## Fun/Food Festival Set This Saturday

A hospital is one of any community's most valuable assets, and this Saturday area residents will have an opportunity to show their support for the Lynn County Hospital at the 17th annual Fun/Food Festival and Auction. The annual fundraising event sponsored by the Hospital Auxiliary will be held from 5-8:30 p.m. Saturday, April 12 at the Lynn County Showbarn, and all proceeds are used to benefit the hospital.

Several organizations have volunteered their assistance with the event, including Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department, who will roll up their sleeves to cook lots of fish and fries which will be served by Lynn County Hospital Board of Directors. The All-You-Can-Eat Fish Fry will cost \$4.50 per person, available throughout the evening.

Tahoka High School's Future Homemakers of America Community Service Class has volunteered to cook and serve cornbread and beans, and the Phebe K. Warner Club is once again providing homemade ice cream.

Tahoka Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts have volunteered to man the concession stand, selling soft drinks

provided by Lynn County 4-H, as well as coffee, tea and water. They will also be selling brownies and rice krispie treats which will be provided by another group of volunteers, the Baptist Young Women group of First Baptist Church of Tahoka.

All proceeds earned by these volunteer groups are donated to the Hospital Auxiliary.

A Silent Auction table will showcase smaller items in the auction, with paper and pen available for bidders to write their bids. The big event of the evening, of course, is the auction which features items of all kinds which have been generously donated by area residents and merchants.

Auctioneers for the evening will be Billy Miller and Melvin Edwards, and emcees will be Cal Huffaker and Glo Hays. They will be assisted by several spotters, and members of the Hospital Auxiliary who keep the auction organized.

Door prizes will be given away during the evening, and free blood pressure checks will be available from EMS personnel. Health service information pamphlets will also be available.

## Senior Citizens Center Here In Desperate Need Of Funds

Center staff other than Ms. Long include Linda Barrientez, who is head cook; Angie Guterrez, transportation; Marylou Saldana, assistant cook; Ricarda Salinas, who delivers Tahoka home deliveries; and in O'Donnell, coordinators Edna Gartman and Rosemary Gonzales.

In addition to the vital function of providing nutritious, affordable hot meals to senior citizens, the center is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. to provide a place for anyone over 60 years of age to visit with friends, or to enjoy recreation activities such as dominoes, quilting, putting together jigsaw puzzles, or simply to have someone to watch television with.

"We believe we provide a much-needed service to the community, but the funding situation is getting very serious, and we would appreciate not only your contributions, but ideas and suggestions on ways to raise funds," Ms. Long said.

The center is sponsoring a Community Rummage Sale this week, with items donated by area residents, which will be held in the former Jolly Time Video building on Main Street in Tahoka, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, beginning at 8:30 a.m. All

funds will benefit the Senior Citizens Center. A golf tournament benefitting the center is also planned at T-Bar Country Club on May 3.

Last March the center also started sponsoring a Bingo night at the Tahoka Activity Center on South 5th and Ave. L on Friday nights, with all profits to benefit the Senior Citizens Center. But the startup costs on that project, according to Ms. Long, have just now been paid off and the profits are just beginning to trickle in.

"We just received \$677 from Bingo, and we are hoping to see an increase in funds from this project," said Ms. Long.

"We've tried fundraising dinners, which sometimes do well but other times don't, and you never know how much food to prepare. We've tried sponsoring a dance without any success - it's very frustrating," said the director.

The Senior Citizens Center has been providing a vital service, one that perhaps has been taken for granted for too long. Now is the time for the community to show its support and willingness to help keep the center going. To contribute or offer suggestions, contact Kathy Long at 998-5264.

IT'S NEVER A real good idea to go to Lubbock, if you can avoid it, because more bad things than good ones happen up there, especially if you're from out of town.

For example, drivers on Loop 289, 50th St., Indiana or any of the major streets in Lubbock can tell from a block away that you're not local: ("There's some hick from Tahoka; let's all see how close we can come to him with our big pickups... and don't let him change lanes in the next five blocks just because he needs to turn someplace. And keep on passing him and cutting in front of him, even if you have to go 85 miles an hour.")

Of course, sometimes the irritating things that happen in Lubbock have nothing to do with traffic. Here is what happened to me Saturday:

I had to go to Lubbock because somebody told me to "go to the mall and get your glue clothes and cold lesser oil checked", which I did, although I wasn't aware that I had any of those things. After that I went to Carrow's at 50th and Q to eat.

The wind was blowing about 119 mph. I went in, planning to use the pay phone first to call home to see if anybody else who lives there wanted to come up and eat with me. Home is Tahoka, which is supposed to have extended area service arranged with Lubbock, so Tahoka numbers should be the same as Lubbock local numbers, right?

Well, if it is, local phone calls from a pay phone in Lubbock have gone up to \$1.45 (for one minute) from what used to be a quarter. As soon as I dialed it, a recorded voice told me to deposit \$1.45. I hung up and called the operator to complain, but she said I'd have to hang up again and call another operator. So I gave up, and went back outside to my car, planning to use my cellular phone instead.

I had locked the car. The wind was howling from the west. I was parked on the east side of the entry walkway. Just as I got outside headed for my car, sprinklers came on, giving me and my car a pretty good shower. I had to stand in the artificial rain trying to unlock the car. The car got all spotted up. I got all spotted up. Nobody could get into Carrow's without getting wet because the sprinklers were blowing right up to the front door. I couldn't see through my glasses, and I sure can't see without them.

Anyway, I stumbled back inside, suggested they either turn off their sprinklers or provide all customers with soap and towels, wiped off my glasses and ordered some stuff which my doctor says is bad for me.

The food tasted good and nothing else unpleasant happened. But still, it is a typical visit to Lubbock (Lucky Me, I Don't Live In Lubbock).

**National Volunteer Week Spotlights  
Senior Companion Program's Service**

April 13 to 19 is National Volunteer Week, a time to recognize the efforts of two Senior Companions who serve with the South Plains Community Action's Senior Companion Program in Lynn County.

The Lynn County Companions include Audelia Casarez and Buelah Hubbard. These companions are active in the communities of O'Donnell and Tahoka. Most of the companions are working with at least two clients,

homebound senior citizens, for 20 hours each week.

The companions provide companionship, run errands, do meal preparation, and light housework for the client or in some cases he/she provides respite for spouses or families that have the 24 hour care of a homebound adult.

The companion is often supplementing the services of a Home Health Agency or DHS provider service. There is no charge to the client for the service of a companion. The program is run through grant funds and donations.

"As government programs at all levels are cut back and problems in our communities continue to mount, our Senior Companions are a fresh resource for solving problems and a smart investment in our future," says Patty Hartin, program director. The Lynn County Companions and former Companions Trudy Schuknecht and Dorothy McCullough volunteered over 6,909 hours during 1996 — to have hired the companions for what they do would have cost family and the supporting communities over \$37,336.

"There is a special urgency to National Volunteer Week," says Harris Wofford, Chief Executive Officer to the Corporation for National Service.

"To solve our country's problems, we need to unleash to full power of citizen service and make service the common expectation and common experience of every American."

The South Plains Senior Companion Program is supported by the Corporation for National Service, which administers AmeriCorps, the domestic Peace Corps, with 25,000 members; the National Senior Service Corps, which includes 24,000 Foster Grandparents, 12,000 Senior Companion volunteers and 450,000 Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) volunteers; and Learn and Serve America, which involves 500,000 school and college students in community service.

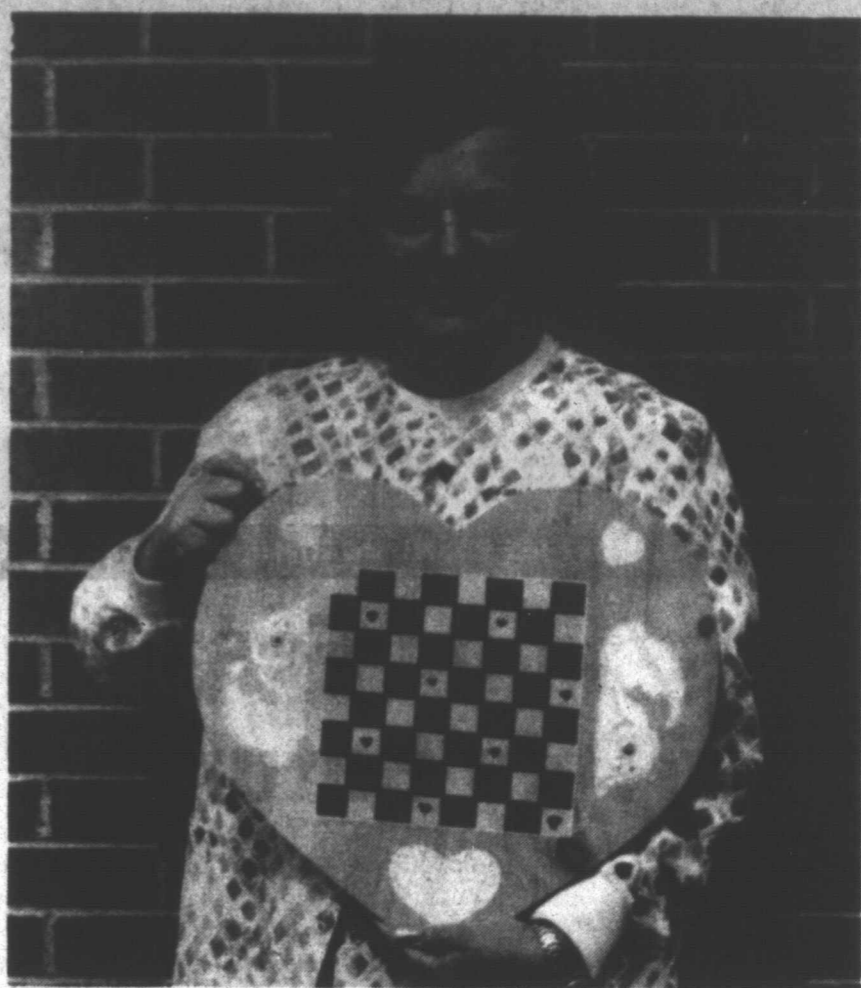

I want to make your readers aware that several organizations are mailing appeals to people in Lynn County for contributions to fight cancer. At least one of these organizations deliberately styles itself after the American Cancer Society in an attempt to confuse contributors. This organization may look like the American Cancer Society, but a closer look would show that it spends much less on educational and patient services and much more on fund raising and overhead.

While there are many legitimate and respected organizations raising funds to fight cancer, many are not legitimate. If you have received a direct mail solicitation to fight cancer, you can contact the Better Business Bureau at (703) 276-0100 or the Texas Attorney General's office at (800) 621-0508 to find out if an organization meets the BBB's standards. I am proud to say that the American Cancer Society does meet all of them.

The Lynn County Unit of the American Cancer Society provides free services to cancer patients, conducts an ongoing support group to cancer patients and their families, offers free educational programs, and raises funds to support our nationally renowned cancer research program. Eighty-three cents of every dollar donated to the American Cancer Society goes directly to fund these programs. Only seventeen cents is used for administration and fund raising costs. These are well within the acceptable limits set by the Better Business Bureau and other watchdog organizations.

Please do not be confused by appeals from organizations who may appear to be the American Cancer Society. Look for the red sword in our logo and the specific name: American Cancer Society.

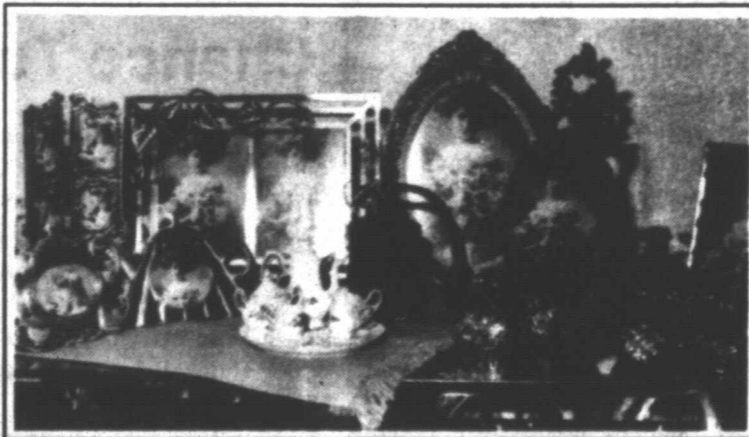

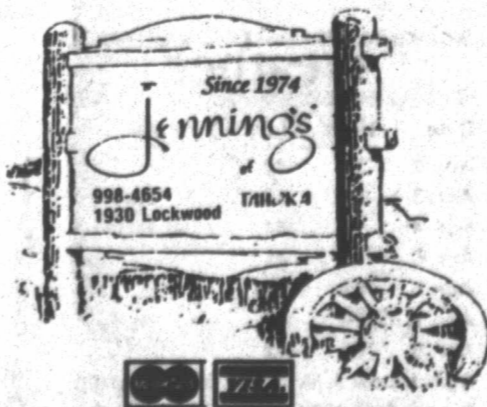

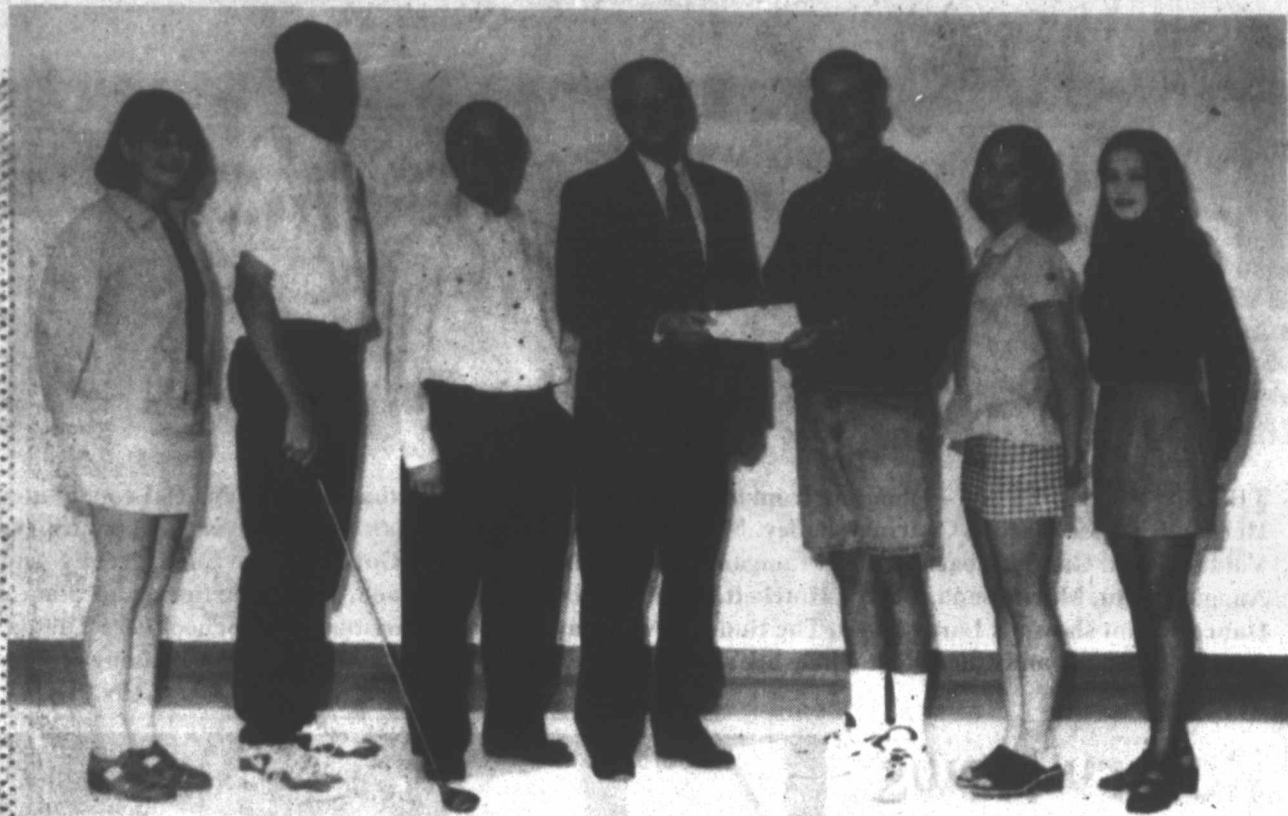

**City To Purchase Mobile Radios For Fire Dept.**

Tahoka City Council approved the purchase of five mobile radios for the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department vehicles at the monthly meeting held Monday night. Cost of the radios will be approximately \$2800, according to City Administrator Jerry Webster, who explained that when firefighters use the current radios in the fire trucks it interrupts the availability of the radios for city police, sheriff's department, and EMS, who use the same frequency.

"This has been an ongoing problem for several years, and the new radios will have 16 channels which can be used," added Webster.

In other business, the council discussed repair work considered at the city-owned T-Bar Airport. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDot) has a program which will furnish labor at no cost, and pay for 50 percent of the cost of materials for such repairs. Webster told the council, who was interested in taking advantage of the program. Webster said sealant for the runway is needed, and other runway work is being considered.

Councilmen also approved a resolution authorizing the city's participation in the Texas Community Development Program, and monthly bills were approved as presented.

Police Chief Steve Chance presented his monthly report to the council.

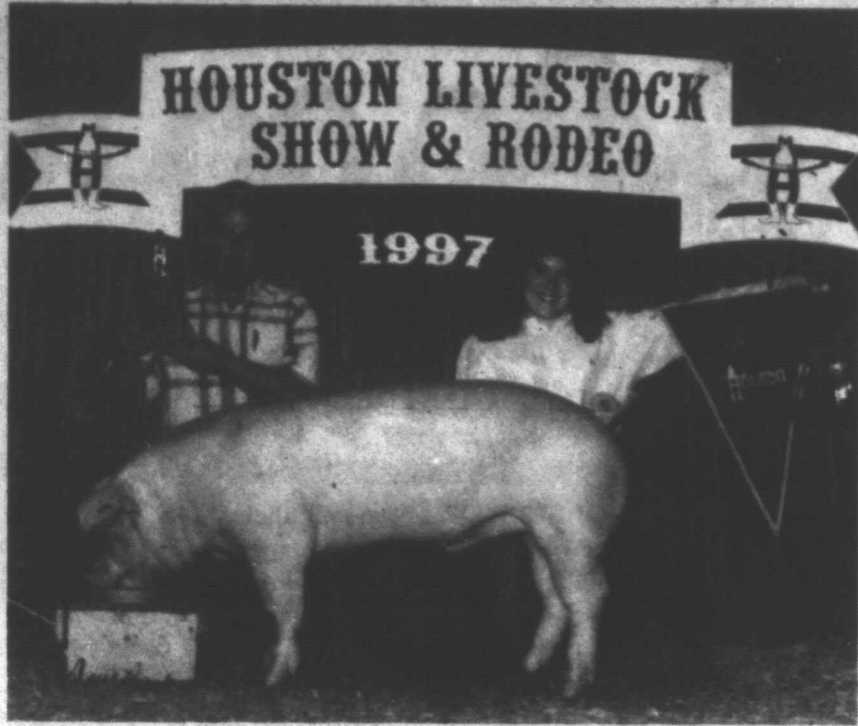

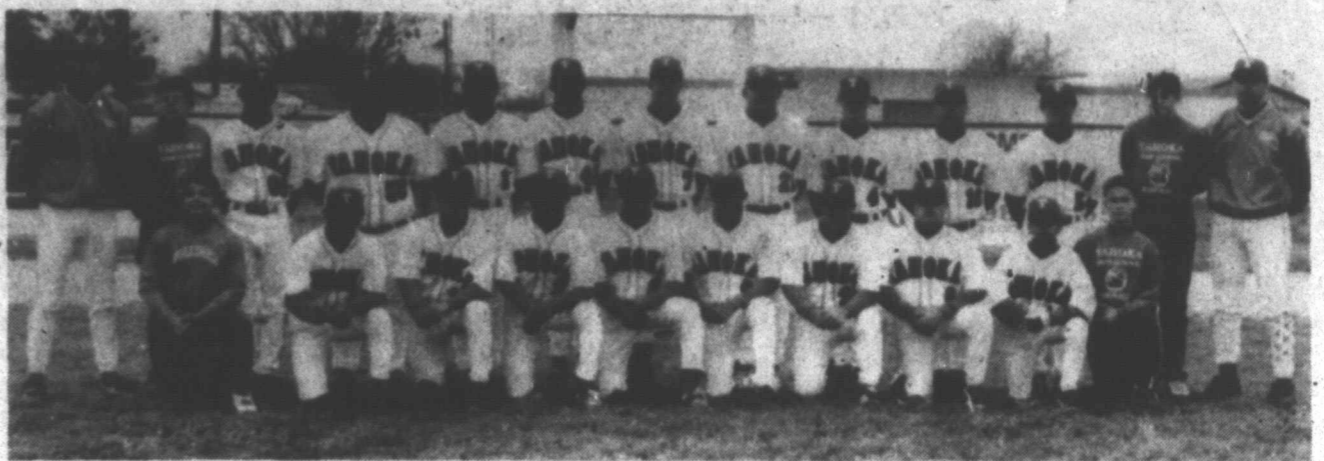

**Rotary News**

The Tahoka Rotary Club met Thursday, April 3, at the First United Methodist Church. Rotarian David Hutton, Tahoka School Superintendent, was in charge of the program. He introduced Warden Dawson and Major Watham of the Preston Smith Prison Unit in Lamesa.

The Warden described the prison as being a 1,340 bed, medium minimal security unit, which houses mostly first and second time male offenders with an average age of 20-25. The compound employs 350 people, most of whom live in Lamesa, and has a full time medical staff of a doctor, dentist and 25 nurses. Twenty teachers work in the prison's school system to educate the inmates. The prisoners operate a mattress factory which also supplies other prison units across the state.

Dawson also spoke about the prisoner work program. Inmates are provided to tax-supported entities to perform intensive labor for no charge. Hutton and the Warden explained to the club that much work had been provided to the local school system by this program. Last year, the inmates painted the buildings of the elementary school. This year, they have been repairing the high school baseball field. Bleachers have been refurbished and new dug-outs built for the facility. The prisoners receive four days of credit on their sentence for each day of hard labor performed.

After the presentation, Warden Dawson and Major Watham, Chief of Security at the plant, answered many questions from the Rotarians. Through their help, public facilities are being upgraded in Lynn County, at little expense to local taxpayers.

Rotary President Haney Wells announced that the annual secretary's day for the club will be April 17. Rotarians are urged to bring their chief assistants for a very special program on that day. Community service chairman Cal Huffaker announced that the Tahoka Rotary Club is overseeing the responsibility for landscaping the new Life Enrichment Center, by providing labor and financial grants to the project.

Visiting the club was Ed Follis from the O'Donnell Rotary Club, and potential new member Lessia Clem, who is a secretary at Lynn County Abstract and Title Company.
