

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

Common Intestinal Parasites of

the Canine by JERRY D. GLEASON, D.V.M. Our friend, the Gog, was many problems in life, however parasites are probably the most common of these problems. In many areas including the Muleshoe area, over 95 per cent of the puppies are parasitized before reaching eight weks old. The dog has four primary helminths. However only three of these parasites are common in this area. They are ascarids, hookworms and tapewor-

ASCARIDS OR ROUNDWORMS

The ascarid is the most common parasite of the puppy. The puppy becomes infected by ingesting the egg of this parasite. Ascarid eggs have been known to live in the soil up to thirty years.

Once the egg is swallowed by the puppy it hatches into a small larvae which makes its way through the intestinal wall, migrates to the liver, bores through the diaphram into the lungs and is Earth, completed the eight-weeks coughed up and reswallowed to become an adult and live in the small intestine.

The parasite feeds on the food material in the smalt intestine, stealing essential nutrients from the dog before the food is absor-

HOOK WORMS

The hookworm is a very small helminth that has a life cycle similiar to the ascarid. Since then, Muleshoe has had more than a steady growth. The 1960 census showed that the U-Bar city's population stood at 3,871, or an increase of 674.2 per cent over the figure of 1930.

COUNTY GROWS TOO The county's population likewise has grown steadily. Only 517 people were enumerated in the county in 1920, but by 1930 a total of 5,186 people lived within the county's boundaries, and in 1960 the total was 9,090.

Muleshoe's growth in the last 30 years has been greater on a percentage basis than larger cities on the South Plains. (See chart,

The city of Muleshoe was incorporated in 1926. Muleshoe is a 36-year-old city with a 37-year old courthouse.

"The courthouse in general doesn't meet state requirements." said County Judge Glen Williams. He stated that the jail was the pressing thing, with no place for women, juveniles or mental pri-

Other things cited by Judge Williams included a general lack of office room for county officials, and no suitable place for a Grand Jury meeting and no jury dorm-

Presently the Highway Patrol is housed across the street from the courthouse.

Probably the courthouse's worst facility is the county jail. Built to accommodate a "full house" Often things get a bit cramped.

We've had as many as 35 people in jail at one time. County Sheriff Dee Clements, who adds that there has been as many as 20 crowded into the cells on

FEW VACANCIES

Deputy Irene Splawn of the Sheriff's Office says that the jail has been empty only about three nights in the five years that she has been with the department.

Besides being crowded, the jail is lacking in other respects. The toilet facilities are enough to turn a health officer's stomach, especially in the women's and juveniles ward.

The lack of space throughout the courthouse is seen in the fact that some old county records are piled on a shelf in this particular

Located on the courthouse's third floor, the jail is approached by a narrow, winding staircase which prohibits the arresting officer from walking side by side with the prisoner. "We have to lead our man up



Jubilette Low established the first troop of 12 girls on March 12, 1912, in Savannah, Georgia. She brought from England the principles of scouting as set forth by Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the scouting movement, and adapted them to the needs of airls in the United States

Since 1912, almost 181/2 million girls, women and men have belonged to the Girl Scouts. They carry on their program in every state of the union, in its possessions and in 49 other countries where American families live. The program itself has expanded and changed to keep pace with our changing times. The basic purpose of Girl Scouting, however, has remained the same, "To inspire girls with the highest ideals of character, conduct, patriotism, and service that they may become happy and resourceful citizens.

Girl Scouts from Caprock Council, with offices in Lubbock, will celebrate their 50th Anniversary in a celebration Saturday, March 17, at 7:30 p.m. in the Municipal Coliseum. Neighborhoods from the 111/2 county council, which includes Lubbok, Garza, Lynn, Crosby, Dickens, Hockley, Terry, Cochran, Bailey, Lamb, Parmer and S. E. Hale Counties, will display projects their Girl Scouts have completed. Over 4,000 Girl Scouts will participate in a pageant telling how scouting can be seen, heard and felt.

he can't even solve the agricultural problem, but actually the very time to switch to some other problem is when you can't handle your own.

I read in a newspaper last night that educators have been looking closely at the educational system in this country and in a meeting in Chicago the other day an expert from the U.S. Office of Education said the traditional 12 years of public education sh-

ould be increased to 14. He said the reason is that 12 years is not long enough to prepare a boy or girl for modern life, even if they're going on to

"The present 12-year program of elementary and secondary education is not strong enough for an era in which the body of man's knowledge doubles every 15 year

he explained. I have been thinking this over and have come to the conclusion that this expert is wrong. The way I figure it, if the body of man's knowledge doubles every 15 years, a 14-year school period is far too short. If a boy learned everything there was to know in 14 years, the year after he graduated he'd still have it to do all over again, as the body of knowledge would have doubled by then. Even if he stayed in school all his life and made 100 on every subject on every report card, he couldn't keep up and would die a comparatively ignor-

Also, if total knowledge doubles every 15 years, what about the teachers? if they don't stay in school themselves full time, 12 months a year, no time out for teaching, every 15 years they are 100 percent behind.
