Soil Conservation

R. E. Ethridge, a cooperator with the Blackwater Valley Soil Conservation District, has installed a sprinkler system utilizing low pressure pipe as a gathering system from four wells to deliver water to a central point.

This water is pumped into a reservoir of approximately 18,600 gallons, from which the water is picked up by a centrifugal pump and delivered into a high pressure line and to the sprinkler laterals.

The primary purpose of the reservoir is to perform as a surge tank to eliminate the need of absolute synchronization of the well pumps to the output pump.

No water is wasted by running over at pump stands nor does the output pump break suction from lack of water.

such that a 50-gallon-per-minute difference between the wells' input and the centrifugal pump output would take 360 minutes to either drain the reservoir when full or overflow from empty stage.

However, as a further aide in the operation of the system, Mr. Ethridge has an automatic switch on the centrifugal pump which will cut off at a low water level and turn on at a high water level in the reservoir. With the reservoir over half full the pump needs no priming.

The low pressure pipe lines on the gathering system from the wells are of 50-foot head asbestos cement and the high pressure line is of 150-foot head asbestos cement to withstand the pressure needed to run a sprinkler system.

The sprinkler main line has risers and valves installed at 150foot intervals to connect the sprinkler laterals to 50 feet of swing line.

The pipes for this system were installed with assistance from the Great Plains Conservation Program.

The main advantage of such a system as this is that each pump and motor needs to be designed to lift the water to the ground surface only, requiring less pump stages and smaller motor.

Lesser amounts of higher costing high pressure line is required. This type of system is especially more feasible on resisting irrigation pumps and motors where it is desired to convert to a sprinkler system. The pumps do not need to be pulled to be re-bowled


