Senior Citizens Center Here In Desperate Need Of Funds

The Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center, which provides weekday noon meals for approximately 120 people in Lynn County, is in desperate need of funds ... to the tune of about \$20,000 in the red.

Kathy Long, Director of the center, told The News this week that federal funding from South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) provides only about one-third of the amount needed to run the center and that the center is dependent upon the generosity of donations to cover the remaining costs.

"For food, utilities, and staff salaries, it costs about \$10,000 per month to run the center. SPAG provides about \$4-\$5,000 per month - \$5,000 is a good month," explained Ms. Long. She also said there are additional costs which cannot be planned for which the center must pay, such as \$1000 for repairs to the gas line recently.

According to the director, the only other designated funds they can depend on is a \$1500 annual contribution from county coffers, designated by Lynn County Commissioners several years ago.

"We had a suggested donation of \$2 per plate for our noon meal, which we just raised to \$3 per plate, and we have cut back on staff and hours (saving approximately \$1500 per month), but by contract with SPAG we must provide noon meals five days a week, 253 days a year, so we can't cut back on the number of days we serve ... and we really don't want to," she added, noting that of the center's 120 meals served daily, perhaps half contribute the suggested

donation. "For a lot of these people, this is the only hot meal they get during the day," said the director, who said that the center also makes home deliveries in addition to serving meals at their location at 1600 South 3rd. In Tahoka, 25-30 home deliveries are made, and 15 home deliveries are made in O'Donnell, as well as 6-7 meals taken to the O'Donnell Senior Citizens Center on the school campus. In Wilson, about 20 meals are taken Mondays and Wednesdays by delivery volunteer Jerry Slover to the Wilson City Office to provide for their senior citizens. Volunteer assistants at Wilson also include Suzanne Follis and Shorty Moore.

Center staff other than Ms. Long include Linda Barrientez, who is head cook; Angie Guiterrez, transportation; Marylou Saldana, assistant cook; Ricarda Salinas, who delivers Tahoka home deliveries; and in O'Donnell, coordinators Edna Gartman and Rosemary Gonzales.

In addition to the vital function of providing nutritious, affordable hot meals to senior citizens, the center is open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m. to provide a place for anyone over 60 years of age to visit with friends, or to enjoy recreation activities such as dominoes, quilting, putting together jigsaw puzzles, or simply to have someone to watch television with.

"We believe we provide a muchneeded service to the community, but the funding situation is getting very serious, and we would appreciate not only your contributions, but ideas and suggestions on ways to raise funds," Ms. Long said.

The center is sponsoring a Community Rummage Sale this week, with items donated by area residents, which will be held in the former Jolly Time Video building on Main Street in Tahoka, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, beginning at 8:30 a.m. All

funds will benefit the Senior Citizens Center. A golf tournament benefitting the center is also planned at T-Bar Country Club on May 3.

Last March the center also started sponsoring a Bingo night at the Tahoka Activity Center on South 5th and Ave. L on Friday nights, with all profits to benefit the Senior Citizens Center. But the startup costs on that project, according to Ms. Long, have just now been paid off and the profits are just beginning to trickle in.

"We just received \$677 from Bingo, and we are hoping to see an increase in funds from this project," said Ms. Long.

"We've tried fundraising dinners, which sometimes do well but other times don't, and you never know how much food to prepare. We've tried sponsoring a dance without any success - it's very frustrating," said the director.

The Senior Citizens Center has been providing a vital service, one that perhaps has been taken for granted for too long. Now is the time for the community to show its support and willingness to help keep the center going. To contribute or offer suggestions, contact Kathy Long at

The companions provide companionship, run errands, do meal preparation, and light housework for the client or in some cases he/she provides respite for spouses or families that have the 24 hour care of a homebound adult.

The companion is often supplementing the services of a Home Health Agency or DHS provider service. There is no charge to the client for the service of a companion. The program is run through grant funds and donations.

"As government programs at all levels are cut back and problems in our communities continue to mount, our Senior Companions are a fresh resource for solving problems and a smart investment in our future," says Patty Hartin, program director. The Lynn County Companions and former Companions Trudy Schuknecht and Dorthy McCullough volunteered over 6,909 hours during 1996 - to have hired the companions for what they do would have cost family and the supporting communities over \$37,336.

"There is a special urgency to National Volunteer Week," says Harris Wofford, Chief Executive Officer to the Corporation for National Ser-



City To Purchase **Mobile Radios** For Fire Dept.

Tahoka City Council approved the purchase of five mobile radios for the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department vehicles at the monthly meeting held Monday night. Cost of the radios will be approximately \$2800, according to City Administrator Jerry Webster, who explained that when firefighters use the current radios in the fire trucks it interrupts the availability of the radios for city police, sheriff's department, and EMS, who use the same frequency.

"This has been an ongoing problem for several years, and the new radios will have 16 channels which can be used," added Webster.

In other business, the council discussed repair work considered at the city-owned T-Bar Airport. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDot) has a program which will furnish labor at no cost, and pay for 50 percent of the cost of materials for such repairs, Webster told the council, who was interested in taking advantage of the program. Webster said sealant for the runway is needed, and other runway work is being consid-

Councilmen also approved a resolution authorizing the city's participation in the Texas Community Development Program, and monthly bills were approved as presented.
