm of Poka Lambro, which serves much of the South Plains of Texas including the Lamesa, Gail, Denver City, Seminole, Andrews, Post, Floydada, and Tahoka areas with cellular telephone service.

Poka Lambro recently sold its minority general partners' interest in Plateau Cellular, which serves areas west and north of Lubbock, for an additional \$600,000 profit, which will be used in the upcoming FCC auction. Poka Lambro continues to be a limited partner in the cellular telephone operations with Southwestern Bell Mobile Systems in Amarillo, Lubbock, Abilene and Midland-Odessa.

Poka Lambro is a rural telephone cooperative with 3600 telephone subscriber/member-owners, and operates Digital Cellular of Texas, Poka Lambro Telecommunications and Communications Long Distance Company, Poka Lambro Fiber Optics system, and Digital Satellite Television. Poka Lambro is governed by a seven person board of directors elected by the membership at the annual meeting held each year on the last Thursday in March at the cooperative's headquarters north of Tahoka.

Tahoka, Wilson Firefighters To Attend Training Session

Volunteer firefighters from Tahoka and Wilson will soon be attending the Annual State Municipal Firefighters Training on the campus of Texas A&M University in College Station. The purpose of the training will be to better equip firefighters to perform the emergency tasks of saving lives and protecting property of citizens in their area.

Each year over 3000 firefighters are in attendance at this annual school. Those attending from Lynn County will be Kelly Livingston and Daniel Clark from Wilson and Chad Ford and Jimmy Woodard from Tahoka.

In addition to the training the firefighters will receive, the key ratings will be reduced for the insurance policies of the citizens in the cities of firefighters in attendance. The program is designed to reduce losses by prevention, during an emergency, and lower the cost of fire insurance.

All hours of training are credited to the individual firefighter's requirements for certification under the Texas State Firefighter and Fire Marshals Association's program. Additional reduction of key rating for fire insurance is given as additional firefighters in a department's membership are certified. Certification of firefighters is accomplished by attending the required hour of class training and passing the state examination for the level of certification desired.

"Volunteer firefighters are willing to give of their time to answer emergency calls as needed and spend the time to increase their skills and obtain the higher levels of certification. Many times they are required to leave their families and risk their lives during the emergency calls. Through their efforts the citizens receive a higher level of skilled assistance during an emergency and reduction in the cost of fire protection from their continued training," said one spokesperson.

"Volunteers are to be complimented for their efforts to help the residents and individuals that travel through their area," added the spokesperson.

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TxDOT Sets July 18 Open House, Public Meeting For Route Study

The Texas Department of Transportation is hosting an open house and public meeting on July 18 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center, 1501 Sixth Street, Lubbock. The open house will be held from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. and the public meeting will begin at 7 p.m.

The purpose of this open house and public meeting is to discuss the TxDOT Route Study from Lubbock to I-10, and from Amarillo north to the state line. The main topic will be the selection of the five most feasible 10-mile wide corridors within the study area. Three of the corridors begin at IH-27 in Lubbock and terminate at points along IH-10 between Fort Stockton and Junction. Two additional corridors begin at IH-27 in Amarillo and terminate at the state line.

TxDOT's consultants, headed by HDR Engineering of Dallas, are in the process of selecting the five corridors by evaluating transportation, environmental, economic and engineering considerations and by reviewing public input from the first round of public meetings held in March. Over 800 citizens attended the March meetings as many provided constructive comments, both verbal and written, that will assist the study team in their final selections.

A sample of the data uncovered thus far includes:

- The desire to be able to safely travel at 65 mph was expressed repeatedly.
- Concern whether a highway brings or bypasses local economies was raised.

- Improvements within existing corridors offer fewer environmental concerns as well as the need for relocation and additional right-of-way.

- Environmental concerns are relatively uniform throughout the study area with no corridor fatal flaws.

- The existing roadway network generally serves the region well considering the existing traffic levels.

Additional data will be discussed at the July 18 Public Open House.

The public is invited to attend the open house anytime between 4 p.m.-7 p.m. Exhibits and maps will be displayed at the open house and members of the study team will be available to discuss the project leisurely with members of the public. Comment forms will be provided at the open house and a court reporter will be available to take private comments.

The formal public meeting will begin at 7 p.m. A brief presentation will be given by the study team followed by public commenting. Verbal comments made at the formal public meeting will be limited to three minutes each. There will be no responses to comments at the public meeting. Citizens with questions for the project team are urged to attend the open house prior to the public meeting.

Written comments may be submitted at the open house and public meeting, or mailed to the District Engineer at the local TxDOT District Office up to 10 days following the public meeting date. Comments will also be accepted on the Route Study Telephone Hotline by calling 1-800-661-3234.

Temperatures Below Normal For June

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of June 1995 had below normal temperatures, according to the National Weather Service, Lubbock office.

Temperatures averaged 1.9 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.1 degrees above normal at Morton to 4.0 degrees below normal at Paducah.

Maximum temperatures averaged 2.0 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.6 degrees above normal at Levelland and Muleshoe Refuge. The highest temperature reported during the month was 102 at Levelland on the 15th.

Minimum temperatures averaged 1.7 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.4 degrees above normal at Morton to 4.2 degrees below normal at Post. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 46 degrees at Friona on the June 11.

Precipitation averaged 0.36 inch below normal and ranged from 3.64 inches above normal at Dimmitt to 2.36 inches below normal at Muleshoe Refuge.

Blowing dust restricted visibilities below 7 miles on two days for a total of only one hour.

Also, beware that utilizing an inexpensive poor quality refrigerant can prove to be a costly mistake. Freon and other refrigerants containing "chlorofluorocarbons" or CFCs are being phased out internationally to slow down the destruction of the ozone layer. Some black marketers have been importing refrigerant without paying taxes and skirting government agency requirements. The results are low-cost, poor quality refrigerants that could ruin air conditioning systems. If your system needs repairs, get several estimates from service shops with a reputation for good work. Ask the service station to use only name-brand refrigerants. And, call your BBB at 763-0459 or 800/687-7890 to get a reliability report.

Your HEALTH TIP

Mary Poppins Was Right
A small amount of sugary liquid on an infant's tongue appears to act as a sort of natural pain killer before routine, but painful medical procedures. Researchers at Brown University found that when 2 and 4 month-olds received the sugary fluid before a routine vaccination the babies cried less than the infants given plain water. This confirmed findings at Johns Hopkins where a bit of sugar was given to newborn boys undergoing circumcision: the babies cried less. Researchers suggest that in some way the sugary fluid activates the body's own naturally produced pain-killing substance.
